Editorial

And The Sun Shone Brightly

n this country, staging any event outside is a bit of a lottery. Do it in May, and you're either just tempting fate or you're barking mad.

Someone up above must have been smiling down upon Aston Abbotts on Sunday May 1st, the day of the Aston Abbotts Czech Connection VE Day Celebrations. The sun came out... and it stayed out.

After being driven almost to despair by far too many problems to mention here, the Czech Connection committee triumphed and produced a day of commemoration and celebration which, I am sure, was memorable for our many visitors.

In addition to the officials and representatives from the Czech and Slovak embassies, we were joined by many people connected with the Czech presence here during the Second World war. Several of these visitors had travelled to the UK especially for the event, coming from as far away as Canada and the Czech Republic itself. They included Vojta Levin who did three duties as presidential guard at Aston Abbotts in 1941 and Mike (Miroslav) Smutny, son of the Czechoslovak "Chancellor" Jaromir Smutny, who had lived at the Old Manor House in Wingrave. The Czech and Slovak Republics were represented by His Excellency Štefan Füle, the Czech ambassador and Mr Radovan Javorcik, Deputy Head of The Slovak Mission.

Sunday morning saw the formal events, with a memorial service in St James, the planting of rose bushes from the Czech village of Lidice in the churchyard, and the planting of a lime tree – a traditional gift of piece – on The Green. A special lunch was laid on for the visitors and for the older residents of the village who either remembered the Czech presence or were veterans of WWII.

The afternoon was an opportunity for more relaxed activities, with the Czech Ambassador himself leading the attack in the football match between Aston Abbotts and the Czech and Slovak embassies. The final result of 3-3 might have been regarded as very diplomatic, but of course both teams wanted to win and it is hoped to have a rematch on the weekend of our fete.

We have two reports on the events. The first, by Peter Shorrock on page 15 covers the whole weekends events and the second is by our special football correspondent John Whyte on page 23.

You are probably aware that funding problems caused the cancellation of the wartime dinner dance. I'm pleased to report that this is now rescheduled for July 23rd, after the fete, and tickets are priced at a very reasonable £10 - details on page 21.

Finally, we should all offer our thanks and congratulations to the Czech connection committee who battled against the odds and produced a day of which the village can be proud. Peter Shorrock has produced a comprehensive list of thanks in his piece so I won't repeat the names here, but somehow he neglected to mention himself. So our thanks to Peter, April and everybody else who worked so hard over the Czech weekend.



Chicken Farm Update

Around 100 people from Aston Abbotts and the surrounding area wrote to Aylesbury Vale's Planning Department voicing objections to the proposed Chicken Farm at Norduck. All of you who objected should have received a three page letter detailing the applicants responses to many of the questions raised. The letter appears to have made many people take the rather cynical view that the deal is "done and dusted", as reflected by Dickie at the end of this piece.

The Parish Council has written to AVDC with a number of further questions. These questions are reproduced below. ~ Ed

All those of you who wrote to Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC) to oppose the application to install an egg production unit at Norduck will have received a reply from the Area Planning Officer. Much of what he has to say is based on the Parish Council questionnaire that was submitted in March this year. This questionnaire asked that a number of omissions, inaccuracies and inconsistencies be addressed. At the last Parish Council Meeting further observations and questions, based on the Planning Officer's reply, were made to AVDC in which the following general questions were submitted:

- a. Why is the Local Planning Authority not requiring the submission of proper, complete and detailed drawings showing the proposals as they have now been described comprehensively and requiring that the present application be withdrawn and that a fresh application be properly submitted with all the information as single documents? The submission of sketches and impressions may be of interest, but it is not acceptable as part of a planning submission where full elevations and details are required
- b. This new application should, therefore, not only avoid all ambiguity but also include all drawings of buildings, silos, and all other ancillary plant; it should also, provide details, for example, of the heights of fences. It should also include the base information and the source for existing and proposed traffic levels including during the period of construction.

