





The proposal to create an egg production unit at Norduck rumbles on. The Planning Proposal included many conflicts, omissions and inconsistencies and before the Parish Council could form a considered view a number of points needed to be clarified, and they asked the applicant to attempt to resolve these. A consolidated list of questions was submitted to Aylesbury Vale Planners in early March, but as yet the applicant has still not replied.

In the mean time, a group of interested residents has formed an association and employed a planning consultant to advise and guide them through the planning process. Clearly this has a price, and the association members have contributed a significant amount of money to a fighting fund; at the present time this covers the short-term fees of consultants and other advisors.

The timing for a decision to be made on the proposal by Aylesbury Vale planners is likely to be sometime in June.

Kirsty finished at position 32,956 with a time of 6 hours & 24 seconds.


However her position as a female was 9303

Bernard Osborn's Shop Closes

A group of villagers gathered outside Bernard's on the morning of April 2nd, the last day of trading for Osborn's shop after more than seven decades of serving Aston Abbotts. At about five past nine, with no sign of Bernard, a few began to wonder—had we got the day wrong, had the shop already closed?

Then Bernard finally arrived, seemingly surprised to see the waiting people. Caroline Lane presented him with a card and a gift of garden vouchers as a thank you from the village and everybody wished him well for his retirement. Unfortunately Bernard's wife Valerie had not come with him, so Caroline also presented him with a bunch of flowers, to take back to her at their home in Cublington.

A photographer from the Leighton Buzzard Observer then took a group photograph, with Bernard standing in the shop doorway alongside neighbour Sharon Wilkinson. (This appeared in the following week's LBO.)

Pictures taken, Bernard opened the shop for one last time. Most people present took the opportunity of making a final purchase. Then, later on in the morning, the doors were finally closed and Aston Abbotts no longer had a shop.

Bernard had worked in the shop since, as a boy, he had helped his father during the war. Last month we reported how Bernard's father had started the shop in the Old Forge before moving it to the end of The Old Cottage in the 1930s. In its heyday the shop carried a wide variety of fresh produce as well as groceries, but the gradual erosion of business caused by changing lifestyles and the move towards supermarket shopping had forced Bernard to drop most of the fresh goods. However, for many years Bernard kept the shop open and provided a personal service to the residents of Aston Abbotts, particularly the elderly. So, on behalf of all of his customers we would like to say a big 'Thank You' and we wish Bernard and Valerie the very best for the future.

The crowd was huge and the laughter loud at some of the strange faces being pulled! In the end it was a close competition between Dave Chick and Alan MacDonald the local photographer (who took these photos incidentally!)

Peter Knight's Countryside Diary

7th April

Despite my protestations here we are with a little blackthorn winter again. Plunging temperatures with hail and snow showers just in time to catch the plum blossom and the emerging seedling potatoes in the vegetable garden. A nasty spell of weather now doesn't do the sheep much good either, it can bring on Hypomagnesia, obviously shortened to Hypomag, in the past sometimes called Hereford disease.

The problem is that grass can grow very quickly over a couple of days. As you can all see from your lawns, one inch a day is possible. In these conditions the grass cannot take up enough magnesium from the soil to provide this essential element to the stock eating the grass. Sheep and cows need a very small amount of magnesium every day and, if they are working hard providing lots of milk for their growing lambs, they may be suddenly short of magnesium. Add to this situation the stress of a cold wet night or cold north wind and, hey presto, the sheep falls over dead. Of course, it's always one of the best yielding cows or a ewe with two thumping good lambs that die from Hypomag.

We, of course, take all the precautions we can and high magnesium minerals are always on offer, but there is little more disheartening than finding a dead sheep with two good lambs motherless in the morning.

Having tempted fate let's move on!


Did the council used a more virulent form of salt on the roads this winter? It has certainly killed the grass in patches on the green and along the road verge. I can't remember it happening in previous years.

The weather must have suited violets this last year. They seem to have come up and flowered in loads of unusual places. Years ago I knew of only one clump of white violets and they were



by their gate into Westcraft, the field opposite the Abbey. This year there are some good clumps flowering on the green and loads in our garden.

Once again I am slightly bemused by the RSPB. I read that it's good news that wood pigeons have increased dramatically in gardens, but it's bad news that starlings and house sparrows are declining in numbers.



It seems to me that there are still plenty of starlings and sparrows about. Could there not have been too many a few years ago? There were certainly too many roosting in Leicester Square and Aston Abbotts Cover (the round wood) in the early 1970s.

