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

N ARTICLE in Homes & Property made it possible for residents in Chesham Bois, Buckinghamshire, to win a court case against local developers. A High Court judgment gave them £100,000 and their full costs,

them £100,000 and their itti costs, which could exceed £70,000.

Local resident Mimi Harket, who has two small children, mored this leafy Hollybush Lane on the Woodside Estate in July 1895. When Banner New Homes told her two years ago have the control of the cost of the that they were proposing a new devel-opment behind her home, taking away part of her garden, she decided to lead the opposition.

When Banner got planning permission for 11 houses all looked lost. Then a neighbour remembered seeing an article about the Covenants Movement, and him! Harker rang Homes & Property and tracked down expart Victor Mishian. A covenant from 1925 was found covering the area, stating clearly that "no more than one home shall be created on the one house shall be crected on the

land on each piot.
"Thank goodness we found you.
After that, despatir changed to hope," says Mrs Hurker. They went to solicitor Gerald Moran, of Dawson and Co, and the legal battle began. The developers kept on building in breach of the covenant as the residents furned and desperately tried to raise the money to keep the legal case going.

Last May, a High Court Judge rejected the builder's application to throw the case out. Judge Rich also criticised an "intimidatory" letter from Banner, threatening residents with huge legal tills.

In the end it was Banner who had to pay all the costs. After a High Court hearing last month, the builder was ordered to pay the residents £100,000 in damages for knowingly breaching tor Gerald Moran, of Dawson and Co.

#### The Ups & Downs of Village Life!



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
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## IN THE VILLAGE 2B.

#### MEMORIES OF RICHARD 'DICKY' CHAPMAN - FROM HIS OLD SCHOOL FRIEND, VALERIE OSBORNE

Remembering Richard Chapman and school days are upper most in my mind during the past week.

As a boy and young man - he was handsome - possessed of the most beautiful, moving, sparkling brown eyes which dominated his face. Eyes which danced with vitality for life.

**B**orn of highly intelligent parents. His mother a brilliant pianist. Father an Olympic medallist, running in the 1912 games.

Aylesbury Grammar School welcomed Richard academically - or so they thought. What great good fortune he could run with the grace and speed of a cheetah, therefore to gain sporting acclaim for school and County which he achieved on numerous occasions.

"They seek him here, they seek him there, the Games Master seeks him everywhere." Another establishment held priority over practise, a rapid sprint to the betting shop.

We would travel home on a service bus - from Kingsbury Square - no school transport in 1943. The conductress was a formidable iron maiden in every sense. Diminutive, grey-frizzed-netted hair, the ever present "fag" cemented between thin lips. The "bete noire" of her day was Richard, he knew it and played the game to the hilt.

On the "upper deck" (seats the width of the bus, with a single aisle lengthwise) the frolicking would continue.

Richard never could locate his season ticket (did he ever own one?). Frequently his getting off point - "The Red Lion"- Bierton. From there a stylish sprint to Wingrave Crossroads, beating "Eastern National". In sign language he would indicate to the iron-maiden, he had won.

I Imagine Richard added a few more firsts over the years.

"Golden lads and lassies must, As chimney sweeps come to dust".

I remember him as a "Golden Lad".

The search is on for the Parish Volunteer of 1999! Following last year's successful awards scheme, AVDC is now looking for worthy local people to be nominated and considered for this year's awards - and it could be someone from your Parish!

Retired Colin Higgs, of Aston Abbotts, was named Parish Volunteer of 1998 after a judging panel chose him from 24"unsung heroes", nominated from all corners of the Vale. Colin is well known in Aston Abbotts because of his huge amount of local fund-raising work and his unstinting efforts to keep the village looking beautiful. He picks up litter, spring cleans the village hall, plants spring bulbs each year on the village green and helps maintain the local churchyard - all voluntary and unpaid work. Joyce Brooker of Wing and Jeanette Palmer of Weston Turville were also recognised for their community work.

AVDC launched the Parish Volunteer of the Year awards scheme last year to recognise and reward those people whose tireless voluntary efforts in their local community may otherwise go unrecognised. It's aimed at people who live within the Vale, but outside the town of Aylesbury itself. This is

is because the Town Mayor already runs a similar awards scheme for townspeople.

Colin will kick off this year's awards scheme by unveiling the Parish Volunteer roll of honour at the Civic Centre, Aylesbury, today. Colin, who may not be nominated for this year's awards, has agreed to join the judging panel, alongside three District Councillors and representatives of the Aylesbury Vale Association of Local Councils and the Buckingham and Winslow Advertiser, which is sponsoring the awards for a second year.

Further information and nomination forms for this year's awards will be available from next week at AVDC offices in Aylesbury, Buckingham and Winslow, and from the Buckingham and Winslow Advertiser reception in West Street, Buckingham. Forms are also available from AVDC Information Points outside Aylesbury, Parish Councils and there are a few included with this press release.

Anyone can be nominated and anyone can do the nominating. However, District Councillors and AVDC staff are not eligible. Nominations must be received by 30<sup>th</sup> April 1999, and the Parish Volunteer of 1999, together with two others, will be announced in the summer. For more information on the scheme, phone (01296) 585060 or see the "Awards" section below. An entry form can be found on Page 22 of this month's CHRONICLE.

