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

Abbots' retreat in the country

JUST off the beaten track between Leighton Buzzard and Aylesbury, Aston Abbotts sits on a hill and surveys the local countryside in a series of fine views to all points of the compass.

The history of the village can be traced back to Saxon times under other names, but achieved its present identity in the middle ages when the abbots of St. Albans selected it as a quiet spot to house their country retreat.

The earliest building still standing is Old Cottage, part of which contains the village shop, and is believed to date from the fifteenth century.

The village underwent a renaissance in Victorian times when it became a fine example of the High Farming movement.

As the countryside became more prosperous towards the middle of the century, landowners everywhere began to invest in model farms with all the latest technology of the day.

The movement carried over into the lives of farmworkers and their families who were rehoused in smart new homes.

There are four rows of such cottages set around the now filled-in village green, all built in 1854.

New houses have gradually taken over the fields and the green and the parish council is encouraging the suggestion of a conservation area around the village to maintain the charm which expansion can do much to threaten.

CHURCH HAS A HISTORY

NIKOLAUS Pevsner's opinion of the church of St. James was terse. "The church is of no interest" he wrote in *The Buildings of England*.

To the casual observer it has the hallmarks of the typical parish church, but Pevsner's dismissive comment probably reflects the fractured nature of its construction.

The tower dates from the fourteenth century but fire destroyed the majority of St. James in 1865.

Also saved from destruction were the parish registers which date from 1559, although mention is made in the first of them to a previous collection of records; and the church bells, too, survived to ring out their message.

There are five of them in all, three being ascribed to Chandler in 1652, and the others to Edward Hall in 1740.

A further feature ignored by Pevsner is the stained glass memorial to Aston Abbotts' most famous former inhabitant, Sir James Clark Ross.

Explorer Ross lived at Aston Abbotts

A FIRST edition of explorer Sir James Clark Ross's book 'A Voyage of Discovery and Research in the Southern and Antarctic Regions' will be auctioned at Sotheby's, London, next week.

The book was written in 1847 by Rear Admiral Sir James Ross at his

home, Aston House (now called the Abbey). Aston Abbotts, after his return from an award-winning Antarctic expedition.

He entered the Navy at the age of 12 and sailed on many Arctic voyages — one of them

he became the first man to discover the North Magnetic Pole.

The book tells the heroic details of his quests for scientific and geographical data, and courageous seaman-ship. It is expected to fetch £200 to £220 at auction.

THE BOOK OF THE MONTH should have been Sir James Clark Ross's "A Voyage of Discovery and Research in the Southern and Antarctic Regions" but I think I will have to wait for the Book Club Edition.

Sir James's portrait hangs in the Church Room, Aston Abbotts and in the National Portrait Gallery, London.

ASTON ABBOTTS COOKBOOK

Barbecued spare ribs

Metric

12-16 pork spare ribs
2 x 15 ml spoons clear
honey
3 x 15 ml spoons soy sauce
3 x 15 ml spoons tomato
ketchup
Tabasco sauce
1 small garlic clove,
crushed
Dry mustard
Paprika
Salt
Freshly ground black
pepper
4 x 15 ml spoons orange
juice
4 x 15 ml spoons wine
vinegar

Imperial

12-16 pork spare ribs
2 tablespoons clear
honey
3 tablespoons soy sauce
3 tablespoons tomato
ketchup
Tabasco sauce
1 small garlic clove,
crushed
Dry mustard
Paprika
Salt
Freshly ground black
pepper
4 tablespoons orange
juice
4 tablespoons wine
vinegar

Cooking time: 45 minutes
Oven: 180 C, 350 F, Gas Mark 4

If not already done, separate the meat into individual ribs. Cook under a preheated moderate grill for 15 minutes or until brown, turning several times. Arrange in a single layer in a roasting tin.

Mix together the honey, soy sauce, tomato ketchup, a few drops of Tabasco, the garlic and mustard, paprika, salt and pepper to taste. Stir in the orange juice and vinegar. Pour over the spare ribs.

