


Following the recent decision by AVDC to approve this chicken farm the only recourse for objectors is to challenge the decision in the High Court.

Aside from low flying chickens it now seems that we will have aircraft from Luton overhead. The Civil Aviation Authority has decided a new flight path would have to avoid Leighton Buzzard which means more aircraft flying over villages west of Luton. May 11th is the date this new flight path will take effect.

Continuing on my avian theme I was told that approximately 20 years ago Fox Covert was a roosting site for a huge flock of starlings and attracted a BBC Nature team to record their fantastic display. The RSPB say that the starling population has halved in the last 25 years and that they are mostly found in urban areas. Aylesbury, it seems, is currently a favourite spot.

When I walked past the workmen rebuilding Clair Fletcher's wall, which was damaged by vehicles sliding on black ice, I commented 'second time lucky' which the builder corrected to 'third time lucky'. Hopefully he is right.







CHICKEN UPDATE





Remedy for Avian Flu?

A Half Hour with Aylesbury Vale District Council On 8th March, AVDC devoted half an hour to the interests of your village, and you might wish to know how they viewed your opinion on the future of the proposed chicken farm at Norduck. In a nutshell, your opinion was ignored

The Aylesbury Vale planning officer, Mr Nicholson, briefed the members on the plan - including a few errors and omissions - and recommended that he should be authorised to proceed with the application without any further involvement of the development Control Committee. Councillor Griffin from Rowsham immediately proposed that the committee accept the planning officer's recommendation. This might have been the end of the meeting; however, other members asked one or two incisive and searching questions that reflected their complete lack of understanding of the situation: Are there any properties nearby? Is the bridleway in use? Is the application for the buildings or for the principle of keeping chickens on site? One member made the profound statement that if one elects to live in the country, then one must expect to endure country smells. It was noteworthy that despite the applicant's assurance that chicken manure does not smell, the Environmental Health Officer contradicted this, but was ignored. AVDC has no contingency plans for the possibility of avian flu as the Government has not issued any guidelines. No Boy Scouts in AVDC then! The outrageous response to the suggestion that the manure should not be spread on the farm land was that other manure could be imported from elsewhere. The vote to approve the planning officer's recommendation was swiftly taken and with that the bouncers, employed by AVDC, moved in, presumably to prevent the audience from assaulting the members. Their only success was assaulting a female member of the audience.

The present state of play is that AVDC will continue to draft the Planning Obligation Agreement, the draft conditions, the Operational Management Scheme and the Landscape Management Scheme in conjunction with the applicant who will write most of these for approval by AVDC.

We have now taken legal advice and have employed a barrister to give his opinion on the probability of success if AVDC are challenged with a Judicial Review of their procedures, in particular their omission to perform an environmental impact assessment when the application was first received in February 2005. This legal procedure will demand a considerable amount of money, albeit, if we won 70% - 80% would be refunded. However, bearing in mind that house prices are likely to be affected by a chicken farm adjacent to the village, with the potential to expand into a much larger operation, the legal costs would be considerably less than the property devaluation. When we have an indication of how the case might proceed, we shall call a further village meeting. In the meantime, should you wish to contribute or pledge to a fighting fund, please contact Peter Curry, the Residents Association Treasurer, on 01296 681137 or e-mail norduck@hotmail.com. Today (Wednesday) Aylesbury Vale District Council's development control committee will meet to agree conditions to be imposed upon the proposed 18,000 bird, free range, organic chicken farm at

Aston Abbotts.

It approved the application last September, subject to certain conditions, in spite of an exceptionally high level of objections from parish councils and individual members of the public.

As so often happens, the fact that there were good planning reasons against the application held little sway.

However, while it is doubtless not a valid planning objection, establishing a new poultry enterprise at this time must surely count, at best, as totally lacking in common sense. At worst, it could be seen as an act of appalling negligence.

Avian flu is a wing beat away - it may already be in this country's wild bird population. It will certainly be here before long. Those who have connections with agriculture or live in rural areas will not be reassured by the way government, MAFF or DEFRA have handled previous epidemics such as BSE and Foot and Mouth. Certainly the British government seems to be taking the threat far less seriously than other countries such as France and the Netherlands.

Unlike Foot and Mouth, avian flu will be with us for years rather than a few months. Unlike Foot and Mouth, which has infected virtually no human

beings over the course of years, there is strong

likelihood that the virus will mutate to a form which will spread among human beings.

