Congratulations to Peter Cooper who was re-elected as our District Councillor with an impressive majority. Our Ward had one of the highest turnouts in the District. There was some confusion regarding the composition of our Parish Council as some councillors failed to submit their papers for re-election. I gather that matters have now been resolved and that the Parish Council is much as before.

At the Annual Parish Meeting the Chronicle was granted a portion of the proceeds of this year's Fete monies, namely £600, for which I am very grateful. The revenue the Chronicle gets from it's advertising was slightly down last year - it is proposed to increase our charges by a modest amount to try and recover the Chronicle's financial position. Each edition costs approximately £100 to print.

Another matter raised at the Annual Parish Meeting was the idea that the village could celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. See page 15 to read Sally Palmer's suggestion and ideas for a village celebration.

Still no rain to speak of. I'm watering my vegetable patch but the rest of the garden has to survive as best it can. Rumour has it that we heading for a heat wave in June and July - but then long range weather forecasting has proved to be wildly wrong in the past. I'm sure the farmers hope so.

#### A Personal Memory of Ray Wilkinson from Lol Hinds

Even now I still feel numb after the death of my brother-in-law and I've found it hard to put pen to paper as I'm still very emotional after what has happened.

I first met Ray about thirty years ago in The Royal Oak, where else, and we soon hit it off. Him being a Liverpool supporter and myself West Ham. He gave me so much stick over the years, it was all friendly rivalry but he did have a soft spot for my team as we went to watch them play on numerous occasions together. I remember once Ray got us tickets for Leicester V West Ham. I was so looking forward to cheering along with our fans, but he had brought tickets amongst the Leicester fans and when we scored I shouted yes very loudly, then realised where I was. We were lucky to get out alive.

On another occasion we went to Mallory Park race track on a corporate day with his company; one of his clients had dropped out and he knew I would enjoy driving the quads, karts and buggies etc. There was only one snag; I wasn't supposed to be there, so I had to keep a low profile. Unfortunately my competitiveness came out and I ended up winning the karting. When it came to the trophy presentation at the end of the day everyone kept asking Ray who I was and which company I worked for. To this day I still don't know how he explained that one away, but all I know is he would have done it in his usual diplomatic way. That is what I loved about Ray; he would put family and friends first regardless of the consequences. He was also a bit of a joker. On a weekend trip to Ostend in Belgium myself, my brother Tony and his stepson Steve were sharing a room together but Ray had told the receptionist, who was a man, that we were gay. I don't know why, but he kept giving us funny looks after that. Perhaps he thought he was in for a chance; cheers for that Ray. In the evening he stitched us up by pretending a strip club was an ordinary bar, but he had already pre-warned the staff our names and descriptions, so when we walked in I was shocked when one of the girls mentioned my name after I made a comment to Tony. A bottle of champagne was ordered by Ray and I should have been suspicious when the barman said certainly Mr Wilkinson. We sat down and in no time at all three girls came and sat with us, but, because Sharon was with us, Ray got away with it. I've never been so nervous in my life. A real eye-opener as the girls were offering all sorts of favours at a price. I was in a relationship at the time so couldn't get out of there fast enough. Ray just kept laughing his head off as he denied he had set us up. What a weekend.

Ray to me was more than a Brother-in-law, he was not just a very good friend but he was also like a father to me. Whenever I needed to talk problems over he was always there for me, giving me advice and making sure I was OK. That was Ray, I miss him so much and I know they say that time's a healer but at the moment I still can't take in what's happened. All I know is its going to take a long time to get used to Ray not being around. Love to Sharon x x





#### VIC SCOTT'S DIARIES

A proportion of the diaries are taken up with Vic's record of the bird nests he spotted. Below is a sample of his observations. Ed.

#### JUNE 1949 nests

Robin's nest with 5 eggs. In ivy wall (15th)

Two Spotted Flycatchers' nests (eggs). In creepers on wall.

Blackbird's nest (eggs). In clematis growing by wall.

Great Tit's nest (young). In hole in tree.

Blue Tit's nest (young). In iron pipe used as chimney.

Linnet's nest (4 eggs). In thorn hedge.

2 Greenfinch's nests. In hedges.

Partridge's nest (14 eggs). In grass by roadside.

Whitethroats, nest (young). In small bushes.

