


Editorial----Thurs. 24th. March.




"So how did this latest escapade end"?

PARISH COUNCIL

Unofficial notes of the meeting held on Wednesday 26th February 1997

1) MOWER FOR SALE

It was agreed to advertise this in the next issue of the Chronicle and the Bucks Herald at the same time.

2) THE WINGRAVE ROAD SIGN

This had disappeared from the wall of Oak Farm House and would be replaced soon.

3) COUNTY COUNCIL AND DISTRICT COUNCIL MATTERS

C/Cllr Jennings reported:

- a) The County Council had been under a great deal of pressure recently due to the reorganisation of the County, movement and retirement of staff. However once these changes had been made things would settle down.
- b) The County Council were having the budget setting meeting tomorrow, the council tax rise was expected to be in the region of 6.5%. Money was being taken from reserves to keep the tax at an acceptable level and to ensure spending did not reach the capping limit. Education and Social Services were to be the least affected areas in any required cuts.

4) PLANNING MATTERS

A/96/2247/APP - single storey extension, 2 Norduck Cottages. APPROVAL A/96/2254/APP - erection of double garage

A/96/2254/APP - erection of double garage and workshop, Oak Farm House. APPROVAL

5) NASH'S FARM

The Clerk reported that the County
Council had no powers to take action on narrowing
of the road by Nash's Farm as it was an unclassified
road. However they had urged AVDC to take note
of the problems that would be caused if the
planning

application was approved and they were against it from the safety aspect.

6) RECREATION GROUND

It was agreed to hire a skip to clear the Recreation Ground. A work party would be organised for the weekend 1st and 2nd March to help Mr Scott with the work.

7) MEMORIAL TREE/BENCH IN VILLAGE

The oak tree had now been planted

8) ANGLIAN WATER - FALLING WATER PRESSURE

A letter had been received from Anglia Water stating that they were fitting pressure loggers in Ross Road and The Green and would inform the Parish Council of their findings.


9) PROTECTION OF TOADS

Cllr Kempster would investigate means of protecting the toads when they crossed the road in Moat Lane. She would report back to the meeting in April.







ANNUAL PARISH COUNCIL

A lively Annual Parish Council Meeting was held on 19 March. Here are some notes on issues that were raised. These are not full minutes. Please ring me if you would like further details (681373).

Village Fete

Fete - last year's Fete had raised £1500, which had been distributed as follows:

St James's Church £525; Church Room £450; Recreation Ground £225; Chronicle £225; Toddlers Group £75.

The Fete in 1997 would be on 26 July, as part of the Church Festival weekend (26/27 July). An announcement would be made in the April Chronicle about the first planning meeting for the Fete (8 April, 8p.m., The Old House).

Development of The Church Room

Church Room. There has been a good deal of discussion and activity during the last year concerning the future of the Church Room. Next stages were discussed at some length at the meeting, and it is difficult, in a summary, to do justice to all the points raised. However, I shall make the attempt, with apologies in advance to anyone who feels that this is not a fair representation.

It is generally agreed that the Church Room is in need of extension and improvement, and that the questions of ownership and legal responsibility for any new development need to be addressed. The Church Room is currently an unlisted Charitable Body administered by a Trust. The Trust is currently in the conveyancing process required to acquire land that has been donated that would enable extension of the Church Room. The plan is that once that conveyancing is complete, the Church Room will be leased to a new group of village people who will become responsible for financing improvements, together with future maintenance and upkeep. The lease may be to the Parish Council; it would remain in force for as long as necessary and would be for a 'peppercorn' rent.

Andy Bystra has drawn up plans for improvements. These allow for improved toilets, proper storage area, refurbished kitchen, reconfigured entrances (with particular regard to fire regulations and disabled requirements), a lobby area, and a small meeting area that would allow small meetings to use the Room without having to heat the whole place.

After a site meeting, AVDC had offered an 'informal view', to the effect that it was unlikely that the plans would be supported because of worries about detracting from the current, simple design, worries about bringing forward the front of the building, effect upon trees, worries about parking.

At the Annual Parish Meeting, some felt that the application should still be made, and that the case for the village needs represented by the current design should be put. One person who had seen the design felt that it could well improve the appearance of the Room. District Councillor Bryan Round felt that simply continuing with the current application would be unwise, given the advice already received. He pointed out that AVDC had a responsibility to maintain the appearance of the village and in particular its conservation area. He suggested a further site meeting, at which interested parties could try to see how AVDC concerns could be met in what is a limited space, but the only one the village has.

