

Aston Abbotts Parish Council Uncovered

You'll notice from the Parish Council minutes in this CHRONICLE that Tom Manning has stood down as Chairman after sterling service to the village over the past few years; he stays on as a councilor and will continue to chair the 'Hall' committee.

On behalf of all **CHRONICLE** readers, I would like to thank Tom for his tireless work in chairing numerous committees, for successfully leading Parish objections to the original proposals by Banner Homes and of course for getting us so close to taking on and modernising the Church Room.

John Sansome will now take on the role at the helm of the Parish and Linda Sutton has been re-elected as Vice-Chairman. I know we will give them all the support we can in challenging threats to the village from development, by-pass roads and aircraft over-head, as well as in the day-to-day running of the Parish.

You could of course take it a step further and become a Parish Councilor. With the increase in the population of the village over recent years and the in-flux of new faces, the Parish Council is giving very serious consideration to increasing the number of councilors from the present five to seven.

This would give a greater cross-section of villagers the opportunity to influence decision making and help to spread the Parish workload around to a greater extent than at present. With more and more issues affecting us, the number of active committees needed will certainly grow over the next few years.

Everyone in the village has a couple of years to think about taking on such a commitment as elections will not be held until 2003. So there is ample opportunity to see for yourself what goes on everybody is welcome to attend the Parish Council meetings and there is no closed element at all.

Of course, as a councilor you have to make some difficult decisions from time to time; decisions like the one this month when the fete committee asked permission to use the Recreation Ground for Car Parking during the fete. After much debate, the PC decided to turn down the request on the basis of safety (cars would pass across the entrance to the children's play ground) and because when the Rec has been used for parking in the past, the grass was badly churned

up and took a long time to recover. It's the sort of issue where you really can see both sides of the argument.

Onto CHRONICLE issues, please remember that because of the Summer holidays, next month sees a combined July and August issue of THE CHRONICLE. Make sure details of events happening in July AND August are passed to the team by June 24th.

Anyway, enough of my ranting - enjoy THE CHRONICLE!



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
IN THE VILLAGE 1- AIRPORT SPECIAL.

AIRWAYS MISERY

Over the past couple of months we have reported on some elements of the proposals to increase operations at Luton Airport and the intention to create a new flight path to the east of the village. Many of you may think that these plans will have little or no effect on Aston Abbotts.

YOU, ESPECIALLY, SHOULD READ ON...

Residents of the villages on the proposed flight path (and remember, this is only a few miles from us) have formed a protest alliance with PAIN called the 'Quieter Skies group' - to fight the flight path and the planned massive increase in flight numbers.



We have taken a somewhat tongue-in-cheek look at the issues so far but there are serious implications. Robert Houston of the Quieter Skies Group has prepared a press briefing:-

New Local Groups Aim for Quieter Skies

People in rural villages want more say on the things that affect their lives and homes. That is the message going to politicians, and civil servants as they consider Luton Airport's expansion plans.

With Luton Airport seeking new airspace over Wing, two local groups have been set up to question and contest the proposals. The airport wants to use the airspace for a new approach route from the west which will fly over Leighton Buzzard, Wing, Mentmore, Cheddington and Ivinghoe. Arrivals will descend from 5000ft over Leighton Buzzard to 3000ft over Ivinghoe as they make their final approach. Decisions by the CAA and the Department of Environment are due this summer.

A series of communication meetings given by the Luton Airport Traffic Control at the turn of the year, rather than allaying local fears, has stirred residents and local councils into action. Protests both on the consultations and the timetable of introduction has gone from Aylesbury Vale and Leighton Linslade to the Airport Authority, the CAA and the DETR. Parish Councils have been pressing District and County authorities to take up the issue. Local MP's have also been involved.

Leighton Linslade Town Council have set up a working party to look at the proposals and seek to lobby through the Airport consultative body for alternatives with less impact on Leighton Linslade. Meanwhile residents of the villages affected by the proposed flight path have formed an action group.

Calling themselves the "Quieter Skies Group" they want the voice of rural villages to be heard in the debate on the use of their

airspace. Drawing on the experience of the Wing Airport Association's campaign in the 60's and the Leighton Buzzard Preservation Society, they plan to make an active and positive input to a debate that is only just beginning.

