Parish Council

Unofficial notes from the Parish Council meeting of 30th October

Matters arising: the street light in Moat Lane is to be put onto a longer arm, thus moving it out 3m closer to the road.

Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC) have once more refused to instal a footway light at the bungalows in Bricstock but suggest the parish council pay for it. We decided to ask advice once more of Bryan Round, our district councillor, and also to find out how much it would cost to do it ourselves.

Planning applications: slurry pit at Red Barn Farm, no comment.

Field shelter in field by Weedon Road: after some discussion we recommended this be refused, partly because of its being in an 'area of natural beauty' and would spoil view from bridleway, and partly because of its large size. Both now go to AVDC for decision.

Accounts: electricity (street lights) £26.74; Sharp electrics, £35 for repair of light by 8 The Green.

Recreation Ground: Agreed to pay £285 from recreation ground account for materials used in building the new storage shed. Agreed to buy three new (solid) swing seats to replace the worn tyres. The question of safety surfacing became very confused and referred to the Rec. committee to look into pros, cons, costs etc. Decided to apply to the Village Fund for money to buy a second seat.

Reports: from the Road Safety and Highways Consultative Committee (Bucks County Council) attended by Caroline Lane and Colin Higgs; and AVDC's Parish Forum (attended by Caroline and Margaret Chesher). The former mostly about speeding and road surfaces, the latter AVDC's plans for the next 5 years (a consultative document has been published) and implications of local government reorganization. Please ask if you would like to know details of either meeting.

Wing School Speech Day: Roy Malin is to represent the parish council.

AOB: Agreed to buy a new tree to replace the young one lost by the bus shelter. Agreed to go ahead with restoration of the Church Row pump following receipt of a grant of £225 from the Shell Better Britain Campaign.

Whoops: The last report said the precept (parish council's annual income) was £2,000. It is in fact £3,000.