Two Partridges' nests (eggs) Among herbage in hedgerows.

Two spotted Flycatchers' nests. In creepers on wall.

Green Woodpecker's nest (young). In hole in tree.

Water Wagtail's nest with three young. In creepers on wall.

#### **JUNE 1954**

The Weather: Mainly rather cold for the season, with much rain at times and very few really sunny days. No really settled weather throughout the month.

Bird Life: Nests found during the month include the following;

Spotted flycatcher (creepers on wall)

Wren (in low bush)

Nuthatch (in hole in trunk of large elm tree)

Little Owl's nest (4 eggs) in hole in ash tree. (1 egg failed to hatch)

Song Thrush (hedge, bush etc) 5

Blackbird (hedge and bush) 2

Pair of Blackbirds reared three broods successfully in same nest.

The diaries don't explain where these nests were located. I would like to think they were in Vic's garden and the immediate surrounds. Ed.



#### **ALLOTMENT DIARY**

In my last diary entry, I mentioned how Adam had ignored my advice, and that of all the books on the subject, and transplanted our sweetcorn from the greenhouse to the allotment in the middle of April – about 5 weeks earlier than recommended. The reason for this advice is that sweetcorn is very susceptible to frost, and frosts in late April and early May are not uncommon. I am happy to say that his gamble has proved successful. There was one night at the end of April when we had an overnight frost, but most of the crop survived. Three plants popped their clogs, and another half dozen or so looked a bit sorry for themselves, with brown leaves and general droopiness: but all of these seem to be surviving. The risk of frost having now (I hope) disappeared, we have now planted the rest of the crop from the greenhouse; and a few more have been planted direct into the ground. The same frost turned the new leaves on the top of our box hedges yellow, but new growth now seems to be coming through.

Talking about frost reminds me that, I suspect in common with most of you, I lost a number of mature plants this winter – no doubt due to the spell of extremely cold weather we had in December. I have gradually become aware of it as the spring has progressed, and I have realised that there is no new growth on the afflicted plants. There were two about which I was particularly sad: one was a fuschia which Clare & I brought back from our holiday in Ireland in 1997. Those of you who have been to Ireland will know that on the west side of the island, where it is more temperate, the majority of the wayside hedges are fuschia. We brought back a cutting, and planted it in our garden, where it had grown very happily until last December. The other was a bay tree that I gave Clare as a present at the beginning of this century – which was in fact three trees intertwined. We kept it in a large pot, and clearly the earth in the pot must have frozen in December. No doubt if we had planted it in the garden, it would have survived. (Our other bay tree did, and I have now noticed other people with bay trees in pots have suffered the same way).

Still virtually no luck with my carrots: of the 4 rows I planted, (I would guess well over 1,000 seeds), only 6 germinated! I have just started replanting, and am praying for some wet weather. Another curious effect of the dry spell is that I planted 3 batches of mange-tout, about one week apart. The first lot grew well, but the second batch came up after the third batch! Presumably the little bit of rain we had at the beginning of May came at the right time to trigger their growth, while the seeds planted earlier had gone a bit dormant, waiting for the rain to arrive.

While I was down at the allotments today, I saw smoke coming from what I thought was a bonfire on Andy's part of the allotment: but on looking closer, I discovered that it was his compost heap, which had spontaneously combusted! Fortunately (while I was thinking I might have to call upon Dave's services) it died down, and I was able to stop worrying.

This year's pumpkin growing competition may be a small one: none of my pumpkin seeds has germinated, and I am told that at the time of writing this piece, three of the allotmenteers to whom I have spoken are in the same boat; and that the fourth has succeeded in starting only one pumpkin plant.

Finally, I have to welcome yet another new allotmenteer: Paul Bruton is now helping Andy Digby with his allotment, so giving Alan more time to spend on his recently acquired boat.



Did you enjoy the Royal Wedding? Perhaps you took the opportunity to visit friends for the day or perhaps you felt a bit sad that Aston Abbotts did not have any community celebrations.

Next year we will all be celebrating the Diamond Jubilee over an extended bank holiday weekend from Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> to Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> June. Whatever your views on the monarchy, this incredible milestone gives us all time to reflect on the huge changes our country has seen during the Queen's reign. The afternoon activities would be inspired by the various decades of the Queen's reign and might include silly races, fancy dress, best picnic hamper/table, throwing sponges at unpopular royals etc. The aim would be to keep costs as low as possible, ideally free, to join in the fun. It would be nice if some of our more senior residents could remember the sorts of things that happened at The Coronation or Silver Jubilee so that these might be included.

