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

Congratulations to **Fiona Whyte** on becoming a fully-fledged Transit pilot. Next... the Mercedes...

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
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In The Village

No More Second Post

here is an old adage that says that you don't know what you have until you have lost it. This is very true of the latest service to be withdrawn from Aston Abbotts.

Most of you will have received the letter from the Post Office informing us of the decision to withdraw the second post from our village. In a letter from "Royal Mail – The Real Network" titled "Changes to your mail deliveries" it was explained that the second post is only a small part of mail deliveries. This will come as a major surprise to those of us who rely so much upon this service. The delivery of our second post has become so slick and successful in recent years, and the postman has become so discreet, that one or two people to whom I spoke seemed unaware that Aston Abbotts actually received a second post!

However, we should not be distracted into sniggering at those less observant villagers, because buried within this letter was the first hint of a new postal scheme which, when fully implemented, will avoid delay, avoid losses, and eventually lead to a 100% reduction in complaints of late postal delivery.

Those of you who read the remainder of the letter will have read about the new free "Mail Collect" service available to all residents. Now, if you pre-register with the Post Office, you can collect your own mail from the sorting office. But this is not all. Although not mentioned in the letter, this is just a precursor to an even bigger and more radical scheme to be launched in 2005.

From next year you will be able to subscribe to a new Premium Postal Service (PPS). Although the cost of this is not yet known it is said to be "within the means of the average household". Unlike users of the newly announced free service who must go to the sorting office, subscribers to this new service will be authorised to collect their mail directly from the home of the sender. By utilising this premium service all forms of postal delay and losses should be eliminated at a stroke.

Of course, a radical new scheme such as this has its detractors and its prophets of doom. There are those who suggest that all this means is that we will see a two-tier postal service from April 1st next year and that it could eventually lead to the demise of the postal service as we know it now. Given the current campaign in the Bucks Herald to prevent the Post Office from closing five of its Aylesbury branches, could we indeed be at risk of losing something very valuable that we currently take for granted?

There were two meals that featured in them on a regular basis.

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Village Hall – Latest News

In my last article, I mentioned that we were exploring solutions to the problem that the Church wanted the Village Hall trustees to accept personal liability. Unhappily, I cannot give you any positive news yet about whether these are going to be viable. The difficulty is that in order to finance the work, it is going to be essential for us to be able to obtain a grant or grants for the work. The Community Fund (the organisation which provides grants from the National Lottery) will not give grants to local authorities – which includes Parish Councils. One suggestion which has been made by the Church solicitors, to get round the fact that trustees do not normally accept personal liability, is that the proposed lease of the Church Room should be taken by the Parish Council, as trustees for the trustees who are going to run it.

For this idea to work, we need to know whether the Community Fund will still be prepared to give a grant towards the renovation of the Church Room, notwithstanding this proposed involvement of the Parish Council; if so, what conditions they will seek to impose; and then whether the Parish Council can accept this liability. At the moment, despite a telephone call and two e-mails, I have not had a decision from the Community Fund – but I do accept that the Church solicitors' idea is somewhat unusual, and is no doubt causing them some difficulty. I am continuing to press them, and hope to have definite news for next month's Chronicle.

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Aston Abbotts Village Centre

Progress on the feasibility study for the new Aston Abbotts Village Centre is being maintained and will be reported in a future edition of the Chronicle

Peter Shorrock reported his views in the last Chronicle and I thought it was time to expose the positive reasons for building a new Village Centre, at the same time as inviting further comment either through the Chronicle or directly to myself..

When the team was set up we looked at the usage of the current Church room.

Basically, the Church room is used mostly by people over 50 years old. There is no prime use by any younger generation. The users tend to be the same groups such as Bingo, Whist, Quizzes, Parish Council meetings, Ladies Club, Band Rehearsals, Cabaret and the odd party. Probably this is around 20% of the village. It is estimated to be used less than 100 times per year.

The Church Room is no longer used by Toddler groups. In fact, these have been transplanted to surrounding villages where there are more congenial and more hygienic surroundings. The Youth Club ended years ago but people remark how something similar could solve some of the issues currently in the village. The Church room only has passive use, there is no positive force creating events, clubs and occasions which involve people under the age of 50.