Other points were raised concerning heating, safety, access and parking. The discussion having reached a stage of considerable complexity, it was agreed that those who had contributed should mull over the points raised as soon as possible, while the conveyancing process continues.

Local crime

Crime. P.C. Griggs addressed the meeting. He said that Cublington and Aston Abbotts remained the most law-abiding villages of the 25 in his 'patch'. He pleaded, however that all crimes, however apparently minor, should be reported to him, because petty crime in villages appeared to go in waves, and if alerted early to problems, he could adjust his movements to give the village priority for a period. It was pointed out that mindless but distressing vandalisation of cars was a persistent problem in Bricstock, and P. C. Griggs said that he would regularly make Bricstock part of his circuit.

Recreation Ground

Caroline Lane said that arrangements were still in train for the acquisition of further land being transferred to the Parish Council as a result of the Nash's Farm development. Also that thought had been given to the provision of facilities on the new land for older children in particular, but that no decisions had been made. A hole in the football pitch had been repaired. A self-confessed footballer said the repair was fine. Much voluntary work had been done in extending the usable area of the Rec. Rec funds stood at £1,308.02, but fundraising would be necessary to provide equipment for the area being acquired, and improving that already owned.

Other

Brenda Jennings (County Councillor) and Bryan Round (District Councillor) commented on recent developments in their spheres - with apologies to both, I think space precludes going into these issues here.

Dog fouling

Finally, a very strong request was made for a further plea in The Chronicle on the subject of dog mess. This ghastly problem is affecting many areas of the village, but in particular Bricstock, and the entrance to the Recreation Ground. Dog owners are making life very unpleasant and unsafe for residents around this area. This is particularly galling because there **IS A BIN** for dog mess there for which we collectively pay £180 per year.



RECTOR'S REPORT -MARCH 1997

This month I need to be extremely careful to avoid making any remarks that could be misconstrued. For, with the General Election coming up, it would be wrong of me to show political bias. The trouble is that all the time we are giving out coded messages and these can be a bit like "Chinese whispers" - when passed on they become more and more distorted.

We have learnt to become extremely cautious about accepting what politicians say especially at election time. It becomes almost impossible to distinguish between what they actually believe and what they are saying in the hope of being elected. There is, of course,

nothing new in this. At the trial of Jesus, Pontius Pilate found great difficulty in determining the accuracy of the evidence that was presented to me. "What is the Truth?" he demanded, and, convinced that he was not being presented with the truth, he washed his hands to dissociate himself from any blame in the proceedings.

The events leading to the Crucifixion and the people who were involved in those events, whether they knew it or not, significantly altered the course of world history. They played their part in God's plan for His world.

As we approach the end of the second Christian millennium, we too are involved in shaping the future destiny of our country, of Europe, and of

the world. We know and understand something of what we have inherited. We have some idea about where we think our society is at present (the good bits as well as the bits we would like to change). We may feel confidence in expressing our hopes for the future by casting our votes in the General Election.

Whichever political party is dominant in the next Parliament, there is one fact that remains unchangeable. After dying on the Cross on that first Good Friday and by rising from the dead on the first Easter Morning, Jesus has transformed all our hopes. Following from that event, "What you see is what you get" - "Watch my lips" - Christ is Risen - Sin and Death are no longer in control - Life Eternal is a reality.

1996 FINANCIAL REPORT OF THE ASTON ABBOTTS PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL.

On Wednesday 5th March 1997 the Annual General Meeting of Aston Abbotts Parochial Church Council was held. The accounts showed that it costs us £96.00 per week to run the church

This is the first time since I became treasurer in 1990 that expenditure has exceeded income. In addition, we were unable to pay our full share of the Diocesan Quota which was £3345, paying only £3115, a shortfall of £230.

The Diocesan Quota goes towards the cost of a priest for the parish which is calculated by the Diocese at over £26,000 a year. This figure includes his salary, housing costs, pension contributions, National Insurance and in-service training etc. Our Rector also serves Wingrave and Cublington who together with ourselves, are asked to pay a total parish share of £16,871, so even altogether we do not cover his total cost.

Our fund raising did raise a further £496 specifically for the clock fund which, together with donations and grants and funds raised in previous years specifically for the clock, enabled us to pay for the new electric clock winding gear at a cost of £1855. In addition the Betty Bennett Memorial fund has been used in 1997 to purchase two new altar frontals at a cost of £943.

The advantages of using this service are greater flexibility (You are not limited to the bus timetable) and the transport available is fitted with wheelchair lifts and seating suitable for those with disabilities. Booking hours are between 9.30am. and 12.30pm. Monday to Fridays.