(Note. We have subsequently heard that the AVDC Planner has no intention of asking the applicant to resubmit his application, but the questions below have still to be answered.)

In addition, the following questions were submitted, without prejudice to the previous remarks above, to illustrate the lack of certainty in the current submission. These concern fencing of the paddocks, traffic, nuisance, and landscape issues.

a. Fencing.

- (1) The applicant, with the approval of the Area Rights of Way Officer, proposes to erect fenced corridors alongside the footpaths and the bridleway adjacent to the site. These will have the effect of isolating large areas of two paddocks available for the birds to range. Why is it necessary to construct a corridor of wire fencing, that will give the impression of a prison, when it seems logical to have just one to separate birds from humans and horses.
- (2) Although the location of the fencing has been given, the question of the height of this fencing has been avoided. Can this be given and also the height of the fencing around the various paddocks and folds.

b. Traffic.

- (1) An attempt has been made to minimise the impact that the increased volume of traffic would have on the bridleway and the village roads. Based on the information forwarded so far, it is estimated that the proposed unit would generate an additional 18 movements per day and if calculated per week with the addition of various lorries, tractors, visitors and inspectors the total would be in the order of 400 450 movements. Can the applicant confirm this assessment?
- (2) In addition to these traffic movements, the impact of the construction, that would have to take place, should be considered. The comment has been made that, "there will be lorries importing crushed stone and ready mixed concrete". A simple calculation suggests that the number of lorry loads will amount to over 150, thus giving 300 or more movements along the bridleway and through the village. Can the applicant provide his figures for this particular traffic flow?
- (3) The applicant proposes to install a single waiting area between Moat Farm and the main highway. The bridleway between the exit to Moat Farm and the northern end of the bridleway as it enters the field section is particularly narrow and would also require a waiting area. Would this second waiting area be built?
- (4) We note that the AVDC Highways representative was charged with giving an opinion on the impact the installation of a mobile home would have on the traffic. Based on our rudimentary calculations is it not time that a proper Traffic analysis be made to include a risk assessment for the equestrian use of the bridleway?

c. Nuisance.

- (1) It is proposed to compost the manure and bark chippings and use this as fertiliser on organic land. The applicant proposes to turn his land to organic and in the fullness of time spread the composted manure on his land. Where would this manure be composted and what legislation is there to prevent nuisance that might be caused to neighbouring dwellings and the village?
- (2) Acorus (Rural Property Services Consultants employed by AVDC) comments in their report that, "no data has been provided by the applicant about wind direction or odour impact analysis, dust, noise and flies". The Reference letter relies entirely on the opinion given in the Technical Report. As the environmental impact of poultry units generates so much antagonism in the public domain as evidenced by the unit mentioned at Stewkley, it is incomprehensible to laymen why an objective study has not been made on the issue. Has such a study been made and if so what is the conclusion? Can an objective assessment be made to replace the subjective one given in the application?

d. Landscape.

- (1) The height of the two silos attached to each unit exceeds the ridge height of the houses. This is marginal, but nevertheless true. Silos were not mentioned in the original application, are there any other hidden items that have been omitted from the application?
- (2) The Landscape Report has many pictures of hedgerows taken from various positions, but there has been no attempt to show the impact that the poultry units would have on these views. In this day of the computer, it is not beyond the ability of an amateur operator to generate such a picture. Has the applicant been asked to do this?
- (3) The pictures attached to the Reference document give a less than accurate view of the houses and the Deans lorry. The angle at which the pictures are taken tends to foreshorten the size and for a better impression, photographs from the side and from the front of the houses with the silos (and vehicle) would be preferred.
- 3. Finally, it is worth mentioning that the rights of objectors are very small, because the Planning Authority is supposed to make decisions on planning applications in the <u>public interest</u>.