It is important in my view to start from the positive proposition of what do we really want rather than suggesting issues such as raising money could be a problem. The proposal under consideration is to build a new Village Centre, the size of a badminton court, equipped with modern facilities. This would house 120 - 130 people at capacity, so doubling the current capacity. Such a space could also be used for Volleyball, handball and a number of other sporting activities, as well as the recreational activities of the Church Room. Once a space is available then this would probably generate a whole range of other uses. Such a space would be warm, inviting, decorated tastefully and equipped with modern toilets, kitchen and even an area for an outside bar. It could have a demountable stage area, a sound system and a lighting rig. Things which are already owned by the village.

It really depends whether we are a 'Can Do' village or a 'Can't be bothered' village No doubt we will find out through the pages of the Chronicle. Please contribute your views.

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


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Countryside Diary

The 15th of March and spring does seem to have arrived, this following last week's second bite of winter.

Unfortunately for newborn lambs the mild weather has also brought considerable rain, and lambs much prefer cold and dry to mild and wet. However, the grass is growing again and that is the most important factor.

Two people have asked me if we have started lambing yet as they have seen no lambs in the Grove or Windmill. They went on to say how much they enjoyed seeing lambs as part of Aston Abbotts in spring. Well the truth is that I have avoided turning out ewes and lambs in the village this year, at least as much as I can, because of the ever-present worry of dogs nowadays. One very pleasant gentleman was quite happy to tell me that one of his dogs was a "killer" and I know that, although he will do his utmost, he cannot guarantee his dogs won't 'escape'. We've had five cases of sheep worrying this winter - one serious case involving young lambs would be heartbreaking for Alex and me. Forget the financial aspect, forget all the work involved, we 'love' the little mites. Nowadays, as in all aspects of farming, we seem to be under siege.

We lamb 250 sheep indoors in a large rented shed and 60 to 70 outside in the field in natural conditions. Over the years approximately 75 per cent of the sheep indoors have twins. Outside only 50 per cent at most have two lambs. This is mostly due to foxes in my opinion. I believe that as the ewe gives birth to her second lamb the fox (or badger) takes the first.

Going round the sheep last Wednesday, a very curious sight: a ewe with two newborn lambs standing close against the hedge, three yards down from her a three-quarters grown dead badger, one of last year's cubs. Had the ewe "struck lucky" defending her lambs, and killed the badger?

Two things suggest she had; one never finds a dead badger in the fields - they always die underground and had the badger been dead earlier surely the ewe would never have gone there to lamb. Perhaps even old ewes can be killers and occasionally get some retribution.

The cold spell of weather brought flocks of lapwings - my favourite bird, into the parish. These days the lapwings have to work hard to feed themselves, harder than they did 15 years

ago. Nowadays there are always seagulls mixed in with the plovers and whenever a plover finds food it gets chased by a gull until the food is dropped or regurgitated. For every eight to 10 plovers there is a predatory gull to be fed. something the gulls have learnt in the last 15 years.

There have been many changes in the wild life round the village in the 35



years I have been here and probably the two greatest changes have been the death of the elm trees and the disappearance of frogs and toads. Years ago, and a wet night in mid-March, and Moat Lane will be alive with hundreds of frogs crossing to get to the moat at the Abbey. The ladies living on Lines Hill hated walking down to the village whist drive in March - frogs everywhere! The edges of the moat were alive with frogs. One year in June/July baby frogs had to be swept off the path and doorsteps of the Abbey every morning to allow the cleaning ladies to get in without squashing them. The place literally teamed with frogs. I didn't see one last year, I'm told a virus has caused this catastrophic decline. No doubt, like most things in nature, they will eventually bounce (or hop) back.

If, for any unforeseeable reason, we are unable to attend the site the Parish Clerk will be informed as soon as possible.

Please see the list of items we are not able to take away for you, there will be no exceptions and the list may be amended without prior notice.

