

During his period of confinement he became a master of computers, layout and artwork, so that will be his area of expertise.



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
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ST. GEORGES NIGHT DINNER


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Local film OVER OUR DEAD BODIES which tells the story of the Third London Airport Campaign 1969-1971 has taken the award for the best use of archive footage in the Home Video/DVD category 2010. The award was given at a ceremony in London by the film trade body FOCAL. This event was attended by such glitterati as Martin Scorsese and Melvyn Bragg and saw our local film win over eight other nominees,

including two American productions.



"Over Our Dead Bodies" is a 55 minute long feature, and interestingly one of the amateur camera-men from 40 years ago was Bernard Osborn. It documents the fight against the third airport in which many of you were involved and remember. 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
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
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ALLOTMENT DIAFRY

After the drought in April, the weather has so far in May been rather better from a gardener's point of view, with a fair amount of rain, although the temperatures have been below average. My vegetables are thriving, as are those of my neighbours (indeed, many doing somewhat better than me, having started their planting earlier). I have now finished off last year's crop of leeks, and the sprouting broccoli will soon be over. However, the first of this year's crops, the asparagus has started popping up; and very tasty it is!

The only sadness from my point of view is that I am about to run out of my stored potatoes: the cold spell in January froze a large number of them, which then turned to unpleasant-smelling mush. I think this will be the first year for a long time when I have had to start buying potatoes. However, the stored onions are still going strong.

I spent a long week-end at the beginning of May in Cornwall, and while I was there, visited the Lost Gardens of Heligan, which I would strongly recommend, especially in the spring, when the rhododendrons and camellias are in bloom. For those of you who do not know the story, and why they are called the "Lost Gardens"; they form part of the estate of a large manor house which has been owned by the Tremayne family for over 400 years. In the 18th Century, the grounds were laid out in different styles in different areas: some formal, some deliberately "natural". They were at their zenith immediately before the First World War, when 22 gardeners were employed to look after them. However all 22 men went off to the War, during which time the gardens began to decline, and only 6 returned, who were clearly not up to the task of maintaining the gardens properly. The gardens struggled on, but when the house was leased out in the 1920's, the grounds (apart from a small garden adjacent to the house) were excluded, and the gardens were forgotten. The gardens suffered decades of neglect, and were then further devastated by the 1990 hurricane. By this time, the gardens had totally reverted to their natural state, and were a mass of brambles, ivy and weeds.

Fortunately in 1991, Tim Smit (the guy who later went on to set up the Eden Project), was told the story, and explored the area where the gardens had been. Amongst other things he discovered a building in the old vegetable garden which had a poignant piece of graffiti in the wall, reading "Don't come here to sleep or slumber", the date in August 1914, and the signatures of the 22 gardeners who were then working there. Although his previous expertise had been in the field of record production, he was fired with enthusiasm to restore the gardens to their former glory. He therefore took a lease of part of the grounds, and set to work restoring the gardens, which he has now done brilliantly. Some 200 acres of the original gardens have so far been leased and restored: there are another 800 acres to go!

For me there were two parts of the garden which particularly fascinated me: the first is a valley which has a number of artificial ponds in it, fed by a ram pump, and which contains a number of exotic — and sometimes sub-tropical — trees and plants. (The valley clearly has its own micro-climate). The second was the vegetable garden. This is enormous, wedge-shaped, and enclosed by walls and hedges. What is staggering about it is the perfection of the planting. Each of the rows of vegetables is about 50 yards long; and each vegetable is perfectly in line with all the other plants, and each seems to be the same exact distance from the others — so much so, that one wonders if they used a ruler when planting out. Needless to say, there was not a weed to be seen. However, I spoke to one of the two gardeners working there the day I went (a bank holiday!), and she told me that there were 9 people who regularly worked in the vegetable garden — which explains a lot!