Cook, uncovered, in a preheated moderate oven for 30 minutes. Serve piping hot in the sauce.

Book of the Month

To those who await the annual edition with relish WISDEN is a way of life - as important a part of cricket as the game itself. There maybe other glossy rivals, that are quicker with the winters results, but none have that ageless charm of WISDEN.



Wisden Cricketers' Almanack, published by Queen Anne Press: hardback £11.95, paperback £9.95.

Just to meander through its backwaters is a relaxing and rewarding experience - unearth a gem, unfound before; raise an eyebrow in amazement at Imran's 58 Test wickets last year and wonder if, perhaps, the Schools should retain the limited space they cling to.

Another joy of this annual rite is to read the real reviews. Arlott all mellow charm in the Guardian and Gibson full of sound common sense in the Times; although this year Gibson did have to apologise for the late arrival of his review....

The reason is that when the publishers eventually sent me a copy, it turned out to be last year's. I did not notice this at first. I settled down to read "Notes by the Editor", with which I always start, and began to feel a little puzzled. I scribbled down an irreverent note, "Johnny getting a little repetitive". I had wasted quite a lot of time before I realized that in the circumstances this was not surprising.


Any change in WISDEN is looked upon by many as a traitorous act, but with the increased activity in Test and one day cricket something will have to go. The Schools section seems the most obvious, but another candidate for curtailment was suggested by Alan Gibson:

It is another *Wisden* tradition that every cricketer who has achieved even minor eminence in the game has to be given his obituary. You will probably remember the most famous one: Sub-Lieutenant Rupert Brooke (Royal Naval Division) died at Lemnos of sunstroke on April 23. In 1906 he was in the Rugby Eleven, and although he was unsuccessful in the Marlborough

match he headed the school's bowling averages with a record of nineteen wickets for 14.05 runs each. He had gained considerable reputation as a poet.

This was a happy stroke in retrospect, but it does seem to me a great deal of space is wasted on brief obituaries of cricketers who would, surely, have been more suitably, and adequately recalled in school magazines or county handbooks.

But whatever criticisms we may have of WISDEN it remains a classic that any self-respecting cricket fan would not be without.



UPDATE

OUR REGULAR FEATURE ON PARISH COUNCIL ACTIVITIES.

Most of the topics discussed at the last Parish Council meeting, held on Friday 11th. May are admirably reported in the local press. The article in the Beds & Bucks Observer, of the 27th. March was very helpful in encouraging the authorities to respond quickly to a genuine problem. The other report is from The Bucks Herald of the 24th May.

Oil-tank problem for old folk

DIP-STICK DILEMMA

ELDERLY Aston Abbotts residents have been getting hot under the collar about the oil central heating systems at their homes.

The Aylesbury Vale District Council house tenants claim that the wrong gauges have been fitted to their fuel tanks, which makes it impossible for them to tell how much oil has been used.

Every time anyone from the old people's bungalows in Bricstock wants to check the amount of oil in their 250 gallon tank, they have to walk down to the bottom of the garden, climb a six-foot ladder and test the level in the tank with a dipstick.

With the ages of the 15 tenants ranging from 70 to 80 this is all a bit too much, and they are getting really fed up with the situation, particularly as they allege the council has known about the problem since the homes were built a few years ago and has done nothing.

The village's parish councillors are so concerned about the problem they have asked the clerk David Watts to write to the district council.

Mr Watts said he was very anxious about the problem and added: "We intend to take steps to remedy the position."

Aylesbury Vale said they didn't know of any complaints, but the council's housing manager Michael Belton said the council would be looking into the matter.

He added if it was found that the wrong gauges had been fitted new ones would be installed.

One of the topics that is not mentioned in the press was the report that the coin box for the public telephone was too full to use. British Telecom reported that it was emptied regularly but on a recent visit was found inoperative because it was 'stuffed with rubbish'. This is silly and potentially dangerous petty vandalism, which it was hoped would not recur.

