

Then the idea, Valentines Day.....


Its origins are entirely obscure but may have been the medieval legend that birds meet on the 14th February to chose mates for the coming spring. The earliest known "valentines" are poems on this theme for festivals of "joyous recreation and conversation about love" held at the late 14th century courts of England and France.

Interesting customs were the drawing of lots for valentines. In the Scottish Borders slips were drawn three times and returned on the first two occasions. A name drawn three times in succession was regarded as "infallibly that of a future spouse". Another more risky and haphazard custom was to take the first person of the opposite sex (excluding your own family) seen on the 14th February - look out for people with their eyes tightly shut first thing in the morning!

Having "selected" a valentine the custom was to present them with a gift. In past times this would have been jewellery, gloves, or (more daringly) a garter. In the 18th century gifts were replaced by written love letters. Commercially printed valentine cards preceded Christmas cards and were most popular in the 1870/80's. Popularity dwindled and almost died out in the 1920's but since the 2nd world war more naughty and daring cards have come into vogue and also the extensive use of newspaper columns.

Perhaps the Chronicle should reserve space in next February's edition for valentine messages, it would make interesting and speculative reading. The design on the front cover is loosely based around a valentine Parish theme.





SUGGESTED CYCLE PATH FROM WINGRAVE TO AYLESBURY

Shrove Tuesday

Shrove Tuesday is the eve of the Lenten fast and in medieval times and earlier on this day all Christians made the compulsory pre-lent confessions or "shrift" hence Shrove Tuesday. This was their last opportunity to eat the meat, eggs, butter and other luxury foods prohibited during Lent. Thus fried rashers (collies) of meat were the traditional dish on the previous "collop" Monday and on Tuesday all eggs, butter and fat remaining in the house were made into pancakes on "Shrove Tuesday" - hence Pancake Day.

Cooks tip To make pancakes richer add 1 to 2 tablespoons of melted butter to the mixture.

Street ball games were once an essential feature of Shrove Tuesday celebrations (but as far as we know not in Aston Abbotts, however, if you know of something similar please tell us!). but now only survive in a handful of villages. Although commonly referred to as Shrovetide football they still continue to use some form of ball but otherwise are basically a mass free for all played with a minimum of rules by virtually unlimited numbers of participants.

The oldest established game is at Atherstone in Warwickshire and still takes place in the boarded-up main street. It is said to have originated in King John's reign as an inter-county struggle for a bag of gold.

At Ashbourne in Derbyshire the game has a "Royal" prefix because in 1928 it was started by the Prince of Wales. The game is still played today but I doubt if the Prince will be there to throw in the ball!

PRESS RELEASE

"SHOT IN THE ARM FOR LOCAL HEALTH SERVICES"

Following the recent success of a round of public forums held by the local Community Health Council in towns and villages in Aylesbury Vale during the Autumn, five more have been planned to give people an opportunity to learn about local health services and express any views they may have.

In the past, topics raised have included prescription charges, GP fundholding, community care, ambulance services and services for older people.
