Nash's Farm

Parish councillors were dismayed and angry as everyone else when the two barns at the front of Nash's Farm were demolished. The Parish Council, our District Councillor Bryan Round, and (we think) AVDC Planning Department all assumed that they were to be converted. However, ...it is legal. This is what happened.

Plans were first approved one or two years ago to convert those two timber-faced barns and to build other new houses, but the developer pulled out and everything went quiet until Banner Homes took an interest. They put in a new application this year, but only for the completely new houses, to different designs. The barns were shown in outline only, marked as already approved. In our innocence we assumed that because there was no new application, Banner wanted to proceed with the existing plan. However, those barns were not listed buildings and the owners were quite entitled to pull them down instead. What they cannot do is build anything else unless they make a new application. When they do, we shall be able to see and comment on the plans in the usual way.

The parish council met on the 20th May, with Bryan Round, to talk about Nash's Farm. Planning permission for the eight new houses has only been granted provisionally while the legal agreement is drawn up, so we are writing to AVDC to ask that the application be referred back to the Planning Committee. We think that the Planning Committee, like us, was working on the assumption that those barns would stay, and Banner's demolition of them changes the situation. Please contact any Parish Councillor if you want to know more.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT OF THE VILLAGE HALL

At the Annual Parish Meeting held on the 29th March, there was a general consensus of opinion that the 'millennium' could

provide a focus for fund-raising with a view to extending and improving our 'village hall' to the benefit of all users and our ability to obtain increased income.

Consequently, a meeting was held on the 1st May to specifically gain the opinions of the village in general and the principal users of the hall in particular. Broad agreement was achieved on the following;-

- 1. Since the deeds are currently held by the Church; before further significant effort or expenditure is committed, a 'trust', or similar, needs to be set up to ensure executive decision making is firmly and legally in the hands of the villagers.
- 2. If an extension is proceeded with, improved heating, male/female toilets meeting modern standards of hygiene plus disabled toilet facilities need to be included.
- 3.A storage area large enough to enable tables and chairs to be removed from the main hall and play-group equipment from the kitchen.
- 4. Although food is not generally prepared in the hall, the kitchen will be refurbished and equipped to meet modern standards of hygiene and generally make it more pleasant and easy to use.
- 5. Re-configure access to meet current fire regulations and disabled requirements and bring electrical services in line with user needs.
- 6. Provision of a 'lobby/entrance' area to facilitate coats, bar area, additional small meeting room and reception area when hired out for weddings etc.
- 7. Any development should be sympathetic to what is regarded by most; a very pretty village hall.

Don Bellingham informed the meeting the Mrs Caroline Murray had said she might be able to donate sufficient adjacent land to enable a lengthening of the site by some five feet. The meeting expressed it's appreciation of this generous offer which is to be followed up.

Copies of a sketch plan identifying a means of maximising the limited area available for an extension were distributed for discussion purposes. It was clear from the ensuing discussion that there were diverse views on how to use the space created and configuration of the access points.

Although a formal body was not formed to manage the initial activities arising at this meeting, the following actions were taken on board:-

Bob Willmot would pursue the setting up of a 'charitable trust' which ensure a high degree 'ownership/excecutive authority' of the hall by the village.

Jean Barnett would identify a small team to look at methods of raising funding.

Caroline Lane would investigate what grants are likely to be available, the circumstances for obtaining them and the bodies involved.

Andy Bystra would write to Aylesbury Vale Planning Office to identify whether there are likely to be any major planning problems associated with the extension of the hall before passing instructions to our architect. He was also asked to design a logo for use with subsequent correspondence and articles.

All - would reflect on the layout/facilities required and pass their views/sketches to Andy.

Future actions.

A further meeting will be called when it is felt significant progress has been made regarding these initial activities.

The agenda is expected to include;-

- 1. Formation of a constituted committee.
- 2. Identify 'officers' and their terms of reference.
- 3. Agree layout of hall to be pursued.
- 4. Agree an initial, phased plan of actions with time scales.
- 5. Record progress of actions in hand.
- 6. AOB.



Unofficial notes of the meeting held on Monday 20th May 1996

Election of Chairman & vice-

Chairman;

Cllr Lane was elected as Chairman, Cllr Manning was elected as Vice-Chairman.

(1) Matters arising:

- a) Mr Scott had planted some trees in the Recreation Ground as agreed.
- b) Cllr Lane reported that Mrs and Miss Clark had donated an inner to the bin in the Recreation Ground.
- c) The residents of bungalows 1, 2, and 3 Bricstock would be asked if they had any objection to the gate at the far end of the footpath into the Recreation Ground, being closed permanently.
- d) There had been no reply to the letter to the taxi firm concerning the damage to the gate. at the top of Lines Hill. It was agreed that no further action would be taken at this time.
- e) O.S. 0006 Whitchurch Road: The Parish Council were concerned at the increased activity at the above location. A letter would be sent to AVDC repeating the Parish Councils previous comments.

Bus Shelter All the options for bus shelters had been looked at by each Cllr. It was agreed that they were too expensive and that local craftsmen would be approached to see if they could construct a shelter.

Fence by recreation ground This was the responsibility of the Parish Council. Quotes to replace the fence would be obtained.

Village Skip Service The skip could not be left over a weekend as it could only be monitored by AVDC Mon - Thur. There would be more publicity before the next skip was due in November to make better use of the facility.

Meetings It was agreed that future meetings would be held on Wednesday evenings. The next being 19 June 1996.

RECTOR'S REPORT

I am currently a member of a working party looking at the future needs of the church in the three deaneries of Mursley, Claydon and Buckingham. This is an area that is bounded by Milton Keynes, Leighton Buzzard, Dunstable, Tring, Aylesbury, Thame, Bicester, Brackley and Towcester.

