



A MONTHLY LOOK AT FACTS YOU NEVER WANTED TO KNOW

Why "all the rest have 31..."
Thirty days hath September, April, June and November, runs the children's mnemonic, all the rest have 31, except February, which has 28. The reason months have different numbers is that when the Romans under Julius Caesar invented the Julian calendar they decided to give months with special religious significance 31 days and the ones of lesser importance 30 days. Thus January, named after the god Janus, March after Mars, and July, in honour of Caesar himself, are among the months with 31 days. Caesar's successor, Augustus, named August after himself and, naturally, gave it 31 days. The Julian months of September (7th month) and October (8th) became the 9th and 10th months when in 1582 Pope Gregory changed the New Year from the Julian date of March 25 to January 1.

We are about to start on another Course in preparation for Confirmation. The first session will take place in Cublington Church on Thursday 3rd February at 7.30pm.

It seems only fair to let people know a bit about what is entailed in this Course. There will be about twenty sessions — each lasting about an hour and a quarter to an hour and a half, during which we shall be exploring the basics of the Christian Faith. In a way this is our response to going Back to Basics — which seems to be all the rage at the moment. Officially the syllabus for Confirmation requires knowledge of the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments — the basics of the Christian Faith, and, some would say that the Ten Commandments were fundamental to a civilised society.

Being Confirmed is a serious business - and it will be expected that candidates will attend at least eighty per cent of the sessions. The days have gone when just turning up at the classes is all that is required, and this time we are experimenting with a fairly new idea. We are asking each candidate to have a named 'sponsor'. They will meet with their sponsor at least once a month to discuss what they have been learning.

Clearly the role of a sponsor is an important one, and they will be expected to encourage the candidates by their example as well as by their interest and support. They will, of course, be welcome to 'sit-in' on the classes. This will enable them to identify with the candidates and also to make a valuable contribution to the group discussion.

It is hardly fair expecting young people to make promises that they are not likely to keep - and we have to admit that the fall-out rate after Confirmation tends to be very high. These people need as much help and encouragement as possible if the Church as we know it is to survive into the next century.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

The Government is proposing to reorganise Local Government in Great Britain during the next two years. The preferred choice is the abolition of counties and county councils and their replacement by "unitary authorities" based approximately on the existing District Councils (e.g. Aylesbury Vale).

Detailed reviewing of Buckinghamshire has just started and the proposals are likely to have a profound effect on local services. It should be stated that they have both support and opposition from the main political parties. But a system of government that has existed, in one form or another, for over 1000 years seems threatened.

Current estimates (as quoted in the Telegraph, Times and Guardian) suggest that the Council Tax could increase by as much as £35-£100 per year to pay for these new councils and their implementation. The new system could jeopardise bus subsidies (a bus from, say, Aylesbury to Milton Keynes, would have to be subsidised by two or more authorities); present arrangements whereby you can borrow a book from Aylesbury Library and return it to Milton Keynes might no longer be possible. Administrative staff would increase considerably, to look after four or five authorities instead of one, but the expertise of more specialist staff might be lost.

Advantages of the new system are a more local form of government, as opposed to what is said to be the remoteness of the county council.

If you feel strongly - one way or the other - about these changes and want to learn how they might affect you and your pocket, you are urged to attend one of the local meetings which will be attended by the Commissioners who are responsible for the review of Buckinghamshire:

- 3 February at Wing Village Hall (7 pm)
- 9 February at Winslow Public Hall (7 pm)
- 10 February at Hazell's Hall, Aylesbury (7 pm)
- 16 February at Civic Offices, Milton Keynes (7 pm)
- 23 February at Buckingham Community Centre (7 pm)

Please also let the MP (George Walden, House of Commons, London SW1) know your views. As yet, these far-reaching proposals have received little publicity. Hopefully this will change and a reasonable, impartial debate can take place locally and on television, radio and the newspapers, to ensure we do get the best possible form of local government for what is now Buckinghamshire and for the country as a whole.

Unofficial notes from the PC meeting on 17th December 1993.

Matters arising

Street lights - having consulted nearby households, it was decided to put up a new, white light outside no 87 The Green (i.e. over the road from the shop) with a back-shield to prevent light shining into the bedroom.

An up-to-date quote of £668 had been received for moving the existing white light on The Green further into Grove corner. Local residents were divided on whether they wanted it moved; the council concluded that moving it the maximum of 11m would not be enough to light the Grove corner sufficiently, and the cost was very high, so it was decided to apply for permission to lop some of the branches from the tree by the light instead.

It was decided to go ahead with repair of the bus shelter ${\tt roof.}$

Planning applications

Bridge Farm (Aston Abbotts parish, but reached via Rowsham) - the parish council made no comment on application for site for 2 agricultural workers' dwellings.

House on land adjacent to Windmill Hill Barns, Weedon Road the parish council objected to this because it was outside the village building limits and could set a precedent. The proposed external cladding was out of character.

Moat Farm, farmhouse: PC had no comment.

Lower Burston Farm - conversion of barn to dwelling, PC requested that tree planting should be native species.

Accounts Eastern Electricity £19.70; E. Sharp (street light repair) £44.27; BCC, mowing of Rec £403.92.

Precept Retained at £3000 for 1994/5; Clerk's salary to increase to £350 per year.

Local Government Review AVDC had asked the PC's views on Parish Partnership - especially the parish council's willingness to take on more local government tasks. It was felt in general that we are too small a body to take on any contracts or agency agreements, particularly functions at present carried out by trained local government staff.

Recreation Ground A letter of thanks was to be sent to Peter Knight for his help in ripping out the old hedge in readiness for replanting. The Rec. subcommittee had decided to move the fence to extend the children's play area because the swings, slide and climbing frame are too close to each other to meet current safety standards; and to investigate grants for safety surfaces.





GLOUCESTERSHIRE PIE

1 lb. lean lamb, cooked and sliced 1 lb. onions, thinly sliced 1 lb. cooking apples, thinly sliced 2 oz. butter Pinch of rosemary and nutmeg ½ pint rich gravy ½-¾ lb. potatoes, diced $\frac{1}{2}-\frac{3}{4}$ lb. swede, diced Salt and pepper

Set oven to 375°F or Mark 5. Put onions and apples in a pan and cover with water Boil for 5 minutes. Drain well, Meanwhile boil swede for 10 minutes, then add polato and cook until both are soft. Drain well and mash together until smooth Greate and ovenproof dish with the butter. Place lavers of meat, onion and apple in the dish, seasoning and sprinkling each layer with herbs as you fill up the dish. Pour in the gravy and top with the mashed potato and swede mixture. Dot top with butter and bake uncovered for \1-1 hour. Serve with a gree vegetable. Serves 4.