Another thing that impressed me was the fact that they were not only growing fan-trained peaches and similar fruit on the walls of the vegetable garden, they were also doing the same thing with fruit like gooseberries and raspberries. The piece de resistance, however, has to be Europe's only remaining pineapple pit, in which pineapples were (and I believe, still are) ripened by putting them in rotting manure, so that the heat from the manure can force the fruit to ripen even in a climate as unsuitable as ours!

MINUTES OF THE ASTON ABBOTTS ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 2010

The annual Parish Meeting was held on Wednesday 12th May in the Church Room at 8pm.

PRESENT: Peter Shorrock (Chairman of the Parish Council), Paul Bruton (Clerk to the Annual Parish Meeting), Peter Cooper (District Councillor), Netta Glover (County Councillor) and 34 parishioners.

MINUTE 1 Apologies - James Perkins.

MINUTE 2 Minutes of previous meeting were approved by the Meeting as a true record, and signed by the Chairman.

MINUTE 3 Matters arising – none.

MINUTE 4 County Council, District Council and Police

County Councillor Netta Glover talked to the meeting about the following matters:

- Landfill Charges: the LGA estimates that the extra rise of £8 per tonne in Landfill tax will add £49 a year to council tax bills by 2014. This is an unexpected increase which means it is even more important that local residents are encouraged to recycle as much as possible and that we procure a waste treatment facility for our residual waste. The county's preferred bidder, Covanta, has hit a snag which has meant that to avoid a legal challenge the contract discussions with both bidders have had to be re-opened.
- Crime Prevention: The Local Community partnerships are working hard to help people protect themselves against distraction burglaries. The elderly are particularly vulnerable to this type of crime. Here are a few tips

Use a door chain when answering the door

Check that the ID of the caller is genuine,

Ask the caller to come back with an arranged appointment.

Ask trading standards about setting up a No Doorstep Selling Zone in your road.

- Self Directed Support: Went live on 1st April. Individuals are allocated their own budget and advised of what is available to support their care needs. Those not already on the scheme will be gradually transferred to it at their annual review.
- Meals on Wheels has changed its name to Community Meals Service has a new provider called Appetito following several tasting sessions.
- Day Care Services: for the elderly are going to be delivered in a different way. Many of the buildings in current use are not fit for purpose mostly because of the change in older people's needs for one thing because people are living longer their needs are becoming more complex. The idea is to develop things like: Day Services for the frail elderly who prefer to live at home but need help. This will be done at day centres.

Councillor Glover then answered questions from the floor, after which the Chairman thanked her for attending the meeting.

District Councillor Peter Cooper talked to the meeting about the following matters:

- Aylesbury Theatre The new Theatre building work was on schedule and was due to open on the 16th October. It is being operated by the Ambassador Theatre Group, one of the Country's leading operators in this field. It is hoped local communities will support the facility and the Programme of events will be published in the Bucks Herald.
- HS2 High Speed Trains The meeting was updated on the current situation regarding the proposed High Speed rail link affecting Aylesbury Vale. County Council were considering 4 possible routes, 2 of which impact directly on Aylesbury Vale. After various considerations and representations it has been agreed that AVDC will oppose all routes through the Chilterns, at this stage it is unclear as to what stance County Council are going to take.
- Land at Wingrave crossroads An overview of the current position regarding the sale of various plots of land was given, including the current legal status should there be any attempted breach of planning on the sites. It was noted that AVDC planning had applied for an Article 4 direction that would remove any permitted development rights associated with the Land and enable Planning to retain some control over possible breaches. Councillor Cooper believed there was still a considerable amount of plots un sold and that the Enforcement team were aware of residents concerns and were ready to act. Given that some of the plots had already been sold he felt the situation would be an on going concern.
- Wind Turbines Details were given of the 4 wind turbine projects that were under review in Aylesbury Vale, some of which would be visible from the village. It was noted that wind testing equipment was being erected in early June within the Wingrave & Rowsham area and the results would be known by the end of the year as to whether the site was economically viable. Councillor Cooper was of the view that this type planning application was of an Industrial nature and Planning should have a proper policy and criteria against which applications are made. The matter is currently on going and he would keep the Parish informed of progress.

