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

New Streetlight? (an update)

ou may remember reading in October's Chronicle that the Parish Council is considering whether to install a new streetlight outside the entrance to The Abbey, to illuminate The Green better during the winter months.

Official quotes have now been obtained, and the cost to the village would be around £900. This represents an increase of 20% on the village precept (part of your council tax!), and would be in addition to any increase the Parish Council needs to impose to cover its day to day expenses.

Much lively debate has already taken place on this issue, with views both in favour and against the idea being aired. As the expense involved is quite high the P.C. has asked me to seek your views once again on the issue - so PLEASE contact me, either by phone (681137), in writing (2, Norduck Cottages, Moat Lane) or by attending the next Parish Council meeting (December 5th). What you think really matters!

Unofficial minutes from the meeting held on 24th October 2001

The meeting was chaired by Cllr Tom Manning. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and signed as a true record.

Matters Arising

Repairs to bus shelter – we have been advised that repairs are not currently necessary.

The letter of complaint to Royal Mail has been acknowledged. The overflowing sewer at 83, The Green is still being monitored.

Comments From The Floor

The manhole cover outside the Royal Oak has still not been repaired (it has now!)

County Council And District Council Matters

District Cllr. Peter Cooper told the meeting that the travellers who have been occupying the lay-by at Rowsham have now departed, leaving behind quantities of rubbish and abandoned vehicles. The gap has been closed and a "clean-up" team will clear the mess. Peter Cooper has tabled a question to AVDC concerning cost, and how further encroachments can be avoided.

Wingrave Park is now fully operational, and residents of Aston Abbotts can book the facilities if they wish.

Planning

Home Farm – revised plans. Mr. A. Cole of Cole Flatt, the developer, was present to answer questions about the amended plans, and after some discussion it was resolved to make no further comment. Gordon Smith thanked the P.C., on behalf of the residents of Church Row, for its support regarding retention of the orchard wall and other planning issues on the site.

3, Ross Road – Conversion of existing outbuildings to family room and shower room and erection of replacement garage. After discussion the Council had no comment to make on this application.

Highways

Proposed new streetlights – quotations have been obtained for the light outside The Abbey, amounting to around £900. Much lively discussion took place on the subject, with representations both for and against the installation of a new light. It was decided to put another article in The Chronicle before making a

final decision. It was resolved not to proceed with putting a light in Wingrave Road at present.

Broken fingerpost on The Green – a quote has been obtained for the arm.

The Clerk agreed to try once more to have Lines Hill added to the "gritting list" for this winter.

It was noted that the repair to the road outside nos. 7 and 9 The Green has been ineffectual as water is still collecting at that spot.

Recreation Ground

Safety check – It was reported that the small goal is unsafe. It should not be used until repairs have been carried out.

The purchase of new nets was agreed, and Cllr. Cooper suggested we might be able to secure a grant from AVDC for this purpose.

The climbing frame has been inspected and deemed safe to use, so it was resolved not to replace it at present.

The bus shelter in Wingrave Road has been vandalised. Its window is broken.

Will there be a grant available to us from AVDC to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee?

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



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The Firework Code—Police Advice



POLICE
Make sure that you remember this years' bonfire night for all the right reasons and not because you and your family have been injured and have spent the night at the local hospital.

The Firework Code

This code is to ensure that you have a safe and enjoyable bonfire night.

- 1. Keep the fireworks in a closed metal box take them out one at a time and put the top back on at once. When the box is open, keep it well away from fires and cigarettes.
- 2. Follow the instructions on each firework carefully. Read them by torchlight, never by a naked flame.
- 3. Light the tip of the firework fuse at arms length, preferably with a safety firework lighter or fuse wick.
- 4. Once lit, stand well back.

- 5. Never return to a firework once lit, it may go off in your face.
- 6. Never throw fireworks.
- 7. Never put fireworks in your pocket.
- 8. Keep all pets indoors, warm and safe.
- 9. Never fool with fireworks.

