
Tony's Sports Column





PASTIERA DI GRANO

(Neapolitan Easter Wheat Tart)

In Naples Easter wouldn't be Easter without this tart. My mother used to make a version of this tart using small pieces of pasta instead of wheat, as she couldn't find the right kind of wheat to use. I have made this tart in the past when I have been able to buy tinned wheat, which can be found in Italian delicatessens and is made by Chirico. I have also tried it, using pasta boiled in milk and it turned out very like the one my mother used to make. This recipe though, is for the real thing which is just wonderful and would certainly be something different to try for Easter.

The grain should have been soaked for 24 hours in several changes of water and needs to be cooked the day before the tart is made. Simmer the grain in the milk for 3 hours on a very

low heat or if using pasta, until the pasta is cooked. When it is cooked, add the cinnamon, vanilla sugar and the orange zest. Leave to cool.

Make the pastry by working together the butter, sugar and egg yolks until smooth, then add the flour to make the pastry. Put aside in the fridge for at least an hour, which makes the pastry easier to handle.

To make the filling, beat the ricotta cheese with the egg yolks and orange water. add

the candied peel and the flavoured grain or pasta to the ricotta mixture. Beat the egg whites with the sugar and fold into the ricotta very gently to keep in as much air as

INGREDIENTS

For the Pastry:

5oz plain flour 1/2 oz castor sugar 2 1/2 oz butter 2 egg yolks.

For the filling:

4oz whole wheat to be soaked or 7 oz can of wheat called Gran Pastiera
1/2 pint Milk if using whole wheat or small pasta
zest of half an orange
1/2 tsp cinnamon
1 tsp vanilla sugar
5oz ricotta cheese
4oz castor sugar
2 large eggs (separated)
1/2 glass orange water
2 oz candied peel finely chopped icing sugar for dusting.

possible. Next press about two-thirds of the pastry into a buttered 8 or 9 inch flan tin, covering the bottom and sides with an equal thickness. Pour in the filling, then roll out the remaining pastry and cut long strips to form a lattice top to the tart. Cook in a medium hot oven for about 40 minutes.

Allow to cool then dust with icing sugar before serving. This tart is very rich and sweet but absolutely delicious especially when served slightly warm, with cool single cream and a cold glass of dessert wine.

PARISH COUNCIL

(Unofficial notes of the meeting held on Friday 23 February 1996)

The meeting was attended by District Councillor Bryan Round.

(1) Matters arising:

Light on the Green/Bricstock: It had been decided not to provide a footway light leading to the bungalows in Bricstock in 1992 due to the cost. It was agreed that it would be unfair to proceed with a footway light on the Green before again considering one for Bricstock. D/Cllr Round said he would repeat the request of 1992 to AVDC for funding to help with the cost of a light in Bricstock.

Landfill site: Cllr Lane, C/Cllr Jennings and Mr Higgs met with Mr Wicks from Bucks County Council to look at specific problems caused by the site. Work would continue daily to keep the road clean and any particular complaints should be referred to Cllr Lane or the Clerk. The contractor had agreed to tidy up the verges and re-seed when work was complete. Bucks County Council hopefully would agree to ensure the roads and kerbs were made good. It was hoped work would be completed by the end of June.

(2) County and District Council matters:

D/Cllr Round reported:

- (1) Rubbish bin liners had not reduced in size, but a "universal" sack was being introduced.
- (2) Licensing of Public Entertainment: The Bull and Butcher, renewal of this license had been approved for 3 months with the following conditions. Only one function to be held each month. Seven days notice must be given to AVDC before the date of each function.

- **(3)** <u>Police Liaison meeting</u> 8 February 1996: Cllr Manning reported:
- (a) The National trend for crime was on the decrease. Aston Abbotts suffered from petty car crime and very little else.
- (b) A new way to deal with offenders was to place them in front of their victim and ask them to explain their actions. Apparently this was successful with young offenders.
- (c) A police helicopter was now available in the area to help beat crime.
- (d) The misuse of drugs amongst young people was discussed. A booklet with information would be published in the Chronicle as soon as possible.

(4) <u>Recreation Ground Committee meeting</u> 15 January 1996.

- (a) There was a discussion on whether or not to go ahead with a Sports Surface.
- (b) It was decided that nettles in the Rec would be Sprayed.
- (c) Lawrence Hinds volunteered to mow the play area.
- (d) A skip was to be hired once the ground was harder to have a clear up.

(5) Correspondence:

Best Kept Village Competition - It was agreed to enter this competition.

Rural Transport- It was pointed out that it was important for everyone to use public transport as there was the likelihood of services being reduced.

(6) Date of next meeting:

The Annual Parish Meeting would be held on 29 March 1996, at 7.30pm

Thanks; Before the meeting closed, Cllr Round thanked those responsible for the excellent work they did in the Village keeping the roads clear during the bad weather. Everyone welcome to attend.





RECTOR'S REPORT

I am not sure now exactly when it happened, but my recollection is that at about the end of March last year the old apple tree in the Rectory garden fell down. It was one of those events that I knew was going to happen. It had dropped a large branch about eighteen months earlier, and the trunk, which was hollow had already split.

As usual, events like this happen at a time when I am too busy to do anything about them, and the tree still lies where it fell. It had still had a few apples, but they were way out of reach. And even though it fell, it did not disappoint us last year.

One reason that I had not done anything to it before was that it had for many years been the support of a huge rambling rose. I think I know which of my predecessors had planted it, and I have been told that the rose is called "Rambling Rector" - which seems fairly appropriate. This produces a tremendous show in early summer - so trying to do anything before this winter was clearly out of the question.

The problem was how on earth to disentangle the two and to provide a new support for the rambling rector. The most promising solution seemed to be an arch or pergola which would become an alternative to the apple tree. This is now in place with one corner as near as I could get it to the rose.

I very soon realised that the only real possibility of moving the rose was to be very brutal. There were four or five main stems which were about an inch and a half thick, and from these came a very tangled network of thinner branches that could not be disentangled. The only choice seemed to be to cut those five main stems back to about four or five feet, with one at about nine feet and hope that nature would provide a new top.

Thankfully the rather unsightly rose is still hidden by the remains of the apple tree with its canopy of disconnected rose branches. But, as I thought about it, I wondered whether I really ought not to hide the present ugliness. Here, in my garden, is death and resurrection. Cutting down and regrowth are essential parts of nature's pattern.

As we celebrate Easter we are reminded of the joy of new life, and as I look into my garden I am hoping to see the resurrection of the "Rambling Rector".
