

RECTOR'S REPORT

I seem to be spending an awful lot of time driving these days.

Of course, I know that having three parishes makes some of this inevitable - but I wish I knew where all the other miles that appear on the 'clock' come from. Maybe it is that since we have lived here our family life-style has changed - Jane needs taking to Whitchurch to catch the bus to school in the morning and collecting in the afternoon, and Penny finds it easier not to have to drive to and from the station. That would account for some of it, and is probably a phase that will pass. The other possible cause is that we are now mainly using one car, whereas we used to regularly use two.

We live in an age that takes esy transport for granted, and we only begin to notice when either the car breaks down, or when weather conditions make driving hazardous.

There was a time - not that long ago - when people used to walk almost everywhere. If you met someone, you could stop for a few moments to say 'hello' (and maybe a few more to catch up with local news). This system even worked quite well when - to save time - people rode bicycles to get from A to B. But can you imagine the chaos that would be caused if we stopped our cars whenever we saw someone we knew so that we could have a gossip?

The best we can now manage is a quick wave as you go your way and I go mine. Sometimes we even wonder whether we have upset people who have stopped waving to us - especially if we have recently changed our car! We can still recognise them - so why can't they recognise us? Is it any wonder that we find community life much harder than the people of previous generations?

Yes, our cars are very convenient, But I'm not sure that they really are a good thing. They get us from A to B faster than other modes of transport - but what about the time they are supposedly saving us? Yes, what happened to all that time that we used to have before we all started driving everywhere?





Dear Caroline,

With reference to last December's Chronicle I noticed a couple of lines relating to the new orange street lights on the Green. I wish to make a comment as I'm probably one of the three people mentioned who are dissatisfied with the new lighting. (I'm sure there are more people who agree with me but haven't said as yet.)

When I read that new lighting was coming to the village back in the Autumn, I wrote to the Parish Council saying that I thought new lights would be fine but I hoped they would not be of the orange type as found outside The Acorns or, more commonly, on a motorway. Having been reassured that this was not the case, I was horrified to see that, during October, two new lights appeared in the heart of the village and were of the "orange type", I wrote again to the Parish Council, I still have had no written reply to either of my letters.

We have been informed indirectly that white lights are no longer obtainable. However, Value Electrical Contractors of Wing, suppliers of the two new orange light fittings say that white tubes/bulbs are available for this type of light at the same price.

There has been no need for orange lights in Cublington, Weedon or Soulbury and new white lights have been recently installed in Long Marston and Wilstone.

Would the Parish Council please look into this for us.

In an earlier edition of the Chronicle, I remember reading about a villager who walked to the edge of the village one evening and could see the orange glow of Milton Keynes getting ever nearer. Perhaps it won't be too long before Milton Keynes can see the orange glow of Aston Abbotts!



Walkers inspect ON New Year's Day, 39 walkers met in Stewkley parish at the Country

ON New Year's Day, 39 walkers met in Stewkley parish at the Cublington (W.A.R.A.) spinney for a 3½ mile walk round the country lanes in the Littlecote area.

They were met at the Littlecote junction with Dunton Road, by five others who had come field-way from Stewkley church and whose round trip involved 6½ miles.

Between Littlecote and Kingsbridge attention was drawn to the site of the deserted medieval village of Lidcote and to the plantation of 100 oaks recently put in to mark the centenary of Bucks County Council.

At Kingsbridge there was interest in the carpark/picnic area now taking shape, and in the new footpath sites which the county coun-

cil is installing.

The 44 walkers completed the return to Cublington spinney before the rain which had been forecast arrived.

Picnic Site Three Locks Picnic Site is situated beside the Grand Union Canal and is open all year round. It is owned and managed by Buckinghamshire County Council.

Refreshments There is a post office and general store in great Brickhill as well as two public houses. The Old Red Lion and The Duncombe Arms, both of which serve lunchtime food and have gardens. The Three Locks pub serves food and also has a children's room.

