THE LATEST protest to erupt over the Wing bypass has come from the potential victims of the outer northern or 'Rothschild Route'.

Aston Abbotts residents have formed an action group and written to three MPs to voice their dismay over the proposals.

Caroline Lane, the group's secretary, claims that if the route is chosen farms would be destroyed, the contours of the land would be altered and several miles of outstanding natural beauty and archeological interest would be lost under cement.

Her letters have been sent to John Gummer, Minister of Agriculture Pisheries and Food; Michael Howard, Secretary of State for the Environment; and John MacGregor, Secretary of State for Transport.

In them she cites two local farms — West Park and Oxley's, an ancient watercourse and seven footpaths which would lose land to the proposed dual carriageway and service roads.

dual carriageway. "Since this idea was presented in the 1989 White Paper, Roads For Prosperity, there has been increasing public concern about the wisdom of building major new trunk roads like this one, which carve up our disappearing countryside and encourage more and more traffic to use them — the benefits quickly disappearing."

They say it could be an unnecessary waste of money if the Department of Transport chose an alternative road to link the M20 with the East

coast ports.

• Wing Parish Council have written a strongly

worded letter to Bucks County Council officials demanding that an outer 'Southern Route' be considered for the the dual-carriageway trunk road, and that the whole matter should again go out to Public Consultation before any new planning application is submimitted for any route.

The letter, signed by parish clerk Harry Ayris and sent to Mr W Chapple, chairman of the Highways and Public Transport sub Committee, County Engineer Tony Sketch and County Planning Officer Edwin Schoon, as well as local county councillor Reg

Keen, asks why the idea of a southern route has been written off.

been written off.

"We have been repeatedly told that the Outer Southern Route has been given detailed investigation and been rejected but the Parish Council and general public have never been told, officially, why this is so, but only by local rumours." says the letter.

"If this route cannot once again be considered

"If this route cannot once again be considered along with the other two proposals we would like to know why not. We understand that the Aylesbury Vale District Council is also taking up these matters with your

council, so hopefully between us we shall get the correct and truthful answers." said the letter.

The protest goes on to speak of villagers fears that the proposed road will be part of the Outer London orbital relief road for the M25, namely the M250. Mr Ayris says that if there is any credence to this rumour, the parish feels that the original single carriageway bypass for Wing should be considered again and this major road put further away from all the villagers which will be affected.

A418 news

The letter campaign continues, and we have had a number of replies from Ministers and local government officers, none of which are reassuring in the slightest. We have had a mention in the Observer (above) - the LBO, that is - on 26th May. We have had a useful meeting with members of the Wing pressure group who gave us valuable advice about putting together formal objection documents to planning permissions. We shall soon be handing in our petition to Bucks County Council, after which we wait for the county engineer's report in July on the relative merits of the Rothschild and S2 routes. We have also met with Ted Payne, a local county councillor. Please ask your friends and relatives in other parts of Bucks to put pressure on their own county councillors to vote against the Rothschild route when the engineer has reported; councillors will probably not be aware of our local issues unless told by their own constituents to sit up and take notice. RECTOR'S REPORT

So far as I can remember I started singing hymns when I was about seven years old. The local Vicar came to our school and I was 'volunteered' for the Church Choir.

Goodness knows how many hymns I must have sung over the years, and I have always had great difficulty in deciding which is my 'favourite'. I like different ones at different times. Some have very moving words, some have catchy tunes, whilst others I just like. Some of the newer ones are called 'worship songs' and, like their predecessors, are a rather mixed bag.

The recent Archbishop's report on Church Music urges the Church to experiment with more new hymns and songs. I think I can see what they are getting at. For the last century every parish church has built its music around the organ. Many of those organs are nearing the end of their useful life. There are problems in many places with finding organists (or people prepared to have a go!). Before there were organs each community produced its band of musicians (some of whom could play in tune!). Why should not the Church utilise the new technology and use electronic instruments, and supplement this with a group of instrumentalists?

If we stick with the hymns we feel comfortable with, and never sing anything else, we shall never develop our understanding of God. From time to time we need to try some of the new challenging/disturbing/provocative hymns and songs of todays generation. We need to remember that all the old favourites were once 'new fangled' hymns. It is just that they caught on whilst others didn't. Until we are prepared to give them a try we shall never know which of the new hymns/worship songs we like and which we don't.

I have no intention of throwing out any of the old hymns. All I want to do is to be prepared to try something new when the right circumstances present themselves.

Unofficial notes from the Parish Council Annual General Meeting, 8th May

Caroline Lane was elected chairman for 1992/3, with Roger Biddle vice chair. Roger is street lighting officer, and Vic Scott, John Ford and Roger are on the Recreation Ground Committee. I am afraid the other posts escape me, but the Clerk of course has a full list.