With Luton looking at major expansion from 5 million to 30 million passengers per year over the next few years, more and more aircraft will be dominating rural skies. The Group feel this recent consultation process has been rushed and inadequate, and are questioning the justification of the new flight path. Nor has there been any meaningful debate or disclosure of alternatives. If Luton is to grow it must listen to the people who have to listen to their planes.

Now the "Quieter Skies Group" want to build a grass roots network of support within the rural parishes while they seek more detailed public debate on the new approach route. A longer term aim is to promote the control of all aircraft noise from whatever source to an acceptable level, by co-operation with others in the South East with similar concerns.

The "Quiet Skies Group" have chosen to work within PAIN (People against Aircraft intrusive noise), who set out to influence the May 1998 introduction of the Olney 1b route from Luton. Brian Wyke the Chairman of PAIN recently secured a place on the Luton Airport Consultative Committee and has agreed to act as the representative of the new group as the PAIN member on the committee.

But what can WE do about it?

You may recall that earlier this year when the plans for the new flight path first surfaced, our Parish Council was given just a few days to respond. It would seem that the Airport Authority's approach hasn't got any better since. We report on page 6 about some of the issues that they seem to be avoiding at the moment.

But you can make a real impact by writing to the people who will be making the decision, or to those who have real influence over it. There are many relevant issues set out on this page and on page 6 - you might choose to concentrate on some or all of them, or perhaps you have other concerns. WRITE TO

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IN THE VILLAGE 2 - AIRPORT SPECIAL.

WHAT'S ALL THE FUSS ABOUT?

So far we have heard about the protest but what are the real issues? And why should we be concerned about the re-routing of the flight path? The Quieter Skies group and PAIN have raised a number of concerns with the airport and received very few useful or even specific answers. Robert Houston takes up the story:

Proposed Western Extension to London Luton Airport Controlled Airspace

The Luton Airport Operating Company, LLAOC, have refused or failed to answer obvious questions that they must know will be asked by anyone affected by their proposal. Their Q & A Paper, which they claim answers the questions raised in the consultation process still does not address the key issues for residents of the affected parishes. The alleged consultation process has been rushed and superficial.

Any consideration of the new route must be given more time and wider publicity of the implications for all those likely to be affected. In this process quite specific questions must be answered; these are -

1. Safety

Is the current route unsafe, if not at what level does it become unsafe? There is no need for the change until safety is a real issue.

Is it about safety or is it really about expansion and cost saving for the operators?

How can it be prudent to expand an airport barely a mile away from a major city centre.

Have any Hazard and Operability studies been carried out?

2. Alternatives

No serious consideration appears to have been given to alternatives, which underlines the real purpose as expansion and cost saving.

Options to the north or a tighter turn over the current London Gliding Club are not mentioned. Why not?

3. Environmental

It is alleged that the new route gives a net environmental benefit because it allows CDA or Controlled Descent Approach. Clearly for the people of North Luton and Hertfordshire who currently receive the noise and pollution of the existing route there is a massive environmental gain. What is the gain for Leighton Linslade and the rural villages of the Vale of Aylesbury?

3.1 Noise. We have asked for an assessment of the noise impact and been fobbed off with an instantaneous decibel number in three spot locations. Why can't we have a contour map showing the entire noise footprint. Why was the footprint and the noise levels across the area not part of the consultation

process? But then is it a real consultation? Or are LLAOC just going through the motions?

3.2 Pollution. The area already has significant military, helicopter and light aircraft traffic, and a Heathrow outbound south/north routing at 6-8000 ft. There is also a new trial Stansted route east/west over Leighton Buzzard, and the trial Olney 1b. What is the impact of the proposal on air quality? LLAOC say they are not qualified to respond! Is that good enough for asthmatics?

4. Quality of Life

We appear to be at a crossing point for three of the regions airports, and the airports assume that growth in air traffic is their commercial right. LLAOC has just published its brief for further expansion to 10m passengers pa. We believe it has also identified what is needed to expand to 30 million ppa. Any new proposed route, or expansion should not be seen just as a small increment in a rural scene, but the start of the degradation of the way of life for a whole community.

Luton Airport contributes £1.4 per passenger to the economy of Luton but nothing to the region as a whole. Should Luton Councillors be taking decisions on a subject in which they have a material interest? Why should LLAOC, The CAA, The DETR, The Airport Consultative Committee determine our future way of life?

