

CABARET REVIEW - 1995

Tremendous fun, clever and above all crazy. Yes! Once again, the Cabaret was extremely entertaining, good value and the place to be on a Saturday night (one hesitates to give a bad review on these occasions in case any of 'the stars' decide to emulate Stephen Fry). All the more remarkable really considering only some eighteen hours earlier most of the cast were 'whooping it up' in the Bull until the small hours drinking green beer (yes, that really was it's colour) and generally helping Frank to celebrate his Patron Saint's day. Perhaps it was this over indulgence which caused the odd words to be forgotten and a wrong tape to be played, subsequently causing considerable domestic distress!!!!???.

The scene for the Cabaret was nicely set by the audience being invited to 'dress posh'. Such is the reputation and standing of the Cabaret that a significant number of the men wore dinner jackets and black tie whilst all the ladies present had clearly 'dressed up to the nines'. In addition, the tables had been nicely laid and decorated, all of which contributed to the creation of a very warm and friendly atmosphere. A very tasty hot meal was provided by the ladies. It always surprises me how they are able to cater for so many with the fairly basic and cramped conditions in the hall. Anyway, we were treated to a very spicy Mexican dish served with salad and French bread. There was plenty for all and this was followed by meringue filled with fruit and 'oozing' cream (quite wicked!).

Following some 'high pressure' salesmanship by Gorden (who incidently made an excellent compare for the evening) there was a thunderous 'popping of corks' and the show got off to what I thought was a cracking start. A very suave John Branker announced 'The 'Pubic-airs' in a 1930's radio style (I think he had meant to say Squadronairs) and they (John Branker, Gorden Smith and Bridget Brandon) sung a very polished version of Glen Miller's Moonlight Serenade. In some ways it's a pity that the rest of the show didn't follow this 30,s theme more closely since it fitted in so well with the 'cabaret' atmosphere which had been so well created within the hall. Non-the -less, the remainder of the entertainment was to a high standard and included two old favourites, 'The Bristols' (Anne and Bridget) and those two characters 'Rodney and Bernard', alias Gorden and Chris Brandon who enacted a very cleverly written and produced sketch. Bridget sung 'The Rose' with considerable poignancy and feeling; a great performance which was enjoyed by all. She sung so beautifully that it was difficult to believe it was the same person who appeared later as the 'revolting' though hilarious 'Waynetta' and who, in conjunction with John Whyte as 'Wayne' gave us a very funny sketch. of several good humorous sketches, one of which included Chris as a convincing 'Mystic Meg' who preceded to reveal the secrets of some of our village characters (some of whom were present). Then of course there were those two (or did I see three?) gnomes (Anne and John Branker) who 'spilled the beans' on their neighbour's sexual habits and peccadilloes. They were so convincing that the following morning I relegated our gnomes to a stout box which is now securely locked away in the garage.

Much of the music was arranged and accompanied by 'Chesh' on his now quite famous 'Wurlitzer' and as usual, all the musical numbers were well written and performed. They included renditions by John Whyte, John Branker and Chris did 'Something stupid' (it's the title of the song!) the choruses of which were directed towards a very embarrassed and 'giggly' (as a newt) Rita. The most refreshing musical act for me though was Jon Chesher who played two guitar pieces; 'Country party' and 'Impressions'. The audience's rapt expressions and total silence whist Jon was playing, not to mention appreciative applause, demonstrated just how well he was received.

The final act was the appearance of a rather improbable 'Garry Glitter' played by John Whyte. The music and his mime were very exciting and kept the audience clapping and stomping in time with some of 'Garry's' most popular numbers. The overall 'delirium' was greatly influenced by his excellent home made costume as well as the hastily improvised 'laser' lighting courtesy of what appeared to be a front lamp from the Vicar's bicycle. In my opinion, it is a great pity that the show finished abruptly at this point since I felt the audience, who had clearly enjoyed themselves, would have liked to have shown their appreciation during a 'Grand Finale' or similar. Still, at least we all had time for a pint at Frank's.

VE-DAY CELEBRATIONS

Wingrave's plans to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of Victory in Europe are now well-advanced, with an ambitious weekend of events taking shape. There will be a Grand Parade with the Recreation Ground as its destination. This will be led by the Royal British Legion and joined by the Ambassador to Britain of the Czech Republic. Other planned events include a 3-day Flower Festival at the Parish Church and a concert at the Community Centre, with contributions from the local school, the Drama Group and the Wingrave Singers.

