

Editorial

Help Needed

n the early days of its publication The Chronicle tended to lurch from one financial pickle to another. Three things brought this fiscal insecurity to an end: support from the Parish Council, fund raising by villagers and the introduction of advertising.

These days our financial position is less insecure. Whilst not exactly rolling in money, The Chronicle's income is just about sufficient to meet the costs of publication and the financial position remains stable.

The bulk of the money now comes from two sources. The main income is from advertising, with the remainder coming from a share of the fete proceeds (not forgetting a few generous donations and the occasional fundraiser).

This year the Annual Parish Meeting voted that The Chronicle should receive 12.5% of the fete proceeds, for which we are truly grateful. This helps to ensure that we can maintain free distribution of our eleven issues a year. We are also grateful to our advertisers for their support. We now have some 40 advertisers and without them there would be no Chronicle.

Ivan Greenaway has looked after the advertising for the last five years and he has done a splendid job. Any business knows that selling your wares is essential, but collecting the cash is equally important. Ivan has been responsible for invoicing our advertisers, politely chasing those who forget to pay, passing the money on to our treasurer and dealing with queries from potential advertisers. Unfortunately heavy work commitments now force Ivan to relinquish these responsibilities, but we would like to extend our grateful thanks to Ivan for his sterling efforts on our behalf.

Of course this means that I am now seeking someone who would be prepared to give up a little time to look after the invoicing of our advertisers. This is an important job that not only helps the Chronicle, but also indirectly helps the village. Ideally the person doing this job should have access to a computer and printer, as this makes the issuing of invoices much quicker and simpler. There is no pay of course (apart from our gratitude), but postage and telephone expenses will be covered. If you would like to consider helping us out in this way and wish



Minutes of the last meeting were read and signed.

Matters Arising



Aston Abbotts Parish Meeting 2003

The annual Parish Meeting was held on Wednesday 2nd April in the Church Room at 8 pm.

Present: Chairman of the Parish Council (Tom Manning), Clerk to the Annual Parish Meeting (Kate Curry), Peter Cooper (District Councillor), and 17 parishioners.

Minute 1

Apologies were received from PC Print and County Councillor Brenda Jennings.

Minute 2

Minutes of previous meeting were approved by the Meeting, and signed by the Chairman.

Minute 3

Matters arising - none.

Minute 4—Police and Neighbourhood Watch.=

No one was present to report to the meeting. Colin Higgs commented that cars are being parked in the bus stop outside the Bull and Butcher.

Minute 5-District Council

Peter Cooper made the following comments:

- There is to be a District Council Election on May 1st. Mr.
 Cooper said he hoped everybody would use their vote.
- He expressed dismay that the Police Station at Wing now seems only to operate on a part time basis. Calls to the Police are now channelled through an Information Centre at Kidlington.
- Luton Airport the latest information is that the second runway planned for Luton will probably now not go ahead. This is, however, a separate issue from the 'Flightpath' one.
- The District Council has a 'Vision for Aylesbury'. They
 want to stop it being a 'dormitory' town by bringing
 industry into the area along with the planned Major
 Development Areas. The town centre will also be
 redeveloped soon.
- Local transport system the A418 is to be upgraded and rail links improved. Aylesbury may also have its own 'Park and Ride' scheme introduced.

Minute 6—Church Room

Tom Manning told the meeting that progress has continued to be slow due to legal problems. He said that the planning permission for the improvements will expire on November 9th 2004, and new legislation regarding disabled access to halls will be in place by October 1st 2004 (this legislation would mean the Church would be unable to continue to let the Church Room). Tom thanked Peter Shorrock for all the legal work he has done so far, and this was unanimously endorsed.

Peter Shorrock said that the good news is that the Trustees have now been registered at the Charity Commission – however, there are still complicated legal procedures to be dealt with, which could foreseeably result in costs up to £3000.

Liz Barlow commented that it was sad that the village has just lost both the Old Masters Restaurant and the Bull and Butcher Pub. It would be a great pity to lose the Church Room as well.

Minute 7-The Chronicle.

Phil Spooner said that the circulation remains static at about

200 issues, and costs have been covered this year. Two thirds of the income is from advertising, with the remainder coming from the Fete. Advertising is healthy at present and the cash flow is good. He proposed a vote of thanks to Ivan Greenaway, who is stepping down as advertising manager after 5 years. A replacement for Ivan is now being sought. Thanks were also offered to Andy Bystra (distribution), John Whyte (bank account) and everyone else who helps with or contributes to The Chronicle.

Phil asked the meeting to approve the Chronicle retaining its share of the Fete proceeds, as it is such an important part of the village. The Chronicle will celebrate its 20th Anniversary next September.

