



ELECTION RESULT ... ELECTION RESULT

The voting and counting is over after the elections on May 6^{th} and Aston Abbotts has a new District Councilor - congratulations go to Peter Cooper.



THE ELECTION BATTLE

Peter, the Independent candidate, is also Chairman of Wingrave with Rowsham Parish Council. He takes over from Bryan Round, a fellow Independent who held the post for 16 years.

Around 47% of people in our area voted, with 564 choosing Peter and 246 opting for Colin Smart, the Conservative candidate. Well done to both candidates for their professional campaigns, and congratulations to Peter who I'm sure we will all get to know over the coming years.

Elsewhere in The Vale, the Conservative candidates fared best, gaining 11 seats mainly at the expense of the Liberal Democrats and losing 2. The final make-up of the District Council (previous numbers of seats in brackets) is:

Liberal Democrat	26	(31)
Conservative	24	(15)
Independents	7	(8)
Labour	1	141

It is clear that the Independents (Peter included) will hold the balance of power on the District Council - good news for us in the Parish!

In by-gone days the elections for District Councilors were conducted somewhat differently. The account opposite, courtesy of Gordon Smith, dates from around 1920 somewhere in The Cotswolds.

DISTRICT COUNCIL ELECTIONS -THE COTSWOLDS Circa 1920

As for the election of District Councillor ... this took place not at the parish meeting, but at the close of an entertainment. As we were moving from our seats the parson got up and said that he did not wish to serve any longer, and that he had a nomination paper with him and wanted nominations. No-one responded in such a high matter. So 'the Reverend' suggested somebody, and called a labourer and the wheelwright forward to be the candidate's mover and seconder to the extent of signing the nomination form. Next day the form was nailed up on the chestnut tree on the green.

The paper hung there for a week until it blew down, and no other candidate came forward. So, in a few days, a form from the clerk of the district council and poor-law guardians - and of everything official or semi-official for miles round that has to have a clerk - duly announced to the candidate his attainment to the dignity for which he had been chosen, and threatened him that if he did not sign a declaration of acceptance he would be fined a pound.

Unfortunately, there was a small problem of


incompatibility which meant that Webmaster Pat couldn't read the message! Eventually all was resolved and the article appears in this CHRONICLE.



We now have a bank account with Clare (chairman), Sally (treasurer) and Margaret (secretary) as signatories. Clare had received an application form for a Millennium Awards for All Grant, and it was agreed that

Paul had also brought a friend, Mike, with experience in advertising to give valuable and valued advice on the layout of both the book and exhibition. We agreed that the exhibition would take place in the Church and Church Room from Saturday 22nd to Monday 24th January 2000 with local schools being invited to bring parties of children on the Monday.

Speaking of the exhibition - does anyone have access to free standing display boards which we could borrow for these dates - it would save our budget an immense amount and make the exhibition look really professional.


The next meeting will be at 8.00pm on June the 8th at the Bull & Butcher - everyone welcome.

JOHN WESTCAR OF CRESLOW

An historical article by Colin Higgs

John Westcar, a renowned grazier, lived at Creslow Manor and farmed the rich pastures there from 1779 until he died in 1833. Creslow Manor is one of the most interesting medieval houses in Buckinghamshire (near Whitchurch). It is built of local limestone and the oldest parts date back to 1330. It has an octagonal tower whose walls are 6ft thick, a great hall, a small crypt and the remains of the ancient parish church, now used for secular purposes.



CRESLOW MANOR

Creslow contained the largest field in the county at over 300 acres and the farmland comprising the whole of the ancient parish of Creslow covers 800 - 900 acres. The pastures have long been noted for the quality of the fat cattle and sheep grazed on them. The richness of the pastures is attributed to the underlying Kimmeridge Clay.

When Mr. Westcar, who came form Oxfordshire, became established at Creslow he traveled to Herefordshire and Cheshire in the west to buy 5 or 6 year old Hereford Bullocks which had worked the land. He transported them by road (drovers' roads) to Creslow to fatten them for market.

In 1798 the Smithfield Cattle and Sheep Society was founded by John Westcar and at the first Smithfield Show in 1799 he won first prize for his fat ox weighing in at 241 stone. The ox had been transported by canal boat from Wendover Wharf to Blackfriars, taking 2 days.

John Westcar was killed by a fall from his pony on the Great Pasture on the 24th April, 1833 aged 84. A clump of trees was planted to mark the spot which later became known as the Old Man's Clump and there is a white marble mural tablet to

memory Whitchurch Church. depicting the famous grazier standing in front of a fat ox with sheep at his feet. The tablet also commemorates Mary Westcar, his wife who died at the early age of 23, and ends with a quotation -"Unblemished let me live or die unknown. Oh grant an honest fame or grant me none."



Unblemished let me live, or die unknown: Oh, grant an honest fame, or grant me none.

John Westcar was one of the outstanding farmers of his day, a country gentleman of taste and culture. A box pew was retained for his use in Whitchurch Church. In his will he left £500 each to the parishes of Whitchurch and Cublington for the benefit of the poor - known as the Westcar Charity. The famous grazier was laid to rest at Whitchurch on May Day 1833, having no son his nephew succeeded the tenancy at Creslow.







RECTOR'S REPORT -MAY 1999

They say that moving house is a very stressful business. I am beginning to feel that moving someone else is even more stressful.

Last Autumn an elderly relative decided, in her mid-nineties, that the time had come to move into a Nursing Home. Mentally she is still very alert, but sadly is no longer able to see or to hear very well. It has taken some time to sell her flat and we are still in the process of disposing of her furniture. We asked

a dealer about the furniture, knowing that it was all very good quality. But he offered us next to nothing for it. The good pictures were sent away to be auctioned. Some sold, some didn't. A buyer for the flat backed out at the last minute after a disagreement with the Residents Association. There have been the inevitable problems – like bills that got paid twice, and information that would have been useful if it had been available.