The organisers of Wingrave's VE-Day Celebrations would greatly wlecome the participation of people from Aston Abbotts in the events being planned. Indeed, the Czech Embassy in London, which is involved in the preparations, has made a particular plea that we should be represented. If you have any ideas about how we could contribute (e.g. by entering an Aston Abbotts float in the Grand Parade), or simply want to offer help, Please contact Robert Lee in the first instance on 681558. But remember, time is short!

Unofficial notes from the parish council meeting on 17 March.

Robert Lee, our new Clerk, was welcomed.

Matters arising The Chairman would ask AVDC's recycling officer to visit the village to discuss possible sites for recycling bins. Councillors were not in favour of the Royal Oak because of dangerous corner, but would welcome advice about possible sites at Bricstock. (If this looks possible, residents will be consulted.)

Continuing concern about state of village roads. County engineer Mr Headon had visited with Brenda Jennings (county councillor) and our Chairman and had agreed to a small number of repairs/maintenance, but most could not be done due to lack of finance. Ask if you want more details.

A quote for mowing the Rec was accepted at £18 per cut (about 16 cuts during the season).

Planning applications The PC could go ahead with pruning two trees on the Green (to clear light and wires) after 23 March. (Work may not actually be done until the end of the summer. These trees are in the conservation area, which is why we had to wait for planning permission.)

PC had no comment on plans for extension at Beulah, Wingrave Road; this will be decided by AVDC

AVDC granted permission for conversion of farm buildings at Norduck Farm subject to residency restrictions (i.e. farm workers only).

Alterations at Lower Burston Farm agreed by AVDC. The application for Nash's Farm would not be granted permission until legal matters relating to donation of a strip of land next to the Rec. were arranged (probably 6 months).

Accounts The VAT refund had been received; electricity, £43; National Association of Local Councils sub, £38; grant to Parochial Church Council £60; Church Room rent, £25; outgoing Clerk's salary and expenses, £370; donation to British Legion £15 (in recognition of VE Weekend).

General Decided to enter Best Kept Village competition again (fee £5, first judging in June). The Waste Local Plan for Bucks would be circulated among councillors for comments. Minutes of the first police/parish councils liaison meeting received (next meeting August) - ask if you want to see them. Although PC happy to put a plaque on the seat on the Green saying given by Betty Bennett, some doubt about whether she wanted this. Chairman would clarify.

New litter bin for Green? Wooden litter bins cost between £130 and £200, which seems a lot. We'll see if we can have a new wooden frame made for existing liner.

Estimate for new sign for gate on play area, £15.50, accepted.

Next skip due at Wingrave Road, weekend of 17 June. Chairman would contact PC Griggs following complaints about chaos in recent diversion of traffic through village.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING The Church Room, Aston Abbotts, Friday 17 March 1995

(the following are draft minutes; please report any errors to Gordon Smith - 681373)

PRESENT Chairman of the Parish Council (Caroline Lane), Clerk to the Annual Parish Meeting (Gordon Smith), 12 members of the Parish, the Rev. Bob Willmott, Brenda Jennings (County Councillor) and Bryan Round (District Councillor). Apologies received from Michael & Hilary Hasler and Clifford Price.

MINUTE 1 The minutes of the previous meeting were read, approved by the Meeting, and signed by the Chairman.

MINUTE 2 Matters arising - none.

MINUTE 3 Village fete 1994

Gordon Smith reported that the fete had been a success. Net proceeds for the day totalled 1,307.93, which had been divided as follows: St James's Church £392.48; Church Room £261.59; Methodist Church £261.59; Recreation Ground £196.19; Chronicle £130.79; Toddlers Group £65.39.

MINUTE 4 Village fete 1995

The Village festival would take place over the weekend of 22/23 July, with the fete to take place on Saturday 22 July. It was agreed that, due to the closure of the Methodist Church, the distribution of funds for 1995 would be amended as follows: St James's Church 35%; Church Room 25%; Recreation Ground 20%; Chronicle 15%; Toddlers 5%.

Gordon Smith expressed concern about the lack of people willing to serve on the Fete Committee. Although a number of people had generously volunteered to help on the day, only David Watts, Treasurer to the 1994 Committee, had indicated a willingness to stand again. At the meeting, Miss Lynne Clark volunteered to stand. [Subsequently, Christopher Fox has agreed to stand.] It was felt that there was an urgent need for more Committee members, and for a Chairman for the Committee, if the Fete were to go ahead. It was agreed to publicize the difficulty in The Chronicle.

