



### **Aston Abbotts Diwali Festival**

I think it may be the first time that Diwali (pronounced De-var-lee) has been celebrated here in Aston Abbotts, but Astonians need little excuse for a party.

Diwali is a Hindu festival welcoming Ram and Sita out of the forest and celebrating the Hindu new year. This year it was celebrated in the Church Room in an evening event organised by Avi and Poonam Gupta and their friends. As Avi (one of the only two bona fide Indians present) put it, "We're going to celebrate it like we do back home... in Essex!".

The Church Room was transformed with a multitude of Indian fabrics and decorations. The gentle smell of joss sticks wafted past and lights burned all around (traditionally some people put decorated candles/lights in their windows for Diwali). One villager said to me, "Never has the Church Room been decorated more beautifully".

Poonam and her helpers served delicious Indian food whilst DJ Avi manned the decks and prepared us for the entertainment to come.

Appetites sated, Avi explained that it was traditional to gamble at Diwali. John Whyte was nominated as cashier (is he the only one in the village who can count) and put in charge of a huge stack of Monopoly money, which was

purchased for the gambling. Poonam got a game of Jackpot going and enthusiastic, noisy and adventurous betting quickly ensued.

Step forward Mr David Lewis. *Three times* he had a perfect sure-fire hand, *three times* he bet everything on it, and *three times* he lost! (See the back page.)

Eventually it was realised that Dave had nothing left to lose, so the game folded. Producing sticks, Avi and Poonam proceeded to teach us how to stick dance.

Although Avi denied it, I am a little suspicious that the stick dancing might have had some fertility ritual aspect to it—so watch the Peoples Page carefully next August folks!

My stick dancing attempts were made more difficult by a certain lady villager who wandered around sticking her stick between the legs of all the gentlemen. I shall not name and embarrass you madam, but if you try that with your alpacas they'll bite your fingers off! An extra element of danger was added by Dave Lewis who, still smarting at his fleecing at cards, insisted upon whacking his sticks together so hard that bits of wood flew in all directions, spearing unwary dancers.

As if that was not enough, after the stick dancing we danced to Indian

pop music until we dropped (or fell over).

The evening raised £310 for the Church Room fund (much of it from Dave Lewis) and our thanks go to Avi and Poonam (and their helpers) for organising such a fun and unusual evening. This is probably the first time that Diwali been celebrated in Aston Abbotts—I certainly hope it's not the last

### Hard To Be Humble


Ohn Brancker (pictured right with Anne) threw a party to celebrate his 60th birthday at the Bull and Butcher in November.


were first class (if any one is thinking of going that way).



### **Proposed New Flightpath - What Now?**

December 2<sup>nd</sup> is officially the end of the informal consultation process for Luton Airport's proposed new flightpath over Aylesbury Vale at 3,500 – 5,000 feet.

#### What can we do about it?

1. If you haven't written to your Parish Council to tell them what you think about the proposals, *do it now*! More information about Luton's proposals and sample letters are

2. If you want to do more, then contact Luton Airport whenever you hear a noisy plane, or a series of planes. The more we complain, the more they will get the message that we don't like planes flying at 6000 feet, so there's no way we will tolerate planes at 3500 feet! Luton's noise hotline is 01582 395382, or noise@london-luton.co.uk. To decide if it's a Luton plane, check the direction of flight – roughly east-west or maybe turning south over AA. Luton planes are lower than Heathrow's, and Luton flies at night more often (11pm – 6am).

#### What happens to all our letters?

Luton should examine every submission from the consultees and produce a question and answer document based on villagers' concerns.

The airport says it will send representatives to as many community meetings as they can. This seems a cock-eyed consultation process – consulting with communities AFTER the official end of the consultation period – and PAVAN has taken this up with the airport and with the Directorate of Airspace Policy (DAP – a division of the Civil Aviation Authority.)

Luton may decide to submit an amended document to the DAP (who will decide whether the new flightpath will go ahead). PAVAN has asked Luton and the DAP whether the consultees can review and comment on any amended plans before they are submitted.