Then, when the buyer was ready to exchange contracts, there was a mad rush to remove the remainder of the furniture and leave the place clean and tidy. That, in itself was hard enough. But then there were the people who needed to be notified that the sale had been completed – like the Local Authority for the Council Tax, and the Electricity Board. Some would not talk to me because I had not registered my Power of Attorney with them – but then, they were only doing their job!

I suspect that much of the stress has arisen because I am working with things that I am not very familiar with. After all I do live in tied accommodation and do not have the problem of buying a house when I change Parish. And because, on the whole, people do not move houses very frequently, none of us gets the chance to learn all the shortcuts. Perhaps we might become nomads if we did!

Yet, as I reflect on the challenge of doing something with which I am not very familiar, I can't help but think that for many people any dealings with the Church might appear just as daunting. In selling the flat I have been dealing with other people who did know what they were doing, and who helped me with the things that I would not have managed on my own. There were times when they seemed to be rather slower than I might have wished – and sometimes their answers were not what I wanted to hear.

God doesn't always answer our prayers "by return". The Church cannot always come up with the solution that we want – The timing may not meet with our approval –but, in the end, we can work our way through our problems.

I am just glad that stress has a built-in time factor. It does end – or maybe it just changes into a different set of problems!







Can't Cook, Won't Cook; Celebrity Cook; Pro-Celebrity Cook; Two fat blokes, and now.....READY STEADY COOK - THE PALMER WAY!

The Ready Steady Cook Stage Show came to The Swan, Wycombe at the end of April. Fern Britton introduced our two chefs for the evening, Brian (I hate puds) Turner and Antony (the arsonist) Worrall Thompson, who took turns to demonstrate how to cook some of their favourite recipes.

Whoever suggested that cooking was a chore? This was comedy at its best, which left the packed audience rolling in the aisles. Our chefs both had a wonderful sense of humour and constantly took the Michael out of each other. The overhead cameras and large projection screen ensured that the whole audience could see clearly all the tricks of the trade. They also led Antony to go around with a tea towel on his head (so that the audience could not see his thinning pate).

Yorkshireman Brian cooked four dishes, fillet of beef, sautéed chicken, potatoes and cabbage, but this was no ordinary fare. For instance the braised cabbage balls contained bacon, garlic, shallots and a touch of curry powder.

Antony described himself as a self-taught chef starting training as a young child (out of necessity due to a pretty lousy au-pair girl). He prepared a crab salad with a coconut lime dressing, chicken noodles and pineapple

carpaccio, burnt butter sabayon and fresh raspberries.

Things didn't go quite to plan, as most of the chicken noodles ended up on the stove rather than in the pan. Nice to see that the experts have little problems as well. Brian helped out by hand whisking the sabayon for the required 20 minutes. At last Antony offered to take over and announced after all of two seconds that it was now ready.



After the masterclass, the production team cleaned up the kitchens while the audience had a well earned drink. The second half followed the familiar television show format with the two participants bringing their own ingredients to the value of a fiver. Our chefs had just twenty minutes to make something of them. Should you be tempted to visit the RSC Stage Show, it reaches St Albans on 13th June. You will not be disappointed.

YE NIGEL RECIPE

A version of Brian's sautéed chicken with mushroom sauce was tried out in "The Vines" kitchen the following day and was pronounced by our resident diners to be an outstanding success.

Ingredients - serves 4.

4 x 100g/4oz chicken breasts (with the skin on), 50g12oz butter, 1 finely chopped shallot, 225g/8oz sliced white button mushrooms, 1/2 glass medium sherry, 1 glass dry ~e wine, 200ml/1/2 pint double cream, salt and pepper, squeezed lemon juice, chopped parsley, tbsp. olive oil.

Method.

Season the chicken. Melt half the butter and the oil in a frying pan and sauté the chicken for 8-10 minutes until tender. Remove and keep warm. Melt the remaining butter and sweat the shallot for a few minutes without colouring. Add the mushrooms and sweat until they colour slightly brown. Add the sherry and white wine and reduce completely. (No alcohol in this dish!). Add the cream, bring to the boil and cook until thickened to a sauce consistency. Season with salt, pepper and lemon juice. Add chopped parsley and serve with the chicken.

KEEP THE BONFIRES BURNING

With garden bonfire season upon us and likely to last until November 5th, here are some thoughts from SAVE (support Aylesbury Vale's Environment):

Bonfires can be a major source of Neighbourhood nuisance, and the Council receives many complaints about them. A bonfire can spoil your neighbour's enjoyment of their property by preventing them using their gardens, opening windows or hanging out washing. As well as causing nuisance, bonfires increase the general background air pollution levels. The immediate health risks may be low, but increased air pollution levels may cause longer term problems for children, asthmatics or bronchitis sufferers. Smoke can contain cancer causing substances.

If you do have to light a bonfire please follow these guidelines:

- Only burn dry material
- Never burn household rubbish, rubber tyres, or anything containing plastic, foam or paint.
- Never use old engine oil, meths, petrol or paraffin to light the fire or to encourage it.
- Avoid lighting a fire in unsuitable weather conditions. Smoke hangs in the air on damp, dull days and in the evenings.

- Avoid burning when the wind will carry the smoke over roads or into other people's properties.
- Avoid burning at weekends when people want to enjoy their gardens.
- Avoid burning when the air quality is moderate, poor or very poor.
- Never leave a fire unattended or smouldering.