Tom Manning offered a vote of thanks to Phil Spooner for all his hard work, which was carried unanimously.

Minute 8—Fete 2002

Gordon Smith reported that the Fete made a profit of £2567 last year. It was a most enjoyable day, for which special thanks must go to the organiser, Barbara Bellingham. Barbara has stepped down as organised this year, and the meeting welcomed Jackie Farrands as new organiser for this year's Fete, which will take place on 26th July.

Votes of thanks were given to Shirley Ford and Pam Hewitt, who have also stood down from the committee after many years of service.

Minute 9—Fete 2003

After some discussion, it was agreed to distribute the proceeds as follows:

- a) Church 35%
- b) Church Room Restoration Fund 50%
- c) Chronicle 12.5%
- d) Toddlers 2.5%

Minute 10—Recreation Ground Account

Tom Manning told the meeting there is around £3500 in this account, which is held by the Parish Council, but was originally raised by people in the village. The Parish Council is seeking a mandate from the village to use the money for essential maintenance and repairs to the children's play equipment on the Recreation Ground. This was unanimously agreed.

Richard Clarke proposed that some of the money raised at the Fete be allocated to the Recreation Ground Account. After some discussion the meeting agreed to reinstate this contribution next year.

Minute 11—Litterblitz

Tom Manning said that this year's Litterblitz has been organised for Saturday April 10th, and urged people to turn up and help.

Minute 12-A.O.B.

- 1. The recycling bins, which were outside the Bull and Butcher, are now in the car park of the Royal Oak.
- 2. Liz Barlow asked whether the Recycling collection could happen weekly instead of fortnightly.
- 3. The Chairman proposed votes of thanks to Peter Knight for mowing The Green, The 'Merry Mowers' for mowing the Churchyard and Colin Higgs for generally keeping the village neat and tidy. These were unanimously carried.

The meeting closed at 9.35 pm



Carol Vorderman's Bottom

As threatened a couple of months ago, here is the inside story on life in the Countdown studio. My intention to build the suspense by not revealing how I got on has been thwarted by the vagaries of the Chronicle publishing deadline. By the time you read this, either you will have seen my appearances and therefore know how I did, or you've missed them and probably don't care anyway. (For the record, I won two games, and lost the third on a tie-break).

Five programmes are recorded in a day, and so I arrive at the YTV studios in Leeds at 12:30, as instructed. Jill was with me in her role as chief supporter. A couple of minutes later, while we are waiting in reception to be collected, Richard Samson of Dictionary Corner walks in. Jill's day is made; she thinks he's gorgeous.

We are taken to the Green Room,

where the incumbent champion and two other challengers are already waiting. My first appearance is scheduled to be the third recording of the day – the Wednesday show – so I have time to assess how well my potential opponents are handling their nerves and to decide which of them I don't want to face.

I had been told to take several changes of clothing, so as to maintain the appearance that the shows are recorded on consecutive days. These are checked for acceptability – no stripes or checks allowed - then it's down to make-up. Carol Vorderman and the guest of the week, Lesley Graham, are already there. Carol is very pretty, and more petite in real life than she seems on TV. (She's got a big bottom and wears too much make-up – JW). After a light dusting, it's back to the Green Room. As I make my way back, a portly gentleman is ambling down the corridor towards me. It is Richard Whiteley himself. I introduce myself to him, and he asks me if I am feeling nervous. I tell him that I'm not, which is quite true – the whole experience is already beginning to have a slightly surreal, out-of-body feel, and after all the months of waiting I'm looking forward to it.

Recording starts at 1:30, so off we troop to the studio to watch the first show. The studio audience, largely consisting of, shall we say, more mature individuals, is already seated, and being 'worked' by the warm-up man, Dudley, an old-style club comedian from Lancashire. The studio is bigger than it appears on television, (or maybe it's just that we have a small TV set), and it also looks rather less garish and more permanent in real life.

The contestants and Dictionary Corner take their seats and are miked up. Then Richard strolls in, has a few words with the audience, and sits down to study his card with the challenger's potted biography and the corny pun. Finally, Carol comes in and takes her position by the letters board. There are five or six cameramen, a floor manager and some other technicians on the

studio floor.

It takes just under an hour to record a 45-minute programme. This includes time for 'pick-ups': odd bits that they re-shoot because the director's not happy. For example, in one of my numbers rounds, I make a baby error, multiplying 125 by 4 and coming up with 600. Carol doesn't spot this, and carries on writing up my incorrect 'solution'. On the re-take, she points out my mistake straight away. Mostly, however, the programme flows just like you see it on the telly, with unscripted banter between Carol and Richard.

