



The Wingrave with Rowsham Communique (December Edition) reported that, at their Parish Council held on 11th November, 'Councillor Cooper reported that the wishes of Aston Abbotts and Wingrave and Rowsham Councils each to keep two lights working at the A418 crossroads had been rejected by Bucks County Council (BCC). BCC wanted to keep to the three year trial of switching off lights - and would not agree to parishes keeping some lights on'. Aston Abbotts Parish Council is continuing to try and get BCC's decision changed



#### **TIGER TRAIL**

Our recent trip to India was certainly a memorable one. Upon arrival at the airport we were met by a smiling guide, who cheerfully informed us that the three things you need when driving in India, were, good brakes, a good horn and good luck! Our driver definitely needed all of them. The tour began in Delhi. Comfortably ensconced in our air-conditioned coach, we viewed the morbidly fascinating scenes of abject poverty and squalor. People worked, bathed, shaved, socialised, and in short, lived and some probably died on the streets. Nothing could have prepared us for the street life of the "Pink City" of Jaipur. It is a seething mass of humanity. Every imaginable kind of vehicle, cars, trucks, tractors, tuktuks, coaches and motor- bikes, shared the roads with camels, monkeys, pigs, goats, dogs, cows and even gaily-painted elephants! I forgot to mention rickshaws. We took a ride in one around the city, and it was a hair raising, experience. Some motor- bikes accommodated families of up to five; the women rode sidesaddle, their vibrantly beautiful jewelled saris glittering in the sunlight. Numerous barrows and stalls overflowed with colourful vegetables, fruits and nuts. It was an unforgettable experience.

Next stop was the tiger reserve. There are only about thirty-five tigers in this reserve, so a sighting is rare. After many hours the sight of a tigress finally rewarded us. She lay on her back with all four feet in the air, just like a contented pet cat! Our second visit resulted in the sighting of a young male tiger, high up in the forest undergrowth, his massive head and shoulders quite motionless. He calmly surveyed the group of awe-stricken tourists; then rose lazily, bored of the proceedings and ambled off into the vegetation. We felt very privileged to have seen tigers in

their natural habitat. Weary but triumphant we left the forest to the tigers.



On to the Taj Mahal, which really defies description. It took twenty-two years and up to one hundred thousand workers to create this magnificent monument. It was built in memory of the beloved wife of Emperor Shah Jahan; her dying request was for him to build an incomparable monument over her grave in her memory. No finer labour of love can surely exist.

Our last stop was Kerala, almost as far south as you can go. Our hotel consisted of about sixty bungalows modelled on a traditional fisherman's dwellings. Each one was thatched with coconut leaves, the bathroom

was partly open air, and if you sat in the shower tray you could see the palm trees swaying above you! It was set in twenty-five acres of palm groves and was totally "eco" friendly; everything was organic, biodegradable, solar-powered, and reusable wherever possible. Even the envelopes, carrier and laundry bags were made of recycled newspaper. Kerala is laced with verdant backwaters and a pleasant morning was spent cruising these waters, observing the fascinating life of the river people. One day we cycled to a nearby village. There were no other westerners in sight, and we were viewed with amazement and amusement. The meandering mud roads led us past paddy fields, and remote primitive dwellings and farmsteads. The hotel gardens led down to the almost deserted, white sand, palm fringed beach that bordered the Arabian Sea. Either side of the hotel there were fishing villages, and we watched the boats come ashore, disgorging their catch; the nets glistening like dew-strung cobwebs in the sunlight. On our last evening as we watched the sun set on the beach, we promised ourselves that we must surely return to India one day. Carol Spooner







#### **Aston Abbotts Parish Council**

Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> December 2008

Present: - Cllrs. C Higgs, D Dicken, K Curry, J Hardcastle, P Shorrock, R Clarke and P Bruton (Clerk).

Apologies had been received from A Stefancyzx.

District Councillor P Cooper

The Clerk had received a request from Bucks CC for venues that may be used as information points. He was advised to notify them that the Church Rooms could be offered as suitable place, however they should be advised that the facility was not always available.

It was reported during a meeting with a surveyor at the Church rooms it had been identified that there was no insulation in the roof and signs of woodworm infestation. The Clerk also advised BCC had confirmed that a disabled entrance ramp would meet the improvement criteria specified in the S106 funding documents. After discussion on various potential expenditure it was decided that quotations for the options would be obtained and the Clerk would investigate whether a Grant could be obtained in respect of the insulation as well as clarifying BCC's position should we wish to allocate further monies to replacement tables and chairs.

Council was updated on a recent minor amendment in respect of the planning application for an Agricultural Dwelling – New Field Off Moat Lane.

It was reported that completion of the Village Plan questionnaire to be circulated to Villagers was anticipated by the end of the year. It was felt that the item should be removed from future Agenda's and the Clerk would be notified when the item required inclusion.

