As the article says, a £25 reward has been offered for information leading to conviction of the person who cut the trees. If you did see anything, please think carefully about continuing to keep it to yourself.





#### RECTOR'S REPORT

This month's report seems to have had more false starts than usual. The chances are that this is because my deadline is a week too soon - I know that I must something written before I go on holiday.

The theme I have been exploring is the goodness of God's Creation - how easily we take natural beauty for granted - and the dangers of trying to manipulate nature.

I've done the rounds of the Rogation Processions - including the story of the irate farmer who complained that the Vicar had not blessed one of his fields. The Vicar's response was that that particular field was more in need of 'muck' than prayer!

I've tried the 'We don't inherit the earth from our fathers, we borrow it from our children' line. But that too was unfruitful - except that I went on a nostalgia trip and ended up longing for the return of the 'rag and bone' man.

Both conservation and recycling are very important principles. Being a hoarder by nature, I have no difficulty with the theory of conservation and recycling, it's actually doing it that I find so hard. It is not that I mind taking the empty bottles to the bottle bank, the cans to the can bank and the bundles of newspaper, etc. (when there are a tidy few, that is) - my trouble is that I keep forgetting to put them in the car! But then— it is always just after I have remembered to get rid of all the cardboard boxes that I discover that I need one.

I was intrigued to discover that the cartridges used in some photocopiers are sent to China after they are used. I thought that they would simply be stripped down, cleaned and reloaded. Apparently they are recycled even more thoroughly - the mechanical parts and the aluminium parts are recycled - the plastic housing is melted down and remoulded - the residual toner is also melted down and recycled for further industrial use. Makes you think!





# Of cars and trees and grass verges and things that go snip in the night - or how one person can bring discontent and mayhem to a village

This is a factual statement combined with comment for those of you that did not know the awful things that have been going on in this lovely village of ours.

## Some History

Taking a trip backwards in time, the County Council supplied a number of trees to be planted around the village. This was part of their policy to improve the local environment.

So saplings were planted. Amongst those, two were planted outside Nos. 32-34, The Green. This is almost opposite the old Post Office.

One tree died and the other was struggling to grow, but had been nominated for replacement

## **Parking**

Parking began on that spot just over a year ago.

It could have been the first incidence of the forthcoming nastiness, but the young sapling was broken.

Despite numerous complaints from the Parish council and from other villagers the parking continued.

The Parish Council made representations to the people parking on the verges, which it was obliged to do.

For it is their duty to listen to and act on the views expressed strongly by concerned villagers. More so, when there is the probability that laws are being broken.

No agreement was reached with the parkers.

#### The new Tree

In November 1992, the Parish Council planted a new larger sapling in the same spot as the original.

Mysteriously, this sapling vanished over the weekend of 21/22 November. Nobody living around the area saw it go or saw any one doing it.

The parking continued.

#### Two more Trees

By now the Parish Council had more complaints and had resolved to end this situation. In March 1993, two large saplings were donated by a local well wisher and were planted with solid wooden posts as support to discourage any further disappearances.

## The Nasty Act!

Then, over the weekend of 24/25 April, this year some nasty minded person sneaked out in the middle of the night and cut both of the saplings at ground level.

They died!

#### Comment