The public demonstrated their interest in opposing the application when about 100 people wrote in to AVDC, but certain people appear quite determined that the application will succeed. So much for democracy.

Peter Knight's Countryside Diary

Spring has certainly arrived and I suggest that it's about 10 days earlier than usual. The swallows and cuckoo were both earlier than usual for me and tadpoles/frogspawn was definitely much earlier this year. Then, just as we start muttering about global warming we get some stinging frosts around May 10th which take out all our potatoes and runner bean plants - unfortunately we were away at the time and could take no protective measures to stop the damage. Just another round to nature in that long fight which is gardening.

Frost damage was not the only setback Alex and I came home to. Having mentioned pigeons in that last month's scribble they obviously thought they should make their mark. Years ago when I would walk round family farms in Leicestershire in the company of an older relative pigeons were nervous and wary birds. We would walk into a field and any pigeons in the opposite hedgeline would fly off. If Uncle George carried his gun he would rarely get a shot at a wood pigeon flying from a tree. Nowadays the descendants of those birds have no fear. This year they have broken all records by walking along under protective netting to eat off young cauliflower plants - whatever

Mid-May is a busy time for many birds and animals and there needs to be plenty of food available. Fledgling and nesting birds are everywhere, all with gaping beaks being regularly stuffed with food. Foxes have their cubs to feed and, yet again, they raided our chickens and got away with three of our best hens.

What of badgers? Other than their mother's milk what are young badgers fed? I've never seen evidence of food being taken back to a bed at badger's sett, whereas it is always obvious at a foxes earth if cubs are in residence - bone, feathers, etc are littered around. I guess the badger cubs follow their parents foraging, but then I've never heard tell of badgers with cubs regularly been seen foraging the fields.

There are so many questions about our own wildlife.

Why are there not more stoats about? The rabbit population is simply huge so in theory there is masses of food for stoats, vet to me they are quite rare. I occasionally see a weasel, not unusually crossing the road, but why no stoats?

Incidentally if you don't know the difference between weasels

and stoats, weasels are weaselly distinguishable and stoats are stoatally different.

Wildlife is not the only thing feeding madly. Lambs are now grazing busily - although still getting their mother's milk they are growing fast and need lots of good fresh grass. Now I expect most people think that all grass is much the same -

not a bit of it. Some


fields of grass are vastly superior to others. Every old fashioned pop-up farmer had a "best field" on his farm, a field where the cow's milk yield always went up when they grazed it. A field where the cattle fattened quicker than even the one right next to it. Some grass fields have a magic certain something - a combination of clover, trace elements, and water perhaps, but there's certainly more to grazing than meets the

Incidentally the best field at Norduck was West Side - the second on the left up the drive - and all that magic grass ploughed up and gone!

The skills of the grazier are, I'm afraid, rather a thing of the past, something unscientific that couldn't be learned at college, something learnt from experience and observation, qualities that don't seem to be very highly valued these days.

May I take the chance to say thank you for a sight of the most beautiful bird in the sky. Yes, I'd rather see a Lancaster than even a golden eagle. Thank you Mr Bannister for making it

I read that the German ambassador said we should get over the war and move on. Mr ambassador, some of us haven't got over Agincourt yet.





A report on the first weekend of events to celebrate the 60th Anniversary of VE Day, and this village's connection with the Czech & Slovcak Republics, through the late President Benes having lived here during the war years.

I think we can say, without false modesty, that everything went off very successfully, and our Czech, Slovak and other visitors all had a most enjoyable weekend.


There was nearly a full house for both of the talks, which were enthusiastically received, and a full house for the first film show. The film show on Sunday night was less well attended, which was disappointing. Both main films (Dark Blue World on Friday – a film about Czech fighter pilots flying for the RAF during the Second World War – and Sunday's film, The Assassination of Reinhard Heydrich), were absolutely first class, and I would have expected each to receive 4 stars on the Radio Times film rating. The exhibition was well attended throughout the weekend, and although I must declare an interest, in that I am married to her, I thought that Clare produced a very professional and interesting display.

