

## The Chronicle

A document is being circulated to all Parish Councils, Voluntary Services and other groups, by Bucks County Council stating the Authority may after April next year drastically reduce it's planned spending by £23 million pounds. So what does this mean?


Cuts to the environmental services are likely to mean less road repairs and maintenance of rural footpaths as well as the possible closure of Country Parks. Fewer road safety schemes such as traffic calming and pedestrian crossings.

Cuts to library services and closure of some rural Libraries. (Use your library van)

Public transport could loose their subsidies to off peak and weekend services. (Make sure you use your bus service; No.65.).

#### 50/50 AUCTION

There was very poor support by village folk for the 50/50 auction held on the 1st of November and as the auctioneer, I have to say it was extremely disappointing to see some of the excellent range of items which had been donated, being 'knocked down' for a tiny fraction of their true worth. 



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

AVA helps people with communication difficulties which prevent them from voicing their own needs. These difficulties may arise from a variety of causes, learning of physical disability, or old age.



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## RECTOR'S REPORT

A week or so ago some extracts from a book about the life of Jesus were published in one of the daily newspapers. I found them interesting, yet strangely twisted.

The book, which was supposedly based on some ancient scrolls which had been unearthed, claimed that Jesus had been married to Mary Magdalene and they had subsequently had three children. It also said that the crucifixion had been an elaborate hoax with Simon of Cyrene acting as a substitute for Jesus. The idea that they simply switched places on the way to Calvary seems to me extremely far-fetched.

But perhaps the thing that, more than anything else, irritated me, was the transference of 20th century Western life and thought forms into 1st century Palestinian society. Their culture was completely different from ours. We have a hard enough job trying to understand some of the cultural differences between our way of life and, for example, the strict Sikh and Muslim lifestyles.

Curiously, the more we examine these different cultures, the less clear do we become about what did, or did not, happen. There is quite a lot to be said for ignorance! We simply do not know anything like enough to even hazard a guess about the domestic arrangements of Jesus' life. The few odd scraps of information that we do have then become for us valuable, even if they only give us a very sketchy impression of how things may have been then.

That Jesus was born in the out-house of an inn in Bethlehem is how we have received the story. Born there because there was no room in the inn. It is possible to argue that Jesus was born in the stable because Mary and Joseph were unmarried and that the innkeeper (as a respectable businessman) would not give them houseroom. "You want to act like animals, then you had better go and live with the animals out at the back" - that is purely a fanciful speculation which I made up as I wrote this article.

We can play with ideas to our hearts' content, but we can never fully fathom the mystery of Almighty God taking upon himself our human flesh and coming to live amongst us. So, like the shepherds and the wise men, our reaction to the Baby in the Manger is the same ... Pure Wonder.

- b) Pavement outside 69 The Green -Concerned residents had spoken to Cllr Lane about the pavement from the Methodist Chapel to the corner of Ross Road. Repairs only

seemed imminent outside 69 and no further at present. The Clerk would follow this up.

c) Works to roads following completion of Oxley's landfill site including flooding of road by allotments - Mr Headon would be reminded of the work that he had agreed to carry out following the completion of the landfill site.

#### 4 Grass cutting on The Green

It was agreed to ask for tenders for this work next year and to advertise this in the Chronicle.

#### 5 Oxley's Farm landfill site

Cllr Lane met Mr Wicks from BCC on 9 October to look at the site. There was some landscaping to be done around the entrance but the site itself was almost flat. Some tree planting was being planned in hedgerows.







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## WHAT CAN I DO TO HELP PREPARE MY CHILD FOR ENTRY INTO HIS OR HER NEW SCHOOL? This is the

sixth of a series of educational articles submitted by Mr B McCLellan, Headteacher of Wingrave CE Combined School.



#### **SCIENCE**

Children's natural curiosity about themselves and the world around them forms the basis for later learning in Science and although for convenience I have used the word "his" throughout but no sexism is intended!

You can harness this natural wonder in reaction to everyday experiences, and encourage the use of all their senses - looking, smelling, listening, touching, tasting - and talk about what their senses reveal. Books, television and video offer rich additions to a child's direct experience, and stimuli should take in animals and plants as well as human life.

His own growth will be a fascination to him. You can help your child to make sense of what he discovers by teaching him the names for parts of the body and also for the parts of plants (stem, petals, leaves, roots, branches, trunk ...), the parts of animals (tail, mane, fur, tusks ...) and fish (scales, fins, gills ...). Teach him to love and respect other living creatures.

He will notice differences and similarities between people and other life forms. Help him to talk about what he perceives.

Help him to understand that people and other living creatures all need food to remain healthy and active.

You should make your child aware that human activities result in a number of waste products; and it is important not just for his knowledge of Science, but for the future of our

planet that you try to foster care and consideration, for example, disposing of litter thoughtfully.

To aid exploration of their environment, children need to learn words that help them to describe things, for instance, words to describe colour, texture, shape, taste and words to describe how things change over time. They will begin to realise that some things changes shape when they are squashed, pulled or twisted.

They should be aware that things can be moved by pushing them; that many household goods are powered by electricity (which can be dangerous); and that information can travel over long distances, for example, to the television or telephone. This kind of thing can be taught within the everyday situation and understanding gradually increases with repetition.

Your child will be conscious of different weather conditions and should be able to talk about these changes. He should be able to describe how the weather links with the seasons and know that living things also react to seasons, for instance, that some animals hibernate.

You can help him to understand that light can come from several sources (from the sun, moon, stars, fire, electric light bulbs, torches,...) and that sound cane be made in a number of different ways. Teach him the vocabulary to describe his findings and encourage him to be aware of colours in his environment, matching and noticing differences in shades and brightness.

In fact, the biggest contribution you can make towards his understanding of Science is to share in the young child's natural sense of wonder and enquiry: the world around him is the subject for everyday exploration and discovery.

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
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

The plan shows the road network connecting nine villages. The numbers refer to the mileages along the roads.


A council workman living at village A wants to inspect all the roads in a car. What is the shortest route he can take if he has to return to A?

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
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
