



ALLOTMENT DIARY

I have recently read that the trendy term in America for a vegetable garden (I don't think they have allotments) is an "edible estate" — which does sound rather grand. They also are very keen on "asphalt gardening" in cities, which is reclaiming empty lots or disused parking spaces, placing raised wooden beds on them and growing tomatoes and pumpkins beneath the sheltered walls in the hot urban sun. There is an added benefit in that the earth used for the vegetables soaks up the run-off water that would otherwise overload the sewers during storms — and of course the greenery softens the hardness of the concrete landscape. Maybe allotments will be the next big thing in the USA?

The author of the article also suggested that because of the current food crisis, lawns, which are totally non-productive from a food point of view (and indeed, increase our carbon footprint because of the petrol or electricity we use mowing them), might become very unfashionable, and that we will in a few years' time all be converting our gardens into replicas of "The Good Life"! If it happens, remember that you read it here first!

Every year I vow I will not go away in May, because of the way that weeds attack my allotment while I am away. Then each year I forget. I have just returned from a week in Corsica - with the usual dire consequences to my allotment, which I have just spent several days rectifying. As I write this, am about to go away again, this time to Greece - and by the time I return, I dread to think what devastation will have been wreaked. In the past, the metaphor that was always used for a job that went on for ever, was "painting the Forth Bridge". However, now that they have been able to paint it with a new form of paint that will last for 20 years or so, this metaphor no longer seems appropriate. I reckon that it should be replaced with "weeding ones allotment" - and I guarantee that I would get plenty of support for the change from the gardening fraternity.



Every year, in common, I think, with most gardeners, I suffer some minor calamity. This year it was the fact that, since I was late planting my sweet-corn seeds in my greenhouse, when I went away at the beginning of May, the weather having been fairly mild, I left them in a

heated propagator. We then of course had a miniheatwave, and when I returned, I found the poor things had got cooked. Those that did come up started turning brown, and some did not germinate at all. I shall plant the brownish ones, and keep my fingers crossed; and have acquired some new seeds that do not have to be planted out until early June (when I am next in the village). A month or two ago, I wrote about the derivation of the names of some of our common vegetables. I have just read an article about the derivation of the names of a number of other foods. Something I had never considered, is the fact that food is the single most important conveyer of words between languages. When a strange foreign food was introduced into Britain, then since we did not have a word for it, we would adopt, or anglicise, the foreign name.

The words wine, pepper, salt, butter and radish all came to Britain with the Roman invasion, Radish, for example, is from the Latin "radix" meaning a root. The Norman Invasion brought a whole banquet of words for food: the words used for the cooked animals on the table were derived from the Norman French (since it was largely only the rich, upper class, Normans who could afford to eat meat); while "on the hoof", the animals retained their old Anglo-Saxon names. Thus, we eat beef (from the French "boeuf" - an ox), while the animal in the field is a bull or a cow or, in old-fashioned parlance, an ox. We eat pork (from the French "porc" a pig), and mutton (from the French "mouton" - a sheep), while the animals in the fields still retain their Anglo-Saxon names. Venison is a slightly different case: it does not come from the French word for "deer", but from the old French word for the produce of the hunt - which was of course usually deer in this country (and which the local Anglo-Saxons were forbidden to hunt).

Chocolate comes from the Aztec word "xocoatl", which meant "bitter water", and was used by the Aztecs as the name for the juice of the pods of the cacao tree. Sugar comes from the Arabic "sukkar", having been introduced to Europe some 1,000 years ago by the Berbers. Although the word "apricot" seems at first sight to have come from the French "abricot", it is probable that both words derive from an Arabic word "al-burquq", since the fruit was introduced to Europe by the Arabs. Marzipan may take its name from a Burmese city; and orange stems from the Sanskrit word for a citrus tree "nananj". (Interestingly, the word in English was originally "a norange", and over the years the "n" got switched to the indefinite article instead. "Newt" has gone the other way: the animal was once "an ewt").

When the foreign word was too peculiar to remember or adapt, the very foreignness of the food became its description: "Walnut", for example comes from the old English "walnutu", meaning "foreign nut", since the first walnuts came from Italy.

