Editorial

Summertime

July is here again. It's easy to tell; the weather has been sunny for two days in a row and there is no longer a late frost killing off our plants. It's time for Wimbledon. It's time for Glastonbury - and most important of all, it's time for the Aston Abbotts fete.

Every year our traditional English fete attracts visitors from all over the County. It has an excellent reputation and it's responsible for raising a substantial sum for village causes. Just how the money should be distributed is decided by you, the villagers, who get to discuss profit distribution at the public annual Parish Meeting. Last May the meeting decided that the profits should be distributed as follows:

- Church 40%
- Recreation Ground 35%
- Chronicle 15%
- Church Room 10%

This year the extravaganza promises some new attractions in addition to all of your usual favourites. For a start, there will be hot food and Pimms served from 1 o'clock, an hour before the official start time of 2 pm. Why not come long early and have your lunch at the fete. This year we have the first Aston Abbotts Dog Show, also at 1 o'clock, in the Grove Field just behind the Green. This promises to be great fun with several different categories including 'dog and owner most alike' - don't forget to enter if you are a dog owner.

The main fete opens at 2 o'clock. None of the stalls will be trading until after the official opening, so please don't distract the stall holders from the important task of setting up and getting ready by trying to buy things before that time.

Not only is the fete taking place that weekend, but there will also be the chance to participate in some of the VE Day commemorations that were postponed from May 1st. The centrepiece of these is the wartime dinner and dance on the evening of the fete, with food and the Dad's Army Jazz band for a very reasonable £10. See page 13 for more details.

On the Sunday after the fete there are many other events, including a barbecue on the rec which promises "silly prices". There are lots of other attractions, so check out the programme of events on page 15.


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In The Village

Aston Abbotts Fete 2005



"I'm very excited about the way everything is coming together for this year's fete," says fete organiser Poonam Gupta. "We have so much that's new and all of the favourite stalls as well.

"Students from Wingrave School will be displaying their work for the first time this year and children from the school are

going to be invited to come in fancy dress. Details will be in the school newsletter and there's going to be a prize awarded to the best boy and the best girl. The prize will be a month's junior's membership compliments of Aqua Vale Swim And Leisure Centre.

"We're also very excited about the first appearance in Aston Abbotts of Colonel Custards Magic Show. This is going to be terrific fun for the kids and there is to be just one performance so make sure you don't miss it.

"We are trying to make the fete a ready special afternoon out for everybody. We are inviting to people to come along from one o'clock, when hot food will be on sale. So why not come along and have lunch with us at the fete? Also at 1 o'clock we have the first ever Aston Abbotts Dog Show organised by Lynne. We want as many entries as possible and there are lots of different categories [details are on page $19 \sim Ed$]. If you want to enter your dog then just bring it along to the Grove Field behind the green at one."

Poonam is quick to reassure that the usual stalls are not forgotten. "Of course, all of these new attractions are in addition to the usual stalls and events which everybody loves so much. All of the usual stalls will be there. The tombola, the bric-a-brac - that's always a favourite and some people come from far away to see if they can find a bargain. Groceries, cakes - home-made of course. Plants, books... have I forgotten anything? Oh yes, gifts, Pym's, ice-cream, children's toys... I can't remember them all! Alpacas - they'll be there. I think there have been some new alpaca arrivals recently but I am not sure if the babies will be there. What else? More for the youngsters - the Lion train, face-painting, kids lucky dip. Oh. by the way, even though the fete is open from one for food and the dog show the stalls will not be ready until the official opening at 2 o'clock so please don't try to buy things from the stall holders as they are setting up."

Poonam is keen to stress how the traditional nature of the fete has been retained. "Two of our most popular attractions which make this such a traditional fete are the Great Horwood Silver Band and the Morris dancers. Both will be there of course. And how could we English get through the afternoon without a cup of tea? Teas and cakes will be on sale in the Church room from half-two onwards, and anybody who would like a quieter

moment away from the hustle and bustle of the fete is also bound to enjoy the floral display in the Church.

"The raffle is always one of the most popular things at the fete and I'm very grateful to Rod and Val Rothero for taking it on this year. This year it's a bit special as the first prize winner will have a choice of prizes. Wingrave shop is going to be selling raffle tickets before the fete, or you can get them from Rod and Val [details on page 23 - Ed]. Please, please, if you can sell any to friends and family, please do so."

I ask Poonam what people could do to help make the fete a success. "Well, the main thing is to come along on July the 23rd and have a great time!!! But of course we rely a lot upon the generosity of villagers making donations for the stalls. We have a team of volunteers who will be calling on the Monday and Tuesday before the fete to collect anything that anyone feels they can give us. We are particularly looking for bottles for the Tombola, bric-a-brac, groceries, nearly new items for the toy stall and the gift stall, but please no electrical items as we are not allowed to sell them and also please no expired groceries.