Surely, if planning regulations cannot stop, or at least delay new poultry businesses, there must be some corner of a forgotten Health and Safety

regulation that can be called upon to protect us.




Holiday Cottages to let in North Cornwall

Peter Knight's Countryside Diary - 8th March

Early March and we have just gone through that cold dry spell with mixed feelings. We are very busy lambing and dry weather is ideal for lambs; it's the cold and wet they don't like.

I'm sorry to harp on about it but one of the problems the cold spell brought was a lack of water for sheep in the fields. Usually in the winter there is plenty of water running in the ditches and from land drains so that should the water troughs freeze there is some moving water where animals can drink – not this year.

Every lambing season is different and so far this year has been a fox year. Last year we lambed about 100 ewes outside and I felt we lost very few lambs to foxes. This year we have just 60 ewes outside and we have a real fox problem. Two out of three ewes outside has only one lamb when we find them in the morning. In the shed at least 8 out of 10 ewes have twins. What happens is the fox takes the first born lamb while the ewe lies down to give birth to the second. Its bad enough knowing its happening - thank goodness we don't see it - it would be heartbreaking.

Last year I was fairly confident about lambing outside - this year I'm saying never again. Why don't we call the hunt in to get rid of the offending fox? Well unfortunately we don't own the fields and the owner is against any control of wildlife in the countryside.

Despite the cold the signs of spring are, as always, there to be seen. As soon as the sun shines birds are vibrant and busy - blue tits inspecting nest boxes, rooks repairing their nests and cock pheasants are fighting to get as large a harem of hens as possible. The pair of buzzards that nest in the Parish have also been a little more obvious lately, wheeling and turning high over Lines Hill.


Lately too there have been great flocks of fieldfares - all apparently moving north and presumably preparing to cross the North sea back to Scandinavia where they breed. What they are feeding on now I don't know - all the hedgerow berries went weeks ago and the ground has been frozen solid but there has been hundreds of them in the pasture fields.

I've noticed skylarks recently. They are not singing yet but no doubt will be when the weather turns for the better.

Last week I saw young rabbits about under a hedgerow and by the side of the frighteningly busy A418. Years ago we thought young rabbits a sign of Spring - now I'm not so sure - true to their

reputation rabbits seem to breed all the year round.

What is difficult to believe at the moment with everything looking wintery is that by the end of the month plum and hawthorn blossom could be



hedges could be turning green. What we want, of course, is the grass to grow for the sheep.

This year we will have to do without that great vegetable of early spring - purple sprouting - usually the simplest of vegetables to grow as long as it is protected from pigeons. This year all our purple sprouting behaved strangely.

When the rain came in late Autumn after prolonged drought the sprouting obviously thought it had gone through winter and did what it should do in Spring – it sprouted – poorly, but it sprouted, then, over the winter it died. The first Spring I can remember without home grown purple sprouting.

Spring cabbage seems to have over wintered well, although about 10% rotted off at the stalks and died.

Broad beans, sown to stand the winter, they too have done what they usually do (except last year a memorable exception) most of them rotting off at ground level.

I can't imagine that this year I shall be planting potatoes on March 14th as I did last year - more likely to be the end of the month or early April, but come round 'planting time' surely will.

My five year diary tells me that Smith's Blackthorn on Lines Hill was breaking into flower during the 3rd week of February last year - will it be blooming when this is in print?

Lastly I was going to write something about our 5 remaining chickens - the fox has had 8 since last May - but Alex said 'No - the villagers might get us shut down!'



'We will take chicken farm fight to the High Court'

This article by Tim Green, appeared in the Bucks Herald 8th March

Opponents of controversial plans for an egg production unit with 18,000 chickens in Aston Abbotts say they will take their fight to the High Court if Aylesbury Vale District Council gives the go-ahead to the scheme.

Last year, members of AVDC's development control committee resolved to grant planning permission to the scheme subsequent to several conditions.

However Aston Abbotts Residents' Association (AARA) which demonstrated against the scheme in Aylesbury town centre on Saturday, says if planning permission is granted, it will seek a judicial review to overturn the decision. A report to AVDC's committee members says AARA believes any permission would be unlawful because members were wrongly advised as to whether an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) needed to be carried out or not.

