

Unofficial notes of the meeting held on Wednesday 4th December 1996

D/Cllr Round attended the meeting.

### 1) Planning Matters

- a) Decisions A/96/1787/APP Erection of double garage and workshop, Mr & Mrs Shorrock, Oak Farm (amendment to 95/2013/APP) APROVAL
- b) Withdrawn A96/1431/APP Erection of 5 dwellings, Nash's Farm, Banner Homes.

### 2) Anglian Water

During the last month, due to a burst pipe, there had been water at the cross-roads which had turned to ice over night. Anglian Water had been informed in the evening but no action was taken until the following morning. Several residents had slid on the ice. It was agreed that the Clerk would write to Anglian Water for an explanation of why emergency work had not been carried out sooner. The water pressure in parts of the Village was very low at times. The Clerk would write to find out why this was so.

### 3) State of Roads

There was a large dip in the road in front of 59 The Green. The verge in front of the Abbey gates to the corner of the Green was eroding badly and there was now a large hole. It was agreed to ask BCC if granite setts would be possible here. The clerk would find out which roads were to be gritted this year.

### 4) Grass cutting on The Green

Mr Knight had tendered for the above for the sum of one polished old penny to be paid on September 29 1997. It was agreed to accept this quote and to thank to Mr Knight.

### 5) Recreation Ground Committee Report 18 November 1996

Cllr Lane reported on the following:

- b) Bonfire night had been a success but with the windy weather, it was felt that it would need to be monitored more closely next year, and checked to see that unsuitable items of rubbish were not dumped on the fire.
- c) The dip in the football field needed to be filled. A working party would be arranged for this work to be done.





### WHAT CAN I DO TO HELP PREPARE MY CHILD FOR ENTRY INTO HIS OR HER NEW SCHOOL?

This is the seventh of a series of educational articles submitted by Mr B McCLellan, Headteacher of Wingrave CE Combined School.

### History



History is another subject which will be incorporated within project work for most children when they start school.

You can help prepare your child for work in History by making him aware of time: days of the week, months, years and by introducing a sense of the past and future, as well as the present. Words such a yesterday, today, before, after, later, old, new, past and present are best taught in real situations, as the opportunity arises.




Stories and pictures about the past, and about imaginary characters from some other times, for example, from myths and legends, all help to develop a sense of the convention of time. The story Sleeping Beauty, pictures of dinosaurs and stories of famous events from the past are all relevant.



The main focus for pre-school children will be their own experience and reminiscences told to them about their babyhood and about your own earlier life. This helps in forming their sense of personal identity, as well as in developing a sense of time. Photographs, along with descriptions and recollections, are central in piecing together the beginning of family history and the child's place within it.

Personal awareness can be extended by visits to museums, by watching programmes, and by looking at old objects whenever they are available. Encourage children to talk about what they see or what they have heard about the past.





It is important for a child's personal development as well as for his sense of history, that you encourage his own memory of past experience and add details in response to his questions about himself.





Here, as promised are the answers to the 'brain teasers' I included in December's issue of The Chronicle.

### Inspecting the roads

A, C, E, G, H, and I are odd nodes and therefore one of the roads to each will have to be driven over twice. To minimise the total distance to be covered, the roads to be driven over twice can be arranged to be AG, HC, and IE. One possible route is as follows;-

A to B to C to D to E to F to A to G to F to I to E to I to D to H to C to H to B to G to H to I and G to A



The total distance travelled was 216 miles


### The Baffled housewife

The apparent paradox is explained when Mrs Smith was shown the timetable which showed the times of the P buses and Q buses at her bus-stop.

P route	Q route
10.09	10.10
10.19	10.20
10.29	10.30
10.3 9	10.40
10.49	10.50
10.59	11.00

There is a gap of only one minute after a P bus visits the stop until a Q bus is due, but then a gap of nine minutes before the next P bus. Thus in any ten-minute period nine minutes would be spent waiting for a P bus but only one minute for a Q bus. The effect of this to a person using the bus stop frequently would be to find that in nine times out of ten a P bus would be the first to appear.

With the prospect of a General Election in the spring and the wrangling about whether or not Britain should draw closer to its European partners, the start of 1997 does not look as though it is going to be very enticing. But I take this opportunity of wishing you a Happy New Year anyway.

Perhaps we need to look for happiness not in national or international events, but rather in the more intimate circles of our families and friends. An old lady once told me that every morning sheo thanked God for allowing her to see another day. Much of her life had been a struggle and, even in her old age, she had little in terms of material comforts. Yet she had this inner happiness - a sense of contentment that I found very humbling.

Someone once described this, rather unfairly I thought, as the "Tortoise Syndrome". When the world outside looks to be a bit of a mess, you withdraw into the narrow confines of an area that is still pleasant - the tranquillity and comfort of the shell! Yet we do need that inner tranquillity and comfort if we are to radiate happiness in the world about us. If we are not at peace with ourselves, then it is not likely that we shall be able to live happily alongside other people.

Maybe one of the root causes of the unhappiness in the world is that we are constantly being made aware of other people's problems.

And, human nature being what it is, we try to find solutions for those problems. "If I was in that situation, what I would do is ......" But we are not in that situation - we are in our own situation, with our own problems and our own solutions.

We must not let other people's troubles take over our lives, yet neither must we become so absorbed with ourselves that we fail to respond to the needs of those around us. We achieve happiness when our lives are in balance, when we are able to keep things in proportion and to have a sense of perspective.

Happiness and "quick-fix" answers do not usually go together:-

"O hush your noise, yet men of strife, and hear the Angels sing!"

As we go into the New Year, perhaps we should try to stop worrying about the problems that do not rightly belong to us, and spend more time working on those aspects of our own lives that need to be changed.
