

Editorial-----Thurs. 29th. May.

Very many thanks to those of you who have donated money to The Chronicle, through either John Whyte or myself.

Donations are continuing to trickle in and I will publish our overall financial situation in a later issue. Perhaps even more gratifying from my point of view were the notes accompanying these donations expressing good wishes for the Chronicle's future.

It currently cost about £950.00 to publish the eleven issues a year. Last year was fairly typical when these costs were pretty well covered by our income as follows:-

Advertising £253.00
Donations £20.00
The Cabaret £300.00
The Fete £225.00
Parish Council £100.00

This totalled of some £900.00 which (since I paid for postage and paper and ink cartridges for the trusty computer) just about covered the production costs. It has not been possible to have a 'Chronicle Cabaret' this year and so our bank balance has suffered accordingly. What has made the situation worse is that the Cabaret provided funding to keep us going up to the middle of the year by which time we could expect some funds from the fete. Without this early income we simply ran out of cash this year and hence the plea in last months issue for donations.

In the hope of further improving our financial 'fortunes' a Disco has been arranged for Saturday the 14th of June. details appear later in this issue but please give us your support by coming along and enjoying the evening. Lawrence Hinds will be providing the music and I am assured he will play music for all tastes and ages.

Still on the subject of The Chronicle funding, I have decide to start reducing the font (print) size in the hope of minimising printing costs. If this gives any of our older reader difficulty, perhaps they would let me know.

And finally! Thank you to Louis de Silva for his excellent drawing and views on Aston Abbotts.






Shona Macgregor was appointed our new Clerk from the beginning of June.

School Association - Family Treasure Hunt.

On Sunday 18th of May, thirteen cars left the school and went off into the unknown. After numerous clues taking them around the local countryside they discovered their final destination was Ashridge Estate where a ploughman's lunch was much appreciated. The event which took place on a warm dry day, was great fun and enjoyed by young and old.

Summer Art Project

The whole school will be taking part to produce a set of 20th century totem poles to be sited in the school grounds. Sam Boffey, a senior art lecturer from Barnfield Collage has already started carving totem poles which are being designed by the children. An exhibition will be held in the Autumn term for parents and other members of the community to share in the work of the children and the sculptor.

As part of the project preparation, a visit was made by classes 6 and 7 to the Pitt Rivers Museum Oxford. Pitt Rivers Museum has three floors which hold over half a million artefacts. When you enter, you are faced with rows and rows of cabinets, one large totem pole and one small one. The artefacts are collected from different cultures of the world, for example, North American Indian, Peruvian, African and Ancient Egyptian.

The artefacts I most liked are the objects from the Chinese culture as they are beautifully decorated, and the North American Indian culture as they use very basic designs and are very well decorated. But my very favourite was a hand carved face, it was very enjoyable to look at.

The building alone is worth a visit, with it's arched ceilings, stone staircases and lovely windows. I think this trip is the most interesting yet. It is exciting to explore other world cultures. It was a shame that the visit was rushed and we had no more time to explore further. I would most certainly like to go back again and discover what else is there.







The Bull & Butcher will be open all day and will provide live music and barbecue in the evening.





Now that the General Election is finally over, I can risk being political again.

Much has been made in the media about the fact that the new parliament has well over a hundred women members - although calling them "women" could be deemed to be politically incorrect? The chances are that they, like their male counterparts, will be referred to as "The honourable member for" yet, by their behaviour, some of them may not deserve such a title.

'Twas ever thus - and I wonder how some of the more prominent parliamentarians of former times would have reacted to the change. Many of them, no doubt, would have been scandalised by such happenings, but to many people today, this gender-related political shift seems to be of little concern.

I read a statistic that surprised me recently - apparently there is now a ratio of 1:5 in the clergy of the Church of England - one woman priest for every five men priests. This ratio is not very different from the House of Commons!

Yet the public reaction is rather different. Women MPs have evolved over more than fifty years whereas women priests have been around for barely five. There is, naturally, fear of the new and untried, whether in parliament or in the church.

How the new House of Commons will "work" remains to be seen - it will be tested by the sure test of time. The same test will apply to the way the church "works", although the criteria for judgement will be rather different. We know that over the next ten to twenty years there will be a very significant drop in the number of full-time stipendiary (paid) clergy. There will need to be far more non-stipendiary (unpaid) clergy if the traditional pattern of church life is to continue.

It is not just in the introduction of women as clergy that changes will take place. The church is entering a period of very dramatic change and it is impossible to predict what it will be like in fifty years' time. God is leading us along un-trodden pathways. We can either bury our heads in the sand and hope that it will all blow over - that we shall




