Unofficial notes from the meeting on 2nd November

Planning applications

- 1. Stone faced boundary wall, The Abbey: this is a proposed stretch of wall to act as a noise barrier, and would be inside the existing hedge. The parish council had no objection provided that toads could still get to the moat. 2. Nash's Farm, conversion of two barns into residential and building of eight further dwellings: after much discussion among councillors and comments from members of the public present, the following comments were made. (1) Building materials had not been specified; it was extremely important that materials should complement houses in the conservation (2) Boundary demarcation not specified; recommended that developers plant a continuous hedge of native species, preferably holly or hawthorn. (3) What was the purpose of the access left open to the field behind? Further development in the field behind this site would be unwelcome. (4) Although not grounds for objection, the parish council felt an opportunity had been missed to provide starter homes within reach of local people; all the units, although not spacious, had three bedrooms.
- 3. Dwelling next to Windmill Hill Barns refused on appeal.
- 4. The parish council would write to object to the application to build a microlight training base in the area.

AoB Caroline Lane would attend Cottesloe School Speech Day. Councillors felt the new Weedon sign outside the shop was far too high and the Clerk would send a letter to BCC. Wingrave School had asked if pupils could plant bulbs in Aston following their successful Bring & Buy sale. Councillors were pleased to grant permission and suggested possible locations. The Clerk would find out when BCC were going to mend the pavement outside 69 The Green (wrecked after the Hole in the Road fiasco).





RECTOR'S REPORT

Firstly, my thanks to those who contributed so generously to the Rwanda Appeal. At the time of writing we have raised over #450. But time passes so fast, and Rwanda and its needs have faded from the news bulletins. Their need is still as great as it was three months ago.

Getting help where it is needed on time is actually quite a good theme for a December report. After all we are all about to be caught up in the "25th December deadline". All those things that we feel that we must have completed before the 'big day'. Presents to buy, food to be prepared, cards to be sent, and all the rest of the many things that seem to be 'essential' and without which, Christmas would not seem like Christmas.

Maybe we are less good at preparing ourselves mentally and spiritually for Christmas than we should be. We do need to make time to think about the mystery of the Word made Flesh. The way in which at the right moment God came to Man's aid sending his only. Son to take our nature upon him. And we have to make that preparation against the backdrop of all the Christmas Hype. It isn't easy amid the often false bonhomie to be still and hear the still small voice - to hear the message of the angels amid the clamour of the secular hurly-burly.

One of the ways to prepare for Christmas is to come to the Mysteries in Wingrave Church. It will be on for four evenings - 14th - 17th Dec. and - even if you don't get the message, I am sure that you will have an enjoyable evening. It is quite high on my list of "jobs to do" at the moment - or maybe that should be "words to learn".

Learning the words is much the same as getting the message. And we frequently find it takes a while to sink in. The message from Rwanda was simple - just HELP! And we have responded. The message of Christmas is similarly simple - even though it often wrapped up in the complicated language of St John' Gospel. Jesus is the Christmas present that we all really need.

I hope that you will discover his presence among your presents!



1 PKT TRIFLE SPONGES

6oz MILK

1 11oz CAN MANDARINS

5 fl oz DOUBLE CREAM

- 1 oz MARACHINO OR GLACE CHERRIES
- 1 LG CHOCOLATE FLAKE BAR

PKT GELATINE

1 PKT DESSERT TOPPING MIX

SPLIT SPONGE CAKES IN HALF AND LINE BASE AND SIDES OF 1.5 PINT PUDDING BASIN. DRAIN MANDARINS - RESERVE SYRUP AND 12 SEGMENTS. SPOON 3 TBSP OF SYRUP OVER SPONGES. CUT CHERRIES INTO QUARTERS RESERVING SOME FOR DECORATION. CUT FLAKE INTO 0.5 INCH PIECES. WHIP DESSERT TOPPING AND MILK UNTIL THICKENED. STIR IN MANDARINS, CHERRIES AND FLAKE.

PUT 3 TBSP MANDARIN SYRUP AND GELATINE INTO CUP AND DISSOLVE OVER HEAT. ADD TO OTHER MIXTURE. FOLD GENTLY IN, THEN POUR INTO SPONGE LINED BASIN. PLACE IN FRIDGE UNTIL SET THEN TURN PUDDING ONTO PLATE. WHIP CREAM, COVER PUDDING AND DECORATE WITH RESERVED CHERRIES AND MANDARINS.

