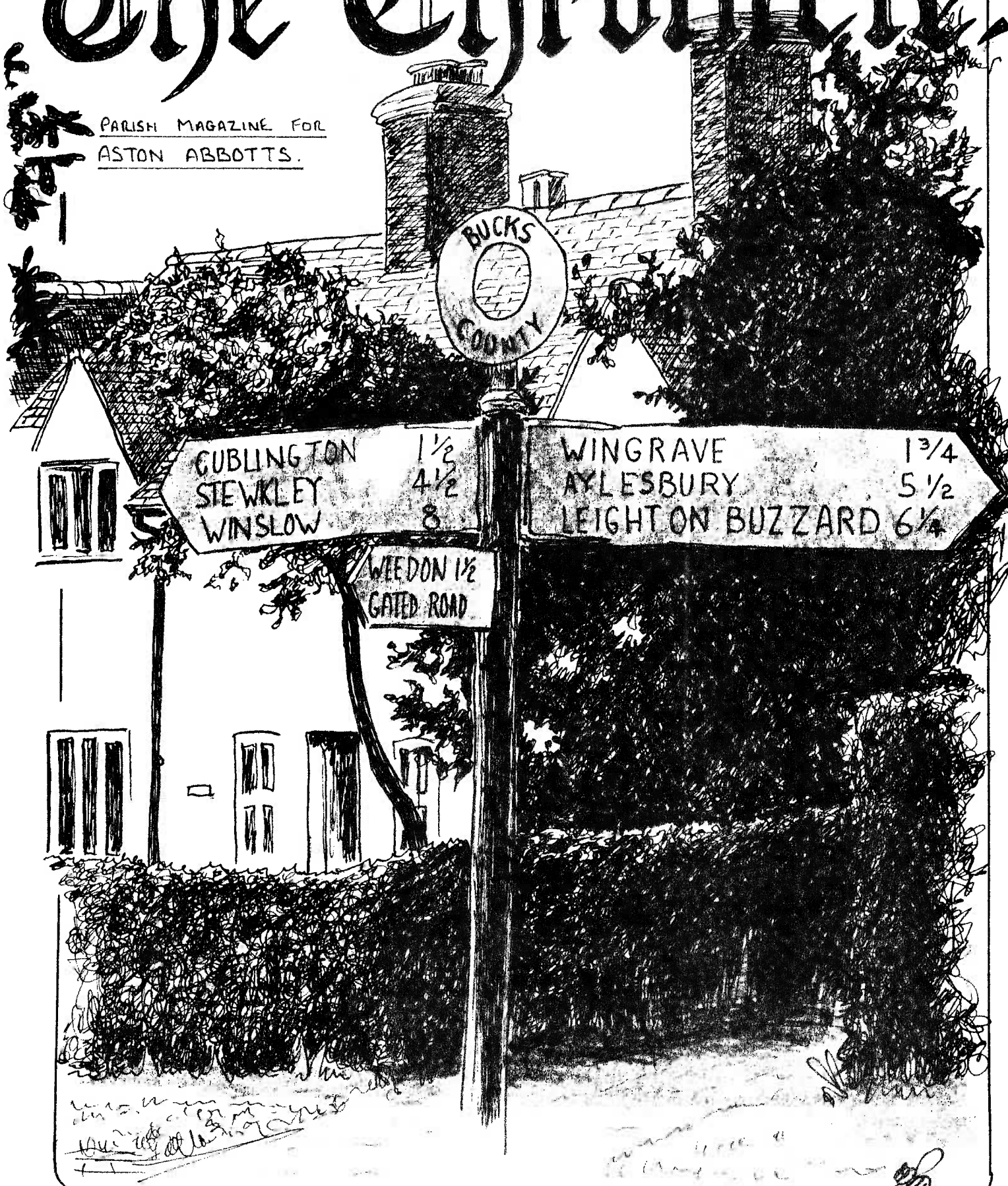

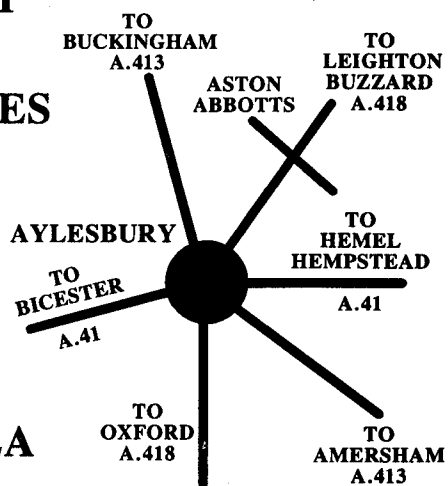

101 (WELL NEARLY) USES FOR A DEAD TURKEY

Well, after all that preparation, it's over for another year. The presents are all unwrapped, toys lay broken, the tree looks like Yul Brynner and the eternal problem: What to do with all that left over turkey? As ever, you were carried away once you heard that Auntie Ethel was coming for Christmas, and so, 'full of the Christmas spirit', you bought a turkey four times bigger than you needed. Well! Here are a few helpful suggestions;-

1. BUY A CAT. - A bit drastic of course, and even cats get cheesed off with turkey every day for a fortnight. Also, once the turkey has finally gone you'll be left with an extremely fat cat that will have developed a taste for fresh meat, an aversion to the canned variety and given the choice, in tests, 8 out of 10 cats would not buy Whiskers.