At this stage I would like to find out if it would be possible to use marquees owned by villagers as these would be a major expense.

I have been reminded that there are several trees in the village planted for the Silver Jubilee and it seems a good idea to plant some new oak trees around the village to replace those that have been lost or damaged by storms over the years. Hopefully profits from the sale of beer and tea could cover the costs of some trees. There may also be small grants available to fund such things.

### A "nationwide celebration" will be held to mark The Queen's Diamond Jubilee, the government has announced.

Events to mark The Queen's 60 years on the throne will take place in the first weekend of June 2012, with an extra bank holiday being created.

Lord Mandelson said it would be a "truly historic occasion" which would allow the British people to show their "pride and affection" for The Queen.

The Queen's Golden Jubilee in 2002 was marked by celebrations across the UK, including a royal tour and a pop concert featuring guitarist Brian May playing a God Save the Queen solo from the roof of Buckingham Palace. First Secretary of State Lord Mandelson told peers that a series of "fitting events" would be held in the summer to 2012 to mark the Queen's Diamond Jubilee and that planning was at an early stage.

#### 'Remarkable achievement'

He said the government had agreed to grant an additional bank holiday on Tuesday 5 June to provide a focal point for the celebrations.

In addition, the traditional Bank Holiday at the end of May will, in 2012, be moved to 4 June to make it a four day



#### MINUTES OF THE ASTON ABBOTTS ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 2011

The annual Parish Meeting was held on Wednesday 11th May in the Church Room at 8pm.

PRESENT: Peter Shorrock (Chairman of the Parish Council), Paul Bruton (Clerk to the Annual Parish Meeting), Mr D Broadley (AVDC), Ms P Boston (PCSO) and 14 parishioners.

MINUTE 1 Apologies – Mrs Kate Curry and Mr James Perkins.

MINUTE 2 Minutes of previous meeting were approved by the Meeting as a true record, and signed by the Chairman.

MINUTE 3 Matters arising – none.

#### MINUTE 4 County Council, District Council and Police

Police Community Support Officer Paul Boston reported to the meeting that it had been decided this year to incorporate the Neighbourhood Action Group reporting into local Parish meetings on a quarterly basis, giving residents the opportunity to raise any issues of concern.

The crime statistics since the beginning of the year were 6 reported crimes -2 damage to vehicles in Brickstock, 2 burglaries from other buildings (Garden shed or Garage), theft of a vehicle from The Green and a burglary from an other building in Brickstock.

The major incident was the attempted Arson that was under investigation.

There had been 6 calls in respect of other incidents, 4 in relation to suspicious males, 1 in relation to a stolen vehicle left in the village and 1 noise complaint. Paula Boston would encourage people to continue reporting such incidents and if a crime was or believed to be being committed then to call 999.

In response to questions from the meeting it was agreed that a supply of fridge magnets that give the number to call be supplied for residents to collect from either the Church room or The Royal Oak Public House. In regard to a question relating to parking in the village, in particular on verges and pathways PCSO Paula Boston advised that as a rule of thumb if you could get a Mobility scooter or double buggy past then the vehicle was not causing an obstruction. Residents can report the matter and the Police will try to contact the registered owner, the final resort would be the issuing of a ticket. For dangerous parking then they do have the option of removing the vehicle, but again would contact the owner to try to resolve the matter in the first instance.

#### MINUTE 5 The Big Society – Neighbourhood Plan

Mr David Broadley on behalf of the AVDC Forward Plans Group gave a talk to the meeting on the Government's Big Society and in particular the introduction of the Neighbourhood Plan in relation to planning policy.

It is intended to replace top down targets for House building incorporated into the Core Strategy (this had been withdrawn in October 2010) and develop a New system taking a bottom up approach with all communities being able to suggest how much new housing is required in their communities to the year 2031.

Housing policies can be delivered within a Neighbourhood Plan (NP) that is developed by Parish Councils after due consultation with residents. NP's are part of formal planning policy.

A meeting with the Parish Council was scheduled for the 25th May to discuss the likely approach we might take that will include a full Public Consultation and then reported upon by the end of 2012.

