Unofficial notes of the meeting held on Wednesday 19th June 1996

The meeting was attended by County Councillor Brenda Jennings

Verges in Village: A reply had been received from

(1) Matters arising

the BCC Planning and Transportation Department, due to lack of funds, nothing could be done. Pavement outside 69 The Green The work would be carried out in the next three months. Concern was expressed that there was some subsidence on the road at this point. Mr Headon had agreed to visit the Village on Friday 21 June. Various problems were to be brought to his attention at this visit.

(2) County Council matters

C/Cllr Jennings reported to the Parish Council:

- 1) A possibility that a Planning Application was to be made for 85 houses on the allotment site in Wing.
- 2) Mr David McGahey had been appointed as Director of Education for Bucks.
- 3) Bucks Scouts Council with Youth and Community Service had been awarded £183,000 from the lottery to build a climbing wall at Green Park.
- 4) Oxleys Infill Site at Wingrave Road was nearing completion, and September seemed likely.

The following new publications had been received: A new Guide to Alternative Travel, Guide for Small Businesses, proposals for the new Central Railway Route, Economic development Strategy 1996/97

(3) Planing Matters

Decisions

- 1) A/96/0569/APP Beulah, Wingrave Road, single storey rear extension
- 2) A/96/0547/APP Bridge Farm, extension to livestock building
- 3) A/96/0662/APP 14 The Green, two storey side extension The above applications have been approved.

Application for use had been withdrawn

(4) Trees

Concern was expressed at the possible Church Room extension which would entail removing the yew tree. Planning permission would be necessary to cut the tree down and needed to be applied for in plenty of time to avoid delay with plans.

(5) Children's Free Entertainment 7 August

It was noted that this clashed with the Wingrave Play Scheme. Unfortunately nothing could be done.





I noticed also this year with the small touches, the personalised menus on each table demonstrating that Andy Bistro has at last mastered his P.C

BACON AND BLUE CHEESE SALAD



This months recipe was supplied to Annie's Kitchen by our editor Andy. It was inspired by recipies in one of several Milk Marketing Board diaries given to his mother by her milkman each Christmas. They contain many practical low cost though tasty recipies and it is my intention to draw on these for inspiration in future issues of the Chronicle. This one was chosen because it is just the sort of thing we need on these hot summer days.

A tasty salad of contrasting flavours and textures to try.

Serves 4

- 1. Cook the bacon in a pan for 7-8 minutes or until crisp and golden. Remove with a slotted spoon and drain on absorbent paper. Add the butter to pan and melt. Add garlic and bread and cook for 3-4 minutes until crisp and golden. Drain on absorbent paper.
- 2. Mix the cheese and mayonnaise together. Stir in cream and black pepper. Beat well to blend.
- 3. Mix salad leaves, bacon and croutons together. Place on serving plates, top with dressing and serve.

INGREDIENTS

12 rashers smoked bacon, cut into bite-sized pieces
2oz butter
2 garlic cloves. crushed
4 thick slices of bread. crusts removed and cut into 1/2 inch squares
2oz Blue Stilton, crumbled
4 tbls mayonnaise
3 fl oz fresh single cream black pepper mixed salad leaves.

Around the School and in the Playground

Regardless of whether you look round the school or are able to observe children in the playground, see how they behave with one another. Do they play well together? Do there seem to be children who are ostracised and isolated? Is there evidence of bullying - either via physical aggression or verbal teasing? If so, does the teacher on duty notice this and intervene, or does it go unnoticed/get ignored?

Is the playground a happy place with friendly children? How would your child fit in here?

Whether or not you look round the school or only manage to observe from the outside, it is a particularly good idea to watch children coming in and out of the school gates at the beginning and end of the day. (Be careful how you do this, so you don't give the wrong impression and make anyone think you are looking to abduct a child!) The real relationships between children often emerge only when they escape the school's control. DO those children walking from the school seem to be relating well with each other?

If possible, speak to some of the parents who are dropping their children or waiting to collect them. See what the parents have to say about the school. Can you relate to the parents? If you can't your child may not relate well with their children.

What questions should I ask the Head Teacher?

Providing that a prior appointment has been made it should be possible to speak to the headteacher of the school that you might like your child to attend. You can learn much from this meeting because it is the headteacher who plays a central role in the establishment and maintenance of the ethos and the educational standards of the school. Come prepared and make the most of the time available. You might like to ask questions about the following:-

- What are the values and aims of the school?
- Is there a School Prospectus?
- What kind of behaviour is expected?
- How is discipline maintained?
- What should parents do if they are worried about an aspect of the child's education?
- How are parents kept informed about their child's progress at school.?
- How often and when do parents receive written reports about their child's progress?
- What are the rules regarding school uniform?
- What are the arrangements for eating and play during the lunch period?
- What links are there between the school and the local playgroup, First School and Secondary Schools?
- What happens if your child is unwell at school?
- What arrangements are made for school assembly?
- What arrangements are made to ease entry of a new child to the school? e.g. half day visits etc.

There will be other things that you have thought of, of course, but this list should be helpful to start you off.

Parents often wonder what they can do at home to give them good grounding for success. In the next article I will concentrate on what can be done to help children in the three core areas of English, Mathematics and Science.

The next in this series by Mr McClellan is entitled "WHAT CAN I DO TO HELP PREPARE MY CHILD FOR ENTRY INTO HIS OR HER NEW SCHOOL?" and will appear in the Sept. issue of the Chronicle.

RECTOR'S REPORT

I wish I knew what it is that triggers memory. All of a sudden, and for no particular reason, a scene from the past comes into mind, and after a few minutes of nostalgia, it quietly retreats back into the subconscious.

It started with the shopping list. Then I was back in the stiff-collared, starched apron grocer's shop of the 1950's. Every counter had it's queue, and it's till. The problem of successfully carrying eggs home in a paper bag by bicycle was one that I never managed to solve.

But the problem switched my line of thought to the shop that sold bicycle parts (and I got through quite a lot of those). It was one of those shops that was near the school, and thinking back, there was a great variety of shops near the school. There was a butcher, and a baker, a greengrocer, a newsagent, a grocer and a wool shop in one group; and a fresh fish shop, an off-licence, an ironmonger and a second-hand shop in another.

How very different from today's out of town supermarkets & DIY stores.

But was it better or worse, or just different?

There are some people who want the Church to stay like it was in the 1950's (or any age that suits them). But, just as the shops have had to change as a result of the changes in the way we live, so too the Church cannot stand still. I am not suggesting that the way forward is necessarily going to be as dramatic as the changes we have seen in our shopping habits, but I would not be surprised to see the Church becoming much less stiff and starchy over the next year or so.

The sense of reverence that some shopkeepers used to generate, was in some ways similar to the feeling we had on entering a Church. That feeling that, whilst they were pleased to see you, their goods were really for a better class of person. The Church too can give us the feeling that we are really not quite good enough. And that seems to me to be a very important reason to become more relaxed.

We still haven't managed to get the message across (like the supermarket) that whoever you are, you are welcome - nor are we very good at advertising what is not just "This week's Special" - "Think Life Eternal"