Cllr. Cooper then answered questions from the floor, after which the Chairman thanked him for attending the meeting.

Police Community Support Officer Tina Hobson was actively involved in an operation and offered her apologies for not being able to verbally give her report. However PCSO Hobson handed over a written report that the Chair read out to the meeting the main points to note were.

*The crime statistics for the last year were 5 crimes of criminal damage, 3 thefts and 4 burglary other (non-dwellings).

•The Police continue to urge residents to inform of any suspicious activity and with any concerns they have using the 0845 8 505 505 number BUT if you feel that a crime is being committed or is about to be committed please use the 999 emergency number.

•As with many of the villages speeding is a concern in Aston Abbotts. Speed checks are planned and they have asked for assistance from other departments within Thames Valley Police. It was suggested that purchasing a Speedwatch system is something the Parish might consider and following a general discussion around this problem it was agreed that the matter would be considered further at a future Parish Council meeting.

MINUTE 5 The Chairman presented to the meeting his Annual report that included an outline of planning applications considered during the year, the use of the S106 monies from the Bull & Butcher development, progress on the streetlights at Wingrave crossroads, the start of the construction of a footpath to the Wingrave crossroads, the new fencing on the recreation ground that had been supported by local donations, our new Parish Councillor James Perkins and the proposed upgrade to street lights in the village.

MINUTE 6 Village Plan.

Peter Elwood gave an overview of the current status of our Village Plan, including an outline of the original objectives and key drivers used in scoping the document.

It was reported that of 165 questionnaires sent to residents, 47 had been returned and the display on view in the Church rooms on the evening gave the findings of that survey. The results had been analysed and from that further questions arose and these too were on display, all present were asked to give their views using the stickers on hand and slips were available for further hand written comments. An overview of the findings suggested that there was a strong sense of community, the village was a safe place to live, and residents would prefer traditional development rather than cheap housing. There seemed to be split views on the usefulness of the Parish Council in that although it spoke for the village it wasn't always supported by BCC or AVDC.

The next stage was to take the results and produce the Village Plan this would then be submitted and would be used by BCC and AVDC when considering future policy.

There was some concern expressed by the floor over the usefulness of this document and whether it was just a consultation exercise. District Councillor Cooper gave assurances and examples of where communities had submitted a Plan had seen policy reflect their wishes and aims. It also is aimed at empowering local people and residents as a community.

Peter Elwood thanked everyone for their support, particularly Dickie Dicken, Sarah Allwood and the members of the Village Plan team.

MINUTE 7 Church Room

Councillor Dicken reported that exactly 10 years ago the village approached the Church with a view to taking a lease out on the Church Room and we are now hopefully going to finish that process in June or July of this year. There will be considerable expenditure required to bring the rooms up to the required standards and a Committee will need to be formed to run the Village rooms and anyone interested in being involved is asked to contact either Councillor Dicken or Councillor Shorrock.

MINUTE 8 The Chronicle

Judy Hardcastle on behalf of John thanked everyone for their contributions and support over the 4 years he had been Editor of the Chronicle. Janice Issitt had kindly taken on the role and he wished her every success in what promised to be an new era for the Chronicle. It was requested that the level of financial support be increased to £600 as costs were rising and this was approved.

MINUTE 9 Fete 2009

April Curnow reported the event had raised £3,500. The day had been a success and some new attractions had given a great deal of fun. The beneficiaries have been the Church (£1,478), Church Room Trust (£1,183), the Chronicle (£500) and the Recreation Ground Fund (£296). After 3 years April was handing over the reins and a vote of thanks was recorded to April and her band of helpers.

MINUTE 10 Fete 2010

The new joint organisers Vanessa and Tracey reported that the plans were in place for this year's event and with the addition of the Summer Ball afterwards promised to be an exciting day. Everyone had been very positive and they thanked all for their support to date. It was noted that the Fete would start at 1:00pm and finish at 4:00pm.

