

I forget now which of the Greek philosophers insisted that the only truly free person was the slave - who had only to obey. I don't think I ever really understood what it meant, for the slave seems to have less freedom than anyone else.

But it is good to see the new freedom in South Africa with the end of Apartheid, and one can only hope that the transitional Government will suceed in its task.

We take our comparative freedom for granted very often. Perhaps we look back to the Garden of Eden and see a story of a freedom that was misused. Maybe we would opt for the Ten Commandments as the basis for our moral code. Or instead we could consider the summary of the Jewish Law that Jesus used. But in all of these there is a definite stress on our relationship with God.

Can we really hope to get our human relationships right, whether at a personal, national or international level, if we ignore our relationship with God? I believe that the Constitution of the United States of America speaks of 'Our freedom under God'. The followers of Islam and Buddhism, to pick just two examples, have very strict ethical codes. Orthodox Jews follow prescribed rules about how they are to behave. And because we live in a free country, we allow them liberties to do 'their thing'.

But I sometimes wonder whether we do not go too far. The only Christians who try to speak up for their faith and their beliefs are usually ignored. A minority group in society that need to be patted on the head. Then there are those others whose voices are less strident, yet nevertheless, try to follow the Christian way of life. They may know that try as they will they usually fail to live as good a Christian life as they would like - yet God still loves them!

'Do as you like' sounds like a wonderful freedom - but it doesn't work. It needs to be expanded to consider the needs of others, and, more importantly, the demands of a just and Holy God.



With toad off the road splattered shoes.



ANONYMOUS FAME

The world's first stick-on, prepaid stamps were introduced in Britain on May 6, 1840. Only two denominations were issued: the penny black and the twopenny blue. Since they were not intended for overseas use, neither stamp carried the name of the country on them and the tradition remains to this day.

MAN OVER MATTER

Man may soon be able to control earthquakes—with water. Water pumped into the ground in unstable areas, accidentally or deliberately, is known to be able to trigger earthquakes. It acts by lubricating the rocks beneath, allowing them to slip more freely past each other. Geologists are working on plans to release tension in unstable zones by pumping water into the ground deliberately and thereby causing a series of small, controlled quakes in place of a single large one.







AYLESBURY VALE HEALTH INFORMATION SERVICE -

AN UPDATE

A Health Information service for the residents of Aylesbury Vale was launched at the end of July 1993. Based in the offices of the Community Health Council at 8 Temple Square Aylesbury, the Service offers information about all aspects of health care to visitors, telephone callers, letter writers and also fax and minicom owners!

Questions about matters such as local GP, dentist, optician and pharmacy services, help from voluntary and statutory bodies, waiting times for consultations and operations at local hospitals, womens' health and a multitude of other topics can all be answered. Information about specific illnesses and conditions is also available, but the service does not provide diagnosis or medical advice - the staff are information specialists, not doctors or nurses!

Since the service was launched it has replied to over 700 enquiries from people throughout Aylesbury Vale. Questions such as "Where can we find an NHS dentist?", "Can you give me the address of a self-help group for people with Colitis?", "How long am I likely to wait for my hernia operation?", "I'd like to see a lady doctor, will this be possible?" and countless others have all been answered in an efficient and confidential manner.

The service is a local access point for the Regional Health Information Line, a database which holds both national and region-wide information on hospitals, treatment centres and clinics. There are over 5000 records of local health information, all available at the touch of a button!

While the service is not always able to answer every enquiry immediately, staff try to provide a speedy, confidential and comprehensive service to all clients. Visitors are welcome to take away leaflets and literature relating to their enquiry, and where appropriate, are given contact names and addresses and details of relevant organisations. Reading material on health related matters is available, and more specific information on conditions and diseases can be obtained for clients from a variety of sources.

The address of the Health Information Service is 8 Temple Square, Aylesbury, Bucks HP20 2QH, phone number (0296) 397647 and there is also a fax (0296) 397762. Deaf clients can use the Minicom when the office is open - (Monday to Friday from 9am until 1 pm), and an answerphone is in operation when the service is closed.

Please drop a line, phone, or call in to make use of <u>your Health Information Service</u> which exists to help everyone in Aylesbury Vale with all health related enquiries.

MARSTON GATE

There really was a station - Marston Gate - With early morning gloom if train was late When passengers would huddle round the fire; No morning papers, nothing to inspire The roving eyes, save battered wooden clock Precisely stating time with tick and tock Until the noise was drowned by piercing scream As train arrived with hissing spouting steam.

A sudden rush, no waste of precious time,
The doors flung wide, and high athletic climb
To smoke-filled carriage, dimly dark and grey,
With corner seat, and crumbs of yesterday.
Then eyes would peer, would watch for black-faced
sheep

In distant meadows where, from wakened sleep, They scattered wide as monster hurtled by Disrupting peace, with smoke-disfigured sky.

A rhythmic change, a rushing hustling speed, And silence fell, a strain to watch and heed The banks of weeds, the hedges bristling thick With coloured leaves, ripe blackberries to pick; Then going slow, terminating tossing, Red for danger, nearing Broughton Crossing - Points manoeuvred, sight of Aylesbury town - "We're nearly there - be careful stepping down."



(This line had its very own runaway train in 1849 when a luggage train smashed through the crossing gates at Broughton — with another engine in hot pursuit — went straight across the points at Cheddington onto the main line and was only stopped when it ran out of steam at Leighton. And we think we have problems with the wrong kind of snow.)