As for wood pigeons - what's good about having half-tame pests eating your emerging peas and brassicas in the garden, nearly as bad as having a rabbit living in your cabbage patch.

I suspect the deer have young now, their behaviour has certainly changed. During the winter I could be within 50 yards of water deer and they would take no notice of me or the Land Rover. Yesterday I was looking at three through binoculars at least a quarter of a mile away. They lifted their heads, stared back, and then disappeared back into the spinney. At the same time a red kite ventured over, but was so vigorously mobbed by rooks that he thought it easier to hunt somewhere else.

There is always something of interest in the countryside.

This week I caught a glimpse of one of the most pleasing spring sights that is increasingly rare. A lovely field of good grass with a herd of fine-looking Friesian cows grazing. They looked beautiful, just beautiful.



Czech VE Day Celebrations

hy should we in Aston Abbotts be interested in Czechoslovakia (or the Czech & Slovak Republics), and why should we be interested in celebrating the 60th Anniversary of VE Day? The short answer is, as I am sure most of you will know, that former President Benes of Czechoslovakia lived in The Abbey during the War. After the War was over Czechoslovakia was freed from the Nazi yoke, and became an independent country again, with Benes as its first post-war president. Important as VE Day is to us, one can see that it is of even more significance to Czechs & Slovaks.

If you want to know more about Eduard Benes please read the article which follows on page 19, which gives a brief resumé of his life.

And why should we be planting a lime tree on the Green, and rose bushes in the Churchyard? The answer to the first question is that in the Czech & Slovak Republics, lime trees (rather than any other species of tree) are commonly planted to commemorate important events. In 1943 President Benes planted a lime tree in the grounds of The Abbey to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the formation of the independent state of Czechoslovakia, and it seemed appropriate to plant a tree for this anniversary as well, especially as by the time the 70th anniversary arrives, there will be few people still alive who fought in the Second World War to celebrate it.

The reason why we are planting rose bushes is that the rose is a symbol of the village of Lidice, and we are being given some roses by the residents of Lidice specially. If the name "Lidice" means as little to you as it did to me before I started doing this research, I strongly recommend that you read the article which follows on Lidice and the assassination of Reinhard Heydrich. When you have read this I am sure that you will agree it is an honour to have some roses from Lidice to plant.

Eduard Benes

Born to a peasant background in Bohemia in 1884, Eduard Benes achieved a high standard of education, ultimately obtaining Doctorates in Sociology and Law. He was an early agitator for Czech independence from the Austro-Hungarian Empire. While at University in Prague in 1904, one of his tutors was Tomas Masaryk, who wanted independence not only for Czechs, but also Slovaks, and he persuaded Benes that a union of the two peoples was the best way of obtaining this. Thereafter Benes worked closely with Masaryk, and when ultimately an independent Czech-Slovak state was established in 1918, with Masaryk as its leader, Benes became Foreign Minister. He served in that capacity until 1935, when he succeeded Masaryk as President.

In 1938, Benes resigned over what he regarded as Chamberlain's betrayal of Czechoslovakia through his signing the Munich Agreement with Hitler, and later that year he left Czechoslovakia to go into exile together with his wife & bodyguard and other members of his government. Despite his anger at what Chamberlain had done, he chose to come to live in England, probably because other members of his government were already here, including Jan Masaryk (son of Tomas), who was here as Czechoslovakian Ambassador

Initially President & Mrs. Benes stayed in Putney, but with the commencement of the Blitz, they were persuaded to move out of London – which proved a wise decision, since their house in Putney was bombed a few days after they left it! For the rest of the War they lived in The Abbey at Aston Abbotts, together with their staff including a cook, maid, butler and chauffeur, and his Alsatian dog, Toga. Two of his nieces also came to live in the house. Because of the risk of the Germans sending paratroops to try to kill him, he needed to have a bodyguard, and a detachment of Czechoslovak soldiers were housed in purpose-built Nissen huts in the grounds. (Two of these huts still survive behind Jeff & Mandy Bannister's home).