The first programme is over, and the challenger has won. I am moved from the back row of the audience to the 'hot seat' at the front, so that the camera can turn to me at the end of the second programme when Richard asks me if I've got the conundrum. (As it happens, I have, which surprises me so much that I clean forget to give Richard my carefully prepared ad lib answer that "I'm still working on yesterday's").

The new champion wins the second game, a close and highscoring affair. She would have lost it but for her challenger having the 8-letter word "MISRATED" disallowed. As he also had spotted, but not offered, the word 'MARDIEST', which, unlikely as it may seem, would have been acceptable, he is mightily peeved.

A short tea-break follows, and I change my shirt. Back in the Green Room, the other two contestants of the day have arrived, and I have the opportunity to size them up.

Then it's my turn. Richard has spotted on my biography card the fact that I juggle, and asks me about that to put me at my ease. I offer to teach him how to juggle, but he declines. The nagging fear that I might be the victim of a whitewash disappears when I score points in the first round. Although I then fall behind, a good run towards the end of the second half



Rectors Report

t's been a funny kind of a war. I am not sure that I can make much sense of what has taken place. For the arguments that were put forward were not very convincing and did not receive the support of the United Nations. The fighting seemed to be very one sided — although with the fire power of the United States, that was perhaps inevitable. And now we are left with a country that is a mess.

This is also the land of Babylon – the land to which the Israelites were taken as captives, and by whose waters they "sat down and wept when they remembered their homeland in Zion".

It is said that many of the priceless historic artefacts from the National Museum have been either smashed or stolen. These are objects that help us to authenticate the stories that have been passed down, and understand more about generations long ago.

For all these centuries God has been dealing with our human determination to go our own way. We have to wonder whether we shall ever learn to live at peace with each other. But maybe we shall learn some lessons from this War as we try to pick up the pieces and rebuild peace in the Middle East.

gives me an unassailable lead by the time it comes to the conundrum – I have won my teapot!

The playing time passes extraordinarily quickly. At home, of course, if the letters selection looks unattractive, or the cat jumps up on the sofa and demands attention, you can ignore the odd round or two. No such choice here – the concentration is continuous and unremitting.

After this game, we have a dinner break (no expense spared: chilli and chips in the staff canteen). At about 7 o'clock, play re-starts. My opponent is a brash young Aussie, who is exuding confidence both before the recording and in his exchange with Richard (To be fair, he's quite normal by Australian standards, but brash when judged by the genteel norms of *Countdown*). He takes an early lead, but it is clear that his confidence is a façade when, on the verge of victory, he offers no solution to the final numbers round and then buzzes prematurely on the crucial conundrum. I sneak through, though it's not being unduly modest to say that he lost it rather than that I won it. He takes defeat rather badly, and chooses to sit alone in the Green Room rather than watch the final game in the studio. Although nobody says anything, of course, I think the other participants are actually rather pleased that he's been beaten.

And so, almost immediately, to the final game of the day/week. I fall behind early on (again!), catch up, and take a 10-point lead into the final round. The conundrum is crucial, just as it was in the previous programme. Although I'm not feeling the tension, my brain has stopped functioning. My opponent gets the conundrum and brings the scores level. Recording stops

while a second, even more crucial, conundrum is slotted into the machine. He beats me to it again – in reality, I am nowhere near it – and my run is over.

It remains only to do the pick-ups, and a technician hands me my winner's goody bag — a two-volume Oxford dictionary, an electronic Countdown game, a Countdown board game, the 'behind the scenes' book of the show, a coaster, a china mug and a T-shirt, all with the Countdown logo, and of course the famous Countdown teapot. Then it's off to the bar, to unwind with the other contestants and their guests. By now, a certain camaraderie has developed amongst us, as though we have all been initiated into a secret club. Richard & Carol don't join us for a drink, but Richard Samson does, and so does the producer, Damian Eadie. They are both happy to share their many Countdown experiences with us.

Finally, Jill and I return to our hotel. It takes me a long time to get to sleep. The adrenalin is keeping me awake, and I'm replaying the games in my head, particularly the rounds in my third game when I could have put my score out of my opponent's reach. I have no doubt that every other defeated participant reacts the same way. I know that two of the other contestants, staying in the same hotel as us, were up till 2 a.m. talking about the programmes.

Although it's just 'another day at the office' for Richard, Carol and the others, every one involved did their best to put us all at our ease and ensure that our fifteen minutes of fame would be pleasant and memorable. All in all, it was a thoroughly enjoyable experience.

And I've gained a teapot!




