
IN THE VILLAGE 1.

FETE DAY LOOMS



RECTOR'S REPORT -JULY 1999

I had thought of writing a piece about the European Elections. But they have now passed and whilst I still think the system of voting for a political party rather than for people by name is very unjust, it is no use wasting more time and effort on that subject.

Some people have more of a problem that others with Europe. There is no doubt that some of the directives from Brussels have little to commend them. For example, the fire extinguishers in Wingrave Church have just

been serviced. The ordinary water extinguisher had to be fitted with a new hose that was about two inches longer than the one it had because Brussels said so!

What difference it will make if we ever need to use it to fight a fire is unclear - but rules are rules!

It is tempting to argue that the simple way out is to stop having the fire extinguishers serviced and to leave them as they are. But that automatically cancels our Fire Insurance. It is one of those things where you just cannot win.

I do not know all the ins and outs of 'Duty Free' but I know that on future trips across the Channel, I shall not be able to replenish my stocks of whisky and tobacco. I expect that I can live with that. By the time this appears in print I shall have managed two foreign trips this year - both within the European Union. So my stocks will be

fairly high - even though I am suffering from 'Eurostress' and attacking them more often than normal!

The first trip was a short break to Belgium to ride on steam trains. It was interesting to note that some of the Belgian engines had been converted from coal to oil. The purists were not too happy about this - declaring that it was no longer a 'proper' steam engine. But for most of the people who were enjoying the trip this seemed a sensible development. It took much less time to get steam up, it didn't need stoking, and whilst it was still not as efficient as a directly driven diesel engine, it was cheaper to run than when it was coal-fired.

We cannot just bury our heads in the sand, because the end of this Millennium is a time of rapid change. And even the Church is caught up in the changes. I have a feeling that in four years time, all church buildings should have been altered so that they are accessible by disabled people. There is a new set of Services in preparation - called Common Worship - and those I have seen so far seem to be very complicated. It is probably a good thing that they are coming out on computer disc - because that allows their many alternatives to be 'shuffled' on screen before deciding how they will appear in print.

We have to learn how to live with all these changes - and try to make them work for our advantage. I expect that we shall manage!

"WINGRAVE: A Rothschild Village in the Vale"

We think that Wingrave is a very special village. We know that most villagers feel the same. And with The Great Upheaval selling 600 copies it seems that many of you want to know more about Wingrave's past. So our new book continues the story of Wingrave for another 150 years from the time of the great upheaval in 1798, when the parish was enclosed. It tells the story of the desperate struggle against poverty and disease. It includes an account of how strawplaiting, a cottage industry, helped to supplement family incomes, and describes how others resorted to emigration in the quest for a better life. It relates how the tide began to turn when Hannah de Rothschild came to the rescue in the mid-1870's. Other topics include: church and chapel, schooling, farming, the Rothschilds, amusements and recreational activities, everyday life, and village characters. A chapter is devoted to Rowsham.

Wherever possible we've included the recollections and views of people living as far back as the 1820's in their own words. They include a generous helping of Hilda Roberts' memories rescued from an attic in Worcester! Seventeen of our senior citizens have contributed recollections of Wingrave in their youth, including Moatin' the Ref (Joyce Sinnott), Helping on the Farm (Vic Clay, Frank King and Norman Brackley), Growing up in the Twenties (Ron Bignell), and Discipline at School (Frank and Grace King). Many more have provided photographs, comments and information.

While emphasising what went on in the parish, we have also looked at it in the context of the Vale and Buckinghamshire. And we haven't ignored the trivial! So find out: Why the lads shot the cats that ate the rats; which preacher told his congregation to "Go on" fourteen times; who thought the forward's heads were footballs; which vicar demonstrated ploughing to the allotment holders;

Based on four years of detailed research, this book should provide an enjoyable and intriguing read for villagers and all those who are interested in local history; a cherished memento for those who have moved elsewhere; and an invaluable source book for pupils studying the local history elements of the national curriculum.

The publisher is Paul Bowes, formerly of Wingrave, whose bookshop, The Book Castle at Dunstable, also publishes attractively produced books on the local area. "Wingrave" will be in hardback, and contain at least 288 pages plus 144 photographs (ISBN 1-871199-99-9). The bookshop price will be £25 but the pre-publication price will be £20. It would help the publisher to assess demand (and stay within budget!) if orders could be sent in as soon as possible. However, provided that orders are received not later than 4th September 1999, purchasers' names will be printed in the book as a Subscribers' List, as will the names of family and friends on whose behalf books have been bought** The launch and publication are planned for late November 1999: details later to all subscribers.

Following the recent review of the Buckinghamshire County Council speed limit policy, pilot speed limit schemes have been set up in four communities - Chearsley, Chenies, Fulmer and Northend. In these schemes, the four villages will be permitted to fund their own speed limits involving the promotion of a speed Limit Order and provision of traffic calming measures.

These measures may typically include gateways, coloured surfacing, enhanced signing or central islands. In this way the environment would be altered to such an extent that a lower speed limit, considered appropriate by both Bucks County Council and Thames Valley Police, could proceed.

The pilot schemes will be carefully monitored to assess

their effectiveness before other community funded schemes are considered. In Buckinghamshire we are working hard to reduce the overall speed of traffic with cameras and traffic calming.

We are asking individuals and communities to help by supporting the "Traffic Calming by Example" campaign. We launched this campaign in 1996 and asked individuals to make a commitment to drive within the speed limit and at speeds appropriate to the road conditions. It has been extremely successful in areas where Parish Councils and local residents have used it as an alternative to traffic calming.