In 1941 a provisional Czechoslovak government-in-exile was set up in London, with Benes as its leader. Some other members of the former Czechoslovak government and Dr. Benes's secretary were housed in at Wingrave Manor in the neighbouring village of Wingrave, including Jan Masaryk, who became foreign minister. The Czechoslovak Military Intelligence were housed in Addington House, in a village some 15 miles away from Aston Abbotts, under its boss, Col. Frantisek Moravec. The houses in Aston Abbotts & Wingrave were leased to the Czechoslovak government, while that in Addington was requisitioned by the British Secret Intelligence Service. Although the government in exile was based in London, because of the close proximity of Aston Abbotts, Wingrave & Addington, meetings frequently took place at The Abbey as well, and representatives of the British government sometimes came out to Aston Abbotts - and the Prime Minister, Winston Churchill sometimes came over from Chequers.

Benes is usually regarded as one for Europe's greatest statesmen of the inter-war period, and it is a mark of Benes's importance that he was on Hitler's "Black List" — a list of persons he intended to kill if he got the chance. Had Hitler ever succeeded in invading Britain successfully, Benes's days would have been numbered. For the same reason, the location of his home was kept secret — to guard against the risk of the Nazis trying to kill him through bombing or using paratroops.

Over the five years they were based in Aston Abbotts, President & Mrs. Benes got to know the local inhabitants, and their time in the village is recalled with affection. There are still local residents who remember them; including Bernard Osborn, who used to deliver their mail (and who was introduced by them to real coffee), and Victor Scott, who often used to meet them on walks, and got to know them quite well – and who was entertained to dinner by President & Mrs. Benes when he visited Czechoslovakia after the War.

As is well known, while he was in Aston Abbotts, as a mark of his feelings for the village, President Benes gave the school at Aston Abbotts a globe, which, following the closure of the school, is now at the Aylesbury Museum; and he presented a bus shelter jointly to the villages of Aston Abbotts & Wingrave, which still stands at the cross-roads.

At the end of the war, President Benes was re-instated as president of Czechoslovakia, in October 1945, and re-elected the following year. Unhappily he had to withstand pressure from the Czechoslovak communists and from Russia, and after what was in effect a Communist coup in June 1948 he resigned, to die a few months later.

He and Tomas Masaryk are commonly regarded as the two most important figures in the independence of Czechoslovakia, and the termination of Austro-Hungarian domination of the Czech & Slovak peoples; and Aston Abbotts has a special place in Czech & Slovak history for this reason.

Lidice & The Assassination Of Reinhard Heydrich

Before the War, Reinhard Heydrich was a member of the SS, and ultimately became chief of the Security Police for the whole of Germany, and then the head of the "Reichssicherheitshauptamt" – the combined Secret Security Police & Department of Security. He played a large part in the planning & realisation of the "Final Solution" – the extermination of all Jewish people living in Germany & Nazi occupied countries. He personally ordered the "concentration" of Polish Jews in ghettos, and the mass deportation of Jews from Germany, Austria & Poland to concentration camps.

In 1941 Hitler became dissatisfied with the "Protector of Czechoslovakia" whom he had appointed, following the Nazi invasion of that country, and replaced him with Heydrich, whom he knew would follow Hitler's extremist policies with vigour. Ironically, Heydrich arrived in Czechoslovakia on 28th September, which for Czechoslovaks is Wenceslas Day – the day of their patron saint.

Heydrich immediately started a policy of terror — for example having 142 Czechs executed without trial, and 584 sent to concentration camps, on the first day of his appointment. He was soon to have the nickname "the Butcher of Prague". Benes and the Czechoslovak government in exile decided to do something about him. Various reasons are given for this: firstly, Benes wanted the world and his countrymen to know that Czechoslovakia was not completely cowed by the Nazi war machine; secondly, Benes and his government were embarrassed by the fact that Czechoslovakian factories were producing armaments for the Nazis; and, finally, two of the first executions were of generals who were friends of Benes and the members of the government in exile in Britain.

They therefore arranged to train Czechoslovakian agents who had escaped to Britain to assassinate Heydrich. In his house at Aston Abbotts, Dr. Benes met the men, a Czech & a Slovak, who were finally chosen to be parachuted into occupied Czechoslovakia, and wished them luck, in what he and they knew was likely to be a mission from which they would not return. The two men were parachuted into Czechoslovakia on 28th December 1941, and after linking up with a resistance group and being joined by a third agent, they lay low in the country until May 1942, when orders were sent out from England to carry out the assassination. On 27th May the attempt to kill Heydrich was made. It was bungled, partly because of a gun jamming, but Heydrich was wounded by a grenade.

Although the wounds appeared superficial, he died of blood poisoning on 3rd June.


