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#### **Restaurant Review—Riviera**

e had a thoroughly enjoyable time at the Riviera
Restaurant (formerly known as the Boathouse, now under
new management) by the lake at Watermead one evening in
January. The location is lovely with the lights of Watermead
glittering across and reflected in the lake - possibly the most
attractive way of seeing Watermead. To find it turn left
towards the ski slope before you reach the lake, leave your car
in the ample parking area and walk across a foot bridge.

The decor is very pleasing - simple, modern and unfussy with a few focal points such as paintings and a bubble machine. The new owner is Iranian, although he has lived in Aylesbury for many years, so some of the dishes on the menu reflect an Eastern Mediterranean or North African influence, such as humous. For those with less adventurous palates there are plenty of options of a more European nature. As we were a party of eight, we sampled between us quite a wide selection of what was on offer and nobody had anything but praise for what they had eaten.

Prices were reasonable, the wine list more than adequate and the service pleasant and efficient but not rushed. All in all, we can only recommend that you try it for yourselves - we considered it worth a good four Abbotts (out of a possible five)!

#### **Recipe—Celery Soup**

Margaret Kent has sent us a recipe that I can certainly vouch for, as I've eaten and thoroughly enjoyed it - and I'm not keen on celery! ~ Ed

#### Ingredients

1½ oz butter

1 Head of celery, finely chopped

1 onion, peeled and finely chopped

1 rasher bacon (streaky), chopped

1 oz flour

1 pint of chicken stock

½ pint of milk

Pinch of caster sugar

Salt and black pepper

Pinch of grated nutmeg

5 tablespoons of single cream

#### Method

Melt butter in a large saucepan and lightly cook the celery, onion and bacon until softened but not brown. Stir in the flour and cook for one minute. Stir in the stock, bring to the boil and simmer for 15 minutes. Puree in a processor or blender and pour into a clean saucepan. Heat thoroughly, stirring in 4 tablespoons of cream, but do not allow to boil, Serve with the remaining cream and garnish with a little grated cheese.

If you are going to freeze it, do not add the cream to the basic recipe until you are ready to use it.

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
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#### Further Tails from Portugal.....

#### Police Advice ~ Who's At The Door?



THAMES VALLEY Always answer every call. Doors are never too thick to talk through - call out through the letter box.

Have a chain fitted to your front door. Make sure it is in position before you open the door. It is a good idea to have a light fitted outside the front door, so that you can see the callers at night.

Door chains are available which can be morticed into the door - making the fitting as strong as the door itself. These are automatic in operation - you don't have to remember to put them on - and are released at a press of a switch. Operation of this type of chain has considerable advantages for the elderly or very young, who may have difficulty with conventional fittings. Don't leave the door chain on all the time.

A door viewer is useful, because you can see who is outside without opening the door. If you have one fitted, make sure that it is at a height that is convenient for you.

#### **Bogus callers**

Think before you open the door. Put the chain on.

- 1. Check to see who they are use the door viewer.
- 2. Ask if you don't know them "Who are you? What do you want?"
- 3. Ask to see their identity card Check carefully. Keep the chain on.

- Note the name, company and telephone number. If you are unsure request the caller to return.
- 5. Check them out by phoning their company. Arrange for a friend or relative to be present when they return.

In the last few months a number of garages have been broken into, in the surrounding villages, so make sure windows are fitted with locks. Garage doors should be lockable or secured by padlocks. Where integral doors are used for entry from the garage into the house, a simple method of security for up and over doors is to drill a hole in the top channel above the wheels and insert a padlock into the hole. This prevents the wheel moving above the padlock so keeping the door closed during forced entry. If there is no internal door from the garage to the house then the up and over doors can be secured by an outer bracket and floor eyelet welded or bolted to the bottom of the door and secured by a padlock inserted into the floor eyelet.

#### Photos needed for new bus pass

This year we are introducing a life long bus pass. Once you have this pass you will not need to renew it again unless the rules for the scheme change or you lose or damage it in some way.