2. CURRY IT. - Lets face it, by the time the new year gets here the very look of turkey is enough to turn even the hardiest meat eater, vegetarian. So, disguise it in a curry sauce. This has the advantage that you make it hot enough that it doesn't even taste like turkey; in fact make it very hot and you won't taste anything again until next Christmas.

3. SOUP IT. - For those dedicated lovers of turkey who have dismissed 1. and 2, (and who probably have eaten all their turkey any way,) the problem remains: What to do with the carcass? Easy! Simply throw the remains with an onion, celery, carrots, a bouquet garni, water to cover and any other left overs into a large pan. Bring to the boil and simmer for ages. Those less devout turkey worshippers will either then freeze it or throw it away once the smell of simmering turkey has permeated every fibre of the house. The turkey lover will box it up into portioable size tubs, religiously freeze it and at weekly intervals defrost, re heat and savour the great taste of turkey every week until next Christmas.

4. STIR FRY. - Ingredients;- Turkey cut into thin strips, bunch of spring onions chopped, sliced red and green pepper, crushed clove of garlic, teaspoon of ground ginger (more or less depending how much you want to take away the taste of turkey), bean sprouts, mushrooms (thinly sliced), two table spoons of oil, two table spoons of Soy Sauce, * three table spoons of Sherry.

*Suggest you omit this and just give every one a large glass of Sherry to put them in the mood for yet more turkey!

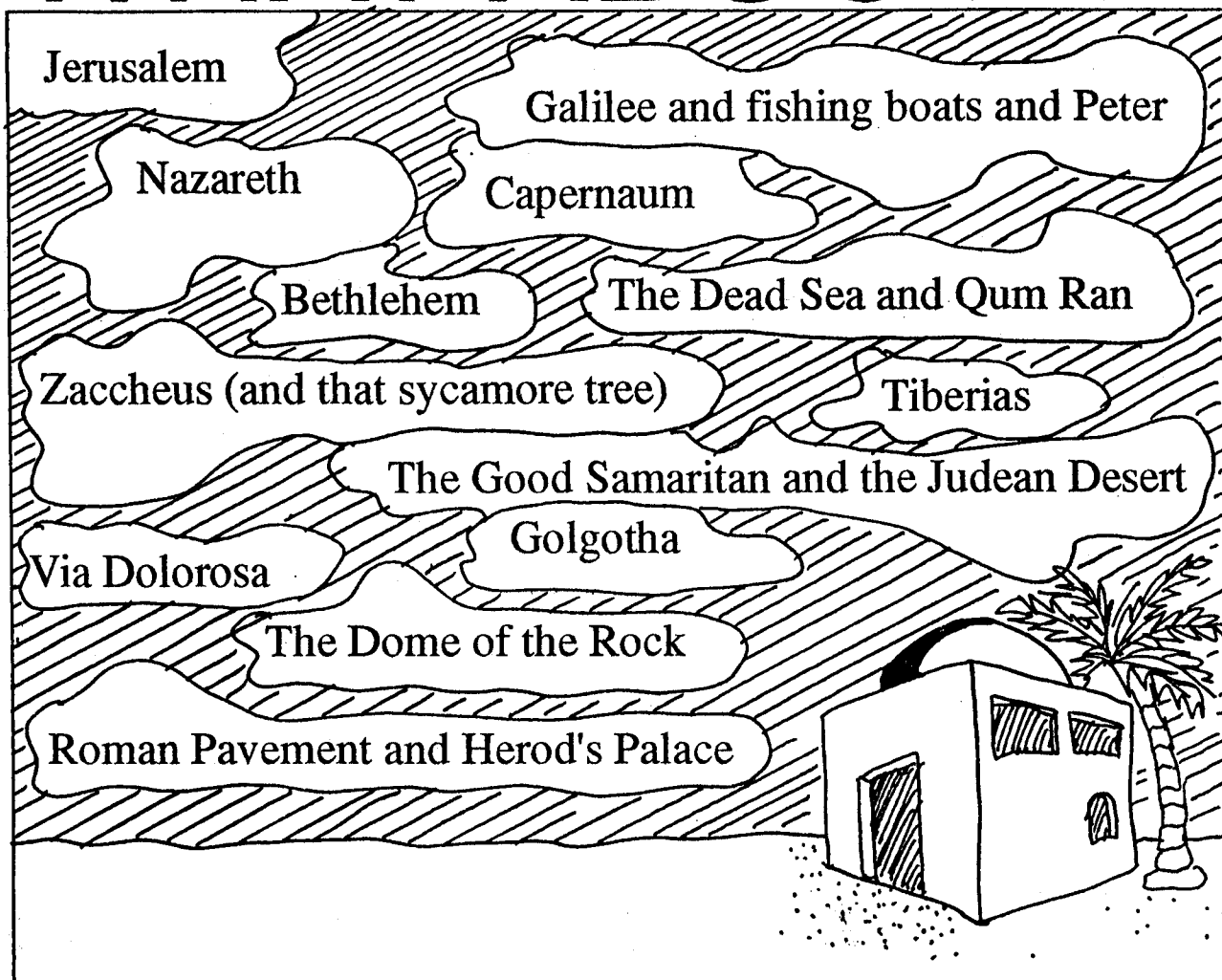
Method;- Heat oil in a large pan/wok. Add garlic, peppers and stir fry for 2 minutes. Add turkey, ginger and cook for a further 4 minutes. Add mushrooms, bean sprouts, soy sauce and sherry (if any left). Continue to cook for a further 5 minutes until all ingredients are thoroughly coated and piping hot. Serve immediately with rice.