On Saturday afternoon, Colin Higgs and Vic Scott were nearly walked off their feet, taking groups of enthusiastic visitors round the village.

Sunday was of course the main day, and we were blessed with perfect English spring sunshine. The day started with a procession into the church, led by the British Legion and a number of Czech & Slovak veterans, with their respective standards being borne, and scouts providing a guard of honour. They were

Bob Willmott aided by a Czech Army chaplain, Mr. Holub. The church was so full that a number of us had to stand at the back, and others had to listen to it on the sound system outside.

After the service, the Czech Ambassador, Mr Stefan Füle, and the Slovak Deputy Head of Embassy, Mr. Radoslav Javorcik, each planted in a new flower bed in the churchyard, a rose bush that had been sent over from Lidice in the Czech (Continued on page 17)



visitors were then Our entertained to a buffet lunch in the garden of Oak Farm House, where, in addition to the delicious array of food prepared by a number of the ladies in the village, and the wine and drinks we had provided; we had the benefit of three barrels of Czech "Budweiser" beer and some wine supplied by the Czech Embassy, and an enormous container of goulash brought along by the Slovak Embassy. The latter is especially worthy of note, since the Slovak Embassy cook was taken ill on the preceding Saturday and was not available to cook this. It was therefore prepared by the Slovak Ambassador's wife herself, so as not to let us down!

At 1.00 p m the Aston Abbotts bell ringers treated us to a peal of bells on the St. James's Church bells.

After lunch, with the consent of Martin & Angela Olley of The Abbey, I was able to take a party of people from the two Embassies around the garden of their property, and show them the house in which their former president had lived, and the lime tree that he planted in 1943.

Then followed what was for some the high point of the day, the football match between the village team and a team from the two Embassies. The two sides were very evenly matched, and the game ultimately ended as a very diplomatic 3-3 draw. Our scorers were Phil Wheaton (2) & Andy Plested. I do not know who scored the Embassy goals, save that the Czech Ambassador opened the scoring for them. The Embassy team captain presented the village team with a very handsome cut glass dish, a photograph of which appears in this issue [see page $25 \sim \text{Ed}$]. We hope that this will be the first of many games between the two sides, and we hope to buy a cup for which the two teams can play in future games.

Then at 4.00 p m came the icing on the cake, a flypast by the only remaining RAF Lancaster bomber which is still airworthy. Its pilot treated us to three flights over the village, one of which was directly over Oak Farm House, where it was hoped our visitors would be assembled. Unfortunately many of them were still at Wingrave Sports Ground, where the football match had ended late — but happily the pilot did a slow turn over the Ground so most of our visitors saw it there.

Observant readers will have noticed that I referred at the outset to the "first" weekend of events. This is because the Czech Connection Committee has now received the grant for which it had applied, and intends to put on another weekend of events during the Fête weekend. This time, however, we plan to put on a series of entertainments, starting on Saturday with a dinner-dance in a marquee on the Rec.(for which tickets will now be substantially cheaper than the price we would have had to (Continued on page 19)







But who would be supporting us - this village of about 400 souls - plenty on the touchline I'm sure but were we up to this on our own.




brought a tear to his eye to see the influence his gene pool exerted that day. Well done Dave.




The Lancaster Flypast

he highpoint of the Day celebrations was, for many people, the flypast by WWII Lancaster bomber PA474 of the Battle Of Britain Memorial Flight. The huge aircraft made three passes over Aston Abbotts at a height of 300 feet. The crew were Squadron Leader Stuart Reid, Flight Lieutenant Dave Chadderton, Squadron Leader Ian Morton, Flight Sergeant Andy Davis, new co-pilots under training Jim Bodley and Miles Davey. They flew from an air show in Abingdon.