- Anyone can submit a nomination. A judging panel which includes three District Councillors and a member of the Aylesbury Vale Association of Local Councils will choose the winners after looking at this information.
- Judges will take into account things like the kind of activities the nominee is involved with in the community, how long they have been involved with these, how much they use their own initiative and how valued they are by their local community.
- The Judges will be looking in particular for people who work off their own initiative.
- The winner and two runners up will each be presented with an award at a special ceremony later this year.
- There are no age restrictions on who can be nominated or on who can do the nominating. District Councillors who are not eligible to be nominated for the awards themselves will be asked by the Judges to comment on nominations from their wards. AVDC staff are also not eligible for nomination.

So think about that person in your own village, town or community who could be Aylesbury Vale's Parish Volunteer of the Year. Then fill in the form on Page 22 of this month's Aston Abbotts CHRONICLE and send it to us. You do not have to tell the person that you are nominating them unless you want to.

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
## IN THE VILLAGE 4.

#### HISTORICAL INTEREST ...

An article by Colin Higgs about the History of Aston Abbotts

#### **OLD FARMHOUSES**

Farm dwellings throughout the country differ much in styles of buildings, but have one thing in common - plenty of space incorporated in solidly built houses intended to last (unlike smaller cottage homes and compact modern



houses erected since World War II.

These period farm houses were erected when young men and women from the villages looked, naturally, to the Farmer for work on the farm or in the house. This helps to explain why farmhouses had so many rooms - not only to house the family, but the domestic staff as well!

Keeping warm was NOT a problem nor the expense that it is today as there was plenty of timber to hand for the large open fires. The broad chimneys also spread warmth around the house and if need be the bedrooms also had fireplaces.

Turning to the material from which old houses were built, in Medieval times timber was used with the lower ends of vertical posts resting on stone bases. Then later the posts were rested on bases built of stone and brick, and the spaces between the beams were filled with Wattle and Daub - the roofs were thatched. In the 16<sup>th</sup> century granite, limestone, bricks made locally, and slates for roofing were used.

A feature in some areas was the practice of tile hanging upper halves of the outside walls for extra protection against the weather, other areas used weather boarding painted black or tarred according to local custom.

Villages and the countryside would be bare and very uninteresting without our attractive old farmhouses and buildings, let alone the hospitality of the people who dwell in them.

it had been rather less than successful!

Sometimes we hide in the back of our memories events from the past, thinking that on a later day we will try them again. The gadgets that we bought that did not really solve the problem we had in mind for them. The things that we tried, that didn't quite work as we planned, and we put them away for another day. Then, almost before we know it, we have a storage problem!

The forty days before Easter -and that means all of March this year - are days when we are challenged to reassess our values. To look again at some of the things that we have put away for another day. Those Bible stories that we heard at Sunday School - have we thought about them since those far off days? Was there something about them that didn't quite work for us? Is it worth looking at them again with the wisdom of a greater experience of life? And even the ones we thought that we could grasp - might it not be an idea to take another look at them?

It always surprises me that there is so much more to be discovered in each of the Bible stories every time that I think about them. The trouble is that it is more comfortable thinking about the stories that need less thought, than trying to unravel those that are a bit of a struggle. In order to understand the more difficult stories, we shall probably need to discard some of the ideas and concepts which we have hoarded for too long.



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

#### Clare Shorrock writes about

#### ASTON ABBOTTS HISTORY ( AAH )

Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> February saw the inaugural meeting of a group of Villagers who are interested in researching and writing about the history of Aston Abbotts. At present the group numbers nine people but anyone else who is interested is more than welcome to join us. The next meeting is at 8.00pm on Tuesday 16th March at the Bull & Butcher.

After considerable discussion it was decided that we should aim to produce:-

- 1. An exhibition tracing the village's history over the last 1000 years. This would include documents, maps, photographs and "artefacts".
- A small booklet about the history of Aston Abbotts and a
  more detailed, hardback version of the booklet, both with
  illustrations such as maps and photos and both to be on sale
  on such occasions as the Fete, Open Gardens day etc.
- 3. A "living history" which would have two aspects, firstly a collection of the memories of the older members of the village about life here during the 20th century, and

secondly a complete photographic record of the village in 1999. This would include general views of the village, photos of village events such as the Fete, and photos of every house in the village, hopefully with the occupants. Additionally, we would like to try to get all Aston Abbotts residents to be in a group photo in the church yard with the photographer at the top of the tower. Individual prints of all photos would be available for sale.

Dickie Dicken and Peter Shorrock will trawl the County Archives, County Museum, St Albans Abbey Archives etc. Shirley Ford will search the Church records and Colin Higgs is producing a map of the village and all the surrounding fields, and he will also talk to older residents about their memories. Paul Ridgely will take all the photographs and Sally Palmer will collect and store old photographs, documents, maps and artefacts.

We are aiming to accomplish all this by the millennium which is quite a tall order, so.....