"Clare has asked me to ask you to take any plants for the plant stall round to Oak Farm House in the week before the fete to give her a chance to sort and label them. Francesca also needs donations of homemade cakes and she would like them taken to the cake stall on the day."

Finally I asked Poonam if there was anything else she could tell us. "I'd just like to say a big thank you to all the helpers in advance for their time and effort. It really would not be possible to host a village fete of increasing popularity like this without the help of so many people. A big *Thank You* to one and all."

My thanks to Poonam for taking the time out to chat with us. Of course, we have a whole weekend of events this year, with a wartime dinner-dance on the Saturday evening and a very full programme of VE day commemoration events on the Sunday. Details on pages 13 and 15.

The planning officer therefore has delayed the meeting (he says) until August or possibly September. However, bearing in mind that the whole issue of this application is riddled with inaccuracies, inconsistencies and uncertainties, it might well be that AVDC might decide to call an earlier meeting. We watch this space with interest. At the eventual AVDC committee meeting that will determine the success or failure of the application, the committee are usually swayed in their decision by the number of local people who attend to witness democracy in action. Once the date and venue of the meeting is fixed, it is hoped that as many villagers as possible will attend.

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
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
Aston Abbotts Recreation Ground

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Peter Knight's Countryside Diary

13th June

am occasionally asked how is it that I see so much in the countryside? The answer is simple - it's a combination of being reasonably observant and spending time in the fields. Not just at weekends, but every day of the year. Those of us who keep livestock look at them every day and in my case that usually means about an hour spent driving round several fields. Shepherding we call it. My friends in Kent and East Sussex referred to it as lookering. A friend from Kent ran up to say he was coming to visit and could he come lookering with me in the morning. I wonder how that word will come out with the editor. Apparently he has a magic machine which prints out his spoken word. Last month in my scribble I referred to proper farmers it came out as pop up farmers [Whoops! Sorry Peter ~ Ed]. Has lookering come out all right?

Earlier in June I had a splendid day watching wildlife. I was driving a tractor for a friend carting cut grass from the field back to the silage dump at the farm. Curious! We don't use carts, we use trailers, but we are still carting. Some old farmers will say leading silage, going back to the days of leading a horse and cart. Agriculture is almost a separate branch of English.

Back to a days silaging. Every time I was at the farmyard I saw a pied wagtail which always nests in a farm shed. I then drove out of the yard, past two pits of dirty water - green and evil looking but nevertheless home to a family of moorhens - on down a long hedge side where a yellowhammer sat, and through a grazing field with a pair of French partridges in residence. Later in the day a skylark rose from the short grass and in the evening a cock pheasant with three hens came out to feed

Into the field of cut grass where three red kites floated and dived around the tractor looking for titbits on the exposed grass stubble - the three kites were later joined by a 4th - four kites in 20 acre field! Now we always used to have rooks and kestrels feeding in newly cut grass but obviously the kites keep these birds away. One day will we be saying that the introduction of the red kite has driven the kestrels to critical levels? As I've said before, you can have too many of even the loveliest of creatures.

Also in the silage field was a fox crossing during the morning and two hares appeared and moved on. A Chinese water deer however came out of the hedge on one side of the grass and wawalked daintily across going into a rape crop on the other side. She crossed and re-crossed four times during the day, had she a fawn in the grass and was looking for it?

We really are very lucky in this area to have such a wealth of wildlife due, in my opinion, to livestock farmers and the grass they grow.

Bees have been an interest to me lately. Is it really possible there are enough bees locally to pollinate the 70 acres of beans

being grown at Lower Burston. especially as the bean flowers are hidden under the canopy of the crop. We should all be eating local honey made from the flowers in local hedgerows and our own gardens. What could be better for you? I make no apologies for suggesting we should all get honey from Kevin Fletcher on Lines Hill local food naturally

produced and



believe me delicious. Like many naturally produced products honey is probably too cheap. Rather like wool.

Yes, shearing is coming up, something that has to be done for the comfort and welfare of the sheep. Gone are the days when the wealth of the country was built on wool. Last year Alex and I sold 825 kilos of wool. From 400 odd sheep, believe it or not, we have will have 22 different grades, each grade at a different price, ranging from 40 pence to 4p per kilo. The total wool check last year was £523 and the bill for shearing was £376! The margin of £150 then has to cover Alex and myself, and a friend working a full day sorting sheep for the shearer - feeding the two shearers and the chap who rolls and packs the fleeces, and then two trips to Thame with a Land Rover and trailer to deliver the valuable commodity. I mustn't complain - two years ago some of our wool was worth nothing at all - the woolstaplers took it to get it off our hands.

To think that in the past fortunes were made from wool - what price the woolsack in the House of Commons now - it's about as valuable as our politician's!