AARA contends regulations and guidance have been misinterpreted and that an EIA is necessary so villagers will know the effects of the development and mitigation measures proposed.

AARA says it is also concerned about traffic issues, the storage and disposal of manure, the effect on other wildlife of poison used to regulate rats on

chicken farms and a possible outbreak of bird flu. Dickie Dicken, AARA chairman, said there are also concerns over a disease called campylobacter, the most common reported bacterial cause of infectious intestinal disease, because of footpaths which cross the site.

He said 'We are fighting for the health and the future of Aston Abbotts. Aylesbury Vale District Council has no interest in people at all or democracy. This farm is already 270 acres, the applicant is planning to develop a further 20 acres of it and may develop the rest of it in future years so we could see even more birds. A meeting about the subject packed out the village hall last week'. Roy Buttery, who is acting on behalf of the applicant Nigel Williams, stressed he did not wish to drawn into the threatened judicial review and added that there is no risk to human health from the proposed egg production unit.

In an earlier letter he said Mr Williams would be happy to allow officers to assess if an EIA was necessary.

AVDC officers told members they believed the site was not in an environmentally sensitive location and said the scheme includes full details of an operational system to manage the smell from manure and ground water pollution.

Seven go skiing in France

You may remember the recent report on how a group of local novices, encouraged by Alison Lewis, went on a skiing trip to the Milton Keynes Snow Dome back in October. This was so successful that a number of participants decided that a visit to the real slopes was in order. So it came to pass that yet another Barlow tour was organised for early March to Meribel in the French Alps.



Seven of us fifty somethings, the Greenaway's, Palmer's, Lewis's and Liz's sister Anne, jetted away from Birmingham to Chambery and a cosy little Chalet, Le Chardon Bleu, that Alison (or was it Liz?) had found on the internet. Unusually, there was more than a little concern the day before departure as heavy snow was forecast for the Birmingham area and we could see ourselves missing the plane stuck in a snowdrift on the M40. Fortunately the snow held off and we all made it. Barlow tours ensured that a mini-coach was available to transport us to the resort and we arrived in brilliant sunshine to be greeted by two more AA exiles, Juan and Brigitte who had booked the same resort with their family in the previous week and decided to stay a little longer. Juan was sporting a hand the size of a balloon having had an argument with a chair lift, but it didn't stop him from taking advantage of the slopes.

Now Meribel is a first class resort that hosted the Winter Olympics back in 1992. There are miles of runs of varying standards - enough to keep any level of skier happy - and we had arrived the week after heavy snow fall and in brilliant sunshine. Having deposited our bags, first stop was lunch in downtown Mottaret, however despite the sunshine, we quickly retired inside as we really hadn't dressed up for the snow. Sally and I each invested in a new pair of goggles, having been assured by Juan that these were essential items of equipment, and of course we never used them the entire week as sunglasses were sufficient. At least we avoided returning from the hols looking like pandas. Then it was back to the Chalet to get acquainted with Leah, an Aussie exile, who was our cook for the week. Our pre-ordered boots and orange skis had already arrived so we tried these for size when our instructor, Cyril arrived to meet us and discuss plans for the week. After drinks and canapés, a delicious 4 course dinner followed.

Monday morning soon arrived and at 9am took a short walk down the hill and a quick ride in a cable car took us to the piste. Skis were donned and we took our first tentative slide across the snow. The run we had reached took us down the valley all the way to the main lift centre in Meribel. However there seemed to be a number of crashes on the way as we all took it in turns to end up in a heap. Alison seemed to have difficulty in turning left and so ended up in a pile of snow or did she really want to go off-piste? At one point Dave came over to rescue her from yet another fall and landed on top of her. I gather that Juan popped up and took the photo. Having

invested in "three valleys" lift passes for the week we took a cable car up the mountain and slowly skied down an "easy" green run to the local airport. Yes, Dave was amazed to discover that you could have flown all the way to the piste.