Parking The Three Locks Picnic Site provides the easiest parking but Great Brickhill village also offers limited street parking. Please park with care and consideration.

Buses A limited service runs between Milton Keynes, Leighton Buzzard and Luton via the Three Locks (no Sunday service). For further information phone the County Busline Enquiry Service on Aylesbury 382000.

Footwear Many of the paths on this walk can be wet and muddy at any time of the year and therefore waterproof footwear is recommended.

Maps This leaflet can be used in conjunction with Ordnance Survey 1:50,000 Map No. 165 (Aylesbury) or 1:25,000 Pathfinder Map No. SP82/92.






THREE LOCKS/GREAT BRICKHILL



The circular walk combines a length of the Grand Union Canal towpath in the Ouzel Valley, with the hilly wooded countryside of the Greensand Ridge. The Three Locks Picnic Site makes a convenient starting place or a shorter walk starts from Great Brickhill village.

- (2) A line of grey poplars, with distinctive grey bark, can be seen beside the towpath. The leaf stalks of many poplars are flattened and therefore offer little support to the leaves, which flutter in the lightest breezes.
- (3) At the first bridge turn right over the canal towards Paper Mill

Cross the small bridge over the original line of the Ouzel and then cross the main stream by a larger bridge near the farm buildings. Originally this was the mill stream but has now become the main course. Paper Mill Farm is situated on or near the site of a water mill mentioned, which was mentioned in the Domesday Book. Paper milling is thought to have started in the eighteenth century but has not been carried out here for many years. Continue on the bridleway past the farm buildings. Now there is a choice of routes. continue straight on for the short cut (see section 13), or turn left towards Great Brickhill. There is a slow steady climb up this old 'green lane' and from the top there are good views across the Ouzel Valley and Milton Keynes.

(4) Great Brickhill is an attractive village with a variety of architectural styles including many seventeenth and eighteenth century buildings. There are some fine examples of timber framed buildings with brick infill including the thatched barn conversion, opposite the top of Stoke Lane, called Cromwell Cottages.

(5) At the main road in Great Brickhill turn left and then right along

Ivy Lane opposite the Old Red Lion public house. Turn right along Heath Road and immediately down Cuff Lane, out of the village

Cromwell Cottages

(6) The short cut rejoins from the right and from here carry straight on along the Greensand

> Ridge Walk. This long distance route runs from Leighton Buzzard to Gamlingay along the prominent ridge of hills across Bedfordshire. Much of the walk is wooded and this length is adjacent to the largest patch of deciduous woodland left in Bedfordshire some of which forms the nearby Stockgrove Country Park.

(7) An animal frequently seen in the woods is the muntjac or barking deer. It comes originally from South East Asia but was introduced to Woburn Deer Park by the Duke of Bedford in 1900. Some of them excaped and they have now become well established in Southern England. Muntiac are small deer (22" - 23" high) and have a chestnut coloured body, blackish-brown legs and a white chin and throat. The muntjac is the symbol of the Greensand Ridge Walk.

(8) Follow the Greensand Ridge Walk down to Rushmere Lodge, around which many exotic trees . have been planted, including Sierra Redwoods. The bark an avenue of Wellingtonias, or protect them from the forest of these trees is spongey to fires of their native California and Sierra Nevada.

(9) At Rushmere Lodge turn left along the road and then right at the cross-roads. Walk above the road through the beech woods and then rejoin it to cross the River Ouzel, taking great care on the bridge. The second bridge crosses the original course of the river.

10. At the canal bridge turn right along the towpath. The Church of St Mary and Old Linslade Manor and Farm are all that remain of the

original village of Linslade. The present town was developed around the London - Birmingham line station, which opened in 1836.

Scots Pine

Three important transport links run along the Ouze! Valley. As well as the Grand Union Canal there is also the London Birmingham/Glasgow railway line and the A4146 Hemel Hempstead to Bletchley road.