Peter mentioned in his column that I sometimes use voice dictation software to help with the task of typing up articles. This had led to some 'howlers'. Fortunately I spotted the one elsewhere this month, when IBM ViaVoice translated 'membership' as 'remember sh*t'. I wouldn't have wanted that to go into print! ~ Ed.





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


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60th Anniversary of VE Day - Czech Celebrations SUNDAY 24th JULY

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

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

Present

Cllrs. C. Higgs (Chair), R. Clarke, D. Dicken, P. Shorrock, M. Kent, T. Manning and Mrs. K. Curry (Clerk). One member of the public attended. Minutes of the last meeting were read and signed. There were no matters arising.

Clerk's Report

The Clerk asked councillors to consider where they may site the new noticeboard.

County Council, District Council And Police Matters

No one was present from any of the above organisations, but a short statement from District Councillor Peter Cooper was read out, outlining his support for the Parish Council regarding planning matters.

To Approve The Annual Accounts

Resolved to approve the annual accounts for year ending 31st March 2005. The Annual Return was signed.

Family Fun Day

The idea of a Family Fun Day on the Rec to raise money for the children's play area was warmly welcomed, though the organisers will have to provide their own insurance for the event.

Twinning

There are three villages in the Czech Republic who may be

interested in twinning with Aston Abbotts. Interest was expressed in this proposal, which will be brought to the next meeting.

Planning

 05/01218/APP Old Masters Restaurant, Old School, Cublington Road. Erection of two semi-detached houses. Resolved to oppose this application on the grounds that it would adversely affect the character of the Conservation Area, and is an overdevelopment of the plot.

Highways

It was noted that no rural verge cutting has been taking place.

Recreation Ground

Safety check - children's play area - up to date.

The Recreation Ground Committee reported that the grant they had applied to from AVDC has been refused. However, there is still the £10,000 which the Parish Council has provided. Permission was asked to spend this money on a 'Multiplay' system. Resolved to proceed with this part of the project.



Following requests for a Youth Club to be set up in Wingrave, we held an open meeting, chaired by Peter Rice from the Bucks Association of Youth Clubs. An outcome of this meeting was that we sent out a brief survey, in January, to ascertain the actual level of interest. The results indicated sufficient interest for us to go ahead and proceed with the setting up of a Youth Club. The survey results identified that the idea of a local Youth Club appealed mostly to the 10-12 year olds and 14-18 year olds. TROUBLE: Area of nonspecific space a child can always be sure to be in.


VITAMINS: Tiny facsimiles of cave people Mum forces you to swallow each morning as part of her sinister plot to have you grow up to be "Just like Daddy".

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Clergy Comment

Sixty years on from the end of the Second World War, it seems that there are still bottles are seems that there are still battles going on in Europe. But they are battles that we actually find happening in many areas of life.

People see what appears to be the thin end of a wedge, and the more they try to put the pieces together, the more they decide that they find these changes unacceptable. The European Constitution may be right, but we have not yet been convinced that it is the way forward.

Just over a year ago the parish churches of Wing, Wingrave with Rowsham, Aston Abbotts and Cublington were linked together. What was formerly one parish and a group of three parishes started to work together more closely. At present there are no formal links - although I suspect that they will come in time. There have been links before between these parishes. Wingrave and Wing, Aston Abbotts and Cublington, Wing and Aston Abbotts. But now we are trying to make a group of four work effectively.

But there is a mighty big difference between being alongside and working together and becoming a single unit. And we are working together for financial and logistical reasons - for the cost of a priest can be shared between the four parishes. Even whilst we remain separate we still find it difficult to offer and receive financial help from each other. We might be convinced of the logic - but we are still not sure whether we can yet remove the boundaries.

"I give to MY Church - I don't want the money to be used to solve problems somewhere else". I am sure that you know how the thinking goes. If THEY need money, let them get on and raise it - after all we do not have any spare money, we are struggling". "Even if we had spare money, we want to decide how it shall be spent rather than just having it taken from us".


But the Church isn't about money. Nor is about being pushed together into supposedly sensible units. The trouble is that those are two ways in which our minds work. We worry about the money and we worry about the organisation - and sometimes we are right to do so. But the Church of God is not about money or organisation, but about a loving God who gave his only Son to die for us.

How does our understanding of that loving God square with our concerns about the Church's constant shortage of money? Are we really being realistic?

Are we worried about some other hidden agenda that is going on that will change things? What is it about the future of our Church that we are really frightened about?

- 2.) Interaction using documents, maps, and propaganda leaflets. Talk to RAF and USAF personnel.
- 3.) WW11 equipment with lots of 'hands on' opportunities for both adults and children
- 4.) Discover life on the Front with demonstrations of period weapons including Bren and Vickers M/c guns. Other weapons available for the public to handle under supervision.



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
