



In The Village

ed. 15th May; and lots of rather smelly water was discovered pouring out of sewerage manholes in the road outside 'The Oak'; a pretty good indication that the village drainage system was again in some distress. Sure enough, it wasn't too long before AVDC had sent several tankers to pump out the drains. Pumping continued for several days before the men with clipboards (a sure sign that things are pretty serious) decided there was a blockage somewhere under between the 'Bull' and the Green. Temporary relief by pumping sewerage to drains around the Green was attempted but rather sabotaged by 'youngsters' deciding it was a good idea to puncture the pipes. creating lots of 'mini fountains'. Not very clever at all since the resulting mess was a very real health hazard to all of us.

The men with clipboards eventually concluded the problem was in the region of Ross Road. Heavy machinery arrived, traffic lights, diversions and all the paraphernalia associated with this sort of operation appeared. A huge hole was dug to get to the main drainage pipe some twenty feet below the road. Due to the hazard caused by 'running sand' under the village, the sides of the hole were 'shored' with hydraulic supports to prevent collapse. Great care was required by the digger operator; particularly whilst men were in the hole repairing the pipe and just watching for a few minutes made you realise just how skilful the driver was.

Considerable disruption was caused for best part of a week due to the limitations on parking and access; not to mention the continued 'thrum' of pumps running through the night. However, looking on the 'bright side', in addition to getting our drains back in working order the entire episode provided much interest and at times not a little amusement for the 'last of the summer wine' chaps living around the Green!

Apparently, in an attempt to prevent running sand etc. reentering and blocking the sewer, a 'sheath' has now been placed under the pipe which in turn has been surrounded with large ballast stones. The theory is that accumulated water will now flow down the outside of the pipe rather than entering it. However, I remain to be convinced that this will be the end of 'sewer pipe' problems in Aston Abbotts.

At the time of writing, the only evidence left to bear witness to all this 'drama' is a few square yards of new tarmac and a rather lonely and apparently abandoned portable toilet on the Green. Oh well!! It might come in handy for the fete or come to think of it, should our drains fail again.

Post script!!

Second week in June and they're back, pumping out sewerage blocked by more sand in the pipe. This time, a mini television has been passed through the drain and the resulting video and engineers report passed to 'senior management'. Apparently, it is quite likely a continuous 'liner' will be fitted inside our existing drain in an attempt to achieve a long term solution. We shall see!!

Schools Promotions Update

nce again I would like to thank all those villagers who helped Wingrave School by collecting tokens and vouchers for the various schemes. Here's how we did:

Walkers: 4,500 tokens collected—an order for 26 books was placed.

Nestle: 270 tokens collected—£27 received and put towards a tape recorder for each classroom. Tokens for next year's scheme have already started to appear on some cereal boxes, so please remember to start saving.

Sainsburys: 192 points earned this year—900 points (including those previously banked) spent on a sea 'n' land set and a stethoscope for the first school.

Tesco: 19,019 vouchers collected—12,290 spent on two items of Maths software, leaving 7,495 banked (including previously banked vouchers) for use next year when the new IT suite currently being worked on is complete.

Bucks Herald: Sponsored by Wingrave Stores, £100 of WH Smith vouchers has been received as a result of collecting the required 500 Bucks Herald tokens. The results of the second computer competition are still awaited.

Open Gardens

t was one of my favourite days in the village events calendar - open gardens day—and another chance to indulge my obsession for all things horticultural. So, with elderly mother in tow, we set off for The Abbey.

The neatly laid out formal gardens were full of herbaceous perennials, a kaleidoscope of colour, the spires of vivid blue delphiniums were particularly eye-catching. The air was heavy with the scent of roses and orange blossom. We made our way through the rest of the gardens, towards the lake where we spent a few tranquil minutes in quiet contemplation. There are many large trees, including the majestic Redwoods, and others we could not name. The old greenhouses, packed with gorgeous blooms are always of great interest and an abundance of fruit and vegetables grow in large neat plots nearby. It was hard to tear ourselves away, but the Vicarage beckoned.

These gardens were a perfect combination of informal and formal. The neatly tended, jam packed borders of shrubs and perennials being closer to the house, whilst the more natural garden, including a wild meadow and avenue of trees leading to a large pond, were away from the house. The Ha Ha added interest and provided a wall to sit on! This beautifully balanced garden was one of my favourites.

They say small is beautiful, this is certainly true of no. 67 The Green, where John and Jean have made their modestly-sized garden appear much larger. The front garden was packed with plants including an impressive Caper Spurge, which was given to Jean as a mole deterrent! (The moles did go but who knows if it was because of the Spurge.) The well designed and beautifully laid out rear garden was filled with a comprehensive selection of shrubs and plants, pots and containers.

On to the Old House. I always enjoy this one, and it did not disappoint. All the beds and borders were well stocked neat and weed free. There is a wonderful old Wisteria and many lovely roses. And 'Oh' for a swing under such a huge Horse Chestnut tree! But we must move on now to no 11 The Green.