But now we had to face the perils of an eight person chairlift. I managed to get on between two seats and so the bar came down between my legs rather than to one side. Getting on is one thing but then you have to ski away when you reach the top. Theory and practice are always somewhat different and it was no surprise that most of us seemed to end up on our bottoms, struggling to keep upright. We even took out our instructor. But we did improve even if the unexpected was never far away. Sally got entangled with some orange netting when standing next to a bubble lift waiting for some of the party to take the easy way down. Slippery stuff snow. But it was amazing how quickly you can progress and soon we were trying to discard the snow plough turn in favour of "ski parallel". On day four we went over the mountain top to another resort Courcheval located in the next valley. The return journey involved various lifts back to the pass and then skiing down the entire mountain to Meribel. This was fine until close to the bottom of a particularly steep slope my left ski decided that it didn't want to stay parallel and, in falling, I tore my calf muscle. I bravely skied down the rest of the mountain but knew that my skiing was over for the day and made for the local free bus service.

That evening we were due to go out for dinner to a restaurant we had booked in Meribel, a few miles down the valley, but I was incapable of moving more than a couple of yards and so Sally and I had to make do with a takeaway Pizza whilst the others went out. Next morning, I admitted defeat and paid a visit to the local walk-in medical centre. I was quickly seen by a French doctor who shook his head, assessed my calf, x-rayed and plastered my broken thumb (another injury sustained on day three) and sent me around to the local pharmacy for a massive supply of medication including "Une pair of Cannes Anglais", which translates literally as English canes otherwise known as crutches. So my skiing was over and I spent the next two days touring the extensive lift system taking photos.

Meanwhile Ivan and Sally had progressed to red runs as the whole experience began to click. Prize for the most spectacular fall of the week went to Anne who turned two somersaults but still ended upright on her skis. Well that's experience for you. By Saturday, there seemed to be very few of us doing much more than "light" skiing although Ann and Sally ventured over the mountain tops into yet another valley.

So what of this skiing lark? Is it all it is cracked up to be? Well we couldn't have had a better location or better conditions. Good snow and wall to wall sunshine. No lift queues to speak of and generally plenty of room on the piste. Even my little accident didn't depress me. Juan now also has his hand in plaster having driven all the way to Spain to find a doctor. Thanks for the enthusiasm of Alison and Liz which got the tour off the ground. It all clicked for Sally and she wants to go back again next year. Not sure what my boss will think, but then he loves skiing as well. Who said it was dangerous? Well that's as maybe but it was fun.







If you're aged between 11 and 14 come and check out your local Youth Centre.



CLERGY COMMENT

Our thoughts in April are drawn to Spring (even though I am writing this on a bitterly cold day at the end of February). As we watch the new growth in the world about us, we may perhaps reflect on our own growth and vitality.

In Church we shall be thinking about life and death issues as we remember again the death of Jesus on the Cross and his Rising from death on the first Easter morning. There are many thoughts that can spring from the contemplation of a Spring or Easter Garden.

Some of those thoughts may lead to remembering those who have gone before us. It is good to tend the graves of those whom we love. Yet, the new Churchyard Regulations (don't you just love rules & regulations!) remind us that our rights are limited to the burial of our bodies in the earth of the Churchyard. Everything else—like a memorial or even flowers on the grave—is a privilege that can be granted or withdrawn.

We now need to have formal written agreements between the family and the Church relating to new memorials. These agreements are made by the incumbent using limited powers delegated by the Diocesan Chancellor. The regulations specify that:

"Graves may not be fenced or otherwise delineated; and fencing or shrubs are not permitted, although the planting of a few bulbs or annuals may be permitted. Only cut flowers or wreaths may be left at the graveside. These must be removed when withered or decaying. No plastic or artificial flowers are permitted save in relation to: Remembrance Day wreaths or poppies, or Christmas wreaths; these must be removed after a period of one month. Silk flowers, appropriate to the season; these must be removed when they become faded of bedraggled."

These rules are designed to encourage good housekeeping, and although we sometimes find people trying to flout the rules, problems can often be resolved with sensitivity and sympathy. As the Church has a responsibility to care for the Churchyard, the simpler things are the better. For example, mowing around gravestones is much more costly and time consuming than being able to mow straight over graves, and stone chippings can do an enormous amount of damage if they are thrown up by a motor mower.

The message of Easter is that we must not allow ourselves to be pre-occupied with the past. The disciples discovered that Easter brought them a new understanding of Life. We may die (indeed we know for certain that we will die), yet Life goes on — and, rather than clinging to that which has gone before we must reach out to that new dimension of life and growth that lies ahead of us.

Enjoy Life - Happy Easter.


