UPDATE



Cllr Colin Higgs took the chair for Friday evenings Parish Council meeting, when D/Cllr Bryan Round explained to members the situation regarding the proposed Easy Rider Track to be situated at Cublington. The Parish Council had given support to Cublington as well as Bryan Round and C/Cllr Reg Keen in opposing the idea on the grounds of noise, excess traffic, environmental health hazards and hygiene, and whether or not it was the right place for such an activity to be sited.

Several planning applicationswere discussed: a side extension to 22 The Green; Loose Boxes at 2 Longmoor Cottages and additional living accommodation at The Old Masters. It was agreed to accept the Eastern Electricity quote of £30 + VAT (each) to change over to street lighting to photocell lens, and that lamps from Church Row - Bull & Butcher including the Ross Road one, be included in the first stage.

Following damage to the seat in the recreation ground it was agreed to get the seat repaired and also display the bye laws relating to dogs and horses being prohibited in the recreation ground.

A member of the public had asked when the road improvements and new signs would be implemented in Moat Lane/Lines Hill area. The Clerk was asked to write to Bucks C.C. and request some urgent action. It was agreed the Parish Council could support a skip for the Moat Lane/Lines Hill area for mid-September.

David Brown reported on the progress of piped gas connections in the village and advised the meeting that because of the demand for this type of appliance, the work load is enormous and it was unlikely Aston Abbotts would be connected for this coming winter, but was hopeful for early spring.

As a result of the sponsored walk held in aid of the recreation ground £169 had been banked so far. A vote of thanks was passed to Lawrence Hinds for his donation of a junior goalpost.


LETTERS TO THE EDITOR







ADULT LEARNING AT WING

ADULT LEARNING AND LEISURE OPPORTUNITIES

Wing Adult Centre, whose office is based at Wing School, provides a range of courses designed for adults. These courses take place during the daytime as well as in the evenings and are located not only at Wing but also in Stoke Hammond, Cheddington, Ivinghoe, Dagnall and Edlesborough.

All our tutors are experts in their subject or activity and they are also trained to teach adults. Their emphasis always is on how they can help you to learn and to find enjoyment and stimulation from your class. This means that our courses are never like "going back to school" but are a completely different experience in which your own experience and knowledge are fully recognised and valued. Our tutors are also conscious of the importance of creating the right atmosphere in their classes. They know that people learn best in friendly, relaxed groups where they do not feel threatened or have to worry about being shown up or made to look foolish.

This year we have been put into a completely new financial system. called Net Budgeting. We, as a Centre, are now responsible for recovering most of the direct costs of putting on courses and we are no longer able to go back to the authority to ask for special dispensation to run course with low numbers. This is really part of the political movement to make the costs of services provided by local government more visible. It does give us much greater flexibility but, coupled with the recent pay award to lecturers and tutors, it has meant a rise in fees this year which is greater than inflation.

You will notice in the brochure that some courses are marked as being for small groups. This applies to some of the Upholstery classes, Furniture Restoration, and to all the Language courses. We felt that in these classes it would be more appropriate to restrict the size of the groups so that people could get more individual attention from the tutor. Although these courses will have to be more expensive, they will be better value for money. With the Languages, we felt that people would be happier if the group size was limited to 12. This will mean a more relaxed atmosphere, everyone will have more chance to actually practice the language, and all will receive more individual attention.

There are not so many new courses this year as we cannot afford to take so many risks. However, those of you who would like to trace your ancestors will be interested in our course on Family History on Thursday evenings. There will be the opportunity for beginners to start Lacemaking on our new six-week introductory course on Friday mornings, and people can learn to play Badminton on our new Beginners course on Wednesday evenings.

Whatever interest you in the brochure, come along to the free introductory session during the week of the 12th of September and see if you like it before you have to part with any money!