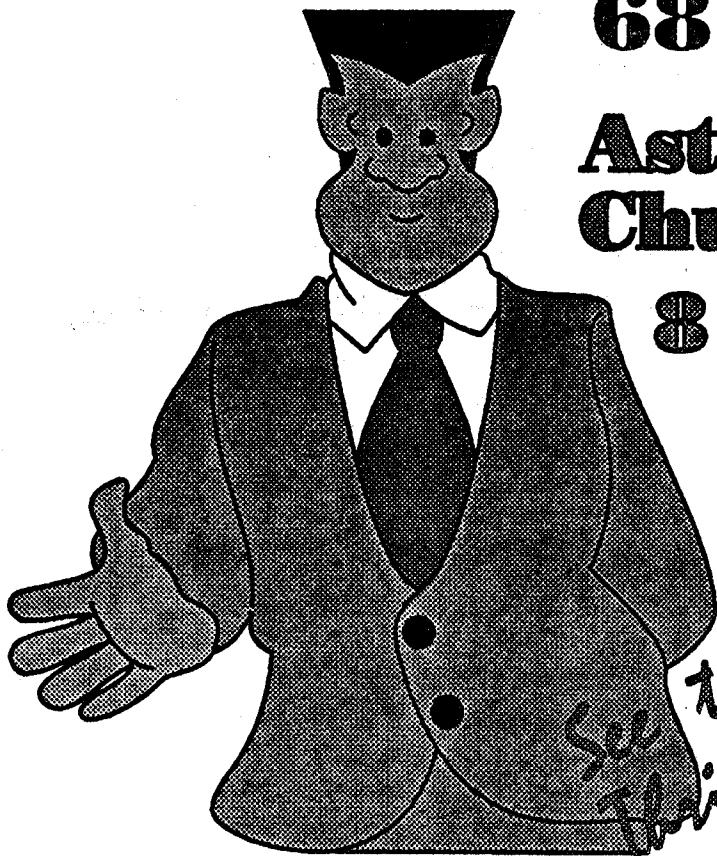

A MONTHLY LOOK AT FACTS YOU NEVER WANTED TO KNOW

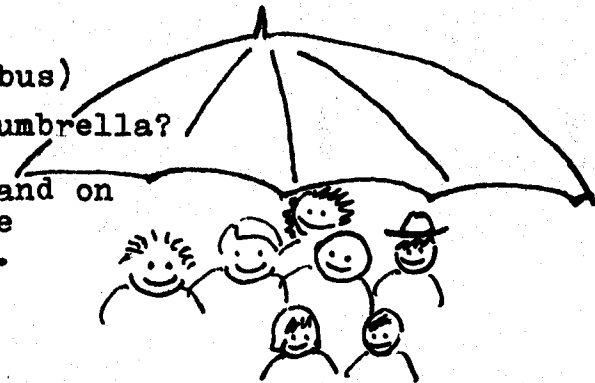

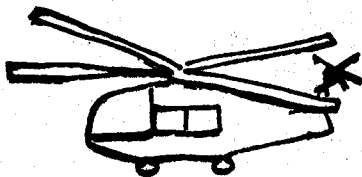

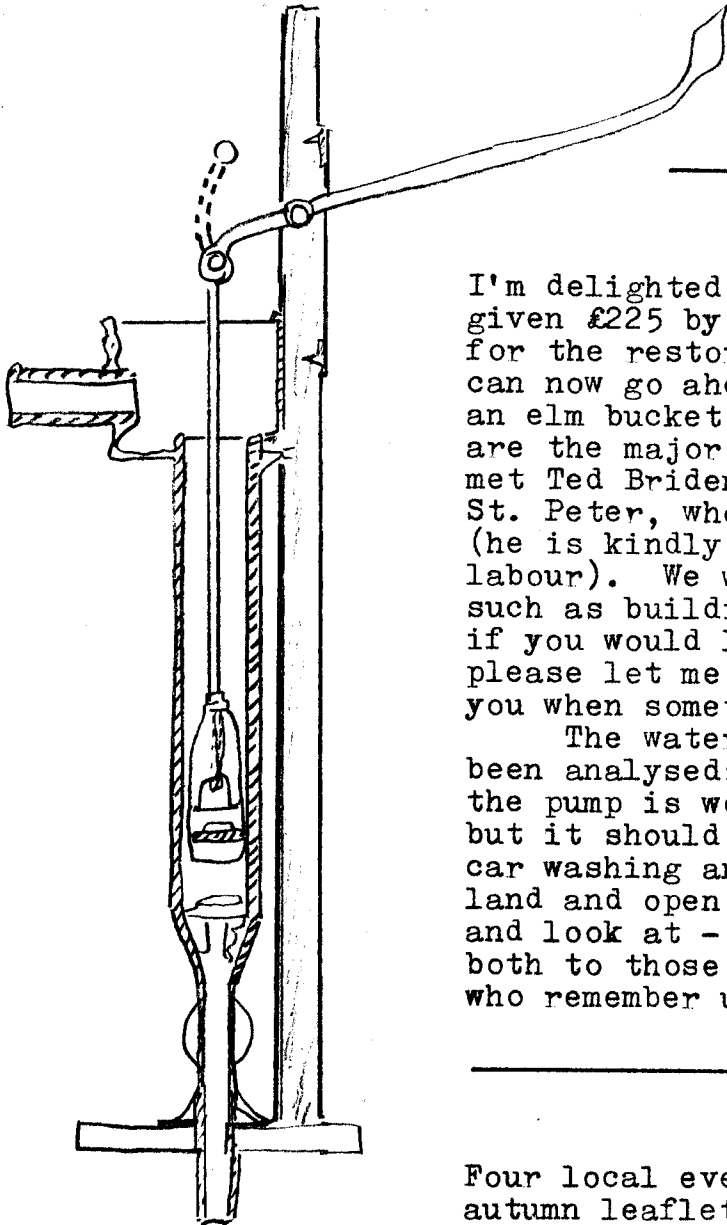

Church Row Pump

I'm delighted to report that we have been given £225 by the Shell Better Britain Campaign for the restoration of the Church Row pump. We can now go ahead and order the parts we need - an elm bucket, a new rod, and a new oak post are the major items. Some of you have already met Ted Briden, a retired plumber from Chalfont St. Peter, who will be in charge of the work (he is kindly not charging the village for labour). We will need help for various tasks such as building a small retaining wall, so if you would like to help, or simply watch, please let me or Chris Fox know and we will tell you when something is happening.

The water in the well next to the pump has been analysed; the quality should improve once the pump is working and the water is moving, but it should in any case be fine for garden use, car washing and so on. The pump is on common land and open to anyone in the village to come and look at - we hope it will be interesting both to those brought up on mains water and those who remember using pumps every day.

Last chance for tree cash

LANDOWNERS who want to take part in tree planting schemes have only a little time left to apply for a grant from Bucks County Council.

The cash is available under the landscape rehabilitation scheme run by the council and supported by the Countryside Commission's Task Force Trees.

The scheme is in its sixth and final year and is designed to encourage tree planting on both public and private land.

To qualify for a grant, planting schemes must be small - less than a quarter of a hectare - consist of native species, and be visible to the public either from roads or other public rights of way.