One of the most offhand LLAOC answers in the Q&A is that to the impact on property values. LLAOC say it is not qualified to answer. If they cannot answer the questions properly and face the real implications of their proposed actions then are they qualified to take those actions?

(In the unlikely event of rain, the show will be postponed)




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

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IN THE VILLAGE 5.

THE VILLAGE INTERVIEW

Phil Spooner caught up with Shirley Ford to ask about how she came to live in Aston Abbotts.

"I liked the village and I liked the people. They made me very welcome very quickly and John's family were super – they were lovely people," says Shirley Ford, remembering her first impression of Aston Abbotts over forty years ago.

Shirley was born and brought up in Aylesbury, along with her two sisters. "When I got to 16 I decided to do nursery nurse training. Then I was employed full-time by the Bucks Council.

"Soon after that I met John. John was born here in Aston Abbotts and lived here all his life. John used to come into the Court School of Dancing. At that time he was working on Pages Farm.

"I didn't really know about Aston Abbotts before I met John. I used to come out on the Sunday afternoon. I would have Sunday lunch at home with my parents, catch a bus out and pay 1s 6d (7½p) return. John would cycle down to the crossroads and meet me. I would spend the rest of the afternoon and have tea here with his mum and dad and his brother and his sisters."

These days, when it seems most young people reach for a mobile phone as soon as they lay down their rattle, the difficulty of keeping in touch when John was busy is not so obvious. "When John was harvesting we used to write to each other because neither of the parents had phones. Later I found out that he threw all my letters away, but I kept all of his. Typical man!"

After their marriage, Shirley and John moved into a cottage in Wingrave. Two and a half years later they moved back to Aston Abbotts. "At this time John was walking for Major Morton [at The Abbey]. Once I had the family I stopped working. We did in those days, once we had our children. You didn't expect to go out to work. That was your job then.

"My three children went to the village school. I was a school parent governor at the time when the decision was made [to close it]. We'd only got six children so there wasn't really any point in keeping it open, but I think that's been a big sadness to have lost the school."

Shirley has been a member of the Ladies Group since moving to the village. "My mother-in-law was a member and she said come along to the Ladies' Club with me. On-and-off I've been a member for about 35-40 years. I've been secretary, I've been vice-chairman and I have been chairman twice - I'm chairman at the moment. We average anything from about 15 to 25 [attendees], depending upon the time of the year, the speakers, and the subjects. We get a marvellous lot of subjects. We are of course all elderly generation, unfortunately. I would love to see some younger people come, I really would, but they do different things now.

"My mother-in-law was a Sunday School teacher in Aston Abbotts. She would organise the Sunday School outing to the seaside in the summer. She would book a coach and the village decamped and went out for the day. That was a real highlight of the year.

"John was a Parish Councillor for... I think... for about four or six years, which he liked. That meant that he was involved with the village, which he very much wanted to do.

The Church soon started to play an important part in Shirley's life. "My parents weren't Church minded at all but they used to send my sister and I off to a Sunday-school somewhere. They never set foot inside a Church but they felt we should go. When I first met my husband and came out here they were very strong churchgoers and I started going to Church with them. That's how I first got involved with the Church here."

John's sudden death of a heart attack in 1996 left Shirley shocked and devastated, but her family, friends and Christian Faith helped her. "The Church is very important to me, very much part of my life. Since John died I've moved on a lot where the Church is concerned... John was a churchwarden when he died... I carried on doing what he was doing. It was hard; it was lonely because I hadn't got him to talk to about it. But there were other good people who saw me through and helped me get through that first year or so. Yes the Church is very, very important to me.

"At that time the Church and the village were not getting on very well. It was always John's idea that the Church people should be much more involved with village events... and that's how I see my role as churchwarden. John and I had this idea that we could bridge the two communities and bring them together. I think that has worked to a great deal, because we may have few bottoms on seats but there is a lot a lot of goodwill towards the village Church. I think they realise how important the actual building is to the village for hatch, match and despatch."

John's Church activities left a special legacy for the children. "He was the Tower Master and he was in charge of bells and he taught all of my children to ring. They ring, and I hope eventually the grandchildren will. I had a go at it and it frightened me to death, but that was something they all shared together."

Involvement in the Aston Abbotts History Society allowed Shirley to exercise her passion for local history, just one of her many village activities. "I have a very busy life now - too busy at times. My children are saying to me 'Mum, come on you must do less'. I do a lot with my children and my grandchildren as we all live so close. I clean the church - I took that responsibility on when my mother in law died. For myself, I have moved on spiritually because last year I did a Pastoral Care course."