As usual we thoroughly enjoyed exploring this treasure trove of a garden. There are plants here too numerous to mention, even if I could pronounce them! Amongst the familiar favourites are many unusual specimens and Vic and Christine will be able to give you each and every one's full botanical name. Their knowledge and sheer enthusiasm knows no bounds. There are many fruit trees and rows of thriving vegetables. The pond area is green and tranquil, planted with ferns, hostas, grasses and iris. Several comfy garden seats are hidden in nooks and crannies, where you can sit and reflect upon this lovely garden.

There is a cobbled herb garden and delightful 'cottage garden' area to the front of the house. The rear borders are stuffed with perennials and shrubs. Many types of geraniums, spurges, iris, foxglove, roses, peonys and sedums to name but a few. There are many trees including a Eucalyptus. Another lovely garden, but we must press on.

Number 6 Wingrave Rd—the garden of Richard and Jane Plested, though I believe it is Richards 'baby'. He was seen flitting in and out of most of the 'competitors' gardens, his energy and enthusiasm seem boundless! This garden is also evolving. 

Jubilee Picnic



OK! So it wasn't actually raining but equally, it was certainly not the best of weather for a picnic. However, despite the rather 'draughty' conditions, shortly after 2.00, and showing not a little 'Dunkirk spirit', about fifty people eventually 'turned up'. There followed several interesting and often very funny scenes as people struggled against the wind to erect shelters of all shapes and sizes. Soon the 'rec.' resembled a campsite with gazebos, tents, golfing 'brollies' pressed into use; in fact anything capable of providing even the smallest shelter from the wind. Dave Lewis, as resourceful as ever managed to get his hands on a van with sufficient battery power and equipment to run a powerful 'sound system' on which he entertained picnickers and lifted their spirits with 'period' songs and music.



Matters Arising From The Minutes Not On The Agenda

Cllr Manning reported that the Litterblitz had to be abandoned because AVDC were unable to supply sufficient equipment.

It was noted that hedges overhanging roads around the village have still not been cut back.

The Wingrave Road footpath will be installed this year.

The Clerk reported that the 'Perfect Village Sunday' is scheduled for 23rd June.

No one has volunteered to be the Council's representative on the Governors of Wingrave School.

Cllr Sansome has had a meeting with John Bercow MP, at which he voiced our concerns about the proposed Weedon Hill MDA.

Clerk's Report

The Clerk informed the Council about a planned meeting with Cublington PC to discuss the proposed new flight paths from Luton Airport.

The new fingerpost on The Green is now fully insured.

County Council, District Council And Police Matters

Nobody from either the County Council or Police attended the meeting.

District Councillor Peter Cooper reported on the following:

- a) The Bull and Butcher. The plans for the pub are due to go before the Planning Committee on 23rd May, and are recommended for refusal. Cllr Cooper is unable to attend the meeting, but has sent a written report supporting the PC's objections and has spoken to Chloe Lambert (Chair of the Committee). He is reasonably confidant that it will be refused.
- b) Luton Airport. Cublington would like the villages to make a joint approach to the issue of the proposed new flight paths, and a meeting has been arranged for 27th May. Cllrs Clarke and Kent agreed to attend.

c) AVDC strike. Apparently 80% of the union membership voted to strike (over pay). This may result in a reduction in services.

Golden Jubilee Grant

Agreed to apply for a Jubilee Grant to help towards the purchase of six new bellringing ropes for the Bells at St. James, and to donate up to £200 from Parish Council funds to the same project, on the understanding that the Bell Fund will also give £200.

Recreation Ground

Parking on the Rec. Resolved to allow the Recreation Ground to be used for car parking for special events under certain circumstances and with strict conditions. Each application will be considered separately, and in the event of wet weather no parking would be allowed at all.

Confirmed that the next meeting of Aston Abbotts Parish Council will be on Wednesday 26th June at 8pm in the Church Room.

Gave the Woman 10s.

Paid to George Aury for Drawing the Woman away.





Rectors Report

one of us likes being constantly spied upon. Yet, almost everywhere we go these days there seem to be CCTV cameras. I am not entirely sure, but I have a feeling that some years ago in a Museum, I saw a Victorian Sampler that bore the words: "The one above sees all".

For the young person who embroidered it, those words could have had several meanings. If, as most likely, it was sewn by a child, then the "one above" could have been any grown up, possibly a parent or a teacher. Once the child graduated beyond their influence, then the "one above" became their employer (since many of the children who had embroidered samplers later went into domestic service). Ultimately the "one above" was God himself.

But the message is the same – that you are constantly under supervision! It was designed to ensure that a high standard of behaviour was maintained. And, in age where there is much crime, the CCTV tries to keep an eye on those who might be

tempted to misbehave.

We cannot escape from the scrutiny of our lives. It matters just as much now, as it did in Victorian England, that we should maintain high personal standards, in our private lives as well as in public places. Those personal standards define us. They give us credibility – and they reflect the standards that we expect of others.

During the fifty years of her reign, our Queen has had her life monitored closely - she has had to live under the eye of the camera. There have, no doubt, been times when she might have preferred to have had less public attention. Yet, she has given us an excellent example.

It is, I suspect, her awareness of "the one above" that enables her to live her life in that constant spotlight.

However we interpret those words "the one above sees all", we all need to keep our personal standards high and constantly do our best.