The safest way to enjoy fireworks is to go to a properly organised display.

Finally, it is an offence throw fireworks in the street or in a public place, and it is an offence to buy fireworks unless you are 16, plus it is an offence to sell fireworks to anyone under 16.

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
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How To Sing The Blues

It's that time of year when Maestro Neil Chesher is looking to pressgang villagers into joining the cast of the Christmas Cabaret. Neil is always looking for singers, so in another of our series of 'How to do it' articles the Chronicle is pleased to bring you this guide on How To Sing The Blues.

Getting Started

Most blues begin with you waking up this morning. After that, it is permissible to pass comment on your woman. "I got a good woman" is a bad way to begin the blues. If you got a good woman why the hell you singing the blues? The only way around this is to stick something nasty in the next line. For instance: "I got a good woman / With the meanest face in town / Got teeth like Margaret Thatcher / And she weigh 500 pound." Then you repeat it. We don't know why. You just do.

Getting Around

The first thing to remember about the blues is they not about choice. Your car stuck in a ditch today, your car stuck in a ditch tomorrow - ain't no way out. Chevys, cadillacs and broken down trucks are the blues. Volvo estates, Ford Mondeos and anything made in Japan are not. When John Lee Hooker wrote Cool Little Car he sure weren't thinking of no damn Nissan Sunny. Walkin' plays a major part in blues. As does fixin' to die and meeting the devil at the crossroads. Getting stuck in a 5 hour traffic jam on the M5 is not the blues. Just unfortunate.

Locations

Blues can take place in New York City, but not in Hawaii or anywhere in Canada. Hard times in Oklahoma is plain depressing, but hard times in Chicago, St Louis or Kansas City is the blues. Losing all your American Express travellers cheques on vacation in Acapulco is just a pain in the butt. You cannot have the blues any place that don't get rain. Good places for the blues: highway, jailhouse, empty bed, bottom of whisky glass.

Who Can Sing The Blues?

Teenagers and schoolchildren cannot sing the blues. They ain't fixin' to die yet. Blues is for adults and adulthood means being old enough to get the chair if you shoot a man in Memphis. Blues is not a colour thing. Tiger Woods cannot sing the blues. Colin Montgomerie probably could. A man with male pattern baldness ain't the blues. A woman with male pattern baldness is. Breaking your leg while skiing in Val d'Isere is not the blues. Losing your leg to an alligator in a Louisiana swamp is. You cannot wear a suit and sing the blues unless you happen to be an 80 year old ethnic person and you slept in it. Also, no matter how tragic your life, if you own a laptop computer you cannot sing the blues. Maybe your big ol' mean woman done sit down on it. We don't care. You ain't going nowhere with blues like that.

Do You Have The Right To Sing The Blues?

Yes, if: you're older than dirt / you're blind / you shot a man in Memphis / you can't be satisfied. No, if: you have all your own teeth / you were once blind but now can see / it turned out to be a flesh wound / you have a retirement plan, company pension or trust fund.

Lifestyle

If you asked for water and baby done give you gasoline, it's the blues. Other acceptable beverages are: Thunderbird wine, whisky or bourbon, muddy water, black coffee. On no account ask for gin and tonic, a Bacardi Breezer, Snapple, Tokay-Pinot Gris Grand Cru furstentum 1998 or camomile tea.

Fixin' To Die

If it occurs in a cheap motel or a shotgun shack, it's a blues death. Stabbed in the back by a jealous lover is another blues way to die. So is the chair, substance abuse, or lonely on a broken down cot. A heart attack playing squash, bizarre liposuction mishaps or being electrocuted while strimming the lawn is not the blues.

Your Name

Some blues names for women: Sadie, Bessie, Big Mama, Fat River Dumpling. Some blues names for men: Willie, Big Willie, Little Willie, Blind Willie. Persons with names like Sierra, Sequoia, Auburn, Rainbow and Kevin cannot sing the blues, even if they take a machine gun to the men of Memphis.

