Letters to the Editor

Dear Mr Ellwood (copy to Editor)

I refer to the article in the December issue of the Aston Abbotts Chronicle and, after reading it several times, offer the following comments.

Whilst I would fully support and wish you luck with the Aston Abbotts Parish Plan, I cannot help but feel it will in the end be a complete waste of time and money. The article states that - A Parish Plan is a locally inspired vision of how a village should develop; in essence it is an aspiration of how we would like our village to be and that village opinion should play a significant part in that development. Sounds very grand, and who could not support it, but will our wishes really be truly considered.

I give you a very recent excellent example of the sort of thing I am trying to say.

We, that is the whole village of Aston Abbotts and the immediate surrounding area, objected most energetically to a Planning Application for an 18,000 bird Chicken Farm located within 1/2 mile of the village, immediately adjacent to 3 properties and very close to a further 10 or so dwellings. There were over 100 letters of objection which is the most AVDC had ever had opposing a planning application and for the first time ever they had to hire the Aylesbury Civic Centre for a Planning Control Committee Meeting because so may people wanted to attend.

This application was also opposed by our Parish Council, and involved our MP John Bercow and local councillor Quentin Ings-Chambers. As well as all the letters I sent to the planning officer, Bill Nicholson and his boss Norman Skedge, I also sent a letters to the Prime Minister, David Cameron. Sir Menzies Campbell and AVDC Chief Executive Richard Carr all of whom appeared not to be interested.

Because all our objections were getting us nowhere with a planning department that appeared to have already made their decision, the residents living nearby at their own expense, employed a lawyer to fight theirs and indirectly our corner but to no avail. None of our well founded objections were considered and AVDC granted planning permission. It is only because of these residents appealing that this Farm in not up and running yet for which we are all very grateful. To rub salt in the wound a local councillor at the planning hearing even said something like they are pretty birds and a few of them would not be a problem. What chance have we of this Parish Plan succeeding when a councillor who voted for the application could not grasp the concept of the size of the Farm, its location, 18,000 birds and all the problems associated with them.

My point is that while the whole village and surrounding area were opposed to this development, nobody in government or AVDC would listen or even truly consider our objections. We feel our village is now blighted with houses that when they do go up for sale take a long time to sell.

Do you really think that this Parish Plan will make any difference. I hope it will and that it will be made to work. But I think that in the end AVDC will do exactly as they please, irrespective of what we aspire to. *Fred Paul*

Dear Mr Paul

Thank you for your input and good wishes. I share your scepticism over AVDC approach to planning issues; I was closely involved in the Chicken Farm debacle and have witnessed their tactics at close range.

The Parish Plan, I think, addresses slightly different issues; it attempts to influence long term plans at their conception rather than opposing current projects. It could be argued that AVDC will adopt the same approach but taking the 'do nothing option' would play into the hands of the Council and, therefore, we must do something. The key is to be realistic, identify and address issues that we can influence and discard those we cannot.

I value your comments and would be grateful for your continued input as the plan progresses. *Peter Ellwood*



Aston Abbotts Parish Council Wednesday 5th November 2007

Present: - Cllrs. C Higgs, D Dicken, R Clarke, K Curry, J Hardcastle, P Shorrock, A Stefancyzk and P Bruton (Clerk). There were three members of the public in attendance.

It was reported to the meeting that we had received notification of the proposed re-organisation of the Mursley Deanery. The current proposal will mean that Aston Abbotts would no longer be part of the Wingrave benefice and we would be linked with Cublington, Stewkley and Soulbury. It was agreed that we should write to the Reverend J Waller, with copies to the Arch Deacon and Bishop in support of the PCC and on behalf of the community to express our concern over the proposed changes.

The recent Police surgery meeting had been better attended. We had suggested a return to attending the Parish Council meeting were advised that the Police wished to continue with the current approach for at least a year. The main area covered by the Surgery concerned the level of burglaries and the need for increased awareness.

It was noted that the kerb repairs had been completed.

We had received a letter from the Fire Authority requesting details of potential events that may require audits in respect of the Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005. It was agreed to seek advice from BALC in case the Annual Fete and Astonbury were considered notifiable events.

