Editorial

In January 2002's editorial I wrote, "Aston Abbotts goes into 2002 with a shop, a Church, a restaurant and two pubs. I wonder what will be left as we approach 2003" One year later we know that the fight to save the Bull and Butcher is lost and The Old Masters Restaurant has just closed its doors to regular restaurant trade.

The news about the Bull came early in December, in a letter to villagers who had attended the appeal hearing. The appeal inspector threw out all of the arguments for retaining the Bull as a pub and gave the green light for its redevelopment as four houses and six flats (see page 5). We don't know when the redevelopment will take place, but the news led to a couple of rather emotional "speeches" at the New Years Eve party as some villagers voiced their disappointment and dismay.

To lose two of our village facilities in one year is a bit of a body blow. There have been many parties, events and discos in the rear bar of the Bull. Juan and Brigit have allowed the Old Masters to be used for special events - where else could we have held 2001's Village Auction which raised so much money for the Church Room (Village Hall) restoration project (currently struggling—see page 9)?

The loss of the Bull is a great shame, but we must move on. There is no point in carping over what is now done or trying to prolong the issue, as this will only cause acrimony to no useful effect. Those of you who objected and stood up for what you believe in should be proud of yourselves. For those who believe in Aston Abbotts as a village and as a community there will be other battles to fight - and we should be ready to fight them.

So let's not start 2003 by burying our heads in hands in gloom and despair. There is still much to be happy about and look forward to. We still have a great pub in The Royal Oak, where Teri and Gary serve good beer and great food, always with a warm welcome. Meanwhile, the Bull and Butcher remains open whilst plans are finalised.

Our church, which last year for the first time itself raised the question of its own future, has, due to some considerable generosity and support, managed to pay its Parish Share for the first time in some years (see page 25). This amazing achievement must surely strengthen its position.

Last year's Astonbury was the best ever. December's cabaret was a smash and sold out, even before it was mentioned in these pages. The fete was again a huge success.

Then there are things to look forward to: this year's fete, maybe there will be another Astonbury, the social events and outings, the Ladies Club, The Toddlers Group, the Rambling Club and more.

Over 70 people attended the New Years Eve party (and it was not publicly advertised). As usual there were people who have been born and brought up in this village partying and celebrating along with "newcomers" like myself. It is this inclusiveness and spirit that makes Aston Abbotts special – and it's going to take more than the loss of a pub to destroy that!

Happy 2003 everybody! Let's have a great year!

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

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# In The Village

# **Last Orders For The Bull**

here was great disappointment in the village just before Christmas when news that the appeal for the Bull and Butcher revelopment is to be allowed spread rapidly. Despite a long planning process, during which many villagers put forward objections and attended meetings, the developers are now free to go ahead with their plans for the site.

A number of villagers attended October's appeal, as did our local councillor Peter Cooper. Representatives of AVDC argued that the appeal should be dismissed and some villagers spoke against the development.

At the end of November planning inspector Terry G Phillimore issued a long judgement, in which he dismissed the many arguments put forward for trying to keep The Bull and Butcher as a public house.

Recognising that both current and emerging policies in the AVDC Local Plan seek to retain local facilities, Mr Phillimore nevertheless dismissed arguments upon this point: "I recognise that the appeal premises are valued as a social venue, but the village contains a small hall which, in spite of its physical limitations and being a different type of facility, does offer local meeting accommodation. Although an increase in village population would result from the appeal proposal, I nevertheless conclude that appropriate facilities would be available as an alternative to the appeal premises". Arguments that the Royal Oak could not match the function room facilities were acknowledged, but seen as "...a commercial operating matter and carries little weight in my considerations".

Dealing with the viability of the public house Mr Phillimore stated, "Some, local scepticism regarding the appellant's case has been expressed, and various alternative explanations given for the declining fortunes of the pub. The Council argues that past absence of profit does not demonstrate that the business cannot be made profitable. However, at the hearing the Council confirmed that it could identify no specific shortcomings in the appellant's evidence. In my view the evidence indicates that the pub is no longer a viable business and that a genuine attempt has been made to market it as a going concern...".