*Vegetarian alternative;- follow recipe above but give the turkey to the neighbour's dog.

Well! I hope you found the above helpful. However, always remember that a big bird is for life, not just Christmas!!!

THE ASTON ABBOTTS CHRISTMAS SHOW 1994

JEST BEAU et AL

We came, we saw, we sat there in awe. Once again the multifarious talents of the people of Aston Abbots were on show, and what a show it was at this year's pre-Christmas offering.

The central feature was the sand dune story of 'Jest Beau', a tale of intrigue and of the thwarting of the highly suspect Abdul Abul of the Sh'ites by the good guys led by the redoubtable MacNormans. Yet before and aft this dramatic extravaganza the audience was treated to a cornucopia of village talent.

New man Nigel, our 'Rick Wakeman' at double speed opened the show with a demonstration of synthetic keyboard virtuosity - the 'A.A. Train Rock' - and retained composure when, as all electronic gadgetry tends to do, it misbehaved. Next, young Anthony, who at eleven years has already been chosen for the national junior orchestra, performed 'Tarantella' on the 'cello'. A budding Du Pré, here!

Gordon Smith and John Whyte clashed personalities as the post impressionist painter and the chartered accountant who had little in common except 'Hendon', a Tibetan girl proving to be the social levelling factor for the snooty artist.

The Brandon family's 'Travellers' Tale', a genuine piece of 'theatre of the absurd', amused all as Karen divested and Hannah bailed out to avoid embarrassment. Narrated by 'daddy', the timing revealed much family sensitivity.

Donna Wiggett's dulcet tones on 'Crazy for You' led us to scenes one and two of the North African mystery and hence the interval.

The raffle offered numerous prizes to the eager audience and the opportunity to recharge glasses before proceedings recommenced.

Following Jest Beau's final scene the Cheshire family revealed the breadth of its talent with classical guitar dexterity from Jon of high quality, particularly for one relatively new to the instrument.

Bridget and Margaret then amused us with an honest dramatic assessment of male inadequacy and hypocrisy before the Branckers unfolded a sad tale whilst awaiting 'The Campbells'. Before the concluding festive finale "Slowhand" Whyte sang 'Wonderful Tonight', a fitting commentary on all we'd seen.

But what of the centrepiece? The main item issued forth revealing performances against the backdrop of Andy Bystra's fine set. John Whyte's Abdul, he of the Arabic/Welsh accent, sought the return of the Sacred Camel and its globes, assisted by 'Nelly the Belly' (Tony Hewitt) who increasingly grew (and grew) into the part. The two many 'F's of Felicity and Fanny Fortescue, the archaeological facsimile finders and philanderers (Bridget Brandon and Margaret Kent), found fame and romance, the latter with the fiery headed half of the MacNormans, whose impersonation of Mark McManus complemented that of his spectacled brother (Gordon Smith), who found affection forthcoming from the ever growing Nelly.

Commandant 'Le Frog' Brancker, who doubled as the Eccles sound-alike gatekeeper, stunned this member of the audience, as much by his licensed legs as by his dramatic range. Finally, Fifi (Ann Brancker) aroused her husband's ardour as he inspected his troops - in black tights!

The whole evening, and particularly 'Jest Beau', was the brainchild of the compère and continuity man Neil Cheshire. He was amusing and entertaining, maintaining our interest during pauses in the action. On behalf of the audience, many thanks to all performers and to him beyond 'compare'. 'O.K.'?

RECTOR'S REPORT

The breaking in of the Eternal into the World of time and space - Good and Evil - Love and Hate - Darkness and Light - War and Peace - Hopes and Fears. Forget them we may, escape them we cannot - which is probably why at the start of a new Year we need to wish each other well.

I hope and pray that 1995 will be a very happy year for you!
