
Offers of help with preparation and serving of soup and baked potatoes would also be most welcome.

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

RECTOR'S REPORT

November can be a very depressing month.

We watch the leaves of summer falling to the ground.

We remember those who died in two World Wars.

We do not look forward to the prospects of Winter - whether it be because it will be cold, or because we do not wish to stay indoors, or for whatever reason.

So I decided to scrap the report I wrote on the 'downward spiral', which made rather depressing reading, and try to focus my thoughts on All Saints Day, 1st November.

We don't celebrate All Saints Day much now - rather there is a tendency (regrettable in my view) to celebrate Halloween, Oct. 31st. Halloween marks the end of the Celtic year, its night 'being the time when all the witches and warlocks were abroad and held their wicked revels'. It derived it's name from the time when the country was 'Christianised', and Now 1st became All Hallows, or All Saints Day. Perhaps Halloween and All Saints Day present two sides of the same coin: Light and Darkness, Good and Evil, Right and Wrong, Truth and Falsehood. I have always thought that it was more appropriate to celebrate the good, the right and the true rather than their oppositss.

An All Saints Day we remember those heroes of the past who have been recognised by the Church as beacons of light in the darkness. There are far too many of them to list, and it is good to have an occasion when we can remember all of them. People whose lives were visibly good, who wakked the life of faith and who helped others on their journey of life. All Saints Day is a Christian Holy Day, so it is hardly surprising that the heroes of other faiths are not included.

In the Church Calendar, November 2nd is kept as the Commemoration of All Souls. This allows people to remember all those who have died, if they so wish, and particularly those who did not qualify as 'saints'.

The message is that 'Good' overcomes 'Evil'. We need to pray against the influence of witches and satanists and <u>for</u> those who proclaim the good news of Jesus.

From a villager

Dear Editors,

I read with interest Gordon's comments in last month's Chronicle

about the village hall.

I, amongst others, was invited onto the Committee to help in the running of the hall in 1984 when it was a sinking ship (and when others got off for the same reason) and could not look after its own finances. It was in the red.

With the help of a £200 loan from a generous parishoner, we got the hall decorated by the MSC, with whom I liaised and generally supervised the project. This obviously went against the grain with one or two people, as I later heard it referred to as Brandon Hall. I was actually very flattered as it seemed to have a certain ring to it.

Various fundraising events later, with the loan paid back, we saw the installation of an electric slot meter (so you paid for what you used), new tables, and an updated heating system, to name but a few improvements. Over the years the funds to finance the hall have steadily increased, and as Gordon mentioned, probably stood at

about £1400.

Recently everything changed. Certain factions of the Committee do not want outsiders (non Church) to be part of the running of the hall, but want to 'go it alone', partly no doubt to the fact that there is now plenty of money in the This faction know who they are, so I will not name names.

The effect the consequences of this could have, as I see it is HERE WE GO AGAIN. The village split down the middle, again. Them and Us. All the good that certain people in the village did to unite the place (again no names, but to them a pat on the back) could be about to go down the pan. What a shame.

Unfortunately, at some time or other, we all have to use the hall, as it's the only one we have (at the moment) otherwise I for one would love to tell them where to put it.

I would say to the Rector and his minders, think very carefully before you come to a decision.

To those I know are trying very hard to bring this very small minority to their senses, good luck.

May common sense prevail.



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ASTON ABBOTTS CHURCH ROOM TRUST

In November 1898 a Trust was set up as the legal basis for Aston Abbotts' Church Room. This original impressive document is now in my possession, and a copy has been sent to the Diocesan Offices.

The land for the Church Room was given jointly by Lady Wantage and the Vicar, Revd. Thomas Waddon Martyn, who was incumbent from 1887 to 1918. It is important to realise that part of the land belonged to the 'Vicar' and not to the 'Church' as such.

