According to 'Encarta' Saint

Valentine's Day is a 'holiday' honouring lovers.

We celebrate it on February 14th by the custom of sending greeting cards or gifts to express affection. (Just my way of providing a hint to those who might have forgotten). The holiday probably derives from the ancient Roman feast of Lupercalis (February 15). The festival gradually became associated with the feast day (February 14) of two Roman martyrs, both named St.

Valentine, who lived in the 3rd century. St.

Valentine has traditionally been regarded as the patron saint of lovers. (So now you know)

One rather less romantic friend of mine always associates the date with, Al Capone (1899-1947), the Italian-American gangster. He was born Alphonse Capone in Naples, Italy, and raised in Brooklyn, New York. In the 1920s he took over a Chicago organisation dealing in illegal liquor, gambling, and prostitution from the gangster Johnny Torrio. In the following years he eliminated his competitors in a series of gang wars, culminating in the Saint Valentine's Day massacre of 1929, that won him control of Chicago's underworld. (Well my informant does drive a large yellow mobster's car!!!)

On a more interesting tack, Shirley Ford has loaned me a vast amount of documentation resulting from her research into the history of Aston Abbotts. As a first step Anne Branker has filed the information in chronological order with a view to helping me to 'serialise' it in the Chronicle. However, having just borrowed a book on the history of Bierton produced by the villagers, I feel there is scope to create a similar permanent record of 'Aston's' history.

The purpose of mentioning this in this editorial is to see if there is any one out there who might have other information and in particular pictures we might borrow to help bring the text to life. Finally, do we have anyone in the village who has experience in 'historic research and compilation of information? If so we would welcome advice on how best to go about this project.

And finally!! Many thanks to all of you who provided items for this months Chronicle on 'disc'. They have been a tremendous help in that they reduced the amount of time I have to spend in typing and therefore more effort can go into the presentation etc. Just got to persuade the vicar to replace his 'stone age P/C with one which will take 3-1/2 discs and my index finger can grow back to it's full length!!



RECTOR'S REPORT

I find it very worrying that almost half of

those aged between fifteen and thirty five have difficulty with knowing the difference between right and wrong. Much is blamed on the permissiveness of the society in which we now live, and suggestions have been made that more emphasis should be placed on the Ten Commandments. I did think that perhaps this month my report should be simply the Ten Commandments.

- 1. Thou shalt have none other Gods but me.
- 2. Thou shalt not make to thyself any graven image.
- 3. Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain.
- 4. Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day.
- 5. Honour thy father and mother.
 - 6. Thou shalt do no murder.
- 7. Thou shalt not commit adultery.
 - 8. Thou shalt not steal.
- 9. Thou shalt not bear false witness.
 - 10. Thou shalt not covet.

But I am not sure many of those who urge a return to those commandments have really thought about what that means. As I was typing the first commandment, I wondered about the capital letters: should

'gods' have a capital G. But there is only one God with a capital G. and that is not the god that is ME. Big G is the God worshipped exclusively by the Christian Church and by the Jewish community. ME seems to be the god worshipped by almost everyone these days - because I know best!

If we know best then we have no need for God's guidance, and all the Commandments need to have "unless I decide otherwise" added to them. We can justify anger and jealousy and hate. Nothing need be wrong - if that is what we decide. It seems as though that is where our society has failed. We have allowed our conscience to be our guide - and then overruled our conscience so many times that we no longer know the difference between right and wrong.

Perhaps the only solution is to bring back the big G. Until we recognise as humans we are not capable of living good lives by ourselves, that we need help and guidance, we shall get nowhere. Morality on it's own will not make things better. We need to have God with us too. The God with us who is Immanuel - the baby born in Bethlehem. The Crucified, Risen and Ascended God who said "Lo I am with you always - even to the end of the Age".

A TRAVELLERS TALE

On a recent Friday night having arrived back at Heathrow at 5.30 pm, and for a change the M25 working as intended, I found myself 2 hours later with my fellow geriatrics Tony Hinds and John Whyte, pumping iron I believe the expression is, in the reflex gym in Waddeson.

I have to confess that evening I was feeling below par, a point not missed by our instructor, Leo, to whom clearly I was giving concern by my rather distressed state on the rowing machine.

John Whyte being his normal self, explained that I was just getting old, but, Tony being of a more charitable disposition, explained that I had just returned from Munich 2 hours previously and therefore allowances should be made.

Inevitably the conversation got around to what one did for a living, and when one has travelled, and indeed worked in countries all over the world from Japan to Egypt, the United States, France and Germany to name but a few, travelling holds very little glamour. The conversation with Leo provoked some reminiscences of 27 years of travelling with a recent life style of one of commuting to Munich and back on a weekly basis.

This has provoked one or two observations, and indeed a reflection on how air travel has changed.

The first point to be made is that travelling is most certainly not glamorous. Anybody who has to get up at 4 o'clock on a January morning to catch the 7.20 to Munich will have some sympathy with my views. And given that most of the continental travel is during the week of the business fraternity, who else could afford the exorbitant rates for airline tickets. I feel a few observations on my fellow travellers and indeed the airlines would not be amiss.

In the war of hearts and lions, I think it used to be called advertising, Virgin Atlantic and British Airways changed all that, they offer the business traveller bigger and better seats, executive lounges, for the Gold Card carriers, is there any other colour! but the basic format of air travel of 20 years ago when I started, has not changed. The basic theory is simple. You are crammed into an aluminium tube, I now know how a cigar feels, strapped in and then as a result of some complex mathematical formula and brute force over weight over energy you are airborne. But it has to be said despite the fancy menu cards and designer presentation of the food, the term loosely used of course, you are still eating something that has been super-chilled for god knows how many hours or super steamed, the only thing that distinguishes the potatoes from the meat is the colour.