The article in the Chronicle requesting volunteers for a possible Speedwatch campaign had so far produced no response. It was also reported that there had been no contact following the last NAG meeting. It was noted that the matter would be raised by our representative at the forthcoming Local Area Forum.

The County Council is currently reviewing the Speed limit along the A418 in our Parish. The details of the proposals were discussed and they appeared to indicate that a 30mph limit would be introduced through Bierton, National speed limit to Rowsham, 40mph and traffic calming through Rowsham (30mph side streets), then reverting to the National speed limit through to Wing. All found the supporting documents confusing and the Clerk would seek to obtain clarification on certain points in order that the matter could be discussed further and a response made following Council's next meeting.

There was currently nothing further to report on the matter of the drainage of surface water from the Hunters Way development, however concern was expressed over the alleged breach of approved details and as we were awaiting a response from AVDC the item would be included on next month's Agenda.

It was noted that we had been refused permission to adopt 2 streetlights at Wingrave Crossroads as BCC were concerned that this would set a precedent. There was disappointment at this decision and it was suggested that as the area was within the Parish boundary we might be able to erect a streetlight of our own. This would been investigated further as well as looking at other potential solutions. There was nothing to report on the height of trees affecting some streetlights.

Councillor Cooper reported that the current indications were that Council tax would rise by 2% next year although this had yet to finalised.

The Clerk advised he had received a letter from BCC regarding the possibility of a phased footpath to Wingrave Crossroads utilising funding from the Local Area Forum. It was AGREED we should bid for a phased scheme and the necessary application made.

The monthly Recreation Ground inspection had been carried out and there was nothing to report.

We were still awaiting the final quotation in respect of the tree overgrowth on the Recreation Ground.

It was confirmed that the next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> January 2009 at 20.00 in the Church Rooms.



Get a window sticker for no doorstep sales and your STOP, CHAIN, CHECK sticker from crime reduction.



#### **ALLOTMENT DIARY**

I was reading an item in my paper this morning about an England rugby player, Matthew Tait, who is suffering from sciatica, and while he is receiving treatment for this – and is unable to play rugby – has taken up cultivating a vegetable patch in his back garden. I felt a bond of kinship with him, until I read on, and found he was quoted as saying "Sciatica and a veg. patch: all I need now is an allotment and a whippet, and I'll be a proper old man". I've now gone right off him!

Now is not the time to be extolling the virtues of gardening. Therapeutic? Invigorating? Good for the soul? You must be kidding! It is cold and windy and frequently wet. The ground is either so hard you can't stick a spade in it, or it's mushy and clogging! And practically everything is dead – even most of the weeds.

Who can think of spring in conditions like this? Well, gardeners can - and do. You always have to look to the future; to have a feeling for the rhythm of life. To quote from an article I read recently, and which I think puts it perfectly "Gardening forces optimism: without hope you would never plant a seed". Despite the problems that have beset your crops this year, you always expect that next year will be different, and spend happy hours browsing through gardening catalogues or websites

Reverting to actual allotment news, rather than these musings, I regret to say that my stored maincrop potatoes are showing signs of having been affected by blight for the second year running. Clearly the infestation has not been anything like as bad as in 2007, but it is there nevertheless – telltale brown streaks when one cuts the tubers open, which, if the potatoes are stored long enough will make them turn into mush. A few have already done so, and they can quickly be identified by the white spores on the outside of the tuber, looking rather like salt crystals. I hope those of you who grow your own potatoes have not been similarly afflicted.

The Times has been doing a series of articles of various charities during the run-up to Christmas, and one of


these charities is an organisation called "Thrive", which provides therapeutic gardening for people with special needs, or those who have become disabled through an accident or illness. They have been particularly successful with teenagers, who have not only become accomplished gardeners, but have also gained in self-confidence as well. Thrive has also provided a purpose in life for men and women who have suddenly lost their sight, who enjoy getting their hands dirty in a garden, and managing to produce their own vegetables despite the obvious problems of gardening with such a disadvantage. Some tasks are beyond them — distinguishing small weeds from seedlings for instance (I have this problem as well, and I have perfect sight!); and hand tools are easily mislaid. However there is a small team of sighted volunteers who help out with the tricky jobs, and children from a local school are willing helpers. I hope the project prospers.







However, the numerous activities that have been going on have been marvellous – there is nothing quite like a First School nativity to give us all the feeling that Christmas is nearly here. I hope you will all have a happy and relaxing Christmas.

Ofsted Review You will no doubt be aware that HMI were in school last week. Governors and staff are pleased with the outcome of the review, but unfortunately cannot give you any further details until we receive the final report. This should be received very soon in the new term and will be copied to all parents. The programme to implement the Ofsted action plan which had been put in place will continue until the end of the academic year 2008/2009.