There are indications that Thomas Martyn wanted the Church Room to be held by himself and the two Churchwardens as Trustees. But a solicitor's letter from this period states that this is not possible, because 'Vicar and Churchwardens' is held in law to be a copporation incapable of holding land - under the Mortmain Acts of 1888. The Trust was accordingly re-worded so that the property should be held by the Vicar with two named Trustees, who must be members of the Church of England, to be appointed by the Vicar. Not surprisingly, the two Trustees named in the original document were - the Churchwardens.

Some fifteen years later, in sending his returns to the Diocese, Thomas Martyn states that the Churchwardens are Trustees of the Church Room. It has so far not been discovered how or when the Trust Deed was first broken by Churchwardens being admitted to office without also being named as Trustees.

To further complicate matters, there was a change of incumbent. The new Vicar, Alfred Haigh, about whom I do not yet know much, seems not to have lasted twelve months. He was replaced in 1919 by John Pugh.

Also there were significant changes in Church legislation taking place.

In simple terms, property that had been held by 'Vicar and Churchwardens' (They could apparently hold land that had been 'Church' land), now became the responsibility of the newly established Parochial Church Councils.

Aston Abbotts Parochial Church Council has taken legal responsibility for the Church Room since then, although there have been a series of Management Committees at various stages over the last forty years. At one stage it proved necessary for the Vicar to ask the Parochial Church Council who the people on the Church Room Committee were - but that is another story, and so is the Vicar's request that the Church Room be kept free of other lettings on Monday evenings so that it could be used for Church purposes.

The show was opened by Mrs Ruth Bellingham of Aston Abbotts, and organised by a committee headed by Mrs Pat Hawkins of Stewkley.



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
BEWARE OF BOGUS OFFICIALS

There are many excuses used for drawing you out of your home. Here are a few examples:

Children will ask you to come out and help them look for their ball or a stray pet.

Someone will call and tell you they admire your garden and draw you away from your house to the far end of the garden to discuss your plants, whilst someone slips into your home.

Someone will call and tell you there is a tile or slate loose on your roof and offer to show you where it is, again, drawing you out of vour home.

Don't keep large amounts of cash in your home. Believe it or not, thieves know all the hiding places and they will usually find it, so you will not fool them.

You should deposit large sums of money in a Bank, Building Society or Post Office, in a savings account.

SCOUTS SUMMER CAMP - LONGRIDGE

The Troop's Annual Summer Camp, held at Longridge Scout Boating Centre, near Marlow, proved to be a great success.


Having no sooner arrived, we all set off as a troop aboard a "gig" (rowing boat) and three canoes, to make our way some nine miles upstream to an island near Henly on Thames, where we slept in bivouacs. During the early hours of the morning (4am) we had univited visitors, 5 very noisey youngsters aboard a rowing boat. Once we had confiscated the boat and the "gang" was sent away, we expected a quiet morning. However, they decided to set fire to the Henley Regatta stageing. In true Scouting tradition, the fire was put out and the day saved.

The following day we rowed back down stream; and, to save our weary arms, we errected a "jury" rig on the gig using a groundsheet and various spars.

The rest of the week continued with daily swims in the river, sailing, canoeing, climbing, gig races (we came second) and abseiling off Marlow bypass bridge into a gig waiting some 100 ft below. We were all assessed for the British Canoe Union 1 Star test and passed with flying colours, even showing one of the Sea Scout Troops how to do it with style.

Another one for the record book was "Baldrick's" custard, which after half an hour's festering, ended up as a mixture of coloured milk and a layer of a burnt undescribable gunge in the pan! (He won't be allowed to forget that for a while.)



OUR WELL DOCUMENTED CASE AGAINST THE TIP

The Action Group completed its well documented case against the tip ahead of the tight deadline it had set, and two copies of the report were with the County Planning Officer by August 17th. At that time we were working to an October 1st decision. Now we understand consideration of the application has been put back because Hales Waste have taken longer than expected to submit an environmental assessment.

