

The Cublington Crier celebrated it's 25th birthday this month with a review of some of the items that have appeared over the years. One that caught my attention was a quote from an article that appeared in 1986 - 'A local vicar is planning a sit-down protest at an accident black spot as part of a campaign to get the junction lay-out changed. The Rev. John Heffer, Rector of Wingrave, is currently drumming up support among villagers in Aston Abbotts and Wingrave, and if enough people are willing to join him he says he will sit down in the middle of the Wingrave crossroads on the A418 and block the traffic. He says it's time Bucks County Highways Department took action to make the junction safe, following several accidents. The most recent incident was in January, when Wingrave resident David Gaskell collided with two cars as he was cycling home from work. He received serious injuries and later died in hospital. ' In a later edition Rev Heffer commented 'WELL DONE! I cannot let the Demonstration at the crossroads pass without congratulating all of you who felt able to support me in, what I promised would be, a peaceful and restrained protest However, please forgive me for correcting some of the press reports which indicate that after I had held up the traffic, 'I retired to the safety of the verge...'. In fact, the Inspector took me gently by the arm and escorted me to the verge! It was you lovely Demonstrators who then took over and gave such terrific displays of non-violent strength'. The current editor concludes with 'Well done to you Supervic. I have no doubt you stopped the traffic with all confidence and faith of Moses parting the Red sea. but the crossroads are still a problem 23 years on'. Ed

Countryside Matters

Most television programs these days are cheap rubbish; even the adverts feature Gorillas with air freshener and Meercats selling insurance to save money. So it is heartening to find Jamie Oliver's 'Saving our Bacon' portraying a serious message amongst the hype. He went at length to show that our pig welfare standards are much higher than Denmark and on a different planet compared to those former communist countries. Some supermarkets still prefer to buy on price instead of quality from these countries. More is the pity and shame on them.

The sow stall has been banned in this country and quite rightly so. In Denmark they shall ban them in 2012 and the rest of Europe? God knows when? This is a cruel and sadistic way to imprison a clean and intelligent animal. The farrowing crate is still in use for 2-3 weeks when the sow is farrowing, but this is a piglet welfare argument and quite correct. 

ALLOTMENT DIARY

One of the results of the current global financial crisis has been in increase in xenophobia and nationalism, and I read recently that in Italy, Berlusconi's government has started a campaign against "foreign" food being sold in Italian cities. They are campaigning against the sale of such things as kebabs, sushi and Indian & Chinese food. An Italian government spokesman said "We stand for tradition, and the safeguarding of our culture".

However, as my paper pointed out, spaghetti almost certainly comes from China, and was probably brought back to Italy by Marco Polo: and the San Marzano tomato, which is a staple ingredient of pizzas and tomato sauces eaten with pasta, was a gift from Peru to Naples in the 18th Century! So much for excluding "foreign" food!

This set me wondering where the vegetables come from, which we regard as standard parts of our diet today. It is well known, for example, that our most common and ubiquitous vegetable, the potato (or a close relative of it), was brought back to this country by Sir Walter Raleigh, and that it did not exist here in the Middle Ages.

My research indicates that very few of the vegetables we grow today originated in north-western Europe. Wild celery, cabbage and carrots existed, but the cultivated varieties we now grow have been derived from species emanating from other parts of the world. It is possible that the beet family (including beetroot) is indigenous, since wild varieties exist in northern Europe; but as late as the Middle Ages, beetroot was called "Roman beet", which suggests that the Romans may have introduced it.

The earliest archaeological evidence of crop cultivation has been found in a crescent stretching from present-day Iraq and Syria to Egypt. Here were grown primitive forms of wheat & barley, peas and lentils. The earliest lentils date from about 8,000 B C in Jericho; and the earliest peas about 1,000 years later, in Iraq. Broad beans (but not dwarf or runner beans) also come from this region, the first evidence of their existence dating to about 1800 B C in Egypt. Onions and carrots are thought to have originated further east, in Afghanistan or central Asia. There is evidence that onions, garlic and radishes were cultivated in ancient Egypt around 3,200 B C, and the Bible refers to cucumbers, melons, leeks, onions & garlic as being among the good things that the Israelites had to leave behind in Egypt after the Exodus in about 1,500 B C.