Though busy, the valley is still beautiful and the wet meadows are attractive to a great variety of wildlife.

(12) Work on the Grand Junction Canal commenced in 1793 and it was to substantially shorten the journey time from Birmingham to London. It runs from Braunston, in Northamptonshire to Brentford, on the River Thames, a journey which before was 154 miles via the Oxford Canal and Thames but was reduced to 93 miles with the construction of the Grand Junction Canal. The canal was later renamed the Grand Union Canal when it merged with several others including the Regents Canal in 1929. The walk continues along the canal and ends back at the picnic site at bridge number 107.

(13) Short Cut As you climb up the hill the view opens up. The large patch of bracken grows well in the freely drained acidic soil. At the top of the hill, saplings have been planted on the left of the bridleway to replace a line of elms that died from Dutch Elm Disease. Many thousands of trees were lost in North Bucks and the landscape was dramatically altered.

(14: Cross the road and go down the bridleway opposite. Just before the lake on the left there is a large patch of Great Tussock Sedge. The tussocks, which built up from dead vegetation, can grow up to three feet in diameter and three feet high and they form an attractive habitat for insects and spiders. The path then follows the edge of the lake and on the opposite side after an open area, turn right to rejoin the main route (see Section 7 to 12).





Stockgrove Country Park Situated nearby it consists of 74 acres of woodland and parkland open to the public for informal recreation. It is jointly managed by Buckinghamshire and Bedfordshire County Councils.

A MONTHLY LOOK AT FACTS YOU NEVER WANTED TO KNOW...

How often can Shrove Tuesday fall on 29th February?

Shrove Tuesday can only fall on 29th February in a leap year in which there are five Tuesdays in February, and in which Easter Day falls on This conjunction will happen in 2028 16th April. and again in 2180. So the interval between two such conjunctions is just 152 years.

(Meanwhile, we'll just have to put up with Shrove Tuesday on 27th February this year. Ed.)



Nichols reported to Aston Abbotts Parish Council's January meeting that only one person in the area had been found to be over the drink-driving limit at Christmas and New Year. It was agreed this was a pleasing result.
Clir John Ford gave

details about grants for recreational facilities. The chairman Colin Higgs asked him and Cllr Richard Speakman, who represent the council on the recreation ground committee, to call a meeting to decide what equipment the village needs before applying for a grant.

Mr Speakman reported that faulty street lighting in Aston Abbotts had now been rectified, except for a lamp in Moat Lane, which was awaiting cable repairs by Eastern Electricity.

Cllr Roy Malin said that several items on the Conservation Plan were incorrect, and Dis-trict Cllr Bryan Round agreed to take these points up with Aylesbury Vale Council. The chairman pressed concern County Cllr Reg Keen about the new drainage project in Wingrave Road/A418 junction, doubting it would ever work when completed.

Planning applications for Moat Lane were discussed and Clerk Mrs Margaret Chesher was asked to point out to Aylesbury Vale's Planning Department that several important trees and a hedgerow in the Conservation Area were not shown on the plan.

Concern had been expressed about people using the Norduck footpath and bridleway allegedly being abused by the occupants of the

Cllr Higgs pointed out these were all legal rights of way, waymarked and for everyone to use on foot or horseback, and he had asked the county council to advise the residents of the farm accordingly.

This was reported to the December Parish Council meeting, chaired by Cllr Colin Higgs. It was also understood that new drainage was under way for Wingrave Road and the junction of the A418, and the damaged storm drain cover in Ross Road was being dealt with.

The meeting granted £50 to the parochial church council towards churchyard upkeep.

Councillors made observations on various planning applications, con-tending that the bridlepath would suffer extra traffic if a proposed farmhouse is built at Norduck, and the design would be and instrusion on the landscape over the Vale of Aylesbury.

An application for a cable duct to be installed in Briestock by British telecom was referred to Aylesbury nected with the village.

District Cilr Bryan Round was asked to look into a request for a street lamp on the footpath in Bricstock.