David Watts had submitted a report to the effect that over £200 existed in a reserve fund to pay for initial expenses.

Gordon Smith reported that after consultation with Shirley Ford, The Great Horwood Silver Band had been booked for the Fete.

MINUTE 5 Church Room Management Committee.

The Rev. Bob Willmott reported that work needed to be done to the Church Room, notably some outside painting and some guttering repairs.

The Rector further commented on the question of an extension. An adviser from Bucks CVS had visited and had commented that unless some changes were made, at some stage the Room would become unlettable. In discussion it was made clear that the changes referred to would be necessary in order to meet Environment and Health regulations. The Rector said that the next stage was to have an architect draw up plans, which would cost about £500. The Rector queried whether it was a good idea

to spend the £500, given that if plans were to be approved, it was likely that actually doing the work would cost in the region of £15,000 - a very large amount for the village to raise. It was suggested that the Church Room Management Committee consider the idea of a Public Meeting to discuss the issue, and find out what support there would be in the village for fundraising, and helping to manage the work.

In the interim, it was felt that gessential painting and guttering work should go ahead, although the Rector reported that he was having difficulty securing tradesmen's quotes.

The Committee now consisted of Jean Barnett, Ruth Bellingham, Chris Brandon, Margaret Chesher, Colin Higgs, John Ford, John Whyte, Doris Scutchings and the Rev Willmott.

MINUTE 6 Recreation Ground
Caroline Lane reported that a dog mess bin had been installed, and that the children's play area had been expanded in order to meet safety regulations. More improvements had been discussed for the play area, but more money was required before they could be implemented, particularly if the area were to meet BSI standards, and thus qualify for grant support.

If the development of Nash's Farm were to proceed, there would be a requirement that the developers provide open space, and the possibility of a strip of land, 20 feet wide and running the length of the Recreation Ground was under discussion.

The Recreation Ground Committee was a Subcommittee of the Parish Council, currently consisting of Vic Scott, Roger Biddle and John Ford for the Council, and Bridget Brandon, Chris Brandon, John Whyte, Lawrence Hinds and Margaret Kent. It was, however, an 'open' committee and anyone wishing to contribute ideas or time would be welcomed with open arms. MINUTE 7 Chronicle

Caroline & Gordon had ceased to edit every issue from July 1994. Each month's issue was now looked after by a different editor, and this had produced interesting and varied issues. It was still hoped that it would be possible to find a permanent editor. Current funds were low. In the absence of the treasurer, a summary of finances would be published in The Chronicle.

MINUTE 8 VE day

Caroline Lane reported that a meeting to discuss possible commemoration of VE day had been poorly attended. The opinion was voiced that August rather than May would be a more appropriate date for any commemoration. Also, that celebration was inappropriate, and that a Church Memorial Service and possibly a Parish Council donation to the British Legion would be more fitting.

MINUTE 9 AOB - none

The meeting closed at 8.13 p.m.

VILLAGE FETE 1995

Last year's fete was both extremely enjoyable and a good financial success. The fete is very important to the village, both in money terms and in creating the one day in the year when all different groups can come together. Sadly, we are this year very short of people willing to serve on the Fete Committee. A number of those who worked for the Fete last year (including me) cannot help this year. We have three volunteers for the Committee now, but I think another three are needed and if I understand correctly, we really need someone willing to pick up the Chairman's reins.

There is no shortage of volunteers willing to help on the day, and I do not think anyone need be worried that they would be left unsupported.

If anyone would be interested, please let me know, and I would be happy to try to explain what's involved and to put you in touch with the other Committee members.

RECTOR'S REPORT

I was watching the television news on St Patrick's Day. There was an item about Sinn Fein leader, Gerry Adams being feted in America. The report said that the Americans celebrate St. Patrick's Day even more than the Irish do. A few moments later, it was the Five Nations Cup to be played between England and Scotland.

That set me thinking about National Celebrations, and I felt that we English are a rather reserved lot.

Let's hear it for St. George!

And if we hear it for St. George, let us not be too proud to fly our own flag - St. George's Cross - rather than the Union Flag. I suppose as the English Flag seems to have been supplanted by the Union Flag, sooner or later that too will give way to the European Flag.