- After some discussion, it was agreed to distribute the proceeds as follows:
 - a) Chronicle £600 (regardless of actual takings)
 - b) Church 45% of the remainder
 - c) Church Room fund for refurbishment 45% of the remainder
 - d) Recreation Ground 10% of the remainder

MINUTE 11 A.O.B.

- There was a strong sense of feeling amongst those present over the gritting of the roads over the winter. It is a problem every year and this year was particularly bad given the extreme weather conditions faced. In particular the fact that Moat Lane is not considered a Bus route seemed ridiculous as the School bus uses the road. The Parish council has been asking for this route to be included in the gritting route for over 5 years but without success. County Councillor Glover advised that she sympathised with residents, however funding and the severity of the weather had resulted in difficulty in keeping all roads operational. It was suggested that we might consider applying for Gritting bins, although these are not always the best option.
- Wingrave School was trying to extend it's hours however it was being stopped from doing so because County Council were saying the cost of changing the hours of the buses was prohibitive, this appeared illogical given that there would be no increase in usage of buses. County Councillor Glover would investigate and obtain further details, keeping the Parish Clerk updated on progress.
- It was suggested that Parish Council meetings should be held earlier and this would be looked into.

The Chairman thanked all those attending and the meeting closed at 9.30pm

The first hot-air balloon was launched in 1783 by the Montgolfier brothers and the very first balloon passengers were animals – a sheep, a duck and a hen. The flight lasted 8 minutes reaching 500 metres, it was witnessed by Louis XVI in Versailles. Two months later saw the first manned flight over Paris.

On our flight we were served champagne whilst in the air but traditionally it is served on landing, story goes, that back in 1783 some farmers were very suspicious of the 'fiery dragon' descending from the sky into their vineyards. To placate them and celebrate the first flight, the pilots offered champagne and the tradition continues to this day.





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

<u>This month - Anita Parker 's</u> <u>BOBOTIE</u>

This month's recipe will hopefully go some way in helping to celebrate the start of the World Cup finals in South Africa which start on 11th June. (Ironical really as I now live in a football free zone since the boys left home!)

This is a near relative of Shepherds Pie and has been adopted by South Africa as its national dish

500gms minced beef

1 large onion, finely chopped

2 gloves garlic, crushed

1 tbsp curry powder

3 tbsp mango chutney

50 gms sultanas or chopped dried apricots

350mls milk

2 slices wholemeal bread

3 large eggs

Fry the beef in a frying pan and add the finely chopped onions and cook until soft Add garlic and curry powder and fry for 2 minutes

Remove from the heat and add the mango chutney and the sultanas or apricots Pour about 200mls milk into a bowl. Tear up the bread into small pieces and add to the milk. Leave to soften for a few minutes then stir into the beef mixture

Tip the mixture into a shallow ovenproof dish and press down with the back of a spoon Mix the remaining milk with the eggs, beat and season

Pour over the beef and place in the oven 180c/4 for 30-40 minutes until the top is golden brown

Serve with a green salad

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

Having been involved with the Chronicle since it's inception, it was quite nostalgic to see copies of the 1st, 100th and 200th covers printed in last months (the 300th) issue.

John Whyte, Neil Chesher and I were party to early discussions with Graham Parker who's idea it was to create and publish a village magazine for Aston Abbotts. I clearly remember him publishing his/the Chronicle's 'mission statement' in an early issue and it was good to be reminded of it by John in his editorial last month.. I've lost count of how many editors there have been over the years but Graham's aims have pretty well been adhered to ever since.

After Graham left Aston Abbotts, the Chronicle was edited by quite a few 'volunteers'; sometimes for just a month, sometimes by individuals and at other times by small teams. It had always been very much a 'cut and paste' affair, so when I retired, towards the end of 1996, I 'volunteered' to become Editor and to produce it in digital form. Since that time we've had four Editors who've undertaken the work for between three and five years. For several months, Graham paid for all the printing out of his own pocket but as soon as 'we' realised this, the 'Friends of the Chronicle' was formed to organise events and raise money to cover printing costs etc. John Whyte became (and still is) Treasurer and now it's financial stability is assured by a combination of advertising revenue and a sizable proportion of the money raised by the fete. Quite a few copies are sent to villagers who have moved away and they usually make generous donations as well.