Make Your Own Blues Name

A. Take name of physical infirmity (Blind, Leadbelly, Lame etc), size of person (Big, Little, Tall, Shorty) or special ability (Howlin', Screamin', Mumblin'). B. Add first name (as above) or name of fruit (Lemon, Lime) C. add the last name of president (Jefferson, Johnson, Washington etc.)

Important note: This system is not entirely foolproof as, while Blind Lemon Jefferson is considered a perfect name for a bluesman, Big Strawberry Bush, whilst using the same procedure, sounds somewhat unsavoury and is very likely to get you banned in exactly the sort of states that that would appreciate your music best.

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Florence Nightingale House

Aylesbury's Florence Nightingale House Hospice was built in the 1980s after a public appeal raised more than £500,000. It was handed over to the Health Authority for the benefit of the local population and is now managed by they Vale of Aylesbury Primary Care Trust.

Its care services are available to people throughout the Vale of Aylesbury and the surrounding areas. These services include a Day Hospice, In-patient beds, Lymphoedema, Community Specialist nurses and carers, The Children's Hospice Home Care Respite Team, Hospital Macmillan nurses, a Bereavement service and a Volunteer service.

Although most patients have cancer, they also care for people with conditions such as motor neurone disease, HIV and AIDS.

A third Hospice shop, in Winslow, has just been opened and this complements the two original shops in Aylesbury and Wendover. Volunteers are always needed for the shops - please ring on 01296 622311 if you would like to help.

The fund-raising team have to raise £309,000 each year to support the work of the hospice. In addition to the shops, the hospice run a number of events and appeals throughout the year. They also sell cards at Christmas. Details of the Christmas cards and the organised events (which include trips on the Orient Express, coach trips to London, bingo evenings, and a trip to the bulb fields of Amsterdam next spring) can be found on the notice board in Bernard Osborn's shop. Alternatively, you can contact the hospice on the address below.

At the moment they are specifically recruiting volunteers to work in peoples' homes, and people under the age of 68 for our transport service. For more details please ring Carolyn Naish at the hospice.

There is an old saying that when you point the finger at another, you point three fingers at yourself. We are all to some extent guilty for the problems of our world. The question is, have we the will to face up to the evil in our world and in our own lives? Rooting out the evil will be a painful process — but Jesus died to show us that it can be achieved.

Wingrave On The Web!

Ver the last six months, two teams of Wingrave school parents have been working on projects to research and construct web sites on the history of the village. These projects have been funded by the Millennium Commission and have been managed by the Open University and the Milton Keynes Living Archive.

The two web sites are called "Wingrave School Days" and "Wingrave Celebrations" and can be found on the web at http://clutch.open.ac.uk/schools/wingrave_school01 and http://clutch.open.ac.uk/schools/wingrave_cele01. The School Days website looks at school life in Wingrave since the 1850's "through the eyes of a child" and contains a wide range of written material, photographs and extracts from tape recorded interviews with past pupils. The Celebrations website concentrates on customs and celebrations that surround the Church's Patronal Festival on June 29th, and how they have changed over the years. This, too, contains extracts from tape recorded interviews, and a video clip of distributing hay in the Church.

Both of the web sites have drawn extensively on the memories and recollections of Wingrave residents, and the teams are grateful to Margaret Morley, Prue Goodwin, Joyce Whipps, Michael Tunnicliffe, Pat Roberts and many other Wingrave people for their help and encouragement during the course of the projects. We would also like to thank the staff at Wingrave School, who acted as "mentors" for the projects.

The two teams hope that Aston Abbotts residents will enjoy browsing the websites and finding out more about the history of the village; we are also aware that many people do not have access to the internet, and we are currently thinking about how best to share our work with "non web" people in Wingrave and surrounding villages- watch this space!

We are very pleased that the Open University has now agreed to a "permanent loan" of the computer equipment which we have been using. This loan will enable us to continue our work, and to combine forces with the Wingrave Archive Group and with Wingrave School to ensure that the social history of the village will be well documented for future generations.