To obtain your new bus pass you MUST bring along two RECENT passport sized photos in black and white or colour. You must still also bring with you identification that confirms that you are eligible for the

scheme e.g. a state retirement pension book, birth certificate, disability certificate.

The rules for whether you are entitled to a bus pass have not changed — men over 65 and women over 60 and disabled people can obtain the free bus pass.

The bus passes, rail cards and taxi tokens will be on sale from Monday 4 March.

In Aylesbury, there are several booths from where you can obtain passport sized photos:



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#### **Rectors Report**

There are some organisations that seem to work in theory, but they are less satisfactory when it comes to putting the theory into practice.

In theory it is a good idea to completely renew the membership list of the Church every six years. But, of course we must not call it a 'membership list'. It is the Church Electoral Roll. Because there are those who can become members who need not be on the Church Electoral Roll, and others who are on the Roll but who do not count themselves as members. The complete renewal of the Roll does give us the opportunity to make sure that the names of those who have moved away or died have been removed, and that we have not missed those who really should be included.

The question is always asked: "Does the number on the Church Electoral Roll make a difference to the amount we have to pay to the Diocese?" The answer to that is both "yes" and "no". For the money that we pay to the Diocese is now a contribution towards the cost of the Clergy. That cost has to include training, housing and pension as well as a "stipend".

Even though the Church of England derives income from its land and investments, that income is now far short of the amount needed to fund the cost of the clergy at today's level.

So, as well as renewing its membership list, the Church of England is also currently consulting about how much the clergy should receive (and should this be on the basis of being "payment for the exercise of office" rather than a "maintenance allowance"), and whether the pension scheme should change from being notionally "final salary" to "money purchase".

One way of looking at being on the Church Electoral Roll is that you are prepared to help pay for the services of the fulltime clergy. We are extremely fortunate here in that we also have the services of clergy for whom we are not required to

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pay. But the Church Electoral Roll is also the qualification for membership of the Parochial Church Council, and for the election of those who represent the parish on the Deanery Synod. Those on the Deanery Synod elect their representatives to the Diocesan Synod and ultimately to the General Synod.

That is how it works in theory! It is all up to (or down to) you!

#### From Mark Berry - Deanery Youth Worker

It is, finally, good to be living here amongst you all in this lovely part of the country. Louisa and I have received a warm welcome from both churches and the local community and we would like thank you all, especially those who were able to attend/contribute to the commissioning service.

We arrived in the Deanery some three weeks ago from Reading where I worked as Bradfield Deanery Youth Work Facilitator. All the way through the process I have been struck by the humility and genuine desire to see young people come to know and develop in their faith in Jesus. It is this challenge that brings us here and the enthusiasm from church, clergy and the young people to really address it in a radical and exciting way and not just to fiddle around the edges.

It is widely recognised, by Church and secular observers that the culture in which we, and in particular young people live is one where spirituality is seen as something to be searched for, however, on the whole the Church is the last place deemed to be worth looking! This is a source of great sadness to me, but has also brought about a desire to see young people leading us forward to make real contact with the needs of those outside the Church. Ideas such as Spiritual journey and pilgrimage have become common both in those seeking to see the church grow and in the wider community. These terms speak of process, discovery and creativity, it is unreal to expect or even desire instant conformity, culturally or theologically. Bishop Mike Hill once said, that we are often tempted to plant church structures and invite people to join, instead of planting the Gospel and nurturing the church that emerges. In some ways this is a definition of 'emerging church', church that grows, and continues to grow from the real situation of the people, community. I see the role of leadership within this model of church as friend, fellow pilgrim, and mentor. My desire, both in my relationship with the churches and in the development of a 'Youth Congregation' is to be alongside you and the young people in this way.

Already in the short time I have been here, it has been possible to develop strong contacts and opportunities in the Churches, with the GROW Youth Group and it's leaders, in Cottesloe School, with Local Authority Youth Workers and the wider community. I am extremely excited about the future of this project; we have some very gifted young people who are going to make a significant contribution to our Church, Deanery and to the Kingdom of God.

I ask for your prayers for them and for all that God would have

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


