RECTOR'S REPORT - OCTOBER 1997

I am writing early this month as the deadline will happen whilst I am away on holiday. By the time we return and this appears in print, I hope that the sudden and tragic death of Diana, Princess of Wales, will be less prominent in the media. I was going to write this month about the loss of our family pet, Bonnie, but this now seems inappropriate. The media have had a field day (as they did all through the Diana Story) and I don't feel that I have anything to add.

The way in which we react to bereavement is as individual as we are, and, even when we have been manipulated by the press, we still cannot be other than we are. Some people feel the need to dissolve into floods of tears whilst others show very little outward emotion. As I have been trying to think about bereavement, it seems to me that it is essentially a selfish exercise. We are not so much demonstrating our sense of loss, but trying to come to terms with facts that cannot be altered.

We find death very hard to accept, and we often forget that it is the only thing in life of which we can be certain. We have this strange feeling that, if we know all the minute detail, then we shall be able to discover why death happened - and may perhaps discover that there was something that we could have done that might have changed things. Death is a reality that we must come to terms with, both for ourselves and for everyone around us. Maybe our problem is that we have marginalised death and forgotten the fragility of human life.

From the time that Diana first hit the headlines, she was dubbed "The Fairytale Princess". It was inevitable that the end of the story would need to be spectacular, but it reminds us that not all fairytales actually have happy endings.

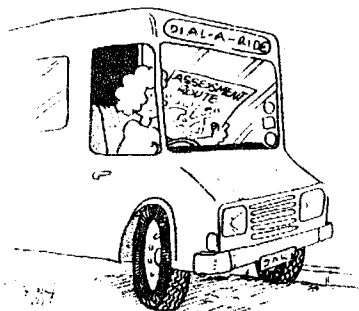
Aylesbury Vale Dial - a - Ride (AVDAR)

Dial - a - Ride is a friendly door to door service which provides transport within the Aylesbury Vale area for the elderly, frail, and physically disabled. The service is also available for those with temporary disabilities. It is intended to help those who are unable, or who find it difficult to use other forms of public transport and can be used to go shopping, visiting friends, collage, places of entertainment, your GP. etc.

At present the service is only available Monday to Friday. Fares are similar to bus fares and in addition there is an annual registration fee of £5.00. The advantages of using this service are greater flexibility (You are not limited to the bus timetable) and the transport available is fitted with wheelchair lifts and seating suitable for those with disabilities. Booking hours are between 9.30am. and 12.30pm. Monday to Fridays.

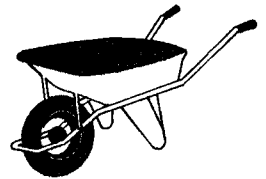

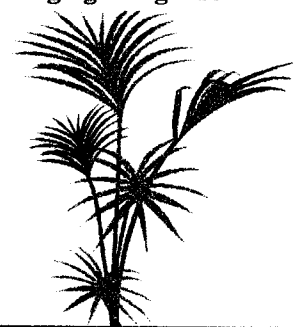

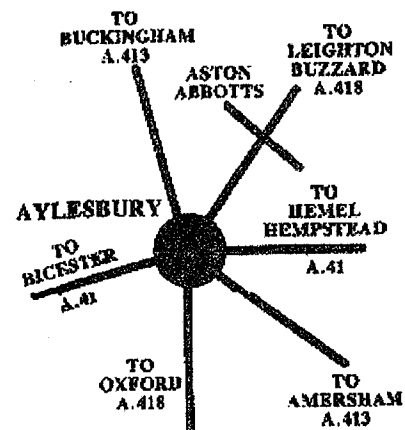

A Walk on the Wild Side

This year I was lucky enough to be accepted again for the 11th Ridgeway & Vale Diabetics expedition, this time to the Isle of Arran from the 5th - 13th September. These expeditions were founded and led by Dr Tony Knight the Diabetes Physician at Stoke Mandeville. The 21 strong group was made up of professionals and diabetics, ages ranged from 18 to over 70. The purpose of the expedition, apart from the enjoyment of the scenery and the outdoors, was to learn more about the management of diabetes during extended and varied periods of exercise.