The Vale of Aylesbury Plan together with NP's will form the new development policies and strategies, it is intended that local input is sought at all times and nothing will be imposed.

Newsletters produced by AVDC were available at the meeting and can be reviewed on the AVDC website.

There was discussion around the difference between our proposed Village Plan and the NP, the major difference being that the latter will include formal planning policies specific to Aston Abbotts and developed by the Parish Council in consultation with residents. The cost of preparing a NP is borne by the Parish. We can use the resources of AVDC in preparing and planning our Plan if we decide it is something we wish to develop, additionally Grants may be available. If we decide not to develop our own, applications will be considered based upon AVDC policy.

Mr Broadley then took questions from those present, these varied from the concern over the burden being placed on the Village, what happened if we did not prepare a plan or didn't want any development, is the Village plan now redundant, are AVDC working with Local Forums and is there a relationship between the NP and the publicised Community Right to Build.

In summary it was confirmed that AVDC would assist at all times in preparing the plan, there was to be no imposed housing targets, the NP was specific to planning policies whereas the Village plan incorporated wider issues, they only worked with Forums when there was no Parish Council.

Finally Mr Broadley advised he would pass to the Parish Clerk any details on the mechanism of the Community Right to Build as it may be relevant to areas such as purchasing assets for the use by the Village. The Chairman thanked Mr Broadley on behalf of the meeting for his presentation.

#### MINUTE 6 Annual Report from the Parish Council Chairman

The Chairman presented to the meeting his Annual report on matters dealt with by Council during the year that included lodging a complaint on the introduction of the Egg Production plant that Planning enforcement are reviewing at present, finishing the upgrade of the streetlights in the Village, replacing the fencing and gates on the recreation ground, finished repayment of the Loan to fund the playground improvements resulting in a reduction in our Precept.

Additionally with the support of our Local Councillor, County Councillor and neighbouring parishes we had been successful in obtaining funding from the Local Area Forum for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Phase of the footpath to Wingrave Crossroads. Finally he wished to thank Peter Knight who kindly installed a new gate at Lines Hill that had recently been damaged beyond repair.





#### MINUTE 7 Village Plan.

The Chairman read out a report from James Perkins on the current status of the Village Plan.

"Firstly the bad news, it isn't finished. Secondly and more upbeat is the plan has moved into a state where it is very close to completion. The village has a draft village plan and a draft action plan.

The following needs to be undertaken to complete.

The draft action plan needs to be finalised by completing a final piece of consultation with the village as recommended by Community Action Bucks. A questionnaire has been drafted and this needs to be delivered and feedback recorded. Once this is complete the varying different draft sections need combining with the draft action plan. The combination of both will enable the plan to be brought forward for signing.

I have recommended to Councillors Shorrock and Curry that we have a meeting to look at the detail of these broad actions which will take place next week. I will then be able to report back to the Parish Council in the following week at their monthly meeting.

Finally I understand that people might be feeling a little worn regarding the time taken to complete this plan. I agree it is taking a long time however I must reiterate that we are not far off. A final push will see the plan put into publication and I am committed to getting it there."

Village Sign – Mr John Whyte advised that he and his Astonbury colleagues had the idea of using the surplus funds from Astonbury and the Christmas shows to purchase on behalf of the village a Village Sign. He reported that having floated the idea with friends and the Parish Council the feedback had been pretty supportive and he wished to present the idea to a wider audience.

He was therefore asking for ideas for emblems depicting the village that could be incorporated into the design of the sign. It was thought that three such emblems would be representative and details would be included in the Chronicle. It was noted that planning permission would be required

There followed a discussion around the possible location, probably The Green, and the size and materials to be used. All present agreed it was a good idea.

#### MINUTE 8 Church Room

The Chairman read out a short letter he had written to the lawyers regarding completion of the Lease. It seemed that he was unable to get any response or move the matter forward.

It was felt that a meeting of the Committee should discuss this issue and decide what steps to take in order to progress the Lease.

The Chairman believed there were sufficient funds to complete the repairs required to the building that included subsidence in one corner of the building, new kitchen, toilets and electrics. However further funds would be required to build an extension, disabled toilet and access ramps, but that grants may be available from WREN and other similar organisations that supported such projects.

