

#### RECTOR'S REPORT

At first sight it was only a bookmark. The fact that it was between pages 30 and 31 reminded me that I had not read very much of the book. In fact it was one of those books that I had given up as a bad job.

But it was an interesting bookmark. It was a 'Day Anywhere' Ticket issued by the Midland Red bus company. I'd done two return trips from Lichfield to Birmingham on a day when Penny had come to visit before we were married. The ticket had cost 12/6 (that's 62½p) and I had probably saved about 10p by buying a Day Ticket instead of two Returns (Well, I was a student!). I can't quite make out the date on it - but it triggered many memories of a period of my life that I can still recall in some detail.

The book (which was not 'required reading', and cost 5/-) offered a new look at 'the historical puzzle of Jesus'. This time round I have read rather more of it, and was fascinated to discover that some of the ideas being put forward by the Bishop of Durham a few years back were nothing new.

Yet the old bus ticket helped me to understand what the author was trying to say. Looking at the story of Jesus through twentieth century eyes, with twentieth century thought forms and understanding of human relationships does not give an entirely clear picture. The story of Jesus had been passed on by word of mouth for far longer than my bookmark has been around before it was written down, so it should hardly surprise us that some details may have changed in the telling. Nor should we assume that the lifestyle of Jesus and his contemporaries will fit our mental picture of how things were.

Put very simply, our perception of things changes as time passes. Things can seem very different with the wisdom of hindsight - 'If I knew then what I know now!' - and there is no telling what we have still to discover. Things that are true must remain true- even if our understanding of 'truth' changes.

Time to move the bus ticket forward a few more pages!

June has been a good month for us at church; we held a mini flower festival based on 100 Best Tunes, with the December Festival Choir joining us for an evening concert which was well attended and much enjoyed by those who came and who joined us for refreshments afterwards. We raised £143.

The tickets for the 100 Club have now been numbered, entered onto the board and distributed in readiness for the first draw to take place at Festival Evensong on July 25th, so do come along.

Our flower theme for the July Festival is based on village life which should create some interest; so why not drop in and view the displays on Saturday and Sunday 24th and 25th July and have a cuppa?

The mowing is now in full swing and the churchyard looks neat and tidy, thanks must go to the people who help with this chore and everyone else who helps in any way to keep the church in good order.

Have a good holiday, or enjoy your days out if you are not going away.

India is often forgotten about amid the focus by the media upon Somalia and Romania, yet its people suffer the same poverty and live extremely primitive lives.

I will be based in one of the many small villages surrounding Madras, teaching English in orphanages, homes for the retarded and rehabilitation centres. Here, text books are

rare and writing is limited to slate and chalk.

For five months, my partner and I will share the sparse lifestyle, living on rice and lentils whilst developing our communication skills and personal character. I feel that this work will broaden my outlook on the world and will be highly satisfying.

This is where I need your help. Unfortunately my school doesn't belong to this scheme and therefore doesn't contribute to costs. A total of £1200 is needed to pay for accommodation and a return flight and must be raised myself.

I am currently seeking sponsorship, but any donations however big or small or any fundraising ideas would be

gratefully received.

I hope that I can raise the money, because this is a great opportunity and means a lot to me. I look forward to hearing from you.

Brief notes from the meeting on 28th May.

The Chairman (Caroline Lane) and the Vice Chairman (Roger Biddle) were re-elected. Representation on other bodies and committees unchanged (including Cllrs Biddle, Ford and Scott on the Recreation Ground Committee).

Post office: the Post Office had written tosay that it was not possible to provide a mobile service. Neighbouring offices had been asked if they were interested in doing a session here once a week but no office wanted to.

Planning applications: alterations to Bull & Butcher approved by AVDC; farmhouse at Moat Farm ditto; the parish council made no comment on new application for garage extension at Maplewood, The Green.

Cllr Ford reported from the meeting of the Wing Association of Parish Councils.

The Rec: decided to apply for an environmental grant from Bucks County Council for replanting of the hedgerow overlooking Aylesbury.

Parking: parking by the bus shelter was now out of the parish council's hands, but it was decided to replace the dead saplings in the autumn.

## Bible Cake

Thanks to Phyl Page for passing on this recipe she found in a magazine recently; you need not a cookbook but a Bible:

1. 6oz Judges 5 v 25

6oz Jeremiah 6 v 20 2.

3: 4 of Jeremiah 17 v 11

8oz 1 Samuel 30 v 12

8oz Nahum 3 v 12 (chopped) (or dates if you prefer) 2oz Numbers 17 v 8 5.

(blanched and chopped)

7. 10oz 1 Kings 4 v 22

8. ltsp 2 Chronicles 9 v 9 A pinch of Leviticus 2 v 13 - 9.

tsp Amos 4 v 5 (alright, 10.

baking powder)

Method: Beat 1 and 2 to cream. Add 3 one at a time. Add 4, 5, and beat again. Sieve 7,8,9,10 together and add. Use a 7" cake tin and bake in a low oven for 2 hours (1 hour 150°C, 1 hour 140°C and cover for last hour).

#### WING SCHOOL MISCELLANEA

The Summer Term began with the return of the group of students and teachers who had spent an interesting and enjoyable Easter in Germany. They were soon followed by the return of a second group who had spent 6 weeks in the USA as guests of American families. They too had a wonderful experience and were given the usual generous American welcome.

The usual intensive pre-examination work followed. Year II have now started their GCSEs and we wish them every success.

Special congratulations are due to the school's basketball team who, after a disappointing start, losing to the Gyosi School in Milton Keynes, went on to compile an impressive seven game winning streak. They then went on to lose only twice more throughout the rest of the season and these were both desperately close calls - by one point in overtime to Sir Henry Floyd 6th form and by 2 points away to Stantonbury 6th form.