The meeting was updated on the current progress regarding the lease on the Church rooms and it was noted that the date for spending the Section 106 monies was July 2009. There followed a discussion on what the monies could be spent on and proposals were considered. It was agreed that we should contact the Solicitors to obtain up to date position on the lease. It was further agreed that the legal documentation would be checked for a possible definition of "improvements" that the monies could be assigned to. It was also agreed the matter would be included on next month's Agenda for a decision on how the monies would be spent and a date for action.

It was reported that there was a further meeting of the Village Plan Group scheduled for week commencing 10th December. There had been no further volunteers to take part, and there was a questionnaire available to use as part of the process.

We had received a reply to our objections to the proposed Switching off of Street lights – Phase 2. Buckinghamshire County Council had noted our concerns but felt that the enhancement measures they would introduce would maintain safety and in any event that conditions would be monitored throughout the trial period.

It was reported that work on six of the streetlights had been ordered. We had sufficient funds for a further six and we should budget to have the remaining lights replaced over the next 2 years. It was agreed that the priority of lights to be repaired would be decided by members of the Council.

The quotes received for the clearance of the work on the Recreation Ground were reviewed and discussed. It was agreed to negotiate with the preferred supplier.

It was confirmed we had applied for a grant in respect of the above mentioned clearance work, and at this stage it was agreed to include the full amount in the budget.

The budget for 2008/09 was reviewed and various expense categories were reviewed and amended as appropriate. It was agreed the amended figures would be circulated and the budget finalised when the outcome of the grant application is known

It was agreed that the dates of the future meetings would be:

Wednesday 16th January 2008 Wednesday 27th February 2008 Wednesday 9th April 2008

It was agreed to set the dates for the Annual Parish Meeting and Annual Parish Council Meeting at the next meeting.

There being no further business, the meeting closed at 9:40 p.m.

ALLOTMENT DIARY

Nothing happened. Well, it didn't on my allotment anyway.

So I thought I'd fill up the space with some more stuff about the history of allotments. I mentioned in an earlier article the fact that allotments as we now know them began with the Allotment Acts of the 19th Century and early 20th Century. However I have now discovered that allotments go back much earlier than this. There are some small Celtic fields (dating back to about 100 B.C.) near Lands End in Cornwall, that are still used as allotments to the present day, but it was in Anglo-Saxon times (around 1000 A.D.) that we discover the first "allotted" pieces of land. A community would clear the woodland that then covered much of England, and the land thus liberated for cultivation was then shared out between the members of the community.

Between this period and around 1500, the communal pattern of land owning persisted, but increasingly the land came into the hands of Church. the monasteries and manorial lords. However, come the Reformation



in the mid-16th Century, the Church and monasteries had their lands confiscated, but this did not mean that the man in the (village) street acquired more of it: it generally fell into the hands of the robber barons – some of whose descendants still sit in the House of Lords today.

Then, in the reign of Elizabeth I, manorial land was enclosed and commoners were compensated with allotments of land attached to their cottages. In these days, of course, the allotment was more a means of survival than a recreation or an alternative to the supermarket.

At the end of the 18th Century and early 19th Century there were many more enclosures, especially as a result of private Acts of Parliament which allowed this, which led to considerable unrest among the labouring classes By 1845, the fear of a peasant revolt led to the General Enclosure Act. Commissioners travelled the length and breadth of the country authorising enclosures, on condition that land was set aside as allotments. However the full weight of the law was required to ensure there were enough allotments to keep the working classes fed. Then from 1887 onwards the pendulum swung back in favour of the common man; there came the various Allotment Acts about which I have already written, by which local councils were put under a statutory duty to provide land for cultivation as long as it was not required for commercial purposes, and these acts led to the allotments that we still have today.

We allotmenteers need no longer fear our allotments being purloined by robber barons or ecclesiastical authorities, but of course we face a new threat: the risk of someone deciding (and persuading the powers that be) that our allotments would make a good site for a new housing development. I do not think there is any chance of this happening here in Aston Abbotts, but this has happened in many parts of the country.

Well, I think that's it for 2007: I hope you all had a good Christmas; and may I wish you all a Happy New Year. *Peter*

Public Meeting on the A418

Tuesday 15th January 2008 7.30pm, Wing Village Hall, Leighton Road, Wing

Public Launch and Presentation of the A418 Alternatives Report by it's author Tom Cohen from Steer Davies Gleave followed by a Question and Answer session.

Bucks CC will be present to answer questions and to give an update on the various options for the A418. Stephen Joseph OBE, Director of Campaign for Better Transport will chair the meeting.

