

Lime Meringue Roulade by Judy Hardcastle

Quick and easy to make freezes well. Makes 8 – 10 Slices

5 egg whites275g caster sugar50g flaked almond

Filling

300 ml double cream grated rind and juice of small lime 2 generous tablespoons lime or lemon curd (lime curd is difficult to find)

- 1. Line a 33 x 23 cm Swiss roll tin with greased non-stick baker paper.
- 2. Whisk egg whites until stiff. Gradually add sugar. Whisk until very, very stiff and shiny.
- 3. Spread meringue mixture into the prepared tin and sprinkle with almonds.
- 4. Cook in oven preheated to 220C/425F gas mark 7 for 12 mins until golden. Then lower to 160C/325F/Gas mark3 and bake for about 15 mins until firm to touch.
- 5. Remove from oven and turn almond side down on to a sheet of non-stick baking paper. Remove paper from the base and allow to cool for about 10 mins.
- 6. Lightly whip cream and, add lime rind and juice, and fold in the lime or lemon curd. Spread over the meringue. Make indentation 1cm in on the long side with a knife, and roll up the meringue fairly tightly from the long end to form a roulade, allowing the paper to help you roll. It is essential to roll tightly and firmly at the beginning. A few cracks in the roulade are part of the charm.
- 7. Wrap in non-stick baking paper and chill before serving with fruit to decorate.

Complete and wrap in foil to freeze. Thaw for 8 hours in fridge. (I can vouch for the deliciousness - Ed)

COUNTRYSIDE MATTERS

I am very glad to hear that new food labelling rules have received the backing of the pig industry. They shall require the animals' county of origin, a great step forward for animal welfare, where the animal was born, reared and slaughtered, not just where it was processed. English pig farmers have long fought for clearer labelling to provide consumers choice and confidence. Hopefully in the not to distant future no more Eastern block pork will be sold as British. They must have read the Communiqué for the Chronicle - Ed]!

Like it or not the rat is the most successful mammal on earth, next to us humans. Thank goodness for a hard winter. The UK rat population is currently estimated at 81 million an increase of 200% since 2007.!! Rats thrive in damp conditions encouraged by fly tipping, and the incredible amount of fast food remnants, such as Mac Donald's etc. thrown from cars into the countryside ditches. The Leighton road out of Wingrave village to Ledburn being a prime example of this. Bird feeding tables, unfortunately, also encourage rats into gardens and outbuildings, as do once a fortnight waste collection which does not help. The brown rat became established in the 18th century pushing out the earlier black rat, known as the "Ships rat" nowadays confined to a few dock areas with the rare sightings elsewhere. Maybe when some of the 188,000 livestock farmers, stockmen, hauliers, slaughter men, milk tanker drivers, auctioneers, vets, milkmen, Butchers, sheepherders, cowmen and shearers have all lost their jobs maybe they can all retrain as pop stars. *James Henderson*

Village Hall Progress February 2010

Obtaining a Lease for the Church Hall has been a long and protracted process, but there are signs that we might at last have succeeded in negotiating the labyrinth of legal procedures and the year 2010 might just be the year when we obtain the Lease. Our solicitor has reviewed the draft Lease and made a number of non contentious amendments and these have been submitted to the Church Solicitors for approval. However, there are a number of hurdles that will still have to be negotiated.

First, there is one more legal item to be resolved by the Church solicitor and this involves a little known article called the Albemarle Scheme: legislation dictates that this is operated by Action with Communities in Rural England (ACRE) Commissioners. In essence, because the nature of the trusts of a village hall is clearly different from the explicitly ecclesiastical nature of the church hall, it is not possible for the church hall simply to operate as a village hall. However, the Commissioners are able to authorise the use of the church hall for use as a village hall under what is known as an 'Albermarle' Scheme. Such a scheme will authorise a lease of the property to a village hall charity, but with user rights reserved to the church hall charity. The village hall charity will normally be responsible for the repair and maintenance of the property under the lease and the rent payable will be reduced to reflect this. Phew!

With the Lease finally in our hands, accompanied by the authority of the Albermarle Scheme, we will then have to address the terms of the Lease. This requires us to renew the electrics of the building and also repair the damage to the southern wall that has been caused by subsidence and these will cost in the order of £7500. Although we have sufficient funds to pay for these works, the available funds are held in a charitable trust and the rules of this account preclude the payment for the works until the Lease is granted. So although there is progress in obtaining the lease, there will still be a considerable amount of administrative work to be done in the immediate future, not least, the setting up of a management committee for the day to day running of the Hall.

In the medium term, we hope to extend the Hall to accommodate toilets, improve access for the disabled, refurbish the kitchen and renew the floor. To this end, we will apply for grants to pay for the major works, but we shall continue to need locally generated funds principally from the Village Fete proceeds. As a matter of interest, we cannot apply for grants until we have the lease. For those who have a keen, or even a passing, interest in the Village Hall, you should make every effort to attend the Annual Parish Meeting in April to question the Hall Trustees for any clarification you might need and to add your support for funds.






Gnomes Annual Dinner



OLD STREET NAMES of AYLESBURY

Old street names uncover history of a town or village, for example

CASTLE STREET - originally called Cattle Street due to the fact sheep and cattle were driven up there to the market via this route. Was there a castle? No trace has ever been found.