From Roman literature we know that the Romans appreciated such delicacies as asparagus and globe artichokes; and they seem to have developed cabbages, cauliflower and broccoli. They probably introduced these vegetables to Britain. The turnip and the Swede are also members of the cabbage family. It is not known how long the turnip has been grown here, but the Swede arrived from Sweden around 1775 (hence the name). Similarly the Brussels sprout came here from Belgium at the beginning of the 19th Century, and gets its name from this. The cultivated carrot was probably brought from the east by the Arabs in around the 10th Century A D – probably from Afghanistan. It was originally white or deep purply-red in colour, as is still the case with present day carrots grown in parts of Pakistan. Orange-coloured carrots were first developed in Holland in the 16th Century, where they became popular because orange was the national colour, and this colour has now largely supplanted the original colours all over the world. The parsnip is also a member of the carrot family, and was probably also grown by the Romans, although the first definite record of it is in Germany in the 16th Century, and it was via Germany that it came to Britain.



Few cultivated vegetables originated in North America, and those that did were overshadowed by the vast variety already domesticated in Mexico and the Andes, when the Europeans arrived. It is possible that the cultivation of vegetables began in central and southern America even earlier than in the southern Mediterranean. In caves in Peru has been discovered evidence of beans and squashes (from which marrows and courgettes are derived) having been eaten – if not cultivated – from about 10,000 B C onwards; and the remains of cultivated potatoes have been found near Lake Titicaca dating from around 8,000 B C. The early civilisations in the area – the Mayas, the Aztecs & the Incas, all cultivated maize, squashes and beans. Dwarf (or French) beans and runner beans both come from beans that were grown in the Andes and Mexico, brought to Europe by the Spanish conquest of this area. The dwarf bean is first recorded in this country in an early plant book called Gerard's Herball which was published in 1597, while the runner bean was first mentioned in the second edition of this work, printed in 1633

Seeds of peppers and tomatoes also appear in archaeological sites in central America from about 7,000 B C on, but these may have been gathered in the wild rather than cultivated. (Experts also point out that since the seeds of peppers and tomatoes pass through the human gut with their efficacy unimpaired, it is likely that peppers and tomatoes were unintentionally sewn by early man around his settlements).

Vegetables were also cultivated in tropical Asia, perhaps as early as 8,000 B C, and among these were yams and rice – and from about 1,000 B C, the soybean, which is now the most important Chinese food plant. However, none have become common cultivated vegetables here. The same is also true of Africa. There is a vegetable called the cowpea, which began there; but while it is now also grown in India and the West Indies, it is not hardy enough for our climate.

Nowadays vegetables have been spread by man all over the world, and varieties have been developed which will grow in climates far removed from their original range. Tomatoes, which originated in the tropics, can now be grown out of doors in Britain, and plant breeders are constantly trying to grow frost-hardy varieties of others, such as potatoes. If a vegetable can be bred to flourish in our climate, sooner or later it will be!



The Clerk reported he had received notification of an increase in the cost of hiring the Church rooms from the 1st March to £6 per hour.

It was agreed that in recognition of his service to the Parish Council of over 40 years, Mr Colin Higgs be nominated to attend a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace.

The Clerk advised he had received notification of a Development Meeting to be held on 19th February and it was noted that D Dicken would speak on behalf of the Parish in respect of the applications that related to Aston Abbotts.

The Clerk reported he had received notification that a Certificate of existing lawful use in respect of Badgers Oak Farm had been granted. It was agreed that the Clerk contact AVDC and request details of the reasons for this decision

The meeting was updated on discussions with AVDC regarding the provision of a disabled ramp for entrance to the Village Hall. Indicative figures had also been obtained to move the telegraph pole and this would be prohibitive.

There followed a discussion on the quotation received in respect of the insulation and treatment of the roof space. It was noted an improved loft access would be required and C Higgs would advise whether the Church Trustees would agree to the work. It was AGREED that R Clarke and Mrs K Curry would have authority to approve the works provided the costs were in line with those indicated during the discussion. During the discussion it was suggested a hot cupboard could be purchased, this was not felt to be appropriate S106 expenditure, however as there was the opportunity of a grant to cover the cost it was AGREED that an application form be submitted. Quotations and lead times for the remainder of the improvement work identified would be obtained.

The meeting was informed of a forthcoming Informal Hearing into the appeal in respect of Longmoor Bungalow, Cublington – removal of agricultural occupancy condition, to be held on 26th February 2009. D Dicken advised he would attend on behalf of the Parish Council.

The Clerk reported that he had spoken with the Officer dealing with the alleged breach of approved details re Hunters Way. The Highways engineer was concerned about the impact of the vision splay from the position of the fence posts and it was understood the Owner had agreed in discussions with the engineer to adjust the line of the fence to address the situation.