The Alternatives report was commissioned by South Beds FoE, with the support of Aylesbury Vale FoE and Bucks CC.

The meeting is hosted by Wing Parish Council


Green Scene - An opportunity to solve problems along the A418

Over the past 18 months Aylesbury Vale Friends of the Earth (AVFoE) has been working with South Bedfordshire FoE on the future of the A418 north of Aylesbury. The 'A418 Improvement scheme' proposed by Bucks CC in the summer of 2006 consisted of four route options of bypasses around Wing and Rowsham. The public consultation created a lot of NIMBY opposition as all routes traversed through or near other villages, as well as support and proposals for modification. However, AVFoE took the stance that any major road building scheme was highly undesirable and unsustainable and other options had to be investigated. This led to major fund raising to commission various reports from top transport consultants.

The first report was written by a very well respected consultant and government advisor. He looked at the modeling work (the traffic models etc) Bucks CC had done on the proposed road scheme and whether they had followed Government guidelines. One noted shortcoming was an incomplete evaluation of the impacts of improved public transport and other sustainable transport measures along A418 corridor. Following this report, South Beds FoE supported by AVFoE commissioned a scoping report to see what could be covered and the cost involved in commissioning a much more detailed study into how alternative transport measures along the A418 would compare in outcome to major road schemes. Dialogue and meetings between FOE and Bucks CC officers followed. The end result was that local FoE groups and Bucks CC agreed to enter into a working partnership which was 'practically unheard of' (Alternatives Report). Together they commissioned an Alternatives Report on the A418 costing £40K! It has been quite some achievement for the local FoE groups to raise £20K. Thanks to national networking by the local FoE groups with the support of Campaign for Better Transport, top sustainable transport experts were invited to join the steering group, along with officers of Bucks CC and FoE representatives.

However in October, Bucks CC made an announcement that due to several significant changes in Government guidance, there were many uncertainties surrounding the making of a decision on a solution for the A418 corridor. One of the significant changes in Government guidelines was the funding implications for Bucks CC as the new draft guidance stated that BCC would have to find at least £8 million to fund this road scheme (10% contribution). Therefore before any decision could be made the County Council would have to agree to fund this amount. There is also the issue that in order for the road scheme to get funding from the government it has to be recommended by the region (in our case the South East Region) as a priority for the whole region. At present it is not in the top list of priorities for the SE region, however the priority list is due to be refreshed at the beginning of 2008 and therefore it is unknown whereabouts in the list the scheme will be placed. However it is unlikely to be funded in the near future.

GREEN SCENE

What is the key concern for the local FoE groups is that something is done as soon as possible to alleviate the many problems and issues faced daily by people living and travelling along the A418 corridor. Inaction is not an option.

So what does this Alternatives Report suggest? Firstly the Report goes right back to the beginning and spells out what objectives any package of measures should achieve so that they can transparently be measured against any scheme. The objectives in the report differ slightly from those of the road scheme as they include social inclusion as a main objective. This was added due to increasing local concern for the isolation of elderly and young people in the villages due to lack of public transport.

The report then goes on to list the constraints operating. In the past the justification for building a road has largely been assessed on a time saving (saving in minutes and seconds) and a reduction in accidents, but in this time of increased car ownership, environmental and heath impacts, there are far more factors that need to come into the equation. One needs to know how much of the traffic is local and how much is through traffic and work out how to reduce the number of cars and HGVs through the villages. The measures looked at in the Report include, frequent high quality buses both to railway stations and to urban centres, demand responsive taxi buses, increasing the safety for pedestrians and cyclists within Wing, Rowsham and Bierton, making sure travel plans are in place and followed and looking at the feasibility of minor road improvement within Wing itself and along the A418.

The Report uses a new computer assessment tool that feeds different packages of measures into a computer programme and weighs them up against the objectives and constraints. This is an exciting and new way of transparently weighing up the benefits and disbenefits of a transport scheme, so that everybody can understand the decisions making process and what weight is being given to different factors by the decision makers. The report examines and questions the way that the government funds sustainable transport and appraises road schemes. The Report is being released to the public at the beginning of January and a public meeting is planned at Wing Village Hall on Tuesday 15th January at 7.30pm. Please come along to discover the interesting findings of this research. This Report could well have national significance.







1st Wingrave Scout Group





All in all, a very appropriate, pleasant and festive way to start the Christmas celebrations.