Head Teacher We are very pleased to confirm that we have appointed Mrs Pat Gurton to the post of Head Teacher to join us immediately after the Easter holidays next year. Mrs Gurton is currently a Deputy Head Teacher and has experience of working in schools undergoing difficulties and supporting the Head Teacher in moving the school forward. We are also fortunate that she has previously worked at a similar church school to ours and consequently understands the specific needs of Wingrave School. Mrs Gurton began a Local Authority secondment in the Autumn Term to work alongside teachers in other schools. Mrs Gurton attended the HMI feedback meeting last week. She also came to the First School play and the Christmas Fair. Mrs Gurton will be visiting the school regularly next term to liaise with Mrs McClellan. Staffing The governors wish Mrs Abbott well on her maternity leave and look forward to her return to the school in a few months time. Whilst she is away an experienced teacher has been taken on to teach in Reception class, Mrs Gomm spent a day in class last Friday getting to know the children.

Unfortunately we have not managed to appoint a new Office Manager as none of the candidates met our requirements. However, we are fortunate that the Finance Manager from county is continuing to deal with the school accounts for the time being. We will be readvertising for this position after Christmas.

Learning and Teaching The school is currently being assisted by various LA consultants and advisors. These include the numeracy consultant Becky Ellers, who gave the brilliant parents' workshop in Maths last term and Hazel Glynn the literacy consultant. We will also have help from the LA science advisor and consultant next term. A lot of work is taking place in school to improve the teaching and learning, such as lesson observations, assessment analysis and pupil progress meetings. This will obviously be ongoing.

The school is now using a new tool (APP) to assess pupil progress in both maths and literacy. Each level has its own grid of statements against which each child is assessed. This then determines the level the child is at, together with which statements need focussing on to achieve the next level. This information is used when deciding on individual and class targets.

Class/Individual Targets As you know, children now have a personal and a class target. Personal targets will continually be reviewed and you will be advised when your child reaches their target and what their new target will be.

Home School Agreement The home school agreement has been reviewed and updated and this will be sent home early in the New Year. It will require a signature from parents and pupils in addition to the signature of the class teacher.

School Website Hopefully you will have now visited our impressive new website. There is a lot of useful information for parents on the website, which is constantly being reviewed and updated.

www.wingrave.bucks.sch.uk. Remember, you can also email the governors at wingravegovernor@gmail.com. If you are unable to access the website, contact the school office for any information

required. Governor Steve Gayler is now working on a Google calendar which will show all school and PTFA events together with governor meetings.

Premises The inside of the school is now looking much more cared for, we are now just waiting for county to organise the painting of the outside of the school.

Governors We have changed the structure of our committees to ensure we can review and progress the areas of concern identified in the Ofsted report. There are now four governor committees:

Learning and Teaching – this committee will cover two sections of the Ofsted report, 1. Achievements and Standards and 2. Teaching and Learning.

**Leadership and Management** – to cover section 3. Leadership and Management.

Care, Guidance and Support – to cover section 4. Care, Guidance and Support.

Corporate Services – to cover finance, personnel and premises. When each committee meet they discuss and record the progress made on the action plan. This information is then fed back to the LA and HMI. Many areas of the action plan have now been completed, but this is ongoing and forms the current School Development Plan. We are aware that although we have to concentrate on improving the issues raised by Ofsted, we must not let the strengths of the school be forgotten.

As mentioned in our last newsletter, we now have a full complement of governors. We would like to give a brief introduction to our new governors.

Yvonne White — Yvonne is a Wingrave resident and for many years has contributed to the Wingrave community in lots of ways. She is a very experienced governor having previously been a governor at our school and is also Vice Chair of governors at a school in Aylesbury. Yvonne has a teaching background and is also experienced in 'special needs'. She became a Wingrave school governor to help ensure our school returns to its former strength.

Jill Lewin – Jill lives in Stewkley and is also a very experienced governor having worked very hard as a governor at another local school. Jill is very committed and will be particularly involved in the library, school council and 'gifted and talented' children. Jill is Chair of our Care, Guidance and Support committee.

Rita Marks — Rita also lives locally and is an ex Chair of Governors at a school in Milton Keynes. She is also a very experienced governor with a lot to contribute to our school. Rita has a lot of knowledge of the education system and is very pro-active. She previously held a senior position within the school library service. Karen Smethurst — Karen joins us as a governor from next term. Karen lives in Whitchurch and has 2 young children, both now in primary school. This is Karen's first term as a governor and she is very keen to get involved.

All of our new governors are keen to help us turn our school into the excellent school that the community deserves.

Events Governors were lucky enough to be invited to the dress rehearsal of the First School Christmas Play. The children were excellent, especially all of the farmyard animals. Well done to all of the children for their wonderful performance and to the staff and parents who helped to put this production together. Some of us also attended the carol service at church on Thursday. This seems very appropriate, given that we are a Church of England school. Well done to the year 6 children for their readings and prayers. We were also very pleased to see children representing the school at the Remembrance Day service in church in November.

Finally The governors and staff are still working extremely hard to ensure Wingrave School comes out of special measures as soon as possible and that all children get the standard of education they deserve.