The oddest bit of etymology I have found is that of the spice "coriander". This derives ultimately (and, as the author says, unnervingly) from the ancient Greek word for bedbug, "koris"; since it is said that coriander smells of crushed bedbugs!

COUNTRY MATTERS

What a shame that the weather in early May could not last until September, alas we always think we are going to pay for it in the long-term, I'm not asking for wall to wall sunshine such as in Spain but just a lovely summer, like we used to have when we were all young!!

A lot of hot air is being bandied about flatulating cows and cattle. It has been estimated that livestock make a bigger contribution to greenhouse gases and emissions than road transport. What a load of total hogwash, when was the last time you stood behind a cow's backend belching out dense black diesel fumes for 10 hours a day. Where do people get all these ridiculous figures from? The good news is that plant breeders are developing new strains of non-bloating legumes such as Sanfoin and other forage that would reduce the amount of methane produced. All good stuff especially seeing that the developing eastern countries are demanding more meat as their standard of living rises. Anyway, who says that there are now more ruminants in the world than 200 years ago? In 1800 there were 60 million Bison on the plains of America, not wise to be down wind of that lot!!

The other current thorny issue is the ongoing argument between DEFRA and the National Federation of Badger Groups. It is now more than 10 years since the Kreb Report confirmed the compelling evidence that badgers transmit T.B. to cattle, even now badger groups themselves are accepting this is the case. The devastation of killing thousands of "Reactor" cattle a year is a complete waste of money and resources. Apart from the loss of the cattle. Unfortunately in areas of high density cattle, (which we are not in), the badgers will have to be controlled. Not exterminated, as some people wrongly believe, but their number kept in check. Badger control in Ireland appears to be working well.

Yes the EU nutters are at it again: 'The EU has banned mince made from meat hung for more that 6 days with immediate effect. This is to protect the small minority of French consumers from eating potentially contaminated steak tartare that is made up from ground up raw steak mixed with eggs and herbs. The ban effectively means mince cannot be made from off cuts and must be made from fresher meat that has to be processed more quickly. It has to be disposed of if it misses the 6 day limit, leading to more wastage. Industry experts say the price of mince could now soar by 40p/lb. This is likely to affect traditional foods like Scotch pies, shepherds pie and popular foods like chili, lasagna, spaghetti Bolognese and burgers.' Now don't blame the farmers for that one.

The rest of my 24 month old chickens have had to go today. The good news is that the new 50 young girls are laying small eggs at 20 weeks. Watch this space.



MINUTES OF THE ASTON ABBOTTS ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 2008

The annual Parish Meeting was held on Wednesday 7th May in the Church Room at 8pm.

PRESENT Colin Higgs (Vice Chairman of the Parish Council), Paul Bruton (Clerk to the Annual Parish Meeting), Peter Cooper (District Councillor), Paula Boston (Community Support Officer) and 9 parishioners.

MINUTE 1 Apologies – Peter Shorrock (Chairman of the Parish Council), Dickie Dicken and Richard Clarke.

MINUTE 2 Minutes of previous meeting were approved by the Meeting as a true record, and signed by the Chairman.

MINUTE 3 Matters arising – none.

MINUTE 4 County Council, District Council and Police

No one was present from the County Council

Community Support Officer Paula Boston who operates out of Wing Police office, talked to the meeting about her role and reported on the following issues:

- The crime statistics for the previous 6 months included 4 traffic collisions (including the A418) and 22 reported incidents, 10 of these had resulted in criminal incidents.
- Villagers should be aware of an increase in reported disturbance burglaries and if they have any suspicions report them to the 0845 number that would now be listed in the Chronicle.
- Neighbourhood Watch scheme leaflets were available at the meeting and if any villagers were interested in setting up a scheme advice is included in the documentation.

CSO Paula Boston then answered questions from the floor, after which the Chairman thanked her for attending the meeting.