This we have found to be our biggest problem. The area we are looking at has no formal links with any of the surrounding towns, and the only towns of any size in the area are Buckingham and Linslade, with perhaps Winslow. Then come Waddesdon, Ivinghoe and Wing. The smallest parish is Barton Hartshorn which had a population in 1991 of 52.

The object of the exercise is to try to reduce the three present areas to two, to anticipate population trends and to consider the present and future deployment of the clergy in the area. The optimum grouping would have about 15 clergy and a representation from the parishes of 40-50. From a meeting together point of view we would like people to have to travel no more than ten miles to attend meetings. Needless to say, there are no simple solutions.

We have tried a north/south split - the northern half looks reasonably good, but the southern part is too long, stretching from Ludgershall to Ivinghoe.

We have tried an east-west split - the eastern half is fine, but the western side is much too large.

The projected population growth will all occur on the eastern side, which will further add to the problems.

One of our other problems is that we can only use the available statistics and some of those are not very up to date. The 1991 population statistics are now five years out of date (although we have had help from Aylesbury Vale with these), the geographical area is a constant 65,756 hectares and the Church Electoral Roll figures have all changed this year (the compilation of a new Roll in each parish) - but are poor statistics.

If, at the end of the exercise, there appears to have been very little change and the church goes on as it has until now, that will be a very good outcome. But I suspect there will be a great deal of haggling before we get there.

CONTINUATION OF 'CHOOSING A SCHOOL'



Are there bright, lively displays in corridors and in the school hall? Do displays come from various subject areas and cover different topics or types of work, or are they all very similar? Have the displays obviously been produced by adults, do they consist mainly of commercially produced materials, or do they include and celebrate children's own work? They should at least include some of the latter. Ideally, displays around the school will show you examples of some of the best and most exciting work produced by the children. If this is not the case, it begs questions about the work that is produced.

Is the inside of the building clean, tidy and well maintained?

If you are able to go into classrooms, or at least into the class your child would enter, is the room light and spacious?

Again, are there varied displays of children's work around the walls? Does the room provide a stimulating learning environment for young children, via pictures and interesting items around the room? Many of the kinds of learning materials (beads, building bricks, paints, modelling materials. dressing-up clothes, puppets, natural objects ..) should be visible around the room.

Are books easily accessible to children and do they seem well-kept?

Is there evidence that the classroom is a place where children are taught, as well as learning through play and self generated activity? For instance, do wall displays include letters of the alphabet and numbers?

Would your child be stimulated in this classroom?

'WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN THE CLASSROOM'

This is the second in a series of educational articles submitted by Mr B McClellan, Headteacher of Wingrave CE Combined School

If you are lucky enough to see a lesson in progress, there are many things to look for. How many children are in the class? How are they seated? Do they have enough space to work or are they crowded together?

How does the teacher talk to the children? Does the relationship between the teacher and children seem to be positive, motivating and reassuring, or does it appear either negative and patronising or overly indulgent? Do children listen attentively when the teacher speaks?

Children may all be doing the same thing or there may be several groups following different activities simultaneously. The teacher may be giving attention to all or some of the class at any given time. Whatever is going on, look carefully to see if all the children are actively involved in learning activities.

Is this a well-organised room with an atmosphere of learning, or is it noisy and chaotic? Are many children chattering instead of getting on with what they are meant to be doing? If they are talking as part of the activity, does the teacher make sure noise is kept to an acceptable level? Teachers vary in what they consider acceptable noise levels; it is up to you to decide whether your child could comfortably learn in this environment or whether he/she would find it disturbing, distracting or even distressing, day in day out.

Do children seem interested in and motivated by what they are doing? Is there an element of fun within the learning? Is only group work taking place, or do children have an opportunity to work individual/independently?

How does the work being done compare with what your child can already do? If he/she is already more advanced than this, try to ask what the school would do about tailoring work to individual needs and capability.

Is there any computer equipment in the room? If so, is it in use? Notice who is using it and what they are doing. Is the room otherwise well resourced with books and equipment?

Does the school have specialist rooms and/or facilities for teaching subjects like Science, Technology, Information Technology, Music or Special Educational Needs? Does the school provide showers after games sessions? Is there a library?





POSH PEOPLE

It has always fascinated me that the term

"POSH" comes from the letters that were written after a person's name when they booked their passage to and from India on a steamship. If you had the money to pay for the privilege then you specified that you wanted Port Out, Starboard Home, the shady side of the ship before the days of air conditioning - this was abbreviated to POSH and thus you were a "posh person"!



Many of the other figures of speech that are in everyday use also have interesting origins. To this day the crossbelt of a Cavalry Officer in his ceremonial uniform has two silver spikes attached to it so that they may "spike someone's gun". This doesn't mean that they would now, or indeed ever did, stick them in someone! They were purpose-made to push into the hole at the rear of the barrel of a cannon you "spiked their gun" to prevent anyone from lighting the blue touch paper to set it off!

A more modern example, and one of my favourites, is the term "Back to Square One". This expression was introduced in the early days of radio by football commentators. The Radio Times Magazine contained a chart dividing a field of play into squares, Square 1 was near the centre spot and thus when the defence cleared the ball, the attacking team was "Back to Square One".

Job mobility is not just a modern phenomenon and in bygone times a miller seeking new employment had an advantage over other trades as he could "show his metal". The skill of the miller was in his ability to dress the millstones driven by wind or water power. The tools in the old-fashioned days were made out of very soft metal and thus the process of dressing the stones created a lot of iron filings, some of which ended up embedded in the miller's hands. Thus, it was a simple matter for a miller to prove his competence as he could "show his metal".