A meeting had been scheduled for the 21st February to carry out data reduction and analysis of the completed Village Plan questionnaires.

It was AGREED that the Parish Council would form a welcoming committee for the Czech Ambassador should he attend this year's Village Fete.

The date for the Village litter blitz was the Saturday 4^{th} April -10:00 am. The Clerk to arrange for the provision of refuse sacks.

The quotations for cutting back the tree overgrowth affecting the streetlights were presented and it was AGREED to accept the estimate from Outside Inside, the Clerk would contact the supplier.

The Clerk reported he had received a letter from Bucks CC regarding solar powered lighting at Bus shelters as a result of the matter of lighting at the Crossroads being discussed at the last Local Area Forum. After discussion it was noted that the matter would be raised again at the next LAF meeting and the Clerk would try to obtain indicative costs for the erection of a streetlight at the Crossroads.

It was reported that we were investigating the possibility of a grant towards the cost of the replacement fencing required at the Recreation Ground and would advise further at the next meeting.

It was confirmed that the next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 8th April 2009 at 20.00 in the Church Rooms.





As I'm sure you will appreciate, the decision to shut the school at these times is not taken lightly and the acting Head Teacher and I have had many discussions about how we can minimise the disruption. We are also planning for future occasions and trying to put more procedures in place to keep the school open if at all possible. Obviously, the safety of the children and the staff is always our primary concern. I would like to take this opportunity to say thank you to the class reps for their efforts phoning everyone, it is greatly appreciated. Work on the priorities raised by the OFSTED inspection has continued and we look forward to another visit by the monitoring team in March. Lynne Roxbee Cox – Chair of Governors

Ofsted Review You will have now received the monitoring report from the HM Inspector showing that the school has once again made satisfactory progress. It shows that standards are rising and pupils' progress during lessons continues to improve. The Inspector acknowledges that appropriate new procedures have been introduced, however it is too early to evaluate their impact.

Head Teacher Mrs Gurton is now attending all governors' meetings to ensure she is well acquainted with the school when she starts after the Easter break. She has also been involved in interviews for the vacancy of Finance/Office Manager.

Staffing We are pleased to advise that Mrs Gomm has settled in well in Reception class. Interviews took place yesterday for the post of Finance/Office Manager and we are pleased to report that Mrs Ruth Hope has now been appointed and will join us just before the end of term. County will continue to provide an officer to deal with all necessary accounts in the meantime.

Learning and Teaching Various LA consultants are still supporting the school and work is continuing on improving the teaching and learning. This includes lesson observations, assessment analysis, one to one self-assessment meetings with the Acting Head Teacher and pupil progress meetings. This will obviously be ongoing.

The Acting Head Teacher meets with KS1 and KS2 Co-ordinators, our School Improvement Partner from County and the Chair of Governors on a regular basis. This enables the school to share the findings of the monitoring and evaluation procedures, as appropriate. Each child's progress showing their current position provides a focus point for checking the accuracy of the data and that pupils, in general, are achieving appropriately. Weekly staff meetings are held to cover the issues raised in the latest HMI's report. These include the use of Learning Support Assistants in lessons in order to ensure they are used effectively and a review of lesson planning to ensure it meets the needs of all pupils and to ensure consistency and to monitor the impact of any changes. Guest providers this term have included the English adviser, the Literacy consultant and the School Improvement Partner.

Home School Agreement The home school agreement has now been sent home. Please could we remind you that this should be signed by both parents and pupils and then returned to school.

School Website There are still more updates being made to our impressive new website www.wingrave.bucks.sch.uk. Remember, you can also email the governors at wingravegovernor@gmail.com. If you are unable to access the website, contact the school office for any information you may require.

PTFA The Governors would like to acknowledge the amount of hard work and time that the PTFA devote to raising money for the school. It is very much appreciated by everybody.

Finally There have not been so many changes to report this time, as it was necessary to introduce a great number during the previous academic year in order to address the issues raised in the Ofsted Report. This is now the time to consolidate, review and evaluate these changes and new practices. This will enable us to ensure that the level of impact on the standards in the school is beneficial and assess where to make any further changes, if necessary. Please be assured that all new procedures and systems will be continually monitored and evaluated. We now need to ensure that all changes made over the last year are embedded for the future and have the necessary impact to give all children the standard of education they deserve, whilst also making sure that the children continue to enjoy coming to school!