Despite my many years of travel and countless hundreds of flights, I have been able to contain what used to be "terror" with now studied indifference, and if you believe that you believe anything. The cabin stewards, actually they are now called "Flight Directors", encourage you to take note of the safety drill and only a fool wouldn't, CA Regulations state that an aircraft should be vacated in an emergency in 90 seconds. Can't be done!

The he next time you travel have a look at the Safety Card. Written in a multitude of languages and pictures, they take you through the brace position, life jacket drill, and ditching at sea procedure. But somebody in the airlines must have a warped sense of humour, if you look at the pictures you will notice the faces of those depicting the drill smiling. Somebody has a very sick sense of humour.

With the introduction of the blind landing systems, the old adage of travelling in December, January and February, add a day, usually because airports would be shut, is relatively a thing of the past and British Airways have been pioneers in this technology. But to show how fragile the infrastructure of an airport actually is, on a recent weekend this month



You stand in line for the tepid cup of coffee at 1.20 and are grateful to get it. Not to worry you think once you get into Business Class they will take care of us. And so you board the aircraft, some 3 hours later than departure is anticipated, to be told that to be able to get as many passengers away as possible Business and First Class has been suspended and its coffee and peanuts service all the way,

and one newspaper between two.

phoning our order before hand.




The ever popular Cabaret will be held towards the end of April; final date to be announced.

PARISH COUNCIL

Unofficial notes of the meeting held on Friday 12 January 1996

The meeting was attended by County Councillor Brenda Jennings and District Councillor Bryan Round.

Matters arising:

Land fill site Wingrave Road: There had been complaints from various residents regarding the state of Wingrave Road and the verges.

C/Cllr Jennings said she would speak to Bucks

CC to arrange a site meeting with a Highways representative and to ask about a wheel cleaner for the site. C/Cllr Jennings would also raise the question of who would be responsible for the damage to the road surface, grass verges and footpath.

Licensing of Public Entertainment - Bull and Butcher: The License would be considered on 12 February 1996 by AVDC.

County and District Council matters:

C/Cllr Jennings reported that traffic calming measures were being introduced into the County. A booklet was available from Bucks CC. The Kill Your Speed signs were effective. Bucks CC was concerned about the cuts in expenditure needed due to the reorganisation of the County. C/Cllr Jennings assured the Cllrs that they were doing their best to ensure good services for Bucks. D/Cllr Round reported that AVDC was committed to becoming a three tier working County i.e. County, AVDC and Parishes. This was to ensure that the views of Parish Councils were taken seriously.

Parish Precept:

It was agreed to set the precept at £3500 for the year Apr 1996/7.

Changes to Village Conservation Area:

Cllr Kempster suggested some amendments to the Conservation Area. Possible inclusion of Abbey Cottages, Windmill Hill Farm and Nash's Farm. It was suggested that a site meeting take place with an AVDC representative to consider these changes.

Dustbins: Cllr Kempster stated that she thought that the bin liners were of a smaller size than previously. D/Cllr Round said he would look into this.



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GOAN COCONUT PANCAKES

INGREDIENTS



Pancakes

4oz plain flour A pinch of salt 4oz chopped unsalted cashews 1 large egg and 1 egg yolk 1/4 teaspoon ground cardamon 10 fl oz milk I tablespoon melted butter 3-4 tablespoons oil

Filling

60z grated fresh coconut 8 tablespoons muscovade sugar 1/4 teaspoon ground cardamom 2 tablespoons sultanas 1 juicy lemon

Here is a recipe for you to try which is a different way to have your pancakes on 20th February, Shrove Tuesday.

Having just returned from a fabulous holiday in Goa, I thought you might like to try the only pudding on offer in any of the bars or restaurants, pancakes! Yes! you could have pancakes filled with coconut or bananas or pineapple or honey or even the old favourite way with lemon and sugar but only pancakes nothing else. They were always freshly made, very light and quite simple, which after the spicy and fiery curries that we usually had as a main courses, came as a lovely way to finish a meal. So I hope you enjoy this recipe for Goan Coconut Pancakes as much as we did, when eating them on the beach while on holiday in India.

Start by chopping and roasting the cashews until golden brown. Then as freshly grated coconut is a problem in this country, you can use desiccated coconut preferably the un sweetened kind soaked in 1/2 pint of hot water until it puffs up and is juicy and tender. Then weigh the correct amount of coconut and use in the same way as fresh coconut. Next beat together, all but the oil, of the pancake ingredients either by hand or with an electric blender, until you have a very smooth batter. Set aside for at least 30 minutes. Now in a bowl combine all the dry ingredients for the filling and put that to one side.

Now make your pancakes, heat a little of your oil in a frying pan set over a medium heat. When hot pour in 4-5 tablespoons of the batter, tilting the pan so that the batter is evenly and thinly spread out. Cook the pancake for a few minutes and when it starts to go brown, toss it over (if you are very brave) or if you are like me then very carefully turn it over with a spatula and cook for another minute.

Remove and put on to plate. Then make the second pancake in the same way, while the next one is cooking, put 2-3 tablespoons of the filling onto the first pancake and a squeeze lemon juice over it then roll up and place in a covered dish. Make all the pancakes in this way, keeping them in a single layer. When you have finished making your pancakes place them in a warm oven to heat through before serving. Finishing off with a generous squeeze of lemon over each pancake.






