CHRISTMAS MORNING 1959

Christmas day was no different from any other in that it began at 6 a.m. in the cowshed – but we had to get there. Uncle would wake me at 5.45 a.m. I would dress quickly, searching for my clothes which had been carefully placed under the top blanket of the bed the night before. Here they kept slightly warm, but at least dry. There was no heat in the upstairs of a farmhouse so in winter everything seemed cold and damp.

Once dressed I would clatter down the stairs and for a brief minute warm up in front of the comforting Rayburn stove, brace myself, then into the scullery for the wellingtons which, though indoors, would be hard and cold. Then outside, stumble across the yard, through the barn to the cowshed door. Here no matter what the weather, rain sleet or snow the world changed. To step into the cowshed, close the two halves of the door behind you, speak to the cows and switch on the light – it was another world first of all the warmth, the comforting warmth of 20 contented cows. I know now that each cow gave out the same heat as a one bar electric fire, but then suffice it to say that compared with my bedroom the cowshed was heaven. Then there was the smell, not the acid smell of silage and dung as today but the sweet perfume of hay, rolled oats and the cows themselves. Then there were the sounds; a cow gently coughs, the clink of her neck chain as she turned to look at me; the sound of chewing and hooves on the concrete. Bluebell, the greedy one, may well low, wanting her rolled oats and beans.

Uncle has assembled the milking buckets and switched on the vacuum pump and shovelled more oats into the barrow and we are ready to go. Always start with the same cow, talk to her, as a friend, press your head into her warm flank and hear her stomach working on yesterday's food. The routine gets under way – 20 cows to milk, I can manage on my own. Uncle goes to feed the pigs and prepare the milk cooler and churns in the dairy and I'm alone in the warm friendly company of friends.

Auntie's voice breaks into the world of gently sounds — "Here's some tea, Happy Christmas". Tea in the cowshed, a tray with pot, mugs and sugar — milk we had, there on the windowsill between the Curry combs and Stockholm Tar, the old brown tea pot. Fresh steaming tea, I fill a mug, having squirted milk from Peggy's front quarter — two spoons of sugar. Could life get any better than this - in that cowshed Christmas morning on a Leicestershire farm — not for me.

God was most surely in this English heaven and, lucky me, so was I.

ALLOTMENT DIARY

Since it is the start of a new Year (and because there is nothing to report, allotment-wise), I thought I would change my usual format, and give you a fruit & vegetable Quiz. How many of the following plants can you identify?

- 1. This is a staple food in N. & S. America. It can be baked, boiled, ground into flour, or turned into a snack to eat at the cinema. One thing it cannot do, however, is reproduce unaided: it is dependent on humans for survival.
- 2. This fruit is now grown globally, and the market for it is estimated to be worth £150 billion. Julius Caesar introduced it to much of Europe, including the British Isles. Incredibly, if all the plants growing this fruit were planted on Iceland (which would be a bit of a waste, since they would all die), they would cover the whole island.
- 3. For centuries, this plant was used to treat liver complaints. Then a new use was discovered for it, and today 98% of the plants are used to sterilise, add flavour to and preserve the shelf-life of a popular drink.
- 4. This annual is used to produce one of the world's main sources of oil, used to make soap, in cooking and to make varnish. The pith of the stem is so light, it has been used to make lifebelts.
- 5. This plant is largely responsible for civilization as we know it; before its discovery, homo sapiens could only live in small groups, because, as hunter-gatherers, they could not obtain enough food to feed large numbers. It is highly nutritious, being full of starch, protein and vitamins.
- 6. The silkworm is a fussy eater, and will only eat the leaves of this tree. Without it we would not have silk
- 7. This plant has been a very mixed blessing. It has saved thousands of lives, and has provided pain relief for over 6,000 years. However, it is, unfortunately, addictive and can be lethal.
- 8. This plant is a member of the nightshade family. It is the world's 4th largest food crop, with over 1,000 different varieties. In 2007, over one third if its production occurred in China and India (which will probably surprise you, when you know the answer).
- 9. A member of the rose family, this plant came from Central Asia originally although it is grown world-wide today. The fruit does not contain fat, sodium or cholesterol. Its seeds contain a cyanide compound, but fortunately they have a protective coating that keeps it safe inside.
- 10. This fruit is unknown in the wild, and is a hybrid of two other fruits, one of which is little-known today. It was first mentioned in Chinese literature in 314 B C. In 1987 1t was the most widely cultivated fruit in the world.