Shirley loves the village. "There are gorgeous views here. Beautiful views." How nice then, that the family's memorial to John is a seat on the Recreation Ground where anybody can sit and enjoy the view across the Vale while, nearby, the crows circle and caw over Fox Covert where John used to play Robin Hood as a boy.

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IN THE VILLAGE 6 - THE HALL

I'll NAME THAT HALL IN ONE!

Last month's leader article about the name of the hall in Aston Abbotts has, it's safe to say, drawn the largest mail (and e-mail) bag to date. And the report from the newly formed hall committee has also prompted a response from a concerned villager.

You may recall that it has been suggested that the former "Church Room" be re-named the Parish Hall once the lease is transferred to AAPC. The overwhelming majority of those who have contacted **THE CHRONICLE** verbally and in writing share this view.

"Dear Editor, yes I believe the Church Room should be called the Village Hall." Sally Turnham

"Dear Ed, It was nice to learn from last month's **CHRONICLE** that the lease of 'our hall' is now in the safe keeping of the Parish Council. I do not agree however that it should be called the 'Parish Hall' when the 'Village Hall' is far more apt. Of course, this is only one view but it is based on the premise that it is village folk who are raising the money to facilitate the much needed improvements and will be no doubt be asked to support it's subsequent maintenance. Also, it will be used mainly by village people and organisations.

We are fortunate to live in a village with a strong sense of identity and I feel this should be reflected in the naming of the one building which is available to all."

The new committee appears to have been formed and none of the present Church Room committee were informed or invited to the meeting, not even the Vicar was invited, who is in charge. The lease has still not been applied for transfer so no

action can be taken until that document is signed and sealed, which may take some considerable time.

Lastly, I am not sure whether the name can legally be changed, the deeds state it is a Church Room so I think a lot of sorting out needs to be done before anything else, so hope the committee take note."

Hopefully I will be able to update the position next month, when I believe the committee will have met again and had a chance to consider the issues. In the meantime, I will be pleased to hear from YOU about what you think - is the name important to you and if so, which name do you prefer.





BYPASS NIGHTMARE???

Last month I hinted at developments with plans for the (much needed) Wing bypass. This road has been on/off for many years but if recent reports are to be believed, matters may now be progressing. Bucks County Council has, rather grandly, announced that the bypass has official status as the next major road scheme to be built in Bucks. Um, after the Linslade and Stoke Hammond bypass, that is.

Mini Motorway

But it doesn't stop there. There's now talk of extending the bypass to join up with the Linslade one to the North and to connect with a new road South of Aylesbury (presumably the extension of the A41 dual carriageway around Aston Clinton). This would include by-passing Rowsham and Bierton, and create a wonderfully quick route from South of Aylesbury all the way to MK. A sort of mini-motorway. Great news for lorry drivers; terrific news for inter-city commuters; express coaches will be pleased; and no doubt the Little Chef will be delighted (subject of course to planning permission...). And with the network of local Motorways becoming increasingly congested, the A41(M) and A418(M) [could it happen?] might provide a scenic alternative to the M25 / M1, the M40 / M42 and create a neat through-link for South West -North East journeys.

Wave Bye Bye to the Aston Abbotts Rat Run
Perhaps I am exaggerating somewhat to make my point, perhaps
not. But the reality of improved roads is inevitably an increase in
road usage. Still it will take traffic out of the villages concerned
(and being charitable folk, that is pleasing), and perhaps with
such a super quick route cars will stop using Aston Abbotts as
the A418 bypass. Perhaps.

A Villager writes Dear Editor,

I rather share the alarm expressed in last month's Chronicle by the Wembles; not so much because a beacon might be sited in the vicinity of Aston Abbotts but because of the nature of the chemicals which may be employed. Furthermore, it is my view the Senior P.O.O.F. they spoke to is either ill informed or is deliberately issuing mis-information since enquiries with the civil Aviation Authority (CAA.) in High Holborn have confirmed my not inconsiderable aviation experience, that photo luminescence (PL.) whilst constituting a useful navigation aid, is not quite so easily installed.