RELATE

Village justice, 13th century

Step back 700 years, and the village of Aston Abbotts would be almost unrecognizable. These extracts from the court rolls of the manor of Aston Abbotts in the 13th century remind us that there were real people here, who had real disputes and were hauled before the court for their resolution. The feudal system was still in full swing, with the manor under the rule of the Abbey of St Albans, and many people serfs with no freedom to choose where they went - still 100 years before the Peasants' Revolt. The book from which these extracts come is in the British Library (BL Ms Egerton 3317), an entry book of copies of court rolls originally in Latin. Many thanks to Mr and Mrs von Simson for passing this on.

The Court of Aston held on Thursday next before the feast of St Dennis, in the 14th year of the reign of King Edward (12th October 1285)

William le Man puts himself in mercy for rescue* done against the beadle and afterwards for breaking the pound of his lord. By sureties: Thomas Belle and William Edward.

Robert of Drayton puts himself in mercy for his wife and son for rescue done on the beadle.

(10th November 1285)

Plea between Gilbert Suth's wife and Alice Brun: it was determined that Alice Brun should give to the wife of the said Gilbert 6d for her losses by surety of John Davy and the said Alice in the lord's mercy. And let her say every day for a year the Lord's Prayer five times for the Abbot and Convent.

From William Wateman, in that he can be outside the lord's service and can be wherever he likes up to the feast of St Michael next following, 2s.

From William Shepherd for having a licence for marrying his daughter, 4s.

(17th December 1286)

William Shepherd gives the lord 2s so that he should not be reeve,** (So did Roger Edward. An unpopular job?) - On which day Reinald is made reeve.

There was a to-do on 12th February 1287:

Thomas Belle puts himself in mercy because he was convicted through inquisition of Robert Miller about debt...The same Thomas convicted against the same Miller for defamation. Therefore in mercy...Also Robert Miller on inquisition against Thomas Belle about unjust toll...

Alexander Carpenter puts himself in mercy because his miller wrongly carried off the manor hedge for timber.

* "rescue" means the improper removal of impounded animals.

** The reeve was a foreman elected to supervise labour on the manor.

Village justice cont.

(12th February 1287)

Alexander Carpenter took the mill of Aston at farm on St Martin's day at the beginning of the term up to the end of two years next following fully completed for eight quarters of corn per year and the said farmer, if it should be necessary within the said time, to mend and repair with large timber. The Kitchener is to find and to mend at the expenses of the Kitchener and to do then, if it should be necessary, that rods be put into position or newly made ready and that the Kitchener will find new rod and the said farmer at his own costs will have repair done and the old rodding to remain to him; and the said farmer at his own costs, is to have the body of the mill roofed and to repair the walls with the timber of the Kitchener and is to repair the cogs and rungs with the mill at his own expense and is to have it repaired; and he will have all the old timber for his work and he will receive nothing for the work from the lord except for the carpentry of the heavy timber as is aforesaid; but when the work is done he will have one meal a day at free board and he will be at the lord's food for four days at Christmas and the said farmer will find and will leave at the end of the term, the mill bare. And the Kitchener will find stones, pipes and rung and he will have it put right whenever need arise. And he will have milled annually without charging toll as much corn as relates to free board with ale. And everything is to be faithfully observed in this; he will find such sureties as Reynald of the Gate, William Lucas, Stephen Smith and Ralf Canun. And these all bind themselves to answer for the said Alexander on any of the above particulars which are not observed.

(Stern stuff. There was another row reported on 20th November; if only we could have witnessed it...!)

William Shepherd complains of the whole vill(age) because they unjustly took ld for 14 years last past for one annual rent which he had in the pasture. For which pasture they give half a mark to his loss. They came and say that they took that penny justly and he puts himself on the verdict of the lord's kitchener and of John the vicar who ask of the said William Shepherd if the men of the vill can impound their animals found in the pasture and for this they give $\frac{1}{2}$ mark and reply that it is so and he defends himself. They can impound. It seems that this plea is unjust and for a false plea he is in mercy.

Thus the whole vill is in mercy because they make defence. William Shepherd can impound the animals of the vill if they are found in the pasture and this they acknowledged in full court and afterwards they came and made denial, so all in mercy.

(This was evidently considered very carefully - if anyone can disentangle the argument, please let us know!)

The term began with a revue of our examination results, which were excellent. Our last Year 11 students are to be congratulated.

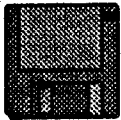
Out of 101 Year 11 students 29% gained grades A - C and 2 students achieved these grades in 11 subjects.