The Irish are proud to fly their flag and of their distinctness (even if they are split between Protestant and Catholic, North and South). I think that we should fight to preserve our own culture. To remind people who have come here through choice that they should respect our ways. We are English and we should have a pride in our National History and acheivements.



Anything that is built now has to comply with the latest regulations, and it may be wise to attempt to improve all our facilities in one go.

An Advisor from Bucks Council for Voluntary Services suggested that the task will have to be put in hand sooner or later - or we shall be no longer able to use the building. She thought the way forward was to engage an Architect to draw up plans and take the project through to the Planning Permission stage. The thought at the moment is to build an extension housing a storage area, two toilets and an entrance vestibule at the end where the existing toilet is. We hope to incorporate a covered porch, and will also upgrade the kitchen and move the existing door to meet Fire Regulations.

We are hoping shortly to call a Public Meeting, before we spend money on an Architect, to ensure that the Project, part of which we hope will be Grant-funded, does have the full support of the Village.



WINGRAVE C.E. COMBINED SCHOOL

THE BUDGET FOR 1995/96

Parents of children at Wingrave School will be aware of the problems being faced by all local schools due to the savings that Bucks County Councils Education Committee are having to make for the next financial year which begins on April 1st 1995.

These savings mean that budgets for the whole education service, including individual schools such as Wingrave, have been reduced by 3.3%. I thought that parents and other villagers might be interested in knowing how their local school was trying to cope under these difficult circumstances.

The Governors of Wingrave School have met and looked at all aspects of the school's expenditure to see if there were any areas where savings could be made. Expenditure on educational equipment, school maintenance, energy etc is minimal and no further savings could be made in these areas. Staffing costs account for over 80% of the school budget and we were faced with the fact that the only way to be able to set a budget for 1995/96 would be to make a teacher redundant. Preliminary negotiations took place with this end in view.

To reduce the present level of teaching staff from 7 to 6 would be very damaging to the school. At present most children are taught in year groups but a reduction in teaching staff would result in larger classes and mixed year groups throughout the school.

This was a situation which I and the Governors of the school were desperate to avoid and so I devoted a considerable amount of my time to trying to find a solution to the problem. After contacting numerous charitable trusts and explaining to them the dire financial situation that was being faced by a successful school an unexpected turn of events altered the situation, albeit temporarily. Two additional sources of income have materialised which will enable Wingrave School to retain its 7 teaching staff for the coming academic year.

The first source of money is a "one-off" £15,000 gift made to the school by Dame Kathleen Raven from the estate of her late brother John Mason Raven. John Mason Raven used to be a governor of Wingrave School many years ago and Dame Kathleen has remained a friend of the school ever since. This, I think you will agree, was an astonishingly generous donation.

The second source of income is £6,000 raised by the School Association during 1994/95 and which, instead of being used to buy "extras" for the school, will go straight into the budget to enable us to retain our teaching staff. £6,000 is a tremendous sum to be raised by the School Association within such a short space of time and from a relatively small body of parents. Governors and staff are most grateful for their efforts.

May I conclude by saying that I regard Wingrave as being a "good school" both in terms of the academic results achieved and the behaviour and character of the children who emerge. The strength of a school lies largely in the quality of its staff and, thanks to the generosity of Dame Kathleen Raven and the tireless work of the School Association, we will be able to retain our current level of teachers for a further year. Beyond that? We shall see.

REVIEW OF SHEERLUCK HOLMES

Chinese 1st and 2nd played by Jenny Graham and Adigail Hutchinson were an astounding pair. They acted well and brought the audience into the play. Their voices were funny and convincing.

Sui Lin played by Hazel Goodson was true to her role. The solo she sung was extremely well projected and all the notes were perfectly in tune. She was also a great actor.

Greasy Pierre. the butler played by Ross Robinson gave the right sly, funny impression. He had also perfected an Italian accent.

All the acting was of an exceptional standard even though there were some absences among the cast. The play included several songs the music was good but some of the singing was not as good as Sui Lin's. The piano accompaniment was provided by the Head of Music Jack Rennie from Aston Abbotts.

The changing of scenes was very slick and quickly done so there were no boring gaps. All the props and special effects were excellent. The costumes were true to the time and didn't look out of place. One of the few criticisms was the pirates' swords were a bit too modern being of coloured plastic.

The play was outstanding and I enjoyed it greatly and it was worth the trip.

Finally, you might like to know that eight representatives from La Bouexiere will be here for the 50th Anniversary of VE Day. It seemed fitting that they should join us to celebrate peace in Europe.