FREEZES WELL, PUT IN FREEZER WHEN PUDDING IS SET AND STILL IN BASIN. KEEP FOR 1 MONTH

TO MAKE A LARGER PUDDING LINE A LARGER PUDDING BASIN USING 2 PACKS OF SPONGES. MAKE UP 2 PACKS OF DESSERT TOPPING AND 12 fl oz OF MILK. EVERYTHING ELSE STAYS THE SAME.

LET'S EAT OUT. PART ONE

As someone who commutes regularly between Brussels, Paris and London, I suppose it was only natural that I should be asked to be your Roving Gourmet reporter.

First stop - "The Old Masters Restaurant"

This Gourmet's Paradise is run by Juan and Brigitte Gutierrez. Juan is of course, a chef of international repute and Brigitte is the Brains. On entering the restaurant - once the village school - you will be greeted by Juan; full of Spanish friendliness. The menu is Spanish, English and Continenta Continental cuisine. Tony, the chef, will actually cook you anything you require, given some notice. Fresh fish of all descriptions is always on the menu. Spanish paella is a favourite and crepe suzette.

For starters, Ichose Feuillettes of mushrooms and Artichokes with Hollandsise sauce (£4.75) They were wonderful, just melted in the mouth. I followed this with Fillet of Beef Strips stir-fried with green peppers, ginger and soy sauce (£15.50). The taste was quite unique and cooked to perfection.

My nartner chose Soup of the Day-Leek and Fotato(£2.95). As an expert on soup he said it was "superb". Being a vegetarian, he followed with Crepes filled with ratatouille, served with melted cheese and Provencal sauce - equally superb (£7.95).

Unlike some establishments I could name, lots of fresh vegetables are served with the main course, many grown in the garden.

For pudding we had Tropical Fruit Favlova (£3.10) and Orange Sorbet - delicious.

We washed all this down with the house white wine - a rather nice Spanish dry white wine. There are plenty of wines to choose from on the wine list. Coffee and mints finished off this delightful meal. The service is impeccable, the atmosphere is quiet and friendly; just the place to go to unwind or celebrate.

The Old Masters Restaurant comes highly recommended and I'm awrding it a Gold Star.

A special Xmas menu is on offer throughout December. Five courses at £16.50 (Friday pm £18.50 and Saturday pm £20.50)

Do go and give yourself a treat.







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Christmas on the other side of the world

Growing up in New Zealand Christmas was very different to the Christmas experience in the UK.

For a start the seasons are reversed. Christmas in New Zealand falls in the middle of summer. I used to wake very early on Xmas morning - it was daylight at about 4am and very warm. There was no need to huddle up in the blankets until the central heating came on.

When I was a child I could never understand why all the Christmas cards depicted snow - something which I had never experienced. I think this was because they were based on the traditional northern hemisphere view of Christmas. After all New Zealand has only been settled by Europeans for 150 years and most of them came from the UK.

Christmas dinner used to be based on the English tradition of roast and steamed Christmas pudding. We used to stuff ourselves on all this hot food including chicken, turkey and ham and then go out into the sun to play with our new toys until late, while the adults rested.

These days more people are abandoning the traditional Christmas fare for a BBQ or picnic ,which seems far more sensible in light of the weather. Now the meal consisted of mainly cold food with BBQ'd chicken. We have smoked mutton ham - which is a cheap replacement for the more expensive smoked ham.

One of my favourite Christmas desserts is pavlova. New Zealand used to be called the 'The Quarter Acre Pavlova Paradise'. It is claimed by New Zealanders that the pavlova was invented there and not so long ago most houses were build on a quarter acre of land.

For anyone who wants to try a New Zealand dessert here is the recipe for pavlova.

Fruit Salad Pavlova

4 egg whites
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup castor sugar
4 teaspoons cornflour
2 teaspoons vinegar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup cream
Selected seasonal fruit

Pre pare a baking tray by lining with foils and greasing with melted butter.

Beat the egg whites and salt until soft peaks form when the beater is lifted from the mixture. Add the sugar, a little at a time, beating well after each addition. Continue to beat until the mixture is very stiff. Add cornflour, vinegar and vanilla. Beat thoroughly.

Pile the mixture into a circle about 20 centimetres round, on the prepared baking tray.

bake at 125 degrees C for 1½ hours. Turn oven off, and leave pavlova in the oven with the door closed, until completely cold.

Remove carefully from the foil, and place pavlova on a serving plate. Just before serving, whip cream until stiff. Spread it over the pavlova. Prepare fruit and arrange on cream. Serves 6