The Nazis were outraged by the death, and did everything they could to find the culprits. Vast numbers of Czechs were interrogated, tortured and killed. It was quickly realised that the attack on Heydrich had been carried out by agents parachuted into the country, but the Germans guessed, correctly, that the killers must have had local help.

Fate then played a hand: a letter was intercepted which had been written to a girl in the small village of Lidice, near Prague. It was believed, wrongly, that it had been written to her by one of the killers, especially as it mentioned the son of one of the families in the village who was believed (this time correctly) to have fled Czechoslovakia in 1939, and joined the Free Czechoslovak Forces in the UK. As a result it was concluded by the Nazis that some of the inhabitants of Lidice were implicated in the assassination.


Accordingly, on the day of Heydrich's funeral, Hitler gave specific orders that all the men in that village over the age of 16 were to be killed; all the women and children were to be sent to concentration camps, and the commune was to be totally destroyed. These orders were swiftly carried out. 173 men from the village were rounded up and shot on 10th June 1942. Gradually the other men in the village were found and killed as well – including 26 men on 26th June 1942, by which time the Nazis knew from a Czech informer that Lidice had nothing to do with the assassination. Many of the women and children died or disappeared in the concentration camps, including 81 children who are known to have been murdered at Chelmno concentration camp. Only 143 out 243 women from Lidice survived the war; and only 16 out of 143 children were traced and repatriated to Czechoslovakia after the war.

The houses, church & other buildings in the village (and its cemetery) were then systematically destroyed by explosives, bulldozers and fire, and when all the rubble had been bulldozed into the ground, the Nazis set to work altering the landscape by removing all traces of the old roads, diverting the stream that had run through the village, building new roads and creating fields for sheep to graze on — so that no trace of the village remained. To compound the evil they were perpetrating, they recorded much of what they were doing on cine-film.


The hiding place of the parachutists was eventually found by the Nazis, following a tip-off by an informer, and they were cornered in a cellar. Having fought the surrounding Gestapo troops as long as they could, each then committed suicide with his last bullet.

The atrocity at Lidice and the barbarous and cold-blooded way in which the reprisals were carried out did much to crystallise world opinion against the Nazis; and because after the Lidice reprisals the members of the Czech "government" in Czechoslovakia had to co-operate with the Nazis or risk death themselves, it caused them to be regarded as puppets and collaborators. This increased the standing of Benes and his government in exile. As a consequence Benes became regarded by the world as the true leader of the Czech people, and it helped him to get back into power after the war. It also changed international views about the ethnic constitution of Czechoslovakia after the War. A part of pre-war Czechoslovakia was the area known as Sudentenland, which

was home to a mixture of Czechs, Slovaks and Germans. It became apparent that after what they had suffered at the hands of Nazi Germany, there was no way that the Czechs and Slovaks could live peacefully with the Germans in Sudentenland, and as a result, post-war Czechoslovakia was able to expel Sudeten Germans from Sudetenland.

After the War a new village was built adjoining the site of the old village of Lidice, and ultimately a splendid and moving memorial statue was erected to the Lidice children who died. A park called "The Friendship & Peace Park" was created between the new village and the site of the old one, and roses were sent from all over the world to be planted in this park: originally as a symbol of new life to show for the "Lidice Shall Live" movement, to symbolise the re-emergence of something beautiful from the destruction that had happened Thus the rose came to be the symbol of the new Lidice. It is from here that the roses to be planted in St. James' churchyard will come.



Minutes Of The Aston Abbotts Annual Parish Meeting 2005

The annual Parish Meeting was held on Wednesday 20th April in the Church Room at 8 pm.

Present

Colin Higgs (Chairman of the Parish Council), Kate Curry (Clerk to the Annual Parish Meeting), Peter Cooper (District Councillor), P.C. Mick Buckle (Police) and 22 parishioners.

Minute 1

Apologies - none

Minute 2

Minutes of previous meeting were approved by the Meeting as a true record, and signed by the Chairman.

Minute 3

Matters arising - none.

Minute 4 Police.

P.C. Buckle told the meeting that the crime and vandalism issues in Wingrave are being tackled successfully, and links with the community as a whole are being strengthened. He gave the new phone number for contacting the police in non-emergency situations (08458 505505), and answered questions from the floor. The Chairman thanked him for attending the meeting.

Minute 5 County Council and District Council

No one was present from the County Council.