Our other objections were also dismissed: "I recognise the substantial local opposition that the proposal has generated, and that it would reduce the availability of local facilities within the village... However, I consider this to be outweighed by my findings on viability..."

Arguments about the appearance, impact and safety were similarly despatched: "I therefore conclude that the proposal would not detract from the character and appearance of the locality." and "...the proposal would not unduly harm the living conditions of neighbouring occupiers..." and "...the proposal would not result in significant harm to the free flow of traffic or highway safety in the vicinity".

Concluding that the appeal should be allowed Mr Phillimore laid down a number of conditions, but effectively gave a green light to the development.

Although Phillimore admitted that the four conditions laid down in local policy could not be fully determined or met, the comprehensive dismissal of both village and AVDC objections left nobody with any desire to pursue the matter further.

# The Old Masters Closes

The Old Masters restaurant closed its doors on the 24th December, as Juan has decided to retire. Juan and Brigit Gutierrez opened The Old Masters on the 29th March 1985 in the former Aston Abbotts schoolhouse, which had ceased to be a school back in 1975.

Juan and Brigit met in 1969, maybe a day or so after Juan had come to England from Madrid. Working in catering for many years, Juan decided to start his own restaurant after being made redundant by the Crows Nest in Tring. He saw many sites, but knew immediately he had found the right place when he saw the former school, which was by then a private residence.

Although the opening of a restaurant in the school caused quite a few raised eyebrows at the time, it soon became a part of the local community. Juan has kept much of the original building intact, adding only the front entrance porch.

Although the restaurant with its high quality cuisine was not used by the village for everyday eating, it will be much missed.


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# **Letters To The Editor**

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# The Village Hall - More News

y fairly upbeat report in the November Chronicle was obviously tempting providence. Since then it has been a case of "one step forward, two steps back"! The Solicitors who act for the Bishop of Oxford have now written saying that:

- 1. Because of a piece of legislation called The Incumbents & Churchwardens (Trusts) Measure, the present (Church) Trustees should have vested the Hall in (i.e. transferred the legal estate to) the Oxford Diocesan Corporation as Custodian Trustee. They have not done so, and this must be done before the proposed lease can be granted. Quite apart from the cost involved (which I hope the Church will bear), this will delay things by 3 months, since notice of the transfer of the property to the Custodian Trustee must be given and advertised, and three months must elapse before the transfer can be completed (presumably to give time for anyone to object).
- 2. They believe that a document called an "Albemarle Schedule" must be prepared, before the Hall can be used for other than ecclesiastical purposes. If they are right, then their costs for doing this, which will be in the region of £1,000 will have to be paid, together with the costs of a surveyor whom the Church will also want to involve, and these are likely to be a further £700. There will also be VAT on both of these sets of costs, and about £40/£50 for disbursements. I personally believe that they may be mistaken, since in my view the 1897 Conveyance which conveyed the Hall to the original Trustees had a very wide "user" clause, which already allows the Hall to be used for a large number of non-ecclesiastical purposes, and I

think would permit any of the uses to which the village would wish to put it, as and when the lease is granted. I asked the Solicitor who now acts for the Church Trustees to seek a ruling from the Charity Commission, which he has done. When I last spoke to him, immediately before Christmas, he was still awaiting their reply. While I can see a strong theoretical argument for saying that these costs should at worst be split between the Church Trustees and the Village Hall Trustees, the Church's present financial plight means that the Village Hall Trustees will have to bear the whole of the costs, if it becomes apparent that they are necessary.

The Village Hall steering committee held a meeting before Christmas, at which it was decided that, if necessary, the Village Hall Trustees would pay these costs, although they very much hoped that it would not be. While it was very irritating to have to spend so much of the money that had been raised on something like this, we were faced with the problem that the Church Hall is the only possible venue for the Village Hall, and we know that unless the toilet and kitchen facilities are upgraded, the time will shortly come when the Hall will have to close down, because it does not meet current Building Regulations. The Solicitor who acts for the Church Trustees has been advised accordingly, and asked to press the Charity Commission for a decision as to whether an Albemarle Schedule is needed.

