

— QUIZ EVENING -

There was a full Church Room on Saturday 23rd April for an evening of cleverly devised questions: not so hard that you wanted to sulk under the table, but not all plain sailing either! Winners were the Ford (extended) family, and thanks to Colin for devising and asking the questions.

A question I am sometimes asked is "Why does God allow suffering?"

It is usually asked by someone who is closely involved in a tragedy, or when there has been a particularly harrowing item on the News.

If I am honest, I have to say that I do not know. But somehow this does not seem to be the appropriate answer when I am faced with the question. Truly I do not know because God doesn't always tell me (or anyone else, for that matter) what he is up to. If he did tell us, the chances are that either we would not understand - or that we would try to be clever and stop him.

One of the alternative answers is that whilst we cannot at this moment understand why a particular event has happened, at some later date its purpose will be revealed. I am never very comfortable with that answer because it means that we go around for ages carrying the question

"Why?" in our minds - looking desperately for an explanation rather than living our lives to the full.

Can it be that the capacity to hurt is too closely related to the capacity to love?

We are often most hurt by those who love us most. I have no doubts about God's love - although I still find it hard to accept that a loving God would inflict these terrible hurts on those he loves. But when we hurt those we love, it is not done in a cold and calculating way. We do not sit down and say "let me see how much hurt I can inflict so that the depth of my love will be proved". When we hurt other people it is usually as a result of an accidernt or a mistake - something that is not meant to happen, and something that we desperately try to avoid. In the same way God doesn't hurt us deliberately. When we are hurt he goes on loving us. Even if we are tempted to turn away from him - even though we find it hard to bear - even though we find it difficult to understand and even harder to forgive, God goes on loving us. He knows what we are suffering, and is always there to help us carry the burden.

He said to my surprise.


Vera Towell was standing there She lives right in Moat Lane She'd heard him "pop" Now he'll not hop Along this road again.

Life saving snails


GARDENING EDITOR

The common garden snail lays about 30 eggs a year (AAAGH), each of them the size of a large pinhead and each one a potential lifesaver. The snail's egg is a cheap, readily available and stable source of a chemical that is used to determine blood groups. Normally, this chemical is extracted from human blood, but it takes the blood from five donors to provide as much as is contained in a single snail's egg. The contents of the egg are extracted and dissolved in a saline solution.

Unofficial notes from the meeting held on 22nd April.

<u>Matters arising</u> Possible extra street light, Ross Road: there was some difficulty with electricity supply, making the quote enormous; another access point to the mains was to be suggested.

Accounts The financial summary for the year ended April 1994 was presented to councillors. The public will be invited to look at the books in May at the Clerk's house: please watch the noticeboard by the shop for details.

Bills agreed for payment: £112.85 for three street light repairs; £225.23 insurance premium (an increase of £17 over last year, regrettable but absolutely standard); fencing materials for the children's play area at the Rec., £12.16; petrol for the mower, £4.25 (yes, we know the Green was looking unkempt until Peter Knight did it, but said mower is being repaired...); electricity, £25.66.

<u>Planning applications</u> Bridge Farm (Rowsham) extensions to farm buildings approved by AVDC; Oak Farm (formerly Badger's Oak), continued use of three mobile units, no comment by parish council; now goes to AVDC.

<u>Wingrave School Governor</u> The parish council (jointly with Cublington) nominates a governor and our current representative has finished her term of office. If any reader would be interested please contact Margaret Chesher. You do not have to have a child at the school to be a governor.

Dogs AVDC is hoping to set up a Responsible Dog Ownership Project in the District and has decided that bins for dog mess can be provided at a cost of £123 each (including emptying for one year). The parish council decided to take up this offer for a bin at the Rec.

Councillors were formally asked for permission for a tree to be planted on the Rec in memory of Jody Sharp and Oliver Sutton. This was agreed and the council would consider making a donation when approximate costs were known.








- 1. Hold the egg firmly and make a hote in the pointed end with a darning needle.


 Make a bigger hole in the other end.
