RECTOR'S REPORT

Over the last few days I have been trying to think of the way in which I can come to terms with two things that seem to be happening – but so far without success.

More and more people now seem to have and use mobile phones. Personally I quite enjoy being away from the reach of a telephone, but I can see that there may be times when one might be quite useful. I am still linked in to the ordinary, everyday BT network, connected by real wires. Maybe it is the way I have been brought up - but there is the understanding of a tangible link between the two people speaking that I find comforting. It may just be me, but I frequently find it hard to hear what people are saying when they are speaking from a mobile phone. Still, mobile phones we must learn to live with.

For most of my life I have seen television aerials on houses. When I was young many of them seemed to be shaped like an H. Later they became more complex, and now many homes have satellite dishes as well as television and FM aerials. But I read recently that it is hoped that within the next few years every house in the country will have access to cable television. Forget your aerials, we can have better and more sophisticated reception by cable.

Now this seems to me to be rather odd. The telephones are forsaking cable and using aerials (mobile phones use radio waves), whilst the television is forsaking the aerial in favour of cable. It is true that the cable television will use fibre-optic conductors rather than conventional 'wire', and that this will, they assure us, enable many more signals to be transmitted more efficiently.

But what does it mean? So far the only 'meaning' that has come to me is that it is going to become even harder to be alone with ourselves. We shall not have the opportunity to be still with our thoughts because we shall be constantly bombarded with messages. Maybe that is because we find it hard now to cope with silence and stillness. We want to fill every silence with noise. It doesn't matter too much what the noise is, or where it comes from, so long as it stops the silence.

Perhaps during Lent we should switch off the noise and - "Be still and know that I am God".







Recipes

Simnel Cake for Mothering Smday

6 oz butter, 6 oz caster sugar, 3 size 1 eggs, beaten, 6 oz currants, 8 oz sultanas, 2 oz glace cherries, grated rinds of 1 small orange & 1 small lemon, 2 oz chopped candied peel, 8 oz plain flour, 1 level teasp baking powder, 1 level teasp mixed spice, 3 tablesps milk

For topping and filling: 12 oz ground almonds, 12 oz sieved icing sugar, 3 size 1 egg yolks, 2 teasp lemon juice, 1 teasp almond essence, 1 tablesp brandy or sherry, 1 dessertsp apricot jam, small egg beaten

Line and grease one 8 inch cake tin. Cream the butter and then add the sugar and beat until light and fluffy. Add the beaten eggs, a little at a time. Gently fold in the fruit, candied peel and orange and lemon rinds. Sift the flour, baking powder and mixed spice and then carefully fold it into the mixture alternately with the milk. Fold gently - do not beat. Spoon half the cake mixture into the prepared tin. For the Almond paste: Combine 12 oz of ground almonds with 12 oz sieved icing sugar. Mix the three egg yolks with the lemon juice and almond essence. Stir this into the almonds and icing sugar and knead to a stiff paste, add the sherry or brandy. Now take one third of the almond paste, and roll it out to form a round approx 8 inches in diameter. Fit the circle of almond paste over the cake mixture, laying it gently, then spoon the rest of the mixture over it. Level it out, then bake the cake in the centre of the oven for about 21/2-3 hours, gas mark 2 (300F, 150C), or until the centre is firm and springy.

Leave the cake in the tin to cool for 15 minutes, then turn out on to a wire rack to cool. When cool brush top with a little warmed jam. Roll out half the remaining almond paste to fit the top of the cake. Press securely all round. Make twelve little balls of almond paste from the rest (to represent the twelve apostles). Brush the top of the cake with beaten egg, fix the "apostles" all round, pressing them gently and brush them with beaten egg too. Place the cake under a hot grill until the almond paste turns a golden colour.

Mothering Sunday and its Origins

Mothering Sunday, which provides a welcome

time off from Lent, brings together a glorious array of traditions. Its roots lie in ancient Rome, its customs belong to 18th century Britain and its commercial success it due largely to the American armed forces.

The Romans honoured their goddess of motherhood in Spring with the feast of Matronalia. Cakes made of special extra-fine flour known as simila were baked and offered to her. When the Church became established in Britain Christians incorporated these customs, but instead of celebrating Matronalia they honoured Mother Church.

It is unclear when the honouring of Mother

It is unclear when the honouring of Mother Church was extended to include thanksgiving for our own mothers. During the 18th and 19th centuries Mothering Sunday was a day when domestic servants were given time off to visit their own homes and mothers. They would often take special presents including a Simnel cake. The Simnel cake may own it name to the white floured cakes offered at Matronalia.

Mother's Day arrived in England when the American armed forces were based here during World War II. They brought with them their May customs of honouring their mothers with gifts of cards, flowers and sweets. Today Mothering Sunday and Mother's Day are celebrated on the fourth Sunday of Lent. Mothering Sunday is also sometimes called Refreshment Sunday, or Laetare Sunday, traditionally a day when the fasting rules of Lent are relaxed.

Throughout history Mothering Sunday has been a remarkably adaptable festival. Its themes of mothering, caring and giving thanks are universal. Today some churches concentrate on the concept of 'mothering' and instead of focusing only on Mother Church and our own mothers, emphasise the 'mothering' everyone does at home or in the community.

This Mothering Sunday why not go to Church as a family? Perhaps visit the Church where your parents were married or where the children were baptised. (Skilled Friendly Service)





Activity 2

First fill the 3 pt jug. Next pour the 3 pints from this jug into the 5 pt jug. Again fill the 3 pt jug and then pour from it into the partially filled 5 pt jug until it is full. This leaves exactly 1 pint in the 3 pt jug.

It would thus be possible to measure any whole number of pints by measuring single pints in this way. Clearly there are more efficient ways for measuring most quantities. 5 pints and 3 pints can be measured directly and as 6 = 3 + 3 while 8 =5 + 3, 6 pints and 8 pints are easily measured. But what about 7 pints and 4 pints?

Unofficial notes from the parish council meeting on 3rd February.

Goodbye Margaret! who has resigned as Clerk. She was thanked for her five+ years' hard work for the village.

<u>Matters arising</u>: Bucks County Council offered to lower the new sign opposite the shop to 2m (i.e. not much but better than nothing).

Long discussion about poor state of roads (mud, potholes) and verges in the village (PC Griggs and County Cllr Jennings also present and contributed to discussion). Agreed to ask a rep from BCC to visit with Cllr Jennings and Caroline and see what could be done about maintenance. Parish Council heard about steps taken by contractors at Oxley's Farm to clean road regularly and concluded little more to be done. Clerk would write to owner of land off Wingrave Road where turf cutting is contributing to mud problem.

PC Griggs reported that there had been few problems in the village recently but encouraged residents to report anything suspicious.

<u>Planning applications</u>: Wall at the Abbey granted by AVDC subject to keeping the hedge and putting in pipes for toads.

No comment from PC on rebuilding of stable block at Lower Burston Farm, together with alteration to internal staircase and addition of two dormer windows.

No comment from PC on single-storey extension at 1 New Zealand Cottages.

PC concerned about application to store six earthmoving vehicles at farm buildings on Wingrave Road - requested info about number of likely movements, particularly through village

The Parish Council had applied for permission to prune two trees on the Green (those obscuring the white light).

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on Friday 17 March at 7.30p.m.