7377 Lancaster bombers were built and PA474 is one of only two remaining in airworthy condition (the other aircraft is in Canada). Commissioned at the end of 1945, she was too

late to take part in hostilities. Her turrets were removed and she was used for reconnaissance duties.

Restoration work started on PA474 in 1965 and she eventually joined the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight in 1973. These days she is painted in the markings originally worn by Lancaster III EE176 'QR-M' ('Mickey the Moocher') of 61 Squadron. The original EE176 was one of only 35 Lancaster centurions - aircraft that flew and survived in excess of 100 missions. However, these huge aircraft had been designed for one purpose: to deliver massive payloads of bombs on the enemy. Peacetime found no use for these massive machines and most, including EE176, were simply scrapped without a thought.



3932 of the 7377 Lancasters built were lost in action. During WWII Lancasters flew a total of 156 000 sorties, dropping over 608,000 tons of bombs. 55,000 aircrew were killed serving in Bomber Command; 5% of the bombers which set out on the nightly bomber raids failed to return, making bomber aircrew the most dangerous wartime service.

These days sight of this magnificent aircraft engenders not just a feeling of nostalgia, but also the faintest glimmer of understanding of the enormous sacrifice made by the aircrew.

Our thanks to Jeff Banister for arranging the flypast of this magnificent machine.

were on holiday, it was quite a nice Sunday afternoon, and a walk beside the river seemed like a good idea. So we pulled into the Pay and Display Car Park that was just by the river bridge. We checked that it was Free parking on Sunday, and decided to eat our sandwiches before we set off. By the time we had finished our lunch, the Car Park was beginning to fill up. Surely, all these people were not also thinking of enjoying a stroll as well?

Before very long it became clear what was taking place. More and more people were arriving and there were flags as well.

The first flag was the Union Jack. This was followed by the English, St George's Flag. In the days just before a General election, it could very well have been a Political Rally. Yet it wasn't - It was the Scouts Annual St. George's Day Parade, and each Group had their own flag. It was a very impressive sight for there were so many children, both boys and girls, who were in the uniform of Beavers, Cubs, and Scouts. Each group was well behaved (so far as we could judge), and they had their Leaders, who were also in uniform.

As this year we celebrate the 60th Anniversary of the end of the Second World War, it did cross my mind how it might have been possible, under other circumstances, for this to have been a rally of a rather different type.

We felt compelled to stay in the car until the Parade - led by the local Corps of Drums - marched off. It was a very long procession, and I should hate to estimate how many people were involved. But, off they went, and off we went on our walk - hoping that it would stay dry until we returned. For

Luton takes a step closer to 3a

Luton Airport has announced that it has formally applied to the Directorate of Airspace Policy (a division of the Civil Aviation Authority) for a new flightpath, dubbed Option 3a, over Leighton Buzzard, Aylesbury Vale and southwest Herts. If the application is processed smoothly, the flightpath could be implemented by January 2006.

Local pressure group (PAVAN -- Protect Aylesbury Vale Against Noise) wrote to the airport before Easter (no response as yet) asking once again for details of the safety issues the airport says prompted their search for a new route. PAVAN says that it's not about safety, it's about expansion, as Luton continues to add more routes and attract more passengers thanks to Government subsidies on aviation fuel.


PAVAN will continue to lobby at the highest level, however, because Luton Airport had a previous application (Option 4 in 2000) thrown out by the DAP.

In addition to plane noise from Luton, the area also suffers from flights taking off from Heathrow Airport, so PAVAN visited BAA at Heathrow in April to discuss the matter. The good news is that Heathrow has expanded its noise monitoring capabilities and can now identify their planes over the Vale. The surprising news is that BAA were surprised their planes cause so much grief so far from the airport.

Villagers are therefore encouraged to complain to Heathrow whenever they are disturbed by one of these planes (generally four-engined flying north). Phone 0800 344844 or email noise complaints@baa.com