As I was already on holiday in the Lake District I was picked up at a service station on the M6 in the early afternoon and we continued up to Ardrossun where we divided up between several very comfortable B & B's. The next morning was an early start as we were to catch the first ferry across to the island which lies 10 miles off the Scottish mainland and takes about an hour.

Arran is a wild and mountainous island about 20 miles by 10, with spectacular coastal scenery, forests, moorland, lochs, glens with the highest point Goatfell just under 3000 ft. The population is about 4000 rising to 20000 in the summer. There is a main road round the island and two across the middle.

Our accommodation consisted of six wooden self catering lodges near the village

of Lamlesh. After settling in and lunch we donned our waterproof gear and went for a four mile walk in the pouring rain, to loosen up as our leaders told us! A good meal out that night soon cheered us up. Provisions had been ordered for breakfasts, packed lunches, snacks and 'eating in' for a couple of nights. The other nights we ate out.

The next day the weather had improved and by 8 am we were in the two mini buses to be taken to the start for our first walk. This proved to be an 11 mile walk along glens, beside burns through thick forests and really heavy going through miles of knee high heather. Although foot paths are marked on maps so few people use them they are not visible so you have to make your own way!

The following day was the big one- Goatfell, lovely and sunny above but very bouldery underfoot. With frequent stops for a breather and snacks we reached the summit which was shrouded in cloud; disappointing as the views would have been superb. We started from Glendach and came down to Corrie where the mini buses were waiting. A most satisfying day.

Tuesday the weather was fine and sunny, we set off quite happily along this glen at Dougarie but the further we went the boggier it got. The path was supposed to follow this burn but the burn seemed to spread everywhere and our feet were getting wetter and wetter. Some of us carried sticks

to help us leap across wide expanses of water but more often than not when weight was put on the stick it disappeared to within a couple of inches? This glen seemed to be going on forever and when we did get to the end of it it went uphill very steeply. Still, there was no going back so up and up we went through heather which looks nicer than it feels of course.

When we got to the top we had to come down the other side and the lower we got the bogger it became again. We stopped for lunch which revived our spirits and viewed the V shape in the far distance which we had to make for, so on we went chatting to one another not really caring now here we put our feet, most of us fell over in it at some



point or other, even Dr. Knight went full length when he turned round to someone and slipped! At last after walking 10 miles in bog we reached a track and saw a couple with their dog, the first people apart from our group we had seen all day. The last mile was downhill and we reached the mini buses waiting in the car park of a whiskey distillery at 7 pm We collected fish and chips on the way home for supper that night!

The next day was a day off, some went boating or cycling while my friend Doreen and I and a few others visited

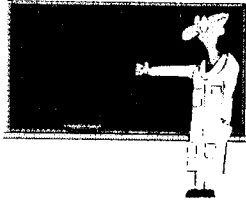
Broddick Castle, a fairly small but beautiful 13th century castle with magnificent views of the mountains, the sea and Holy island not far away. It was owned by the Hamilton family but was given to the National Trust in 1958. The day was hot and sunny and lunch on the castle terrace was most enjoyable. We also visited a cheese making and soup making factory.

On Thursday some opted for a low level walk along the shore where many seals were seen. The rest of us walked up Sannox glen then scrambled up a very steep narrow gully to the saddle at the top intending to go along a ridge but it began to rain and we were in cloud so we descended and came down Glen Rosa and back to Broddick about 10 miles.

Friday our last day we had a shorter walk of about 6 1/2 miles through forests and back along the rocky shore. That night each house did part of the meal and we assembled in one house to eat and then we did our packing and had an early night as we had to be away by 7.15 am to catch the first ferry across to the mainland. We stood on the top deck watching Arran disappear in the distance. We had made new friends, met the challenges of the week and proved that having diabetes does not stop you enjoying life and doing the things that other people do.