I hope to have more news for you next month.

# **Countdown To Fame**

O you fancy a post-Christmas brain-teaser? If so, then stop reading at the end of this paragraph, and try the following: What is the longest word you can make out of the letters A E C H I L N T U? You have just 30 seconds, starting ... NOW!

How did you do? If you managed better than a 6-letter word, then I can tell you that you stand a fair chance of appearing on television.

As some of you will know, I have endured a period of enforced leisure during much of the past year. If you caught sight during the summer of someone pounding around the streets of Aston Abbotts with hardly any clothes on, that was probably me, passing the time of day in a vain attempt to get fit.

Having all this spare time also enabled me to become familiar with some TV programmes that in the normal course of events I wouldn't have been at home to watch. One of these was *Countdown*, the Channel 4 programme with Richard Whiteley and Carol Vorderman. Round about last April, I decided that I might like to have a go, and sent off an application form. I then promptly forgot all about it, until in October I received an invitation to attend an audition in Oxford the following week.

Along I went to the Randolph Hotel, for a 10 o'clock start. I was directed to a room on the first floor, where the programme researcher was waiting, together with four other lambs for the slaughter: a man and a woman of retirement age, and two other men, one about my age and one a bit younger.

Over the course of the next three-quarters of an hour, we had 7 "Letters" rounds, of which the example at the top of this article was the first, interspersed with 3 "Numbers" rounds, and followed at the end by 3 conundrums (nine-letter anagrams to

unravel). Unlike the programme itself, all the examples had been pre-selected, so the researcher knew the 'correct' answers.

Here is one of the numbers rounds (the only one I can remember): given the numbers 100, 75, 50, 25, 2 and 2, your target is to make 704 using only the normal arithmetical symbols +, - \* and /

I didn't think I'd done terribly well at all. I only got a six-letter word ('launch') out of the letters above, and almost everyone else did better than that. I didn't get any of the three number targets spot on — I only managed 702 on the example above. That was really disappointing, as I'd normally regard the numbers as my strong suit. And I only got two of the three conundrums. I did however get a couple of 8-letter words, which were also got by some of the others in the room, and I was pleased to be the only person in the room to find a 9-letter word on one of the other rounds.

I left, expecting to get a polite letter telling me that I hadn't been quite good enough. (I've had quite a few of those, one way and another, this past year). Much to my surprise however, the following week I received a letter telling me that I'd been successful, and that I would be invited up to Leeds for a recording session at YTV in the New Year. I don't have a date for that yet, but if Mr Ed is prepared to indulge me, I'll report back on how it went in a future article. (And depending on how I do, I might even let on when you'll be able to watch me!)

Oh yes, the answers: there is a nine-letter word hidden in there – it's 'unethical'. And the solution to the numbers puzzle is ((100+75)\*2+2)\*50/25

No one was present from the County or District Councils. The Clerk agreed to contact District Cllr Peter Cooper about the burned out shed at the entrance to Badger's Oak Farm.

## **Comments From The Floor**

Concern was expressed that the Refuse Freighter was not advertised, therefore very few people used it. This will hopefully be rectified next year.

An enquiry was made as to whether the village may qualify for a grant to have visits from a mobile Post Office. It was agreed to try and find out more.

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
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# **Goodness Gracious Me**

Ave you ever dreamt of living in a place where the sun shines nearly all year round? Where the average temperature is 22 degrees? Where the sea is as warm as a bath and the golden beaches stretch for mile upon mile? Well if you have, and the onset of winter is making you shiver at it's very thought ... then read on!