It is very true that coloured dyes and smokes have been used to great effect in locating crashed pilots from the air. Equally, on a bright summers day the livid orange/khaki colour of sewerage farms stands out well against the green of surrounding fields providing excellent navigation aids. The use of PL, will of course enhance this at night but villagers need to be aware of it's disadvantages.

PL. dye is a photo chemical process and to provide the requisite level of light needs to operate at a consistent temperature of 110 degrees F. On anything but the hottest of days therefore, all sewerage will need to be heated. Not in itself a major problem but on windless days (particularly during the

And the route for the new Wing - Rowsham bypass? Across the miles of sparsely populated fields to the south east of the A418? Not if early reports are anything to go by. During previous attempts at planning the bypass, numerous routes have been proposed - either to the south or north of Wing. It now seems that any route to the south has been discounted and that the current favourite is the "Outer Northern" Route.

The original Outer Northern Route proposed begins at the Wingrave Crossroads, turning north across the fields on the edge of the village (behind The Oak and The Bull) before continuing north of Wing and Burcott. A new road cutting across at least 4 of the village farms. If you would like to know what this will do for noise pollution, go to Wendover and stand ½ a mile from the bypass (assuming they only build a single-carriageway road).

True, these are only summations based on previous plans, a little conjecture and a few comments from BCC and our local councillor Mr Peter Cooper, who is reported in the Bucks Herald as saying that he was "pleased to hear what was likely". Any route would be subject to full public consultation (though probably not enquiry) with all plans and maps displayed in Wing Village Hall (though not in our own Hall), probably later this year. Road building might not start until 2005/6.

Whether your views are "march of progress" or "blot on the landscape", there are serious implications for the village. AAPC will no doubt be informed of developments and dates for any consultation, and we in turn will publish these in THE CHRONICLE. It is early days yet but we must play an active part in the planning process to ensure that the best interests of our village are also taken into account.

cooler evenings) this process will inevitably lead to great clouds of murky fog developing, thus preventing pilots from seeing the light emitting effluent. To cure this, huge fans will have to be employed to blow noxious vapours away from the area. The problem then is that since the gasses involved are highly flammable, no naked lights will be permitted within a 2000 metre radius resulting in no smoking, bonfires or open fires in or around Aston Abbotts. Of course, although the 'green glow given off at night will as Jill & Mike point out provide a colourful backdrop to evening activities in the garden (and may even enable some street lights to be switched off) the fire risk, smell and noise from the fans will be such as to discourage all such events.

Finally, I have to say I felt it a little unfair to expect our over-worked editor to investigate this further, when surely from a constitutional point of view, local sewerage is something our Parish Council should be deeply involved in!!!

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CHALLENGERS AGAIN....

Way back in 1946 / 47 a Youth Club was started in Hayes (Kent). I had spent my childhood on a great Uncle and Aunt's farm in Northamptonshire but returned to my parents when I was 11 to start a new school. The club was the idea of the curate Peter Tadman and a local man Claude Pierce, and with the full support of the Rector the Reverend Eric Smith we were called the Challengers YC. We used to meet on Thursday evenings in the Old Church School where as far as I can remember we chatted over coffee and soft drinks, had dancing lessons and played endless table tennis etc. On Saturdays we played tennis and the boys squash.

Being a church Youth Club several members were in the Choir and a lot of us were bell ringers both for morning service and evensong, which most of us used to attend and after which we would go for a walk over Hayes Common. We were a very competitive club entering all sorts of competitions - swimming, tennis, table tennis and athletics, all of which we did very well in. Every Bank Holiday we would go somewhere by bus or coach and then for a long walk. We also did a lot of cycling and used to go to summer camps.

All of this ended for me when I left Hayes in 1958 to go to Agricultural College. After some years I got in touch with my old school friend June and for the last 20 years we have met in London twice a year together with a couple of other friends. About fifteen months ago I was contacted by a member to say a Millennium reunion was being planned for a weekend in Eastbourne on 6th May 2000, for Challengers and their partners. The Sussex Room in the Cavendish Hotel was booked and a guest list was sent. On the day, Tony and I drove down to Eastbourne having returned from the Lake District the day before.

It was a really hot day and we spent the afternoon on the beach before getting ready and assembling at 7.00pm. There were over a hundred people there and we picked our name badges up. The moment had arrived - I hadn't seen anyone, apart from the two or three I have mentioned, for 50 years but after a couple of minutes recognition came; we might all be 50 years older but voices and mannerisms don't change.