Chairman, Cllr. John Whyte; Vice-chairman, Cllr. Peter Dines; Cllr. J. Whyte and Mr. D. Watts representatives for Bucks Association of Parish Councils; Cllr. Colin Higgs, representative on Bucks Road Safety and Rural Transport committees.

It was agreed to send copies of the village conservation plan to the C.P.R.E. and Friends of the Vale, and members were asked to note that allotment gardens shown on the plan, being sited at R/O 5-11, The Green were in fact private gardens.

Cllr. Graham Parker

asked for a vote of thanks to be passed to M.P.S. for their recent redecoration scheme at the churchroom.

Cllr. Higgs again expressed concern over the road surfaces in Wingrave Road and Lines Hill due to the heavy vehicles on the pipeline scheme and the Wingrave Road infill site.

Cllr. R. Keen, a county councillor reported that he hoped the pot hole filling and the extension of Wingrave Road footpath would be carried out shortly and likewise the erection of the chevron signs in Moat Lane.

Various planning applications for the village were observed and members noted the village had been entered for the Best Kept Village competition with the first round of judging to take place at the end of the month.

Gardening

The drought that has been with us for the last few weeks has now ended. After the good rain, it is time to set out our bedding plants. Take up the daffodils, take off the dead heads but not the flower stem or any leaves for, at least, six weeks because they are building up the bulb for next years flowers. Replant straightaway in a trench somewhere out of the way and they will be safe until required for planting again.

This leaves the flower beds free for a good dog mixing in some compost or put on a dressing of a general fertiliser before putting in the bedding plants and they will give you a good show very quickly.

A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

The celebration of our Prime Minister's five years in office prompts me to enquire about the progress of women's rights in our modern society. Is it still predominantly a man's world?

In the Easter Services this year, I asked the congregations to tell me what the Resurrection meant to them as individuals. The response was good. Quite a few Christians told me - were not afraid to tell me - what Christ's rising from the dead meant to them.

I had some surprises. In most cases Easter Day was a time to remember the assurance of life after death. Few seemed to find reassurance about life in this world. I found that very interesting and, in some ways, puzzling. Several folk felt that the Resurrection Appearances were particularly important, and help us now to contemplate Jesus alive today. But I mustn't overplay that because such feelings were not as strong as those about the after life.

One observation particularly interested me because I had thought about it so much myself. The Resurrection Appearances began to WOMEN.

Women play a large part in Christ's ministry right the way through to the crucifixion. The first person to know that he was the Messiah was a woman (John 4: 26). It seems sad to me, therefore, that the Church of England cannot make up its mind about the ordination of women.

Now, I'm not a special advocate of the movement known as "feminism". But I did believe that when Mrs. Thatcher became our Prime Minister she would lead us forward. I thought to myself, if the so called "conservative-party-at-prayer" (it isn't, surely!) couldn't see its way clear to promoting the ministry of women, at least that Party would be able to do something for their status in society.

So, although Mrs. T. did not get my vote, I was glad in many ways to see a woman in that position. After all, there is a sensitivity in the character of women that our political life badly needs. Not a namby-pamby, sentimental softness, but that essential kindness so often missing in the male of the species. I thought she would bring women forward into a man's world, and show what feminine grit, guts, and determination could do.

What has happened? Our P.M. has surrounded herself with men. The Government of this country is still run by men, and the Lady has truly proved herself to be as hard as any man I know. The Iron Lady has certainly got grit, guts, and determination to carry our policies which give little help to broken homes and shattered lives of the jobless men and women who are the victims of a seemingly heartless society.

Please don't leave me! I not looking for an argument about British party politics. I'm just disappointed and disillusioned about the rightful place of women. The established Church is dominated by men who obviously feel threatened by the possibility of being ousted from their position.

Our Lord leads us to believe in the equality of all people in the sight of God. His great Apostle wrote: 'In Christ Jesus there is neither male nor female, but all are one' (Galations 3: 28). May the day soon come when that is acknowledged across the whole spectrum of religion and politics. Or, have we got to wait for the perfect coming of the kingdom of God? I pray not.