District Councillor Peter Cooper talked to the meeting about the following issues:

- He reminded everyone that the forthcoming election is not only a national one, but also to elect a new County Council. He urged parishioners to use their vote.
- Planning members of the District Council have been campaigning to improve the effectiveness of enforcement action taken when developers do not stick to the plans.
- The Licensing procedure has changed: anyone wishing to apply for a license to sell alcohol should now approach the District Council.
- Council Tax there is to be an increase of 9.2% in the District Council's element of the Council Tax. This has led to the Council being capped by the Government.
- Growth Agenda the target is still to build 59,000 new houses in Aylesbury Vale. The District Council plans to introduce new businesses to the Vale before new residential areas are built.
- Transfer of Council Houses Aylesbury Vale currently has
 to pay the Government ten million pounds per year
 towards the upkeep of Council Houses. One option for
 avoiding this payment is to set up a 'housing association',
 which would enable the District Council to keep this
 money. Council house tenants are to be consulted, and
 asked what they would prefer to happen.

Cllr. Cooper then answered questions from the floor, after which the Chairman thanked him for attending the meeting.

Minute 6 Recreation Ground

Jackie Farrands reported that progress towards obtaining the new playground equipment has been good. A loan and grant are being sought to finance the project, though some fund raising will also need to take place. A meeting has been held, at which children who live in the village were able to express their preferences. Various people offered to undertake fundraising events over the year.

Minute 7 Church Room

Peter Shorrock told the meeting that the plan to completely refurbish the Church Room was finally abandoned. The committee is now seeking to ensure the Church Room complies with legislation regarding access for the disabled. Plans have been drawn up, but are still under discussion.

Minute 8 The New Village Centre

Neil Chesher said a public meeting which took place in January had been successful, establishing that there is indeed a 'village will' to undertake the project. Little progress has been made since then, and it is intended to restart in May.

Minute 9 The Chronicle

Phil Spooner thanked members of the public who regularly contribute good articles to the Chronicle, thus making it such a successful magazine. It is currently financially secure, with money coming from advertising, the Fete and the Parish Council. He thanked those who help with delivery / distribution every month.

Minute 10 Fete 2004

The Clerk reported that Wingrave PC has agreed to donate £50 towards restoring the bus shelter at Wingrave Crossroads. Quotations for the work are being sought, and the Council agreed to delegate Cllrs Higgs, Kent and Shorrock to approve the work up to a limit of £150.

No one was present from any of the above organisations.

Church Room Improvements

Clergy Comment

What a lot of things there are that could form the basis of this month's letter!

There are things like the General Election - about which it is probably wisest for me to stay tight-lipped.

Then there is the recent marriage of Prince Charles and Camilla Parker-Bowles - a topic that may have significant constitutional implications - leading perhaps to thoughts that the hereditary Monarchy in this country should be replaced by a Republic. If the General Election is dangerous ground, then this is even thinner ice on which to dare to walk!

Various issues have been flown as flags in preparation for that General Election - often with the rider that "the Church of England has had nothing to say on the subject".

I wonder whether that is a very fair comment - for very often the Church has said that there are two sides to each argument. In many cases both sides are equally valid, and the decisions that are arrived at need to be dependent on the individual circumstances. There are no simple right and wrong answers!

But this does not mean that we have to start addressing each problem "from first principles". For there is a basis from which we can apply our understanding of what life is all about and where we are going. There is a moral framework - even though there are those who are constantly wanting to tinker with it, or to change it so that it no longer challenges their latest fancy -"wrong" isn't "wrong" any more.


The late Pope was a man of great principle. There were times when one felt that he was out of touch with the world in which the rest of us lived. Yet he stuck doggedly to what he was convinced was right - and even in death he has preached the Gospel of God's love and compassion in a very eloquent way. One must hope that his successor, whilst bringing new light and personality to the position, will be of similar courage and devotion.

Curiously, when you reflect on these events, there is a very strong common element linking them together. They are about the society in which we want to live and the people we want to influence that world. So it is right for us to have views, and at appropriate times to share those views with others. We may find that, whilst there are ideas that we share, there are also times when we do not entirely see eye to eye with everyone

Yet we cannot live in a moral vacuum. The Good News of Jesus Christ, who died on the Cross, who rose from the dead, who is part of the one true God, helps me to have a firm basis on which to build my life - and my prayer is that you may also find this a sound and solid basis for the world in which you