We are extremely fortunate that just as John Hardcastle was considering retiring as Editor, Ian and Janice offered to 'step into the breach'. They've already introduced covers in full colour and I've no doubt that their combined photographic, artistic and publishing experience will ensure our beloved village magazine continues to go from strength to strength.

I'm sure we all thank them and wish them well with next month's and future issues.

At coffee morning we had an impromptu visit from a gentleman called Roger Langdon who works for AVDC. His job is to advise Aylesbury Vale residents of their entitlements to having assisted help or in some circumstances, free, energy saving improvements to their homes. He was particularly pointing out the benefits of Cavity Wall Insulation and Loft Lagging.

With either or both of the above, you can make a saving of over £100 per year. Without adequate insulation in the roof or walls you could be losing 40p in every £1 of heat you pay for.

Heating bills are really high these days so its worth thinking about. Roger gave out some leaflets and it seems that you call a company called Cocoon on 0800 8048 777. This company are working with Bucks councils and will arrange for an installer to call you. They will advise you of your properties needs. below is an example of the criteria for either free or assisted grants.

- If you own your own home or rent it from a private landlord and if:

You are 60 years or older and are in receipt of one or more benefits. Benefits include: income support, council tax benefit, housing benefit, job seekers allowance and pension credit.

or

You have a child under 16 or you are pregnant and have been given maternity MAT B1 and are also in receipt of benefits such as income support, council tax benefit etc.

You are in receipt of one or more benefits such as disability living allowance, child tax credit with an income of less than £16,040, housing benefit and disability premium etc.

Then you could be entitled to a warm front grant.

REPAIRS TO START SOON!!!

Readers of the Chronicle will be aware that an Architect's inspection last year identified significant faults needing to be rectified to ensure our church remains in use. These have arisen because little or no money had been available over the past 20 years or more years and considerable age related deterioration has taken place. It's estimated repairs will require £25,000 of essential work to ensure the structure of the church will remain weatherproof, safe and useable into the future.

Initially, this seemed an impossible amount of cash for us to raise, but thankfully, largely due to the efforts of our Secretary Caroline Abel Smith, grants were sought from the Bucks Historic Churches Trust and the Francis Coales Charitable Foundation resulting in £12,000 being made available. Added to our own fund raising such as the 100 club, Harvest Supper and Auction, various quizzes, St Georges Night supper and a very successful Race Night etc, we now have sufficient funds to seek tenders for some of the work.

A meeting with the Architect this month resulted in the following being identified as the most urgently required repairs;-

- 1.) Repair and point those areas of stonework on the 13th century tower most badly effected by weather/frost damage, secure and weatherproof the large north window and extend the lightening conductor to protect the bell frame.
- 2.) The old chimney (originally for the church heating stove) above the organ to be completely removed and the area affected 're-roofed' to prevent further moisture ingress and damage to internal plaster work.
 - 3.) Masonry bees in the south wall to be removed and stonework re-pointed.
- 4.) Weather damaged stonework on the outside of the porch to be repaired/replaced and where necessary, re-pointing carried out.

Tenders are being sought for the above and it is hoped that a contractor can be identified and formal permission obtained from the Diocese in time for work to start well before winter. Whilst it is expected this work will take the bulk of our funds, it is hoped there will be sufficient left so that in the not too distant future the interior walls can be painted, which (as many of you have mentioned to members of the PCC) will considerably improve the ambience. Even when the above has been completed, more work is required. This includes treatment to

remove beetle from the roof timbers, re-plastering and of course considerable work to the boundary wall to ensure it is safe and weatherproofed.

Clearly our fund raising activities will need to continue for several years to come but I would like, on behalf of the PCC. to thank all of you who have contributed so generously to our fundraising efforts, thus ensuring our village church remains a useable and beautiful asset to Aston Abbotts.

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
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