District Councillor Peter Cooper talked to the meeting about the following issues:

- A418 Improvements and Survey results the results of the recent survey were reported to the meeting and County Council were finalising a formal funding bid to be presented to SEERA at the end of May 2008. A decision was expected in December 2008 and if successful then nothing would be likely to happen before 2016. Additionally the funding structure had changed and in order to meet application requirements Bucks. C.C. would have to find the 1st 10% of funds and 50% of any over running costs. The budget figure was £130 million and included the A41 extension.
- Planning Developments for Aylesbury Vale an over view of the current status and issues affecting AVDC in meeting the Government housing targets was presented. This included the different approaches being considered and the potential impact on Rural areas.
- Post Offices The District Council continued to battle to keep our rural Post Offices, however he was not very confident that Wingrave would escape closure.

Cllr. Cooper then answered questions from the floor, after which the Chairman thanked him for attending the meeting.

MINUTE 5 Annual report from the Parish Council Chairman. Colin Higgs (Chairman) read Peter Shorrock's annual report (to be published separately) in his absence.

MINUTE 6 Village Activities.

Reports were given on activities during the year of the following organisations: G.N.O.M.E.S. (Judy Hardcastle), Ladies' Club (Shirley Ford), P.C.C. (Colin Higgs)

MINUTE 7 Children's Play Area and Recreation Ground

The Chairman referred to Peter Shorrock's report that informed the meeting that the Aerial Runway had been successfully repaired and the strip of land acquired from AVDC had been landscaped.

MINUTE 8 Church Room

The Chairman advised the meeting that progress was being made on the Lease of the building and the next step would be to carry out a survey of condition.

MINUTE 9 The Chronicle

John Hardcastle (editor) thanked the following for all their hard work over the year in contributing to the continuing success of the Chronicle – Phil Corrigan (advertising manager), Andy Bystra (printing and distribution) and John Whyte (finances) as well as the regular contributors of articles. John reported that the finances were stable, and requested that the current level of financial support be maintained. The meeting thanked John Hardcastle for all his efforts during the year.


MINUTE 10 Fete 2007

The advertisers encourage us to cheer ourselves up by buying what we can't afford. We are encouraged to seek happiness in retail therapy, in wanting what we haven't got.

I admit I can get a thrill from shopping, but then I get home and open the bag and disappointment begins to set in. The happiness promise is never fulfilled.

The Office of National Statistics revealed recently that though we are healthier and twice as well off than we were in 1987, we are no happier. 





CRIME CANNOT FLOURISH IN A COMMUNITY THAT CARES

Neighbourhood Watch schemes can vary in size from a large estate to a few houses. A scheme is generally led by a volunteer co-ordinator (or several if the scheme is large).

Their role is to get people working together. Schemes keep in touch with local police to share information and advice among members.

How do NHW schemes get started?

- First contact your local NHW office to find out if a scheme already exists. They will send you an information pack.
- Ask your neighbours, preferably in person, or through a questionnaire, if they want to be involved in a NHW scheme.
- Once you have enough interest a "start-up" meeting can be arranged through your local NHW office.
- At the meeting information will be given about basic crime prevention and the type of incidents and crimes to report to the police. An Area Beat Officer may also attend if available.
- Members may be asked to contribute a nominal amount per household towards the cost of street signs, photocopying and any other expenses.

What do I have to do as a Co-ordinator?

- Support and promote NHW activity within your scheme.
- Receive information from the Ringmaster messaging system (by phone, fax or e-mail) and distribute these messages to scheme members.
- Keep a check on vulnerable households.
- Welcome newcomers and invite them to be part of the scheme
- Reassure and support members, especially the elderly and vulnerable.

How can members get involved?

- Report anything suspicious or out of the ordinary to the police and let your neighbours know.
- Be aware of and practice the Top 10 Neighbourly Tips (see overleaf).
- Participate

Success depends upon a number of factors but the most important is commitment and a desire to improve the safety of their community.

We are mindful that in some areas people may want to help but live in fear of intimidation. We have many members operating without any outward signs of membership who provide a valuable two way link in helping to deal with problems in their communities.

Too Busy for NHW - Community Watch may be the answer

These days, many of us are too busy to take on extra commitments. Time is precious to us all and perhaps you cannot find time to volunteer for a regular commitment.

Thames Valley Community Messaging enables individual people in the community to be kept informed of crime alerts and information in their neighbourhood. You can register as a member of Community Watch by:




