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
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
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Peter Knight—Quiet Hero!



Our man of the soil, Peter Knight, starts yet another job for the village.


He has recently replaced the gate at the village end of Lines Hill, complaining that both old posts had been concreted in which was not the right way, or the country way, to do it.

CHICKEN FARM UPDATE

The planned installation of an egg production unit at Norduck has been halted until the New Year. At present the AA Residents Association has appealed to the Court on the grounds that Aylesbury Vale District Council has acted illegally in granting permission for the installation of the unit at Norduck. The date set by the Court to hear this appeal has been set for 12 February 2007 and thus no work can be started until this dispute has been resolved. The solicitor and barrister who are leading this appeal are understandably confident of a successful outcome.

It is perhaps worth pointing out that the Aylesbury Vale Planning Officer who is dealing with this application has consistently acquiesced to all the demands of the applicant and his agent with the result that the Operational Management Scheme submitted by the applicant was approved without question. For example, complaints will have to be made to the farm manager and in turn these will be forwarded to Aylesbury Vale officers once per year for their consideration; the chicken manure has to be moved off site each week, but the Deed defines the site as that land on which the poultry sheds will be situated, thus the manure might be stored anywhere else on the farm land with the possibility of gentle aromas percolating across the village. One of the conditions set by Aylesbury Vale calls for the construction of a passing bay on the bridleway leading to Norduck to allow for the safe passage of horses; the timing of this improvement is set to occur when the units have been built, i.e. after all the heavy construction traffic has ceased.

We pay the salaries of the District Council Officers and they are charged with making decisions in the best interests of the community. Their efforts with respect to this application suggest that they have failed this village community." Dickie Dicken

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


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An Alternative route for the A418



Below is the text of a letter sent to Kirk Adams, The County Planning Officer at County Offices Aylesbury on 13th September

As requested this is a formal letter of objection to all four of your alternative routes put forward for public consultation on the proposed A418 Improvements. Although writing on my own behalf at this moment in time you will have received a number of letters supporting the alternative 'Cheddington Route'. This is illustrated in

my drawing No WBP.706.7

My first objection is that there has been a procedural error by the BCC in that the Focus committee and perhaps your consultants we were advised to take a 'bit by bit' approach to the problem, rather than considering the route from Aylesbury to the Leighton bypass (A505) as a whole. Your approach has been to first consider the Wing Bypass Section of the route, for which alternative routes were studied within a very small search area, which is marked on the consultants' plans. The two other bypasses (Rowsham and Bierton) were added at a later date. You moved the

goal posts. This approach left very little scope for your consultants who were forced to suggest alternative routes which all crossed an Area of Attractive landscape. If this is true, then it is my belief that the Focus committee has been misled.

A glance at my drawing [above] will show that the Cheddington route is comparable in length and probably costs even before intangibles are considered. It may well cause less blight. The 'bit by bit' approach has meant that the route was entirely missed, and although alerted to its potential by my first letter to you (as a private individual) on 30th June 2005, by that time it would have upset your procedures and briefings, so there would have been a reluctance on the part of BCC to take it seriously. This is demonstrated by the fact that it does not appear on your brochure inset map of routes that have been considered and rejected at various stages between 2001 and 2006.

The main environmental objection to the BCC proposals are that they involve violation of the pristine Vale of Aylesbury landscape which we are all so anxious to conserve. The Cheddington Route avoids this dilemma. Although it is obvious that the Cheddington Route has an 'impact' on the surrounding landscape all bypasses have this problem, which has to be minimised. It does this by:

- A) Running parallel to the existing main line railway (an already disturbed area of the countryside).
- B) Running parallel to a line of pylons and the route of a former railway line (an already disturbed area of countryside).
- C) In the gap between Mentmore and Cheddington it swings away from the existing few houses below Cheddington Station and allows a generous buffer zone. which could contain earth mounds and planting. Continued on next page 11

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Socially it avoids the disharmony in Wing between those who want the BCC northern route and those who want the BCC southern route. Residents in the centre of Wing who suffer most from the traffic congestion suffer least from the BCC proposals. It removes the A418 through traffic as effectively as the BCC routes.

It begins and ends at the same point as the BCC southern route, but avoids the visual problems of disruption of views from Aylesbury Road houses and the Ascott Estate at Wing, and the close proximity to Ledburn.

It will avoid rat runs on the northern route, which will be caused by drivers wishing to avoid the A413 traffic jams and reaching the proposed route via Mursley, Swan-

bourne and Stewkley High Street. It will also prevent the degradation of the Cublington Valley and North Burcott, which would be inevitable should this route be selected. Were the residents of Stewkley, Cublington, Mursley and Swanbourne consulted?

It has incidental advantages to villages such as Mentmore, Cheddington and Long Marston because it improves accessibility, especially to Aylesbury.

Finally, I think that there is a real danger that should a BCC planning application be called in, it might (as before) be turned down on the grounds that alternative routes have not been properly considered.

I therefore consider it imperative that the Cheddington route be investigated to the

same standard as the selected BCC routes. The lack of central government funding in the short term means that there is plenty of time to do so. At an average cost of £5M per mile it would appear to be competitive and I am pleased to hear that the Bierton bypass is now undergoing a detailed investigation. This includes the first quarter of the Cheddington Route.

IS THERE AN ALTERNATIVE TO THE A418 STRATEGIC ROUTE?

Many concerns have been expressed about the proposed Wing and Rowsham bypasses. The proposed dual carriageway is, in fact, a new up-rated strategic route. Whilst residents may perceive the proposed 'A418 Improvements' purely as a scheme to provide traffic relief for the villages of Wing and Rowsham, the measures are, in reality, part of a much larger road scheme. They would link the M1 via the A505 to the A41 into London, hence forming a bypass of the highly congested M1 and M25. The benefits to the local community are therefore somewhat debatable when one realises the enormous growth in traffic that the scheme will bring to the area.

Aylesbury Vale Friends of the Earth, in conjunction with South Beds FOE are concerned that the proposed scheme has not given local residents adequate choice and knowledge of the alternatives. Over the summer we obtained grants in excess of £2000 to commission a leading independent expert in transport planning, whose work has been cited in Government documents and in the media. This expert, Dr Denvil Coombe, compiled a report looking at BCC's proposal and at whether BCC has provided adequate background evidence to support its position. We are now circulating Dr Coombe's report widely. It highlights several areas which show potential or real shortcomings of some of the background research and the conclusions reached by Bucks CC.

The report casts doubt over claims that the scheme will relieve congestion on the A413 North of Aylesbury. It has pointed out that arguments from Bucks

CC on the limited effectiveness of travel reduction measures and public transport have not been backed up by proper analysis of the nature of traffic using the A418 and A413.

The report has highlighted that the Government is currently examining the introduction of a national road pricing system. Road pricing, if introduced, could undermine the case for major changes to the A418. The report also expresses concern that the methodology used to assess the amount of traffic that a new upgraded road would generate, could have produced misleading results.

By increasing the available road space it actually encourages people to increase the length of their journeys. A new dual carriageway would promote longer car journeys, not only to shop, but to reach a place of work. As people head to Milton Keynes to shop, this is likely to have a knock-on effect on the economy of Aylesbury. New roads will mean more traffic travelling at a faster speed, and this will produce increased carbon dioxide emissions.

We have written to neighbouring Parish Councils informing them of the findings in this report. Friends of the Earth are now applying for further funding to commission a much larger study to explore viable options for sustainable transport as an alternative to major road building. We hope to work with Bucks CC on this commission. When the results are published we will share our findings.

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Peter Knight's Countryside Diary - October

I think I have now heard the ultimate in silliness from DEFRA, that amazing body of civil servants sent to try us and rule our lives.

I try to avoid too much reference to our farming regulations because I can find nothing positive to say about the petty laws we have to abide by.

An acquaintance with no agricultural connections and little rural understanding has accused me of 'always moaning' - heavens forbid. That chance remark almost made me give up these monthly notes. Who wants to be labelled as a moaning farmer? Being a grumpy old man is fine, quite acceptable, but a complaining farmer is not a label I wish to carry.

However lack of any exciting countryside news forces me to share the latest DEFRA joke with you.

A friend was dagging sheep in his farmyard when he was subject to a surprise inspection by Trading Standards.

Incidentally I understand that there are now seven official organisations that can arrive un-announced on a farm and carry out an inspection. They range from the local Water Company, obviously the Police, DEFRA itself to The Trading Standards Office - the latter being able to demand to see farm records and paperwork associated with crops and livestock as they implement DEFRA directives.

So - this chap was dagging some lambs. Ah yes dagging! Sheep and lambs in certain circumstances can get rather mucky round the tail end. Wool and 'you Know what' can form an inseparable partnership and this splendid combination has, sometimes, to be cut away from the animals rear end - dagging.

Yes, our friend was dagging lambs when a trading standards official called to see his paperwork, ear tags and to check on his general suitability to be allowed to farm.

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ALLOTMENT DIARY



Well, the end of another summer season is upon us. All of the summer fruit and vegetables have been harvested, and the appearance of the allotments is changing. Most are reverting to large expanses of bare earth. In Simon Guy's case, his allotment is changing to wall to wall Axminster. (It stops weeds from growing, in case you were wondering). In my case, because I have not been as attentive as I should have been to weeding recently, I have produced a very healthy crop of weeds — mainly nettles. Next week I must get round to pulling them up, or I shall be in bad odour with the other allotmenteers, since the seeds from my weeds will spread to their patches as well as mine.

To my slight surprise, my pumpkins have been in great demand – although I suspect that most are not destined for the dinner table. I am told that those that have not been given away can be stored, to be eaten by the end of the year. There are lots of exotic recipes for pumpkins on the internet, and I hope to try some of them: pumpkin curry, pumpkin ice-cream, pumpkin cheesecake, as well as the better known pumpkin pie and pumpkin soup. If any are worthwhile, I will let you know.