My wife, Claudine, and I moved from Buckingham to Australia's Gold Coast (an hours drive south of Brisbane), fourteen months ago. Since getting married four years ago we had been contemplating the move and as Claudine herself is an Australian - we were sort of half way there anyway! So, with visas organised and our furniture and belongings already on a cargo ship bound for Oz's sunny shores, we boarded a plane at Heathrow with mixed feelings. At that point I had just said goodbye to my parents (Richard and Sally Clarke), and I didn't know when I would see them again. To make matters worse I'm an only child so you can imagine the wrench felt by all of us; but we had weighed up the pros and cons a thousand times and the bottom line was that we just had to give it a go there. We had a wonderful opportunity that many people only dream of, and we ultimately felt that not to go would be our biggest mistake.

We landed twenty-five hours later, in Brisbane, and were met by Claudine's parents. Then, after sleeping for what seemed like a week - we finally realised that our dream had at last come true. I had been to Australia ten years earlier on a backpackers trip and had covered most of it, but as I was to find, a holiday is one thing - to actually make a home overseas is quite another!

Everything was different! The heat (at that time 30 degrees), the humidity, (up to 95%), the houses, the shops, the cars ... Everything! I think the first differences I noticed were in the television programs. In particular the news. Instead of the heavy political content of our own current affairs programmes, the Aussie's don't have bickering politicians dominating the news day after day. Obviously they are not a major political world power like us, and I found this reflected in the news. Of course all important and relevant items are reported but they don't have endless so called 'experts' and 'analysts' banging on, and I found that they devote a fair chunk of the news to more important things like the surf and fishing reports.

Once acclimatised, Claudine and I started to explore the area. The Gold Coast was new to her too, as her parents recently moved there from Sydney. We started with the large swimming pool situated in her parent's complex, and moved on to Burleigh beach which is only a five-minute drive away, and has golden sand and large surf. In fact it regularly holds world class surfing competitions. Lifeguards patrol the beach and have a flag system to indicate where it is safe to swim. You can swim outside these areas, but at your own peril ... the riptides are notoriously strong!

Claudine found another nearby place called Tallebudgera Creek, which was calmer as it was just an inlet from the sea. With it's crystal clear waters and small beach we lapped up the sun and thought of cloudy Aston Abbotts! We were shocked to find fish swimming around our legs as we ventured into the water! We got another shock when we returned and Claudine's Dad told us that 'Tallebudgera' is an Aboriginal word that literally means 'Man eaten by crocodile'! He did assure us though that the crocs had long gone; but you do have to be careful, not just when swimming but in just about everything you do to avoid being bitten by something! If it's not



mosquitoes, it's spiders or snakes! I quickly learned to bang my shoes on the ground each morning, in case anything nasty had crawled in there during the night!

Within two months Claudine, who is a speech and drama teacher, had secured a good job at a large private school on the Coast called 'All Saints School.' She is really enjoying it and as she teaches the LAMDA syllabus, (London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art) she has single-handedly introduced this syllabus to Australia! An examiner even flew out from London to judge her students!

As for me I have struggled to get permanent work but I know that it is just a matter of time. In the meantime I have discovered writing and recently won a national short story competition out there. I'm currently over here in the U.K. for Christmas and the New Year to see my family, which is great for all of us! It was while I was in the Bull and Butcher that I got talking to Phil Spooner and he encouraged me to write something for The Chronicle - Aston Abbotts' premier publication!

Australia is a great place, but I'll leave you with a poignant story if I may, one of many that have rocked that country recently. I had a temporary job on one of the many golf courses on the Coast, and it was while working there that I made friends with a guy who went to Bali for a holiday - and he was caught in the bombing of the 'Sari' nightclub. Amazingly, his brother was caught in the World Trade Centre attacks a year earlier but got out unscathed, and his luck must have rubbed off on my friend, as he too got away with only some shards of glass in his leg. I say got away with - as his companion was not so lucky and was killed. It's a sobering thought about the world today, that the news reports and in depth discussions that I was so glad to leave behind, now seem to be a part of Australian life too.

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




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# **Rectors Report**

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
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
