The Recreation Ground Committee would like to thank all of those who took part in some way in this years Christmas Show.



#### THE ASTON ABBOTTS COOKBOOK

AN ONION SOUP CALLED " THE KING'S SOUP "

Something warming for the winter? Why not try this recipe adapted from "The Lady's Companion", a cookbook published in 1753.

Ingredients: 2 large onions, thinly sliced.

13 pints milk.

d teaspoon mace blades.

4 ounces butter.

13 teaspoons salt.

1 egg yolk.

Chopped parsley.

Croutons.

Method: Place onions, milk, mace, butter and salt in a saucepan. Bring to the boil, then reduce heat, and cook slowly for 30 to 40 minutes or until onions are very tender. Pick out mace blades and discard. Beat egg yolk in a small bowl, then add a little of the hot soup, beating constantly. Pour egg mixture into soup and cook a minute or two to thicken slightly. Sprinkle each serving with finely chopped parsley, then add a few croutons. Serves 4.

Hot soup at table is very vulgar; it either leads to an unseemly mode of Kaking it, or keeps people waiting too long whilst it cools. Soup should be brought to table only moderately warm. - Charles Day. 'Hints on Etiquette', 1844.

#### A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

CONSIDER THE CALENDAR. No, I don't mean George Orwell's 1984. You will hear enough about that. I do mean that Christ is the centre-piece of time. All events before the birth of Jesus Christ are designated B.C. All events since his birth belong to the A.D. period—the "year of our Lord". He dominates the story of history. All our records are adjusted according to the time of his birth. Be you Christian or not, Christ is the pivot of history as we know it.

CONSIDER THE MAN. A Jewish peasant. Born in an obscure province in a far-off age. He never wrote a book. He made no discovery. He was without official learning (John 7.15). He invented no philosophy. At his arrest, his friends deserted him. He died when he had scarcely reached his prime.

CONSIDER HIS SIGNATURE. Every newspaper and magazine we pick up has his mark at the top of the page. The date tells us that this Man lived. Every man, every woman, who writes a letter to a friend or makes out a cheque, unwittingly testifies that Jesus Christ has come. Be you atheist or agnostic, indifferent or hostile to Christianity, you cannot state the date of your own birth without testifying to his:

Not one person has ever been able to carve their name so deeply and so significantly on the roll of human history.

CONSIDER YOUR TERM. Most of us can look back to some event in our life which was important to us. Some date we can remember in life's term which made its mark, for good or ill. When was it? What was it?

CONSIDER YOUR B.C. TIME. That period before you knew Jesus Christ as a real and living Person. Perhaps you can't remember such a time. But if you can, you will know that it was an age of darkness - like the B.C. of history - clouded in the mists of ignorance. If, of course, you still don't know him, then you are involved in a tragic extension of the "Before Christ" time. You are hopelessly out- of-date! Well not quite hopeless.

CONSIDER YOUR A.D. TIME. The story is told of a Frenchman who took citizenship of this country. He was asked how he felt now that he had transferred his allegiance from France to Britain. The proud new citizen replied, "I simply can't describe my happiness. Yesterday, waterloo meant defeat. Today, it is victory:" What a date to recall! I hope that 1984 may be for you - your "in the year of our Lord" time.

CONSIDER B.C. TO A.D. For the remedy is crucial. "When anyone is joined to Christ, he is a new being; the old is gone, the new has come" (2 Corinthians 5.17). To take Christianity seriously is simply to be brought up-to-date: Getting into step with history. A date to remember. The difference between defeat and victory.