I had thought that my pumpkins were pretty big, until I saw a TV news item yesterday about someone in England who had grown a pumpkin so big, he was able to cut off the top, scoop out the inside, attach an outboard motor to it, and them get in it and sail across a river!

We allotmenteers have just enjoyed our second allotment dinner, at which the greater part of the food had been produced on our own allotments. Things started well, with Brian (one of the allotmentholders from outside the village) producing and sharing with everyone a bottle of grappa that he had recently brought back from Italy. The starter was leek & potato soup from the Clarke patch. For the main course we had a delicious piece of beef, courtesy of Andy & Sue Digby, accompanied by a choice of five different vegetables grown by various allotment holders. (My offering was pumpkin pieces, roasted with shallots and sage, which I thought wasn't bad). We then had a selection of puddings of such excellence, that almost everyone had two helpings, so that they could try two different sorts (except for Richard Clark who liked the bread & butter pudding so much, he had several helpings of this). All this washed down by copious drafts of the wine which the diners had thought to bring with them. On behalf of all the allotment holders, I would like to thank Colin Higgs for organising the event.

The evening concluded with the pumpkin judging competition, at which Andy Digby won with a pumpkin measured to have a circumference of 36 inches, so pushing the writer's 32 inch pumpkin into second place. We losers consoled ourselves with the knowledge that size is not everything! And I hate to be accused of sour grapes, but I did think that putting a seat-belt round his pumpkin for the drive home was a bit over the top. . . !



During the Aston Abbotts fete on Saturday 22nd July I met Czech freelance journalist Tomas Mrva and introduced him to people in the village. Tomas Mrva used to work for the BBC Slovak Service, but this was axed during their cost-cutting and he has now become a freelancer to make money. He wanted to write an article about the Czechs and Slovaks in Aston Abbotts during the Second World War. He wrote an article that was published by the Slovak national newspaper Pravda (Truth) on 30th-August 2006. He kindly sent me this translation from Slovak to English:

President Beneš's Forgotten Sanctuary

For a village of four hundred people, Aston Abbotts has a surprisingly rich history. A famous explorer James Clark Ross, who was the first person to reach the North Magnetic Pole in 1832, lived and is buried there. During the World War II, the Abbey in a village was for almost five years home for the exiled Czechoslovak president Edvard Beneš and his suite. When London was bombed in 1940, the president wanted to stay there but Jan Masaryk, the Foreign Minister, was determined to find a safer place. Aston Abbotts was reasonably far from German bombers' targets and there was one more reason why to move there. "Both these statesmen were good friends of the Rotschild family which lived in the nearby Wing, so it is possible that they asked the Rotschilds for some advice where to go. The Rotschilds were the friends of the owners of the Abbey in Aston Abbotts, so we can find some link there," says Neil Rees, the author of The Czech Connection, a book on the exile government. The then owners of the Abbey, Harold and Beatrice Morton, voluntarily gave up the property in favour of the Czechoslovak president. Dr Beneš moved in in November 1940, accompanied by his wife, nieces, dog, servants and bodyguards. The Czechoslovak soldiers lived in three huts built by Italian prisoners of war.

According to the locals, the soldiers kept a low profile, and their presence had little effect on people's

lives. "They were very nice people. Some of them used to come to the Sunday services to the church," remembers a 93-year-old Nathalie Higgs. Her son Colin recalls that Dr Beneš bought a globe to the local school and children used to sing Christmas carols to the soldiers. Even the war could not distract people from entertaining activities. "There was a lot of snow during the war winters. The soldiers built their own skis and tried to teach us skiing. I was falling most of the time," smiles Victor Scott, who met the president for the first time while opening the gate on the road. Edvard Beneš and his wife started chatting with a boy and their meetings became regular. After the presidential couple had left after the war, Victor sent them a letter with best wishes.

"When I went to Prague, I rang the bell at the Castle and asked if I could talk to the president. I was very pleased that Dr Beneš and his wife remembered me and invited me in," says Victor. One of the favourite stories of the locals is about a young woman who fell in love with a Czech soldier. "He was originally an accountant but his English was not very good, so she understood he had been a count. Excited, she was telling everyone that she would marry a Czech count. It all ended sadly because he disappeared during the Communism," remembers Victor. He adds that villagers still hold a high opinion of the president, his suite and the soldiers who served in Aston Abbotts. Victor Scott, who is a respected horticulturalist, also had roses planted in the churchyard, from the Friendship and Peace Park in Lidice. The roses are a symbol of birth and a national symbol of England, and as the assassination of Reinhard Heydrich, which led to the Lidice massacre, was probably planned in the Abbey, by planting the roses from Lidice. Victor Scott wanted to close the circle of life and death that started in his village.