The meeting was in full support of continuing with the objective of securing a Lease.

#### MINUTE 9 The Chronicle

John Hardcastle reported that Janet Issitt was the Editor until December last year, after which there was a gap and he had volunteered to resume as Editor of the village magazine. It was noted that revenues were down, due to less advertising, and that the level of financial support be maintained at last year's level.

#### MINUTE 10 Fete 2010 and 2011

There was nobody present to report on the Fete, however April Curnow reported that as far as she was aware the plans were in place for this year's event and with the continuation of the Summer Ball afterwards, once again it promised to be an exciting day.

- After some discussion, it was agreed to distribute the proceeds as follows:
  - a) Chronicle £600 (regardless of actual takings)
  - b) Church 50% of the remainder
  - c) Church Room fund for refurbishment 35% of the remainder
  - d) Recreation Ground 15% of the remainder

#### MINUTE 11 A.O.B.

Sally Palmer commented that she had noted that the village had not organised anything to celebrate the recent Royal Wedding. It had already been announced that next year in celebration of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee there would be a public holiday on the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> June. It was suggested that the village might like to join in the celebrations and she was suggesting perhaps an event is organised on the Recreation Ground that could include activities for children, 50's style picnic and if any residents were around at the time of the Coronation any ideas for the day would be welcome. Any funds raised from the day could perhaps be put towards replacing some of the Oak trees the village has lost over the last few years.

It was agreed this was a good idea and an article asking for ideas, suggestions and volunteers would be included in the Chronicle.

The Chairman thanked all those attending and the meeting closed at 9.40pm

#### **COUNTRYSIDE MATTERS**

Last year Bovine Tuberculosis caused the slaughter of 38,000 cattle in this country. The cost to the Taxpayer ran into millions. The cost to the Livestock and Dairy Farmers was heartache, anguish and despair. 



#### **Cooking in Morocco**

We recently spent a week in the Imperial cities of Morocco, probably the most interesting of which was Fez. This is the most ancient of the Imperial capitals and the most complete medieval city of the Arab world. Fez Medina is a maze of some 10,000 narrow streets which turn randomly at right angles and are identified only by occasional names in Arabic script. This blanket of buildings covers the rolling contours of the land and even today is inhabited by some 200,000 people. The only freight transport within this area is by donkey and small two wheeled trailers drawn by local porters. A traffic jam is easily caused by two donkeys meeting going in opposite directions.

Our accommodation, the Riad Laaroussa is located somewhere in the middle of this maze so not surprisingly we were met at the gate and guided through the streets. The Riad is a very recently restored 17th century palace owned and lived in by Fred, Cathy, their children and pets. For visitors there are 4 suites and 4 other massive en suite bedrooms and a Hamman, a steam bath where you can get a scrub and a massage. The Riad's staff are all treated as part of the family which is very refreshing and this all helps to create the feeling that you are living at home, rather than in a hotel.

Cuisine at the Riad is under the direction of head chef, Samira who is ably assisted by Fatima. One of the features that attracted us to this particular Riad rather than one of the many others, was that it offered guests a free cooking day for no more than the price of the evening meal. This started in the morning with Samira taking us on a tour of the local markets, watching as she selected the meat (good cuts of lamb on the bone), vegetables, fruit and other ingredients required for dinner that evening. Nothing escaped Samira's eye - even the broad beans were sampled raw to make sure that they were sweet enough. There was then some negotiation with the prices. I am sure Samira always got a good deal but then she is there buying from the same vendors six days a week. We wondered how all the purchases would get back to the Riad, but a porter appeared with his trailer, visiting stalls in our wake, collecting Samira's purchases. Somehow he seemed to know where we had been. The morning finished with a stop for mint tea at a local street cafe.

After lunch, we appeared at the kitchen for the next stage of our day. The main dish for that evening was Tagine of lamb with raisins and almonds. Traditionally this is cooked slowly in an oven in the crockery pyramid shaped Tagine so that the meat is tender. The process effectively steams the lamb. But in Samira's kitchen this wasn't really practical, so the meat was first cooked in huge pressure cookers to hasten the process. Then it was put into large saucepans and simmered until it was tender and the wonderful rich sauce was ready.

We were set to work sorting currants individually. We had to pick out and discard the hard ones which would never soften up however much they were cooked. The acceptable ones went in with the simmering lamb.