The accounts for 1991/2 were approved; financial Accounts summary is in this month's Chronicle. Public audit day is 19th June when accounts available for inspection-askthe Clerk.

It was noted that the monthly electricity bill for street lighting is down from £48 to £26 due to the new photocell units now fitted to all lights.

A418/Wing bypass Reg Keen, our county councillor, attended and assured the parish council that he had the interests of Aston Abbotts very much at heart. does of course represent several villages, including Wing, but he believes that route S2 (closest to Wing), with substantial extra cutting and tunnelling near the village, is the best solution. He is opposed to the outer northern route. He added that money is unlikely to be forthcoming for either project in the next two years.


DOG MESS

Aylesbury Vale's environmental health officers have just held a no dog mess exercise, part of a national campaign - we found out about this rather too late on the parish council, so you have been spared the Free Literature and Poop-Scoops. Seriously though, dog mess is a problem even in a rural area like this. You have to watch your feet on some of the footpaths, and we often have complaints about dog mess on the recreation ground. Dogs can carry infections which do not harm the animal but in severe cases can cause blindness in children. Please be responsible and follow three guidelines suggested by AVDC:

- Don't allow your dog out of your garden on its own
- Don't allow your dog to foul footpaths, verges, or recreational land which the public use
- If it does (and of course it can't be avoided) then clear it up. You might feel silly using a poop-scoop (certainly a silly name) but the very next person along the path will be glad you did.









Hedgenogs: by the wildlife Hospital Trust

What's the one night-time wanderer that everybody welcomes into their garden? The hedgehog! Small, noisy and not particularly good looking, the hedgehog is nevertheless the gardener's best friend and everybody else's favourite wildlife visitor.

The hedgehog, Erinaceus europaeus, is strictly speaking an insectivore, and it relishes a meal of slugs, worms and insects, together with more unusual fare such as fallen fruit or carrion. It is one of our most friendly wild animals, often popping into gardens at a regular time for a hand-out of tinned dog or cat food and a bowl of water (bread and milk are real no-nos and can harm the hedgehog).

However, that doesn't mean that the hedgehog doesn't have his enemies. Badgers are the only natural predator, so if you have a sett anywhere near you, no matter how much you encourage hedgehogs into your garden, you won't be successful.

And the hedgehog's natural defence mechanism - of rolling into a tight ball so that all its prickles stick out and form an impenetrable ball - is of no use against its most dreaded enemy, the motor car. Hundreds of thousands of hedgehogs fall foul of this man-made danger every year.

And there are other dangers in the garden to contend with, too. Barbed wire and netting are obvious ones, bonfires and compost heaps, drains, lawn mowers and bowls of oil in the garage less so. And then of course there are herbicides, insecticides and pesticides - wood preserver and slug pellets, for instance. Ponds are another area for concern - if you have a pond, make sure that there is a ramp for the spiny garden visitor to use if falls in; though hedgehogs can swim well, they will get exhausted if they cannot climb out.

But, all in all, towns and cities are a friendly place for hedgehogs, who will wander up to four miles a night in their search for food. Dogs are about the only other animal, apart from the badger, that will injure a hedgehog, so if you have regular hedgehog visitors, try to keep the dog in during the evening. And don't worry about the hedgehog's legendary fleas - yes, they do have them, but the hedgehog will not thank you for puffing flea killer all over it, as the powder is just as likely to harm the hedgehog as tkill he fleas. Hedgehog fleas are host-specific, so they won't live on humans, dogs or cats, and won't find carpets a very satisfactory home. The best course of action is to leave them, and the hedgehogs, alone.

It is also best to leave an accidentally-disturbed nest of young hedgehogs alone. Cover them up quickly and retreat, mum should soon return. If the mother does not return and the babies start leaving the nest in desperation, 'piping' loudly, or if you come across a sick or injured youngster (or adult) then that is another situation entirely. Take the orphans or casualty in, put it in a deep box with a hot water bottle wrapped up in a towel at one end, and phone The Wildlife Hospital for advice (0844 292 292).

Any hedgehog out during the day is likely to be in trouble and, having taken it in, one of the most important procedures to carry out is to check for maggots and fly eggs. Every one must be removed with tweezers and the area bathed with dilute Savlon: it really is a life-saving practice. (Then, again, phone The Wildlife Hospital for advice.)

So, being hedgehog-friendly does take some effort - keep the garden clear of hazards, including chemicals, and offer food to supplement their natural diet - but the effort is well worth while and you will be rewarded by regular visits from the namesakes of one of Britain's favourite nursery characters - Mrs Tiggy Winkle.