PARSONS FEE - a fee was a piece of land held as part or whole of a feudal tenure, records also mention others such as Bands Fee Castle Fee and Brands Fee, but the only is Parsons Fee and houses the historic St Osyth's House.

PITCHES HILL - Now called Rickfords Hill (pitches was an old Aylesbury name, William Rickford owned the local bank and eventually became MP for Aylesbury.

THE TEMPLES - There is an old reference to a building called 'The Temples', but unlikely a temple existed - a more likely explanation is that Temple Street and Square were named as a compliment to the Temple/Greenvilles of Stowe who strove to gain political support in Aylesbury in the 1840's. Temple Stree was formerley known as Cobblers Row (or Coldwainer Street) after the number of shoemakers residing there.

HOG LANE - Now called George Street. The original name implies a congregation of piggeries. CHURCH STREET - Once called Broad Street where doctors solicitors and moneyed people lived, including Thomas Hickman, founder of the Hickman Trust that provides Alms Houses.

GALLOWS CORNER - Now called Bicester Road but was once the site of the Common Gallows, prior to the new drop at the County Hall

LONG LIONEL - No record why this was named so, it runs from Townhall Arches to High Street.

Aston Abbotts Today

Aston Abbotts today is a far cry from the self-supporting agricultural community described on the history page of this website. Although much of the surrounding land is still farmed, the growth of mechanised farming methods has left few people directly involved within the industry. A modern-day Astonian could still be a farmer, but more likely might be a commuter travelling to Aylesbury, Leighton Buzzard or even London. People from all walks of life live in Aston Abbotts.

Although modern-day Aston Abbotts has a rich cosmopolitan mix of people there are signs of its farming roots everywhere. Many of the farms still exist, though absentee landlords now hold some of the land. Other farms have long since been lost, with only their names remaining: Nash's Farm is now a small courtyard development of modern houses built in the 1990s. Home Farm is now a sympathetically restored farmhouse home, but separated from its original lands. Longmoor Farm is residential, with the old barns also having undergone residential conversion. Church Farm has a helipad.

The growth of car ownership in the last century coupled with a desire of professional townspeople to escape the hurly-burly of town life for a real or imagined rural idyll have caused many commuters to swell the population of Bucks villages. Some of these have settled in Aston Abbotts. As described on the history page the village has changed dramatically in the last century but never more so than in the last few decades. These saw a gradual but relentless erosion of traditional rural village life, with farms being sold, land being redeveloped for residential purposes and village facilities like the bakery and Post Office closing.

ALLOTMENT DIARY

One of the things that caught my eye in the paper recently was an item about a restaurant proprietor who has a restaurant near a football club – Chelsea, I think – who has started giving his customers the option of having blue potato chips with their meals, to demonstrate their allegiance to their club (who, for the benefit of non-footballing readers, play in blue). This sounded an interesting idea, and while there are few clubs I would be less likely to support than Chelsea, the idea of a blue potato rather tickled my fancy. I therefore scanned the Thompson & Morgan catalogue which has recently landed on my doormat, to see what they had to offer.

Sure enough they had a potato called "Blue Danube", which indeed has a striking coloured skin; although to my eye the colour is purple rather than blue. However, the description makes it plain that the flesh of the tubers is white, so that it could not be these that the restaurant was serving. I therefore searched the internet. Sutton Seeds also had an allegedly blue potato called Edzell Blue. Again, the potatoes in the picture looked to be purple rather than blue, and again the flesh was white.

However, I then discovered several sources of a potato which, although being a purplish colour, indeed had blue flesh: a variety called "All Blue". Unfortunately the suppliers were all in the USA or the Phillipines, and they were a bit pricey – \$18.95 for 10 tubers (whereas I normally do not expect to pay more than £4.00 for 20 tubers – or perhaps a bit more if it is an unusual variety). I think I may perhaps wait until All Blue is established here before buying any (while I like the idea of blue potatoes, I don't like it that much!); and for the time being will try out Blue Danube.

This blue/purple conflict has irritated me before; whenever I have read that growers have produced a blue rose, the bloom in the photographs has always looked purple to me, and purple is <u>not</u> a sort of blue: it is the result of mixing blue (which is a primary colour), with red (another primary colour). Is it an "emperor's new clothes" problem: if you say often enough that a colour is blue, even though it is not, the public believe it?

I had a few days' holiday in Rome recently, and hoped to be able to tell you about allotment activity there. However, all I can report is that there isn't any! – at least in the parts that I saw. Indeed, there were very few gardens, but a large number of houses had roof gardens; far more than in any other city I have visited.

As you may have gathered, nothing much is happening allotment-wise at the moment: I am coming to the end of my Brussels sprouts, and am about to start on my remaining crop from last year, my leeks. Next month I hope to do more to justify the title of this article!



The circumstances since the original application that was refused have not changed. The building and land had been purchased for £230k, the structure of the building had been modified detrimentally by removing fixtures & fittings, the plot size reduced and then marketed at a significantly higher price. The comparable properties identified in the Acorus report did not appear to be representative and an independent valuation commissioned by uninterested 3rd parties should be obtained.

The letters of objection received indicated there was a need for this type of property with an agricultural condition and interest had been registered, however the condition and size of the property did not justify the current vendor's valuation. Offers had been made but negotiations were not even considered by the vendors.

There was concern that the report commissioned and paid for by the vendors is not, nor can be interpreted as being, independent and unbiased.





Proposed Turbine Layout for Wing