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
Sharps: Please ensure that any potential dangerous objects such as broken glass, knives or other sharps, are not disposed of in a manner that is dangerous to others. You must securely wrap such items to ensure they will not harm others and label with large letters stating the content.

Hot ashes or other potential ignition: Please ensure that any potential source of ignition is not presented to avoid a potential fire. Should you have such items you must ensure that they are completely safe prior to being presented for collection.

Fridges and freezers: For the disposal of these items, due to

the hazardous linings and CFC's, a special collection must be arranged. Or they can be delivered to one of the Bucks County Council Household Waste Sites.

Clinical Waste: Due to the special requirements for disposal a special collection must be arranged by your District Nurse at your local surgery. Sharp boxes must be used for syringes.



Tyres, Exhausts,

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Hazardous Waste - Asbestos etc: Due to the special requirements for disposal a special collection must be arranged with a contract that is licensed to handle asbestos.

Commercial Waste - Any waste generated as part of a business: The disposal of such waste must be paid for; therefore special collection arrangements must be arranged.

Building Rubble etc: Such waste must be taken to a Civic Amenity site where disposal arrangements are available.

Paint, Liquids etc: As with general household refuse collection paints and liquids cannot be taken away in the freighter. The Civic Amenity Site has disposal arrangements.





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Last Year's Aston Abbotts Parish Meeting Minutes (2003)

Last year the annual Parish Meeting was held on Wednesday 2nd April 2003 in the Church Room at 8 pm. The minutes are being reprinted here before there approval at this years meeting. \sim Ed

Present: Chairman of the Parish Council (Tom Manning), Clerk to the Annual Parish Meeting (Kate Curry), Peter Cooper (District Councillor), and 17 parishioners.

Minute 1

Apologies were received from PC Print and County Councillor Brenda Jennings.

Minute 2

Minutes of previous meeting were approved by the Meeting, and signed by the Chairman.

Minute 3

Matters arising - none.

Minute 4—Police and Neighbourhood Watch.=

No one was present to report to the meeting. Colin Higgs commented that cars are being parked in the bus stop outside the Bull and Butcher.

Minute 5-District Council

Peter Cooper made the following comments:

- There is to be a District Council Election on May 1st. Mr.
 Cooper said he hoped everybody would use their vote.
- He expressed dismay that the Police Station at Wing now seems only to operate on a part time basis. Calls to the Police are now channelled through an Information Centre at Kidlington.
- Luton Airport the latest information is that the second runway planned for Luton will probably now not go ahead. This is, however, a separate issue from the 'Flightpath' one.
- The District Council has a 'Vision for Aylesbury'. They
 want to stop it being a 'dormitory' town by bringing
 industry into the area along with the planned Major
 Development Areas. The town centre will also be
 redeveloped soon.
- Local transport system the A418 is to be upgraded and rail links improved. Aylesbury may also have its own 'Park and Ride' scheme introduced.

Minute 6-Church Room

Tom Manning told the meeting that progress has continued to be slow due to legal problems. He said that the planning permission for the improvements will expire on November 9th 2004, and new legislation regarding disabled access to halls will be in place by October 1st 2004 (this legislation would mean the Church would be unable to continue to let the Church Room). Tom thanked Peter Shorrock for all the legal work he has done so far, and this was unanimously endorsed.

Peter Shorrock said that the good news is that the Trustees have now been registered at the Charity Commission – however, there are still complicated legal procedures to be dealt with, which could foreseeably result in costs up to £3000.

Liz Barlow commented that it was sad that the village has just lost both the Old Masters Restaurant and the Bull and Butcher Pub. It would be a great pity to lose the Church Room as well.

Minute 7—The Chronicle.

Phil Spooner said that the circulation remains static at about 200 issues, and costs have been covered this year. Two thirds of the income is from advertising, with the remainder coming from the Fete. Advertising is healthy at present and the cash flow is good. He proposed a vote of thanks to Ivan Greenaway, who is stepping down as advertising manager after 5 years. A replacement for Ivan is now being sought. Thanks were also offered to Andy Bystra (distribution), John Whyte (bank account) and everyone else who helps with or contributes to The Chronicle.