As I said, it was a church YC and quite a few boys went into the Ministry. The first I recognised was John Boyce, now a retired vicar. He lived just along the road from us and our mothers met once a week so we shared a playpen. John Pierce, son of the man who started the club is now a vicar in Central London. Drummond (Tiddles) Randall said he remembered tying me by my plaits to the park railings! Geoff, who all of us girls used to swoon over, and his wife Pat who went to the same school as I did. Keith who used to meet me off the train from school and carry my violin case for me. Dear Michael Walker, another retired vicar who doesn't have very good health now but was determined to attend with his wife.

The Reverend Peter Knott now Bishop of Norwich, lived just around the corner from us, couldn't come as he had other commitments but sent a letter saying he remembered the Challengers with great affection and especially Margaret who he regarded as his first girl friend when he was fifteen. There was Denise. Valerie... Mary... and as you chatted to them all the years rolled back and you remembered them as teenagers, and the great times we had. After preliminary drinks we sat down to a

superb four course meal. We were at round tables of ten in groups of our era. After the meal the organiser gave a brief summary and recollection of the Club and there were several toasts.

We met next morning for breakfast, some had planned a walk over The Downs to the Seven Sisters but regrettably we decided to make our way home as we had already been away that week. Will we all meet again, I wonder? But what a night to remember, I wouldn't have missed it for the World.

The first surprise was the amount of Religious broadcasting that took place. The TV in the hotel room (which I am sure did have not the most comprehensive selection) managed about an hour of "chanting" on each of three evenings on one channel, whilst another channel had a Bible "feature" film (in English with Greek subtitles).

The hotel arranged a walk to see the local Good Friday Procession – but somehow the time was wrong – because we missed it!

- To approve minutes of meeting held Wednesday 5th April and matters arising - there were no matters arising.
- County Council and District Council matters
 Cllr Jennings gave an update on the Luton Airport consultative committee. Cllr Jennings was asked by the council to speak to the highways department on our behalf regarding the poor state of repair of our local roads.

Planning

Appeal by Ms Barlow & Mr Greenaway of 1, Nash's Farm against the council's decision to refuse planning permission for the erection of a trellis on the existing fence (retrospective)

The P.C. wholeheartedly supports this appeal.

Highways

Road sign on The Green has not been repaired. Resolved, continue to try to get it refurbished rather than replaced by a modern one. Moat Lane - concern was expressed at the increasing speed of traffic, lack of visibility and danger to pedestrians. Resolved to ask highways to cut the verges, and renew our efforts to have the 30mph limit moved further out.

Verges on the A418 - rubbish left by hedge cutters is still littering the verge. Cllr Jennings will pursue the matter on our behalf.

Size of the Parish Council

The Clerk reported that AVDC has no objection to an increase in the size of the PC from 5 to 7. However, we would have to hold an election at an estimated cost of £800. Resolved to wait until the next national election in 2003.

Tug-of-war Rope

Resolved to accept the quotation from the rope makers at Hawes and order a rope for the village. We will also investigate whether a grant may be available.

· Recreation Ground

The Fete Committee have asked the P.C. whether it would be possible to use the Rec. as a car park on Fete day. After lengthy discussion it was resolved not to grant permission. Two reasons were given; firstly that vehicles would have to cross the access to the children's playground, and secondly that the Rec. would become churned up if the weather was wet. The safety work being carried out on the playground should be completed soon. Goal posts and nets have been delivered. Sand and cement now need to be bought. Resolved to have the strimmer serviced.

Reports

Post box. Concern was expressed that motorists drive onto the pavement to use the box. There is nothing we can do except inform the Police. Request for new mower - will be put on the agenda for the next meeting. Police Liaison Group report from Cllr Manning - apparently Aston Abbotts is perfect, with no crime recorded between January and March this year. A letter of thanks will be sent to Peter Knight for continuing to mow The Green. AVDC's Visual Archive - Gordon Smith was commended for preparing a page about the village for this millennium publication.

If you do this it gives them full access to your telephone line allowing them to make LONG DISTANCE, INTERNATIONAL and CHAT LINE calls billed to your account. DO NOT PRESS 90# for anyone.

Please pass on this information to family and friends.


On a general note, it's worth reminding everybody that there are many bogus callers about - even teenagers and children may use the following types of excuse to get into your home.