Our sincere thanks to everyone who has contributed in any way towards the compilation and publication of the document. It contains <u>76 A4 Pages</u> and has a delightful full colour front cover - <u>a photograph of The Thistle Brook</u> taken by professional photographer Ian Pleath, of Hulcott.

It contains carefully prepared technical papers dealing

with:

- * water pollution, land drainage and soil
- environmental health
- * flora and fauna
- * agriculture and air pollution
- * traffic and roads

The Group was most fortunate in finding people from diverse professional callings who volunteered their services and devoted many hours to research, discussion and finally the writing of their reports.

TELLING POINTS

Action Group Chairman Keith Miller in his letter to the County Planning Officer - it forms part of the report - makes some telling points:

- 1. There is no need for additional waste disposal capacity. Existing facilities are so spacious that they are taking large quantities of waste from other parts of Britain.
- 2. The site was probably chosen because it appeared to be capable of providing satisfactory conditions for land-raised waste disposal. Our studies showed this is not to be the case. Indeed the Royal Commission on Environmental Pollution and Waste Management seriously questions the effectiveness of clay and man-made liners for lasting containment of leachate.

- 3. Since there is no need, other than commercial gain for Hales Waste, there can be no possible justification for violating a beautiful part of the Vale.
- 4. It would jeopardise and disrupt so many vital aspects of the environment enjoyed by the residents of Bierton, the neighbouring villages and Aylesbury.
- 5. It would risk pollution of the Thistle Brook which supports a wide variety of flora and fauna, including scarce species of birds.
- 6. It would generate unacceptable movements of heavy goods vehicles.
- 7. It would prejudice the traffic relief expected in Bierton when the new by-pass is constructed with a possibility that all tip traffic would have to pass through Bierton Village and the residential section of Rowsham Road.
- 8. It would mean going ahead with a major scheme, the long term consequences of which are substantially unknown, but which look increasingly unacceptable as technical knowledge and practical experience expand.
- 9. It would establish a test case in famous fragile and vulnerable countryside, where there is no hole to fill, no eyesore to remove and no resource to extract.
- 10. Hales appear to be deliberately seeking for commercial reasons to get ahead of the very substantial body of new legislation coming from Brussels and Westminster which recognises the need to greatly strength controls over all aspects of pollution and waste disposal.

USE OF WINGRAVE SCHOOL GROUNDS

AFTER SCHOOL HOURS AND DURING HOLIDAYS

I thought that it might be helpful if I clarified the procedure by which permission to use the school grounds after school hours and during holidays periods may be obtained.

An initial approach has to be made to me by 'a responsible adult', who should explain why the grounds are required and what arrangements have been made with regard to matters of insurance, safety and control in relation to the proposed usage.

If I am satisfied with these arrangements, a form is completed and forwarded to the lettings section at County Offices. If the Lettings Officer is also satisfied, the responsible adult concerned will have the form returned, which indicates that the authorisation has been granted.

ADMISSION TO WINGRAVE C. E. COMBINED SCHOOL

The above school takes children from the age of 5 to 12 , largely from the villages of Wingrave, Aston Abbotts, Cublington and Rowsham, although an increasing number of out of catchment area children are now being admitted.

Wingrave School has a flourishing School Association and close links with the local community. Parents of children at the school and School Governors are kept closely in touch with what is happening by means of a weekly newsletter.

The present policy of the School Governors is to admit children termly for the Reception Class as rising-5's, i.e. at the start of the term in which they will reach the age of five. Parents, who would like to consider the entry of their child to the school, are invited to make an appointment to see the Headteacher. They will then be given the opportunity to look around the school and be able to raise any questions. If you would like your child to be considered for admittance to the school, the procedure to adopt is as follows:

- Telephone or write to the School Secretary or Headteacher when the child reaches the age of three or as soon as you move into the area if you have a child aged 3 - 12 years.
- 2. An information pack will be sent to you, and a mutually convenient appointment arranged for you to meet the Headteacher and to be shown around the building.