Phil asked the meeting to approve the Chronicle retaining its share of the Fete proceeds, as it is such an important part of the village. The Chronicle will celebrate its 20th Anniversary next September.

Tom Manning offered a vote of thanks to Phil Spooner for all his hard work, which was carried unanimously.

Minute 8-Fete 2002

Gordon Smith reported that the Fete made a profit of £2567 last year. It was a most enjoyable day, for which special thanks must go to the organiser, Barbara Bellingham. Barbara has stepped down as organised this year, and the meeting welcomed Jackie Farrands as new organiser for this year's Fete, which will take place on 26th July.

Votes of thanks were given to Shirley Ford and Pam Hewitt, who have also stood down from the committee after many years of service.

Minute 9-Fete 2003

After some discussion, it was agreed to distribute the proceeds as follows:

- a) Church 35%
- b) Church Room Restoration Fund 50%
- c) Chronicle 12.5%
- d) Toddlers 2.5%

Minute 10-Recreation Ground Account

Tom Manning told the meeting there is around £3500 in this account, which is held by the Parish Council, but was originally raised by people in the village. The Parish Council is seeking a mandate from the village to use the money for essential maintenance and repairs to the children's play equipment on the Recreation Ground. This was unanimously agreed.

Richard Clarke proposed that some of the money raised at the Fete be allocated to the Recreation Ground Account. After some discussion the meeting agreed to reinstate this contribution next year.

Minute 11—Litterblitz

Tom Manning said that this year's Litterblitz has been organised for Saturday April 10th, and urged people to turn up and help.

Minute 12-A.O.B.

- The recycling bins, which were outside the Bull and Butcher, are now in the car park of the Royal Oak.
- 2. Liz Barlow asked whether the Recycling collection could happen weekly instead of fortnightly.
- 3. The Chairman proposed votes of thanks to Peter Knight for mowing The Green, The 'Merry Mowers' for mowing the Churchyard and Colin Higgs for generally keeping the village neat and tidy. These were unanimously carried.

The meeting closed at 9.35 pm

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

10. Have 2 Jackets



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Carrier Bags: We cannot collect these with your recycling. Many supermarkets have special bins for the recycling of carrier bags. 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Clergy Comment

have been asked to publish the statement that was read out in Wing, Wingrave, Aston Abbotts and Cublington on Sunday 29th February. This is probably not really possible – because there were two statements, although they were both saying the same thing, but from different angles.

The gist of the message is fundamentally very simple:-

- Wing has been without a priest for almost a year, and attempts to find a replacement have so far proved unsuccessful.
- There is a proposal to link Wing with Wingrave, Aston Abbotts and Cublington in the future as part of the Mursley Deanery plan to reduce the number of full time clergy.
- After consultation with the Church Councils, it has been decided to forge the link this summer.
- ♦ A date in May has been fixed for this to happen, and with the help of Siv Tunnicliffe, I shall also be priest in charge of Wing.
- At present the link will be only a "clergy" link. The legal business involved in creating a new enlarged benefice will take place probably in the next two years.

But, it makes much more sense to work on the basis that the new enlarged benefice already exists. So we shall be looking at things and trying to decide how we can work more closely together. This will bring to an end a period of uncertainty in Wing and enable things to start moving forward again. Inevitably it will involve making changes — but I am confident that they will prove to be changes for the better.

Now that the veil of secrecy has been lifted and a public and official announcement has been made (although many people have either known or suspected what is happening for weeks!) – we shall be able to discuss our plans and explain the changes much more openly.

From my point of view, the prospect is somewhat scary. For it seems at times as though I am trying to reinvent the wheel. Yet, in reality it gives us all a chance to question many of the things that we do. We can compare them with the way that they are being done by others, and then we can decide that how they can best be done in the future. It even allows us to ask whether there is real reason for some our curious customs!

Some things are fairly easy to change – others will take some time, and may involve much heart-searching.

It is important that this is not seen as an exercise in "rearranging the deckchairs". We are presented with exciting opportunities for developing Christian Mission and Ministry, and our coming together will be a test of our commitment to the Gospel of Jesus Christ in these villages.