The DAP can either accept Luton's proposals, reject them, or refer them to the Secretary of State for Transport for a final decision. Should the proposals be accepted, PAVAN will consider all available options to have the decision overturned before the route becomes operational (summer 2003). Should the proposals be rejected, then we might have a celebratory drink (or two ....)

### Grey Stereotype Counted Out By The 'Colourful' Accountant

The image of the dull, grey accountant has been shattered by a survey that claims to have evidence that they are more interesting and adventurous than other people. They are more likely to socialise, they watch less television and enjoy more sex, according to a 'monotony monitor' aimed at exposing those whose life was more rut race than rat race.

A hundred people in different jobs kept a diary for a fortnight to show how they spent their time. Hairdressers spent most time in front of the television, watching up to 36 hours over ten consecutive evenings, followed by advertising executives. Construction engineers went to the gym the least. They also went to bed the earliest.

All admitted to lethargy when it came to a social life, watching television nine nights out of ten rather than drinking or meeting friends. Most of those surveyed (60 per cent) could not name a single highlight to their day, although secretaries sited "office gossip".

By contrast, accountants watched less than an hour's television in two weeks. They had sex an average of six times in a fortnight, compared with the average three, and most played some kind of sport. Nearly half socialised at least once or twice a week and more than half went to the gym. They also went to bed later and were the keenest to change their routine.

Researchers said the face of finance had changed so much that accountants often had front-office roles, inter-personal skills and the presence to succeed outside number-crunching, making them more sociable. They also had become the "champions of making life more enjoyable".

The survey was conducted by Lindemans, the wine producers. The wife of a well-known Aston Abbotts accountant declined to comment.



### **A Canadian Holiday**

#### Sun. 8th Sept

Bang on the stroke of 8am, we left our hotel at Banff to go to Jasper. It rained at first but then, following the appearance of a double rainbow, we enjoyed glorious sunshine. Our guide talked about all aspects of the ecology of Jasper National Park He was without doubt one of the most knowledgeable and interesting people I have ever listened to.

Following a quick lunch in Jasper we boarded the bus to Lake Maligne for another informative boat cruise on the green waters of the lake and amid spectacular scenery. By this time we were ready to return to our pine bungalows for the evening meal. The evening ended by having to pack our cases ready to move on in the morning. However, not before enjoying a camp fire sing song where people toasted marshmallows, played 'horseshoes' or lawn bowls until it was time to 'turn in'.

have to admit to being slightly bemused – or perhaps that should be confused. I was walking through Friars Square the other day, and at the side of "Santa's Grotty" was a small archway in which was the tail of a dragon. Now I cannot think for the life of me what the dragon has to do with the Christmas story.

Maybe this is yet another Christmas "peripheral" that I shall just have to learn to accept. I have grown accustomed to accepting reindeer and robins — which are fairly gentle, non-threatening additions to the Christmas story.

It made me wonder which story I was meant to be thinking about. Maybe this dragon is part of the story of St. George, our Patron Saint. For that is a story about evil (depicted by the dragon) being overcome by good (St. George). Perhaps the dragon could be there as something to breathe fire and melt the symbolic snow – suggesting that Christmas requires us to demonstrate relationships that are not as chilly as they can sometimes be. I cannot bring myself to think of the dragon as being "one of Santa's little helpers".

But that, of course, is only one element of the "Christmas fun and festivities". Perhaps the dragon really has a significant part to play in what has now largely become the "feast of consumerism". This is a season that is characterised by greed.

It is part of the "gimme, gimme" culture in which we live. Happiness comes from spending more and more on ourselves, and to a lesser extent from the presents that we receive.

But maybe the dragon is intended to remind us of a presence rather than presents. Sadly the idea of presence is something that we often miss at Christmas. For Christmas is about the presence of God. God taking our human nature, becoming weak and vulnerable like us in Jesus, the baby of Bethlehem.

The dragon's presence seems rather sinister, but the presence of the Christ child is the greatest present that we could wish to receive.