I was set to work making a moist sponge cake for the following morning's breakfast. The various ingredients were added to the bowl as I continually whisked until the consistency met with Samira'a approval. The mixture was then poured into two large circular doughnut shaped moulds and baked in the oven for at least an hour. We watched Fatima making apple tarts for dessert. First the sweet pastry was mixed and rolled out and Fatima then lined the tart dishes. Each apple was peeled, cored and sliced and then carefully arranged by hand in the tart. Finally a custard type mix was poured over the top and more strips of pastry arranged on top. The recipe is available on Samira's internet blog spot, but in French.

Finally that evening we sat down to dinner in the open air of the Riad's courtyard. Knowing that we had played a small part in its preparation made that an evening not to forget.

#### Mad Summer Ball for 'Care for Casualties' 2nd July Upper Wingbury Farm, Wingrave The Rifles regiment and their charity by Jane Murrell

OUR small group is now well advanced with the organization of the Mad Summer Ball, with all the entertainment confirmed, contracts signed and many bills paid. Caterers all booked. We have some great donations for the raffle, silent auction, tombola and the main auction. Many different things such as four VIP tickets to see 'Take That' at Wembley on 9th July, and Grand Prix tickets for 10th July. (Yes, that's the weekend after the ball.) For which we are very grateful as without these generous donations the event would not be able to go ahead. We thank all of the companies and individual who have donated.

I would like to give you a little more information about our chosen charities, and will start this month with The Rifles. whose charity is 'Care for Casualties'. The ball will raise funds for them, and also for 'Help for Heroes'. The Rifles are the largest infantry regiment in the British Army. Infantry are a body of soldiers who march and fight on foot. They march at 140 paces per minute, faster than any other infantry (who march at 120 paces per minute). The Rifles consist of five regular and two territorial battalions. Their current roles and locations are: 1st battalion - commando infantry, Chepstow

2<sup>nd</sup> battalion - Northern Ireland

3rd battalion - Edinburgh

4th battalion - mechanized infantry, Bulford 5th battalion - armoured infantry, Paderborn, Germany

6th battalion - Territorial Army, Exeter: South West England

7th battalion - Territorial Army, Reading: Home Counties and London.

Territorial elements of the regiment are spread throughout the South West and Home Counties. They support operations worldwide, and most recently Salonika Company from the 7th Rifles was deployed to Afghanistan. The Rifles cap badge is worn by all army cadets in Buckinghamshire.

The Rifles charity is 'Care for Casualties'. Their mission statement: "Endure the responsibility to safeguard the welfare of the regiment's serving soldiers, its 35,000 veterans and their families through financial and practical support." Since February 2007, Rifles battalions have been deploying almost continuously on operations, the intensity and ferocity of which has cost the lives of 50 Riflemen killed in action and more than 290 seriously injured. Many of these injuries are life changing for them and their families. In addition to this, it is anticipated that many veterans will suffer from psychological problems at some stage in the future. This will give The Rifles charity a significant increase in the amount of financial benevolence needed to meet those needs.

The support they can give varies from counselling for depression of a close relative after the death of a Rifleman, driving lessons for a triple amputee, funding re-training courses for soldiers invalided out of the army, to providing a stair lift for an elderly veteran. Last year there were 691 individual cases funded by the regiment. The units based at Milton Keynes have had their own share of fatalities. On the 15th November 2009, Rifleman Andy Fentiman (from E Company, 7 Rifles, Milton Keynes) was shot and killed during firefight whilst serving in Sangin, Afghanistan. He was a personal friend to many of the guys based at MK.

At the moment The Rifles charity gives grants of almost £400,000 per year to help those vulnerable members of the regimental family who require assistance. In the coming years it is assessed that the regiment will not be able to sustain its current level of benevolence let alone address any increase without significant extra funds. Our Riflemen are recruited from throughout the country and represent every walk of life. For each casualty the regiment sustains, a family's life is changed forever. We all owe them our enduring support. So please come and meet some for them at the **Mad Summer Ball: 2nd July, Upper Wingbury Farm, Wingrave.** Enjoy an evening of entertainment while helping these men and women who need our help now and in the future.





If you have a domestic alarm always ensure this is set and that you give details of the key holder to your monitoring station.






